# UK seeks volunteers for testing HIV vaccine

**Research program: Doctor says participants will not be injected with HIV virus in study**

UK officials announced Friday that the university has been selected to participate in a major HIV vaccine-research program.

Dr. Richard Greenberg, principle investigator and professor in the College of Medicine, said the university was

chosen because of its track record in research.

"UK has had experience in over 30 trials with HIV-infected individuals and recently was awarded a grant from the government for a full service HIV clinic," Greenberg said.

The vaccine, developed by Merck & Co. Pharmaceutical Corp., is made up of DNA,

whereas traditional HIV vaccines are made up of protein, Greenberg said.

Instead of generating antibodies, the Merck vaccine strengthens the body's host defenses, specifically the Cytotoxic T lymphocytes.

"This difference is the new strategy of HIV vaccines," he added.

Greenberg said the function of Cytotoxic T lymphocytes in the human body is comparable to the structure of a Pac-Man video game.

"These little dots would be

the HIV virus and Pac-Man would be the Cytotoxic T lymphocyte," he said. "The way to train these 'Pac-Men' to go after the HIV virus is the strategy that Merck is using."

# HIV attacks nervous system, especially brain, research says

**AIDS: Late stages of virus cause dementia**

Although most people think HIV just affects the immune system, UK researchers said at a seminar Tuesday that the virus can have equally devastating effects on the nervous system.

"It's not uncommon for the primary manifestation of the HIV infection to be neurological," said Dr. Joseph Berger, chair of the Department of Neurology.

Berger said that when one out of five people who don't know they have HIV come to their doctor, they first complain of various neurological problems.

The brain is the part of the nervous system most seri-

ously affected by HIV. Berger said that one-third of all people in advanced stages of AIDS suffer from dementia.

Two UK studies currently focus on this phenomenon, employing magnetic resonance imaging to determine the factors that contribute to HIV-related dementia. Colum Avison, an associate professor of neurology and biochemistry, said one of the clinical dilemmas in dealing with HIV dementia is the various ways it manifests itself.

"HIV, once it gets in the brain, seems to do everything you can think of," Avison said.

HIV dementia can be caused by two "pathways,"

# Dissertations: Ph.D. students must pick, research, write and defend their theses

Eric Moyen is embarking on his dissertation journey.

Moyen, a graduate student in educational policy studies and evaluation, spent two years completing coursework for his Ph.D. and recently began struggling with a dissertation topic.

He knows he wants to examine relationships between colleges and college towns, but finds it difficult to narrow down the list of schools.

"The key to a successful topic is finding something that is interesting to you, but is small enough that it is

manageable," he said.

"Getting your Ph.D. is not just about intelligence," he said. "It has a lot to do with perseverance."

Before coming to this conclusion, he asked himself several questions that he recommends other prospective Ph.D. students consider.

"Are you willing to watch your college friends start making lots of money while you stay in school and barely scrape by?" he asked.

"Are you willing to read books and write papers until you can't take it anymore? Are you willing to survive?"

To Moyen, surviving is what getting a Ph.D. is about.

## The Ph.D. process

Moyen said all graduate students pick committee members from different professors they have in class. The committee offers suggestions about the dissertation, beginning with the proposal, until it is time for the student to defend the dissertation. He said his committee is playing a crucial role in the dissertation process.

"Your committee holds your future," Moyen said. William Hoyt, a professor and committee member for Moyen, said deciding on a topic is often very difficult.

"Some students have a topic of their own while others can really struggle to pick a topic," he said.

And he said students should always expect some dead ends.

"Students should realize that things do not fall into a nice schedule and progress may be slow," he said.

Jeanine Blackwell, senior associate dean in Academic Administration in the Graduate School, said the dissertation is the first major project a doctoral student works on as a beginning scholar and researcher. "The dissertation shows not only knowledge of the content area of the field, but also an active mastery of how new ideas are created, tested and explained in the field," she said.

Blackwell said completing a dissertation can be time consuming. The Graduate School has a limit of five years for completion, though many students finish earlier.

# Players return for Vandy game

**Suspensions lifted: Fitch, Daniels reinstated to team for game against Vanderbilt tonight**

Coach Tubby Smith announced Tuesday that two players will be reinstated to the UK basketball team.

"Both will be reinstated for the (Vanderbilt game)," Smith said. "Whether they play or not will be the coach's decision."

On Friday, Smith indefinitely suspended guard Gerald Fitch, 19, and forward Erik Daniels, 19, both sophomores, for being charged with trying to enter a Lexington nightclub with fake IDs early Friday morning.

