The brothers of Alpha Phi Alpha social fraternity hosted their Second Annual Unity Breakfast yesterday morning. Organizers estimated that over 300 people attended.

Speakers addressed the crowd on reflections of Dr. King's commitment to education, spirituality, civil rights and humanitarianism. James Lee, Jr., chairman of the Unity Breakfast Committee, said today's youth possess the power to make King's dream a reality.

"Children should honor their parents, have respect for themselves, other youth, their elders," Lee said, "and youth need to get their education, stay of the complete of the said above all they need to get a good above all they need to get a good Christian foundation for living a full life."

pants holding hands and singing "We Shall Overcome."

Mary Smith, president of Kentucky State University, spoke about the importance of education to blacks.

"We have come from slavery; without education we will revert back to slavery," smith said. "The difference, though, this time will be that we will have enslaved ourselves."

WASHINGTON — Hillary Rodham Clinton said yesterday that her conversations with presidential aides on reported financial mismanagement at the White House travel office unintentionally prompted the mass frings there. While continuing to maintain that she didn't order the travel office purge, the first lady said that aides could have misconstrued her remarks to mean she wanted the seven employees dismissed.

"The mere expression of concern could be, I guess, taken to mean something more than ... was meant." Mrs. Clinton told the "Diane Rehm Show" on Washington radio station WAMU-FM.

Mrs. Clinton said she was told by White House aides in the days before the firings that an accounting firm had been engaged to examine possible financial mismanagement in the travel office, and "I said that sounds like a good idea."

In explaining why she thinks her remarks could have been misconstrued to mean more than she intended, Mrs. Clinton said that living in the White House is "an entirely different environment" than what she is used to. The first lady said that she has spent a lifetime dealing with people "in a very direct way" and saying what "was on my mind."

WASHINGTON — Pentagon investigators
believe that four former American soldiers who

a U.S. defense official said yesterday.

The official, who spoke on condition of
anonymity, also said the Pentagon was pursuing
unconfirmed intelligence leads that as many as 11
Americans taken prisoner in the 1950-53 Korean
War were still alive in the North.

The intelligence leads emerged in the late
1980s, but until now the Pentagon has not commented publicly on them.

The four Americans the Pentagon be blieves are
living in North Korea have no connection with
the Korean War.

They were among six U.S. soldiers who
defected in the 1960s from the Army's 2nd
Infantry Division, based in South Korea, the official said. Pentagon investigators believe two of
the six died.

#### Shooting near arena concerns students

The weekend shooting of a Lexington man after a UK basketball game has students and citizens concerned for their safety while attending games at Rupp Arena.

The man, Dr. Lane T. Veltkump, a psychiatrist at the Chandler Medical Center, said the incident after Saturday's UK-Tennessee game, illustrates that the area around Rupp Arena and downtown Lexington may not be safe.

"If you can't go to a ball game, if you can't walk with your family and friends and sit in your car without having people attempt to murder you, it's pretry outragous," he said.

Veltkamp, who evaluates Kentucky's most high-profile murderers for the state's criminal courts, said Sunday night he was shot in the shoulder but not seriously wounded.

A gunman chased Veltkamp, his wife

A gunman chased Veltkamp, his wife and another couple after they left the game, then fired into their car, wounding Veltkamp, the driver.

He said the men did not try to rob him or take his car: "This is an attempted murder."

Lexington police Lt. Ken Hall said he knew of no previous attacks after a UK

Same. Veltkamp said he, his wife, Mary Beth, and friends Don and Elva Mallot of northern Kentucky left the game two minutes before it ended. About 9:25-p.m., the four walked out of Rupp Arena, across the Rupp Arena parking lot, then about a block and a half down Patterson Street toward the Veltkamp car. What happened next took only seconds, he said.

Two men walked within 3 feet of them and said something like "Hello, have a nice evening," he said. Veltkamp's group returned the greeting.

Mary Beth Veltkamp glanced back a little later and saw the men running toward them. At that point, the two couples were 30 or 40 feet from Veltkamp's Lexus.

Mary Beth Veltkamp told the others to run to the car, and Lane Veltkamp unlocked the doors and started the engine, he said. The windows were rolled up.

Then, he said, "the guy comes up to the car. I looked out my window, and there was a gun aimed right at my hed. He fires four bullets."

The first bullet when in Veltkamp's shoulder, hit a boine, came out the other side and landed on the front seat. The second shot went through the rear window on the driver's side, lodging in the headrest behind Veltkamp's head.

Two other shots hit the back door 4 inches below the window. Both windows on the driver's side were shattered.

