Two Costly Fumbles Prepare Touchdown Drives For Commodores In Nashville

BOB DAVIS THROTTLED BY VANDY DEFENDERS Small Rain-drenched Crowd Watches Morrisonsmen Capitalize Breaks

By GEORGE KERLER KERNEL SPORTS EDITOR Nashville, Tenn.—A crowd of 5,000 rain-battered fans saw two Kentucky fumbles prop a pair of Vanderbilt touchdown drives to a 22-0 victory over the Wildcats here on Dudley Field in the season's debut for a cold conference event.

Bob Davis, killed in Nashville as a football-incapable rookie, was called back and the Wynnesmen were penalized 15 yards for clipping. Another foul, a quarterback, was covered and was barred on the K-11. On this play Joe Ague, Vandy back, was injured and forced to leave the game.

At this point Kentucky started an aerial rally. Coleman passed to Garland on the Kentucky 36. Davis blocked the Commodore punt but back and the Wynnesmen were penalized 15 yards for clipping. Another foul, a quarterback, was covered and was barred on the K-11. On this play Joe Ague, Vandy back, was injured and forced to leave the game.

A fine back failed, a pass was blocked, and Vanderbilt sent in Bert Marshall at quarterback and Shepherd Marshall Robinson at the line.

Taking Marshall's punt, Davis scooped back 14 yards to the V-40. Another screen pass, Coleman to Davis, brought the ball down to the Vanderbilt 29. This was the deepest yardage gained by the Wildcats yet to see during the afternoon.

Simpson failed to gain and the V-men broke up another Coleman pickup. Davis lost three and when he attempted to punt on the next play, he fumbled, Vanderbilt retrieving on the V-48.

Before the Kentuckys could settle down again, Marshall had the ball on the K-11. But a holding penalty against Vandy destroyed the advance. Kentucky taking the ball on their own ten. Running and passing proved yardage, so Davis punched out of danger. . . . .

But Vanderbilt came on once more. Within five plays they were down to the K-3 before the Kentucky line held well. He

sparkplugged Vanderbilt during the entire 50 yard drive. . . . .

Taking the kickoff on his own eight, Davis returned it to the 33 yard line. On this play Sydney, the game's outstanding lineman, suffered a cut over his eye and was taken out of the battle. Bob Hall replaced him. . . . .

After an offside penalty, Coleman threw two passes, both incomplete. Again while attempting to punt, Davis fumbled and the Commos recovered on the K-17. This time the Wildcats line stopped the frantic Vandy, Kentucky taking the ball on their own 13. Simpson made seven, Davis gained one, and Coleman, trying to heave, found no one there and was thrown for a ten yard loss. . . . .

This time Davis punted out to midfield where Hinklebain pulled down Marshall. Vanderbilt was touchdownward again and had the ball down on Kentucky's 18 when the half-whistle lovingly interceded. . . . .

Coleman carried the second semester kickoff to the K-33. Walter Fodge, who replaced Simpson as fullback, muffed the cowhide on the first play and McElreath, a greedy Vandy wing, pounced on the ball. . . . .

It took but four plays to register the second Commo score. Marshall sprinted 20 yards to the Kentucky 10 where Fodge nabbed him. A plunge gathered two more and Marshall arrowed through center for seven to the K-1 where Ford carried it over for the next six markers. The placement was low. . . . .

Davis returned the kickoff to the K-30. The teams exchanged offside penalties. On the next play Coleman passed to Davis but the ball bounced from him into the arms of Linden, Kentucky tackle, an ineligible man. The officials gave the ball to Vanderbilt on the Kentucky 35, where Linden caught the ball. . . . .

It was at this point that the Wildcats went wild. There were eleven impersonations of Burehly Grimes stamping around the referee. The 'Cats' editorial comment was so bitter that they were penalized five yards for arguing, a gross understatement. . . . .

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and smothered a runner for a six yard loss, as the quarter ended. After Sherman Hinklebain intercepted a Commo pass and returned it to the K-33, the Wildcats were somewhat ignited. Tom Coleman, looking vainly for a pair of free hands, fumbled and was compelled to run. He made nine yards, Fodge gained six and four. Davis fumbled and lost two. Another incomplete loss and Hodge booted to the Vandy 40. . . . .

McCubbin broke into the game at right end for Kentucky and immediately monkey-wrenched a Vandy lateral for a seven yard loss. The Vanderbiltists then punted over the K goal line. . . . .

Again Kentucky started. The Commodores were offside and Coleman picked up 16 yards around end. With the Vandy pass defense now mastering the situation, Coleman was lucky to get a pass away without being niled for a loss. Hodge kicked after two more plays brought nothing. Vandy taking the ball on their own 23. . . . .

The 'Cats' charging fast now, smothered the V-offense and forced them to kick. Davis being dumped on the K-32. A pass, Coleman to Robinson, was good for 20 yards. The kick was muffed by Coleman. Their line pounding was futile. Commos intercepted a pass and their so they punted to Davis on Kentucky's 16 yard stripe. . . . .

Hodge ripped off 19 yards; Coleman got five around end; and Davis, loose for the first time in the game, galloped 24 yards to the Vandy 36. . . . .

Here the Nashvilleans, ranks full of substitutes, tightened up and took the ball on downs as the game got the gong and everybody ran for cover. . . . .

Vanderbilt made 13 first downs against Kentucky's 6. Vandy tried four passes, completed one, good for five yards. Kentucky tried 15, completed four, good for sixty-three yards. Vanderbilt gained 234 yards running and the Wildcats made 93. . . . .