Both players missed UK's victory against Arkansas Saturday. Smith declined to comment on the length of the players' suspensions Friday because he said he wanted to determine if alcohol was involved.

Smith said Tuesday that Alcohol Beverage Control officers cited the players before they entered the club and that alcohol was not involved. That was a factor in the lengths of the suspensions. "(ABC officers) took them out of line," Smith said. "They never got into the establishment."

Freshman forward Chuck Hayes expressed confidence that Smith made the right decision.

"Smith has a great heart and wants what is best for them," he said. "Sometimes we, as players, disappoint him and he has to act. (Daniels and Fitch) practiced yesterday and we are looking forward to getting them back in the lineup."

# Escaped cow eludes police in Ohio park

**On the lam: 'Heidi' climbs six-foot fence, avoids capture for nearly two weeks**

Lexington's newest celebrity, Heidi the cow, was captured Monday night after nearly two weeks of being on the run from Cincinnati authorities.

On Feb. 15, a cow that authorities dubbed "Heidi" made an incredible escape from Ken Meyer Meat Company in Camp Washington, Ohio and managed to elude a lengthy Cincinnati Police helicopter search.

Heidi, who was born and bred at Bluegrass Stockyards in Lexington, reportedly scaled a six-and-a-half-foot fence to freedom. Cincinnati Police gave chase in a helicopter armed with heat-sensitive tracking equipment, but were unable to locate the runaway cow. The cow continued to hide out in Mt. Storm Park, which helped

earn her the name "Heidi." The 1,500-pound cow was spotted several times before being located at the park on Thursday, Feb. 21, three miles from the meat company.

"We are very relieved to have captured her without incident," said Sgt. Todd Manser of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Heidi has received national media attention for her escape, and received offers from nearly 40 citizens wishing to give her a new home, including some celebrities. Roger Bingham, of "Survivor," has offered Heidi a place on his farm. Officials at Fifth Third Bank of Cincinnati were interested in hiring the cow as its official mascot. Owner Ken Meyer said he will donate the cow to a good home

### Police to adopt recommendations

CINCINNATI — City police, accused of using excessive force and harassing black people, have agreed to adopt most of the U.S. Justice Department recommendations for the police division. The police department's 26-page response to the Justice Department promises changes in policies governing how officers use force and chemical irritants and how they handle citizen complaints. Mayor Charlie Luken has said the council may vote to accept it as soon as March 5.

### Judge reinstated after 113 years

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — A black judge who was removed from the bench in 1888, for allowing an interracial marriage, was posthumously reinstated Tuesday by Gov. Jeb Bush. James Dean's election as a Monroe County judge in Nov., 1888 made history — he was the first black county judge in the South after Reconstruction. But Gov. Francis Fleming removed him nine months later and refused to reinstate him.

### Critics say judge biased against gays

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — A lawyer for Alabama Chief Justice Roy Moore on Tuesday denied critics' claims that the judge advocated the execution or jailing of gays in an opinion where he called homosexuality an "inherent evil." Stephen Melchior said Moore was only recounting laws in the document — issued in a child custody case involving a lesbian — and not urging police action against gays.

### More charges filed against cremator

LaFAYETTE, Ga. — Authorities filed 100 more criminal charges Tuesday against the operator of a crematory where hundreds of corpses have been discovered. Ray Brent Marsh already faced 16 counts of theft by deception for allegedly taking money for cremations he never performed at Tri-State Crematory. The 100 additional theft by deception charges were filed by the Georgia Bureau of Investigation.

He most recently had a recurring role on "Ally McBeal," which garnered him an Emmy nomination and won him a Golden Globe and a Screen Actors Guild award. Downey left the show after a substance abuse relapse, but has attended to his rehabilitation since.

Numerous movies have been offered to Downey, but he has chosen for his first film to work with Gibson, who he co-starred with in *Air America* and who has remained a friend. Gibson runs Icon with production partner Bruce Davay.

## Psychologist says mother 'severely ill'

HOUSTON — Andrea Yates suffered from schizophrenia and didn't know right from wrong when she drowned her five children in the bathtub in June, a psychologist testified Tuesday at her capital murder trial. The testimony of the psychologist is key to the defense, which must convince jurors Yates was insane when her children were drowned one by one on June 20.

## Fewer deaths means more HIV patients

SEATTLE — After a decade of holding steady, the number of Americans infected with HIV has begun to increase. But the news is better than it sounds. Experts say the total is growing because fewer people are dying of AIDS. Doctors' recent success in treating the disease is paying off in an unexpected way. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that in 1999 and 2000, the number of people infected by HIV increased by about 50,000. This means between 850,000 and 950,000 Americans were infected with HIV.