Realizing he had been shot, Veltkamp frove to the UK Hospital and called police on the way from his car phone.

"It was a big shock to us," Veltkamp said. "I am glad we are alive."

Veltkamp has attended UK basketball games for 25 years and said he often parks on Patterson Street to avoid post-game traffic. He said he never felt unsafe before. "I thought we were safe," Veltkamp said. "We were just four people walking to our ar."

#### Halls facing RA shortage

Advisers could be in short supply next year at UK's dorms unless students answer the call.

The Office of Residence Life is looking to fill the approximately 50 to 60 resident adviser positions available for next fall, said Melanie-Tyner-Wilson, assistant director of Residence Life.

"We have a large group of students graduating or moving on to other things," Tyner-Wilson said. "We are looking for students who have a desire to do something that deals with people."

RAs reside on a floor with approximately 30-40 students and provide support and counsel.

The role of the resident adviser is also to initiate intellectual, cultural, social and recreational program activities for residents.

Matt Englehard, director of Haggin Hall for the past three years, said the role of disciplinarian is not as large as some think. "(RAs) are there among their peers. For the most part, they have fum with the job, "Englehard said.

Tyner-Wilson wants students to understand there are both positive and negative aspects to being an RA.

#### **UK's women commit 35** turnovers in loss to UT

The UK women's basketball team didn't give itself much of a chance to pull an upset on fourth-ranked Tennessee Sunday at Memorial Coliseum.

The Cats turned the ball over 35 times, including 11 giveaways by Christian Jansen, while literally handing Tennessee a 60-45 victory in front of 1,527 mostly orange-clad fans.

"Obviously, when you have 35 turnovers, you're not going to put yourself in a position to win," UK coach Bernadette Locke-Mastrox said.

The Lady Vols were led by Michelle Marciniak's school-record 11 steals. Marciniak also led Tennessee in scoring, pouring in 16 points, eight of them off steals.

The Vols jumped out quickly

ing in 16 points, eight of them off steals.

The Vols jumped out quickly against UK, taking a 24-6 lead after 12 Wildcat turnovers.

But after a Marciniak three, UK ran off 14 of the next 16 points, thanks in part to three UT turnovers and four missed shots. UK's run cut the Tenessee lead to 26-20 with 4-16 left until intermission.

Soon though, UK reverted back to form turning the basket-ball over on six out of its last nine possessions before halftime, and Tennessee took a 32-2-0 advantage into the break.

"I have to credit our defense," Locke-Mattox said. "I thought we played outstanding defense in the first half. But you can't score when you don't have the ball in your hands."

UK finished the first half with 19 turnovers, with the Lady Volsturning the miscues into 19 points.

At times, Tennessee had trou-

At times, Tennessee had troughed controlling the ball. The Lady Vols finished the game with 20 turnovers, 10 in the first half. Tennessee coach Par Summit was, to say the least, disappointed with her team's lackluster performance against UK.

right now," Summitt said, "so IT don't have a whole lot to say. We weren't real inspired to play."
The second half was much like the first, as UT expanded its lead to 40-20, with 17-47 left. The Vols forced the Cats into open the second stanza.

UK made another run cutting the UT lead to 42-31 after Shaunda Roberts, who led UK with 15 points, hit a jump shot from the foul line with 11:12-to go.

Tennessee freshman Chamique Holdsclaw promptly, answered the Cats' mini-run, scoring six points and expanding the UT lead to 48-34 with 6:46 left. The Cats could claw no closer than 12 the rest of the

Tennessee managed to turned the UK turnovers into 30 points, while the Cats could only manage 16 points off UT miscues.

"We absolutely didn't execute tonight," Locke-Mattox said, "and it's something that I'm very disappointed with."



From there Marisol's life begins to disintegrate. Someone with her name is killed on her street and she, and everyone else, become confused about whether or not she was the one who died. She meets Lenny, the mentally unstable brother of her friend June, who insists that he's in love with her, and who leads her to commit an act that horrifies her and the audience.

Throughout most of the songs, strong rhythms keep your attention. At times punkishly droning, the band carries the rhythm to its most intense point before carrying it to a transition.


Perhaps the only thing "Bar Chord Ritual" lacks is consistency, but consistently great songs and lyrics are a rarity and of course, the difference between



# Clinton says U.S. must heal divisions

ATLANTA — Preaching racial unity from Martin Luther King Jr.'s pulpit, President Clinton said yesterday the slain civil rights leader would find his dream unfulfilled today. "He would say to us, 'You've still got a ways to go," the president said.

