Attention was called by the Secretary to the correspondence with Professor John L. Patterson of Louisville relative to the degree of Ph.D. , but by consent it was deferred until the committee appointed to consider the question of degrees should make its report. The following report of the Board of Discipline was presented.

Faculty, State University, Lexington, Ky.  
Gentlemen:-

Your Discipline Committee for October 1908 desires to report as follows:

We have investigated some of the events occurring on last Wednesday, at which time students left their class rooms, military officers were guilty of annoying a professor by persistent rapping on the door of his class room, students were engaged in fights on the campus and in bumping of various classmen for attempting to carry on the regular class duties of the day.

In view of these facts we recommend to the Faculty, that a general discussion of the question of the discipline of this institution be entered into, with a view of formulating some well defined plan for bringing about a state of affairs that will be more in harmony with the good behavior of the students, and the general work of the institution.

We feel unable to recommend any specific punishment in the cases that have been referred to, due to the fact that there was a general upheaval and disturbance on Wednesday, of regular class work, and that the officers while undoubtedly aiding in these disturbances, were technically doing their duty.

President Patterson read a letter which had been sent anonymously to the Editor of the Leader relative to the disturbances upon the University grounds upon Wednesday, Sept. 30th. He urged that reports of this character if published would likely do injury to the work of the University and possibly influence to some degree with the securing of legislative appropriations and he urged that the Faculty should give careful consideration to the case, and as to how best secure a better discipline and order among the students. Remarks upon this were made by Professors Miller, Pence, Mackenzie, Wilson, and W.K. Patterson, but no formal action was taken. The Secretary was requested in cooperation with the committee appointed to investigate the Smith case, Professor Wilson as chairman, to prepare a statement of what had been done by the Faculty in reference to the case of the missing student, Mr. W.E. Smith. The President requested that the Faculty when it adjourned, adjourn to meet Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock Adjourned.