## INTERNATIONAL NEWS

### Colombian rebels kill three soldiers

SAN VICENTE DEL CAGUAN, Colombia — Colombia's largest rebel group killed three soldiers and responded to a government offensive by sabotaging utility lines, roads and bridges in their former safe haven. One army soldier was killed Monday when troops fired on Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia, or FARC, rebels tampering with power lines. Two other soldiers died trying to defuse a bomb on a bus blocking a key highway.

### Afghan troops lay down their arms

KABUL, Afghanistan — Two hundred soldiers in northern Afghanistan laid down their weapons as part of the interim government's efforts to end factional fighting. On Monday, warlord Atta Mohammed saluted his men before ordering them to place their Kalashnikovs in the dirt and step back. Other soldiers began training by peacekeepers. Discouraging rival warlords from turning their armies on each other is seen as the greatest challenge ahead as interim Prime Minister Hamid Karzai tries to consolidate power in the hands of a stable national government.

# Women discuss need to increase female presence in state politics

Seven women involved in Kentucky politics, including some UK students and professors, will speak at a symposium Thursday about women in politics.

"There are going to be some very dynamic women from a variety of backgrounds who will be sharing their experiences in politics, some of whom have already made big splashes in politics," said Penny Miller, a political science professor.

The women will talk about the future of Kentucky politics.

"There is a theme: The future belongs to those who believe in the beauty of their dreams," Miller said. "There are many women who are not pursuing their dreams."

Because Kentucky is a state with low female political involvement, many women say they find it discouraging to seek a career in politics.

"Our goal is to inspire women in our contemporary era to consider a career in politics and to see that it is worth the same sacrifice Eleanor Roosevelt made in her time."

said Wendy Hyland, president of the Women's Law Caucus.

The speakers will address the fact that Kentucky ranks among the lowest in the nation for the number of women involved in politics.

Statistics from the Institute for Women's Policy Research reveal that Kentucky ranks 49th in its percentage of women elected to office and 48th in political participation and representation.

"The idea is to expose people on campus to women in politics," said Caroline Haralson, Student Government vice president. "In Kentucky we have a great shortage of women in politics."

Natalie Jensen, a member of the Kentucky Board of Elections, said all students considering political careers are encouraged to attend.

"(All) politically interested students can come and ask questions about how to become more involved."

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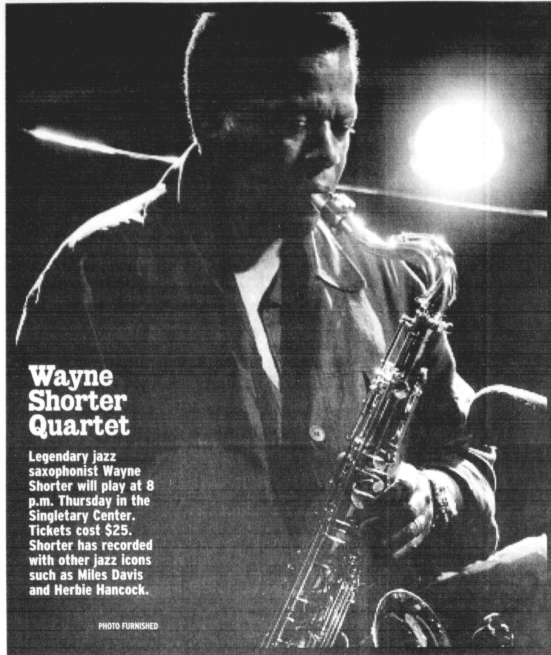

Purchase General Electric's new disposable refrigerators. You toss them out carefree after a week of use. That's telling the ozone layer where to go.

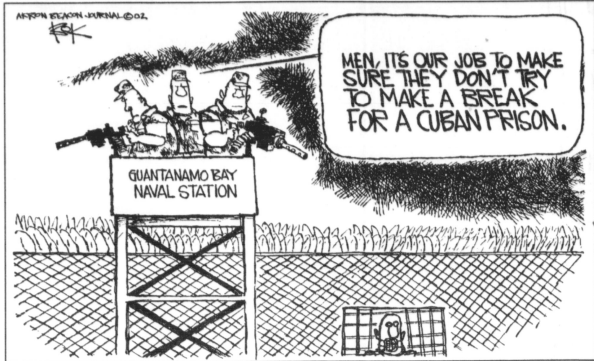

## Student body girds for coming elections

Democracy is at work — sort of. The filing date is today, and only two candidates have announced their plans to run for Student Government president — Tim Robinson, the current SG president, and Ben Hayes, a history junior.