"We have to continue to heal the racial divisions that still tear at our nation," Clinton said during the preeminent ceremony for King commemorations across the country.

country.

The president waited three hours to speak, visibly enjoying the lengthy, lively memorial to the civil rights activist and Nobel

Peace Prize laureate who would have turned 67 Monday. King was killed April 4, 1968. Linking arms with King's son, Dexter, and wife, Coretra Scott King, the president puffed out his chest and sang "We Shall Over-come" and "Lift Every Heart and Sing."

Kennedy told a stunned crowd in the Indiana capital that King had been killed. "Crisis came in an awesome, horrible way that night," said Lugar, who in 1968 was Indianapolis' 36-year-old mayor.





#### Telescope breaking new ground

SAN ANTONIO — In time exposures focused for days on an obscure dot in the universe, the flubble Space Telescope photographed the faintest stars and galaxies ever seen — some 4 billion times dimmer than what is visible to the naked eye.

"Most of these galaxies have never been seen before," said Robert E. Williams, director of the Space Telescope Science Institute in Baltimore. Just how old the galaxies are has not been determined. They could be the most distant, and hence the oldest, ever detected, he said.
"In archaeological terms, it is similar to finding a royal city, but we don't have the dates yet," he said. "We don't know yet if we are seeing the most distant objects or not."

A report on the just completed

A report on the just completed deep space survey was delivered yesterday to the national meeting of the American Astronomical Society.

Williams said the finding was released quickly into the public domain so that the world's astronomers can immediately begin studying the data, described by some as "the astronomical equivalent of the Dead Sea Scrolls."

To gather the views, the Hubble Space Telescope was aimed at a specific target and allowed to capture light for 10 consecutive days.

The target was a point in the sky near the handle of the Big Dipper, a part of the universe con-tinuously in view of the orbiting space telescope.

Seen from the Earth, the target was very small, "about the size of a large grain of sand held at arms length," said Williams. To ground telescopes, the area seemed basi-cally a blank part of the sky. Yet the long exposure revealed at least 1,500 galaxies in various stages of formation.

"The variety of galaxies we see is amazing," said Williams.

The study is rather like taking a core sample of the Earth. Such a sample would have many layers of dirt and rock laid down over millions of years. In the celestial core sample, what is captured are views of stars and galaxies ranging farther and farther into the universe and increasingly distant in time.

Some images could be from galaxies formed within a billion years after the beginning of the universe, but Williams said this will require detailed analysis to determine.

"It's like looking down a long tube and seeing all the galaxies along that line of sight," said Mark Dickinson, a member of the Hubble Space Telescope team. "They're all stacked up against one another in this picture, and the challenge now is to disentangle them."

#### Yale instructors quit grade strike By Brigitte Greenburg Associated Press

NEW HAVEN, Conn. — Yale University teaching assistants who refused to hand in grades in a protest against working conditions ended their "grade strike" yesterday, saying the threat of firings was too strong.

In a closed-door meeting late Sunday, members of the Graduate Employees and Students Organization voted to end the job action even though they had not gotten any concessions from the university.

Faculty members have threat-ened striking (teaching assistants) with disciplinary hearings, with their academic careers," the group's chairwoman, Robin Brown, wrote. The strikers "have voted to hand in our grades ... so as to secure our teaching positions for the coming term."

The school had set yesterday as the deadline for the teaching assistants, all graduate students, to hand in grades or face disciplinary action.

The university said more than 80 graduate students had withheld the grades of their undergraduate students after the fall semester ended last month. The graduate student group claimed the number was more than 200. In all, the school has about 2,500 graduate students.

## Influential Mexican drug trafficker arrested

WASHINGTON — Juan Garcia Abrego, accused of being a top Mexican drug trafficker and one of the FBI's 10 Most Wanted, has been arrested in Mexica and deported to Houston yesterday, the U.S. government said.

Garcia was indicted in September 1993 as the leader of a drug ring "responsible for transporting tons of cocaine into the Calic carted and for authorizing acts of violence, including murders," the State Department said.

In Mexico City, Mexican authorities confirmed the arrest but said Garcia Abrego had not been deported.

Garcia Abrego was the first international drug trafficker listed on the FBI's most wanted list and was the target of an intensive manhunt on both sides of the border.

The 51-year-old Garcia Abrego allegedly heads a drug cartel that U.S. law enforcement officials say smuggles hundreds of tons of Colombian cocaine across the border into the United States

The organization is alleged to spend millions of dollars in bribing Mexican authorities to facilitate their trade.
