last note is due the 7th of Feb.
Those that owe me as far back as
June I will bring suit on them
if he dont come up then. It is
a nice out I cant get what is
due me on the land I have sold.
There said, there have to pay taxes
on it too. I will need the money
1st of March to pay on what I
have bought, and if Mrs. B. dont
pay her part of taxes I will bring
on her notes if she lets the first
go past due. Every foot of ground
down there must be assessed
against me. The amount is \$218.

I cant write any more. Hope I
see you and all are well.

Dear Bronnie:

I received your some
days ago and would have answered
sooner, but wanted to consult an
atty about this business. I had
a talk with Col J. Embury Allen.
He said he didn't see how they
could legally sell my part if
I owed no debt, and had not
been summons by the Sheriff
here. Didnt father have a \$500⁰⁰
life insurance for Mable, In
the will dont it say at Ma's

the place is to be equally
divided between you, Ella, I, and
Remmie's children. Ma should have
paid her out of the insurance,
and, if she could stop the ^{suit}, by giving
\$500~~00~~ out of ^{her} 116 acres at her
death. I dont ^{see} how they can sell
the place before they get a judge-
ment. I will not sign the deed
if it is sold, one thing certain
for I dont owe her anything.
I got a letter from Ella yes-
terday wanting me to come
down with you and go on her
bond. I dont think that would
do. I have nothing in my name
and you are ⁱⁿ the same fix.
She could get some bond Co.
to go on her bond books like.
I would like to do any thing

I could for Ma in her old age, I couldn't bid in the place as I havent the money and, if did bid it in, Mable, Ida's Children and Filmore would want their money at once. I owe the bank here and they are after me for it, so I am in such a fix I couldn't pay my railroad fair to Louisville I cant that, that is owing to me to do anything. Well we have had a nice little rain to day. I wanted to sow some barley to day, will sow about 20 acres. I am

thinking of sowing some wheat.
Dr Coyle offers to furnish the seed
and give $\frac{1}{2}$. I will go to Lexington
tomorrow to see him.

I don't feel very well, am
suffering with a pain in my
side. I got wet to day and
have the toothache to night.
I hope you all are well. Tell
Beedie. The calf got her udder
she left in the tub.

loads. Velma is still com-
pressing. Hope you are all
well. Write soon.

Dear Bessie,

I wrote you and sent
you a letter I received from
Mrs B. I wrote her that I
would extend the time. Now
I send you an answer to
my letter. I wrote her that
I would get young, she had
Miller to resurvey it. I have
not received any thing from
Miller and he is just as liable
to make mistakes as young.
You tell her I was not willing
to sell less than 40 acres

She offered me \$600⁰⁰ per acre
for the balance some weeks ago
you tell her that if she dont
take it, I will close the trade
with the other party and they
will put up some cottages
and that will be very
undesirable to her. I extended
her note until the 3rd of Nov
Now I need the money
to pay on this place and I
dont know what I will do
if it is not fixed up soon.
I wrote Morley to send Weller
but he has not done it. I
owe a note pass due in the bank
and also my taxes. Tell me a
boat Ma's business. Hope all is
well. I still complain of my side.
I pretended that I could sell the
other part to a party. I must close.

Dear Mr Lyon

Your letter received
yesterday. You remember this is
the way I bought your land.
When Mr Young went to survey
my son Helen showed him
the ~~boundary~~ ^{boundary} limits of what he
wanted, not knowing the number
of acres. Mr Young made them
contain 39 acres. Now we find
there are less than 34 acres. I am
not ready as I have told you
to buy any more land at present.
But hope to be able after this
year, perhaps in the fall to buy
the rest of the place. There is no

mal use of making a new
deed. Correct the No of acres +
from this note now due deduct
the price of the missing acres -
Credit me with interest paid on
that amount, + let the other notes
stand as they are.

When ever this is done + my deed
is so I can have it recorded I
am ready to pay you what I at
present owe you. Put yourself
in my place. I wrote to your
brother + yourself about this
mistake + you see the ones
to correct it, so it is not my
fault that it has been delayed.
No one was really to blame
but Bob Young. He had to
acknowledge his mistake + would
not correct it. Your brother went
to him + insisted upon his

correcting his error. My sons went
to, so did Mr Parsons + Mr Miller
two other Surveyors. But no one
could move him. There was
nothing for me to do, but to get
a Surveyor to do the work, which
costs me \$15.00. which I ought not
to be compelled to pay, as I was
to have a correct survey without
any expense.

I have almost had nervous prostration
over this matter + hope it will be
settled at once, which it certainly
can be as we know the number of
acres.