It is good that someone decided to challenge Robinson, thus preventing him from running an uncontested campaign. This is not to imply anything about Robinson, of course, but just to recognize how important contested elections are at every level.

It will be Robinson's second term if he wins reelection, which begs the question: Should the student body presidency be a one-term gig?

Robinson has been a competent and qualified president throughout the past year — we supported many of his actions on these pages — but this isn't the U.S. Congress. Student Government is an institution set up, at least in part, to offer students experience and opportunity, both of which are limited when the same administration serves consecutive terms.

The thought never crossed anyone's mind until Jimmy Glenn's second term. The Senate then voted to limit all future presidents to two terms. So, despite being term-limited at the outset, Robinson is now following the same path as Glenn, which means that if he wins reelection, next year's graduating seniors will have seen only two SG (or SGA, depending on your preference) presidents.

What is the precedent that is being set by this policy for the future of student-run government? Will other students turn away from the opportunity because of the difficulty inherent in running against an incumbent? Will future student body presidents spend a large part of their term running for reelection?

This is not to say that reelection is a bad thing, especially if the president does a fine job. It is just to say that a one-year term is enough time for a student to make an impact on the lives of other students. And allowing multiple year terms will lead to much of the political problems that should not be associated with student government elections — the blatant breaking of spending limits, the increase use of outside money and the possible creation of a party system.

This is not what UK needs, and it can be preemptively halted by limiting an SG president to one term.

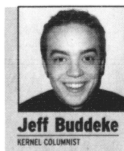
For now, though, all we can hope for is an above-the-board race that focuses on issues facing students and not on campaign violations. Perhaps this cause can be furthered if more students get to the SG office too sweet and file to run.

All you need is a running mate. The deadline is at 4 p.m. today.

## Road to bye in SEC tourney runs through Nashville

**19 straight?: UK hasn't lost to Vandy since '93, looks to continue dominance in key league game**

A UK first-round bye for the Southeastern Conference Tournament is on the line tonight against Vanderbilt.

The No. 11 Cats (19-7, 9-5 SEC) are tied for first in the SEC East with Florida (20-6, 9-5 SEC) and Georgia (20-7, 9-5 SEC).

UK can avoid playing in the first round of the tournament for the first time since the league expanded to 12 teams in 1992 by winning its two remaining games.

Georgia and Florida can also clinch a 1- or 2-seed by winning out.

Georgia faces South Carolina in Athens tonight and Tennessee in Knoxville Saturday.

Florida hosts Tennessee tonight and faces UK Saturday.

"This is a big game for us as we try to position ourselves to get a bye in the SEC Tournament," Coach Tubby Smith said about tonight's matchup. "I expect our guys to come ready to play."

If UK doesn't come to play, the Cats will likely be playing Thursday when the SEC Tournament tips off in Atlanta.

Vandy (15-12, 5-9 SEC) has lost four of its last five games, but defeated Tennessee in Knoxville Saturday. Vandy also celebrates Senior Night tonight.

Vandy is third in the SEC in 3-point shooting percentage and makes a league-best 8.7 3-pointers per game.

UK clamped the Commodores shooters during a 67-59 victory Feb. 13.

Vandy shot 36.2 percent overall and 31.8 percent on 3-point attempts against UK.

The Dores were one of 13 opponents to shoot less than 40 percent from the field, and UK is 12-1 in those games.

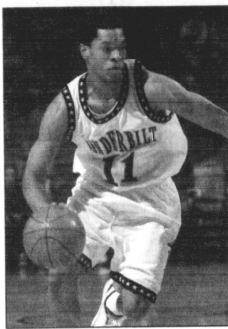
"I think we are building some momentum as a team, and we are playing especially well on defense," sophomore guard Cliff Hawkins said. "We have players stepping up and playing well."

One of those players is forward Chuck Hayes. The freshman will retain his starting position after the reinstatement of sophomores Gerald Fitch, a guard who Hayes started in place of against Tennessee and Georgia, and Erik Daniels, a forward.

"(Hayes) brings toughness," Smith said. "We've been looking for it all year long, he's had it all year long. Now it's starting to permeate to the team."

Hayes and the Cats will try to take another step toward a first-round SEC Tournament bye, and UK will look for its 19th consecutive victory against Vandy.

"We have not had much success against them at all and I don't think any of the guys on my team has ever beaten Kentucky," said Vanderbilt Coach Kevin Stallings. "We are anxious to play them and maybe get a win."
