Power moves fail; Gandhi's reign ends

On the surface it appears that democracy has returned to India. Prime Minister Indira Gandhi, who lost her seat in Parliament in this week's national election, said Monday that she would resign her position today.

Her departure marks the end of an era in Indian history, and leaves questions about the future of what has been termed the "world's

Shortly after her defeat was announced, Gandhi lifted India's 21-month-old state of entergency. The emergency, which was used as justification for jailing several of Gandhi's key opponents, was imposed after the State High Court of Allahabad upheld her conviction for violating campaign practices during the 1971 elections. elections

emergency restrictions in January and allowed free elections. It was a move that cost Gandhi her job and led to the defeat of her Congress Party, which has ruled India since it became an independent nation 30 years ago.

The 39-year-old prime minister lost her parliamentary seat to former Socialist leader Narain, who was jailed during the state of emergency. Immediately after the election returns started flowing, the oposition coalition, the Janata (Peoples) Party, called for her resignation.

Stripped of power and in the new minority party, Gandhi agreed to step down. India's fate is now in the hands of the Janta

Party, which was formed two months ago rarty, which was formed two mon-Communist through the merger of four non-Communist opposition groups. The leading contender for Gandhi's post appears to be Morarji R. Desai, 81.

Desai served as deputy prime minister and finance minister until he and the old-line leadership of the Congress Party split with Gandhin 1969. Earlier he had served as minister of commerce and industry and as chief minister of Bombay.

Desai is a srong opponent of communism and has criticized Gandhi for being unfriendly to the West. Desai, who was jailed during the state of emergency, continually lashed out against Gandhi's dictatorship and became a central figure in the campaign.

It's interesting to note that Gandhi is the first "dictator" in memory to be voted out of office During an 11-year reign Gandi moved India into the nuclear age, signed a friendship treaty with Russia and fought a war with China.

In addition to the damages incurred as a result of the state of emergency order, Gandhi's reign was jeopardized by a government sterilization program. Initiated as a voluntary program, Gandhi later forced sterilization on India's 620

As with most powerful leaders, Gardhi took some positive and negative steps. But, in the end, she had lost the people's support.



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

After a so-so dual meet season, the Cats rallied to capture their second consecutive SEC championship and, in the process, qualified seven men for the NCAA tournament.

Out of the seven who traveled to Norman, Okla, last week, four emerged as All-Americans. Wrestling is unique in that the top six place winners of each class in the NCAA tourney are automaticily named All-Americans.

Wildcat Jimmy Carr, wrestling in the 128-pound weight class, nailed down fifth place and became the third Carr All-American (brethes Fletcher and Joe preceded him).
Jimmy advanced in the tourney by defeating Colorado's Marvin Gasner 13-8 and Michigan's Amos Goodlow 12-3. In the quarter-finals Carr dropped a

Then, in the consolation match, Carr defeated Terry Farley, of Portland State, 9-7 before losing to lowa State's Mike Land 6-1. Carr then embarrassed Martin in a rematch, 11-5. to capture fifth place honors. "I think I should've

Kurt Mock made All-America for the second straight year but it want' easy. Mock was upset in his

first match by Pat Neu of Minnesota, 6-2. Neu was unseeded but Mock wasn't his only victim. Neu eventually won the 134-pound championship.

To finish fourth, Mock defeated Mark Preston of Arizona 9-3. Tom Scotton of Fucknell 6-2, and Lee Roy Smith of Oklahoma 8-2. In the consolation finals Mock was defeated by Franc Affentranger of California State Bakersville.

Patients who produce extremely small amounts of insulin must inject it directly into the bloodstream in order to regulate their dangerously tigh sugar levels. Nine test patients who faithfully followed the diet were able to give up daily injections of insulin. Must had been taking 20 units or less of

injections of insulin. Most had been taking 20 units or less of insulin and were capable of producing limited amounts of their own insulin.

Other patients who require 30 units or more of insulin were not able to significantly lower their insulin requirements even with

requirements, even with strict adherence to An-



strict adherence to Anderson's delt.

"These people are total diabetics: we don't think they produce any insulin at all." Anderson said. "For those patients taking less than 30 urits of insulin, we can, through the diet, enhance their production so they can function independently."

Six diabetic patients who used and diabetes pills were able to discontinue their use when they followed Anderson's diet All of the diabetics in the research program were hospitalized

Diet good for everyone
Anderson, through his
research, has become an
advocate of the high fiber
diel—for everybody. "People
who stick to high-fiber diets
are healthier." he said.
He cited a widelypublicated study of an African
diet compared with American
and British diets. The study
indicates "fiber is the difference" for the low incidence among Africans of
such conditions as diabetes,
intestinal ailments, obesity,
hemmorrhoids and varicose
veirs.

The occurrence of diabetes, said the UK medical researcher, is rising at a rapid rate in the US, and outld become the country's number one health problem within a few years.

Anderson hopes that with detary changes, the rise can be checked. He welcomes inquiries from veterans who are diabetic—he has already received 1,000 letters—and who might be willing to try his diet under supervision in an effort to remove the need for insulin or anti-diabetes pills.
