Sky bridge possible for Limestone

Re-evaluation: Crosswalk postponed; Committee wants to examine all problems on South Limestone for a solution

Crossing South Limestone is a living version of Frogger.

But pedestrian woes may be alleviated by summer 2001, according to Scott Crosbie, a city council member.

Jackie Russell, a journalism junior and Student Government Association senator, has worked on a proposal to get a crosswalk between Keeneland Drive and South Limestone since the spring of 1999.

Russell and other SGA senators presented the proposal to the city's service committee Monday. The committee decid that all of South Limestone's problems should be examined, not just the area around Secnetard Driven committee, a group of UK representatives and city representatives, will now examine the proposal.

JERUSALEM — Israel imposed a blockade around Palestinian communities yesterday in response to the ambush killings of four Israelis Monday. The blockade stopped Palestinians from coming to work in the Jewish state, but falled to halt the violence that began nearly five weeks ago, At least three Palestinians were killed today during fighting in the West Bank and Gaza Strip.

Mystery disease kills 7 in Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil — Officials in Japeri, a small municipality on the outskirts of Rio, are considering quarantining two neighborhoods where a mysterious illness has killed seven people and left 43 seriously ill, local media reported yesterday. Luiz Barcelos de Vasconcelos, mayor of Japeri said he was waiting for results of blood tests sent to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta before deciding whether to isolate the neighborhoods. The first victim was a 15-year-old boy who died on June 12, five days after he was hospitalized complaining of sharp head pains, the next six victims died between June and September.

DETROIT — Honda Accords and Toyota Camrys remained atop the list of vehicles most favored by thieves last year, with high-end light trucks still popular targets for swiping, the National Insurance Crime Bureau said in its latest list yesterday. Accords and Camrys — tops on the list for the past few years — were followed by the Oldsmobile Cutlass, Chevrolet full-size pick-up truck, Honda Civic, Toyota Corolla, Jeep Cherokee/Grand Cherokee sport utility vehicles. Chevrolet Caprice, Ford Taurus and the Chevrolet Cavalier. The list by the nonprofit NICB is based on the FBI-estimated 1.1 million reported vehicle thefts last year.

NEW YORK — Woody Guthrie gave a voice to the down and out in the 1930s and '40s with songs that were a testament to the suffering he witnessed among the poor and the powerless.

He didn't write any Top 25 bits, Many people hated him for his populist politics. Yet the folk singer from Oklahoma, who dide don Oct. 3, 1967, at age 55, is enjoying a resurgence in popularity.

This past spring, Guthrie was posthumously awarded an honorary Grammy for Lifetime Achievement. The Recording Academy described Guthrie as 'the original folk hero' who transformed the folk ballad into a vehicle for society protest and observation that paved the way for Bob Dylan, Bruce Springsteen and many other folk and rock songwriters.







State education: Time to ante up

Trained educators deserve home district jobs

A state education program seeks to help schools in struggling counties. Under the "highly skilled educators" program, teachers, principals and superintendents are trained in subjects involving curriculum, instruction and assessment. The teachers then serve two or more years in troubled counties across the state helping those schools improve their students' achievement, as gauged by state tests.

The program was established in 1990 as part of Kentucky's education reform legislation and implemented six years ago by the Kentucky Department of Education. Since that time, the program has trained over 170 educators and sent them out to aid poorly

has trained over 170 educators and sent them out to aid poorly

has trained over 170 educators and sent them out to aid poorly performing schools.

Sounds like a great program, right? It would be — except educators are having a hard time finding jobs in their home districts once they leave the program. Although officials at the state Education Department expected the home districts would be happy to use their newly trained educators' expertise, a majority of those exiting the program aren't landing jobs in their home district.

In fact, the Herald-Leader reported Sunday that a survey of 110 teachers found that only 48 of them have jobs in their home district.

Other educators are concerned that their expertise on

districts. Other educators are concerned that their expertise on curriculum and achievement is not being used by the counties that hire them, and that the jobs being offered don't utilize their

new skills.

Obviously, this is a problem. The "highly skilled educators" program is a good idea, but teachers need to be assured a job after participating in the program. The home counties of those who participate need to come up with some way to provide those par-ticipants security. Otherwise, it is not realistic to expect educa-tors to partake in the training and service.

Kentucky schools have often been criticized for their low nation-

wide placement, especially schools in rural and struggling counties Any measure to help those schools should be encouraged. Better test scores will not only help those districts receive more money for supplies and education materials, they will also give Kentucky schools more respect. And, believe it or not, that will even help us at UK, since these schools filter into Kentucky colleges.




