# SG ups spending for execs, projects

Increase: Two senators vote against budget, say too much money allotted for exec. staff

Student Government sensitors have approved a budget for the 2001-2002 school year, securing \$246, 221 to be spent on various internal operations and student-oriented service projects. The budget was passed 21:2.

Compared to the 2000-2000 budget, \$80,598 more has been allocated to select projects this year; \$3,000 for a new "What it year; \$3,000 for a senate chairman fund; and \$27,700 for an executive support staff."

The organization receives its

annual revenue from a general UK fund, called the 2 Account; and self-generated clunds from telephone and account, and self-generated clunds from telephone and account.

More than 75 percent of the total balance of SG revenue comes from a \$4.25 fee paid by students each semester. The fee was raised in the spring. The projected revenue from students this school year is \$199.125.

SG President Tim Robinson, who created the budget, said it reflects the group's mission of unity, service and advocacy for students.

"At the end of the year, peo-

ey's worth," Robinson said.

Parts of the financial plan
have sparked debate within the
organization, primarily concerning the \$27,700 allotment to the
executive support staff members
on SG.

The support sail memoers on the season receive an hourly wage that covers a minimum number of work hours each week. They also keep time logs of when they work. Robinson said.

College of Arts and Science Senator Zach Webb and Senator Tach Webb and Senator at large David Hutchinson, the two who voted against the budget, said they find strong faults within the executive staff apportionment.

"It's wasteful spending,"
Hutchinson said. "It's going to positions that I don't think are needed."

Hutchinson said he believes

most students would not support the payroll for the executive staff support. Last year, SG President Jim-my Glenn allocated \$12,000 for three staff members, Robinson said.

Boyd said he understood why the Indiana game needed to be postponed and his team accepted the decision.

"If eel sorry for what happened," Boyd said. "We put our trust in the NCAA to make that decision and we have to feed off that decision."

The Cats' QB said he and his teammates were now anxious to play and that they definitely have their work cut out for them against the Gators.

The Cats (20) have won 14 straight meetings with UK, dating back to 1987 and were victorious in Gainesville last year 59.31.

Caudill will be joined on defense by a healthy David Johnson at safety and Jeremy Bowie at cornerback, both of whom missed the Bail State game.


Senior linebacker Jamal White will see his first action of the season after serving a two-game suspension by the NCAA.






