Deans grapple with bleak news of faculty, staff hiring freeze

Preparation: Dean says faculty is 'in shock' as Todd announces faculty vacancies must wait to be filled

Hiring an orchestra conductor was on Robert Shay's to-do-list Wednesday.

But after receiving news of a hiring freeze on all vacant positions, Shay, the dean of fine arts, will have to put it off.

ti off.

You can't have a school of fine arts without an orchestra, and you can't have an orchestra without a conductor.

Shay said. These cuts are going to be absolutely devasating.

Shay, like other deans on campus, is grappling with UK's possible \$28 million state funding cut. Over 100 faculty positions and over 50 staff positions will be left unfilled. The freeze is "there to position us when the cuts take place," said President Lee Todd, addressing the Kentucky House of Representatives Subcommittee on Education Wednesday. The freeze could save \$12 to \$13 million.

Cibulka was trying to fill five faculty positions and some staff positions when the freeze took place.

"In one year you can be set back five," he said.

The medical schools will not be as affected by the freeze. UK is allowing 90 percent of their available positions to be filled.

If severe cuts are passed, a further strain will be placed on UK's teaching ability. UK would have to eliminate 125 faculty positions and more than 500 staff positions.

Cutting costs: Faculty are advised to conserve heat, electricity, but some say they have no control over it

Time to turn down the thermostat and turn off the lights.

Along with a hiring freeze and restricted travel and overtime, administrator to conserve electricity anywhere possible and turn heat down in an attempt to save money in utilities.

In 2002, the Patterson Office Tower cost \$80,000 to heat and used \$121,000 worth of electricity said Bill Reesor, manager of utilities

serving energy and still re-taining a reasonable comfort level is keeping the thermo-stat at 86 gigrees in the win-out and the state of the memory. "If we ask people would hope for them to keep it around 68 degrees," he said.

AIDS plan includes condoms, generics

Relief: President Bush's plan receives praise, skepticism from AIDS relief organizations

WASHINGTON — President Bush's \$15 billion commitment to AIDS relief in Africa will include condom distribution and generic AIDS drugs, administration officials said
Wednesday, bucking abstinence-advocating conservatives
and brand name pharmaceutical giants.
Generic AIDS drugs manufactured by Cipla, an Indian
company will be among those recommended to the 14 nations getting the help, said Anthony Fauci, a senior National
Institutes of Health official.
As recently as November, Bush administration negotiators urged the World Trade Organization to confine generic
knockoff drugs to domestic markets, and to ban their export.
Western pharmaceutical companies holding AIDS drug
patents have been major contributors to Bush's Republican
party.

Fuci said condom distribution would be part of the prevention component — but so would abstinence education.

Many Christian conservatives, a pillar of Bush's domestic support, believe that distributing condoms promotes promiscuity and have emphasized abstinence.

In a conference call with reporters, Fauci suggested that emphasizing either component — condoms and abstinence—unfairly skewed broad prevention policy.

"There are 12 points of prevention, Fauci said, including preventing mother-child transmission, media campaigns and making sure blood used in transfusions is safe.

Officials insisted that the proposal had little to do with politics.

"It's not about 'He's trying to get the African American vote," said Jendayi Frazer; the top Africa adviser on the White House's National Security Council. "It derives from his sense of the need to preserve human dignity." In his State of the Union speech, Bush asked Congress to budget \$10 billion in new money and \$5 billion in aiready allocated assistance over five years to provide AIDS drugs to 2 million Africans, help prevent 7 million new infections, and care for those infected with the virus and children orphaned by the disease.

The funding starts with \$2 billion in the budget year that will start in October.

"Inspiring and clearly heartfelt," said Sandra Thurman, the Clinton administrations top AIDS official who now heads the International AIDS trust. "His plan can save millions of lives."

Others were cautious, citting Bush's failure to make good on an earlier plan to spend \$500 million on preventing mother-to-child AIDS transmission. That plan now appears to be wrapped into the new one.

The lack of specifics especially worried Salih Booker of Africa Action. Booker, who wondered how — and when—the money would be distributed.

Still, he said, it was a welcome change. "This is a turn-about, in terms of emphasizing treatment instead of abstinence."



LOUISVILLE, - Credit-LOUISVILLE, — Credit-card solicitors have been banned from the University of Louisville after two workers offered students racially of-fensive and sexually explicit T-shirts during a promotion. A caricature of a volup-tuous black woman, the Bank One logo and "10 Reasons Why Beer is Better than a Black Man" appeared on the shirts.

"Bank One is outraged that such a thing could happen," said company spokes woman Nancy Norris. "That offensive T-shirt was not approved by Bank One."

Several calls to FrontLine were not returned Wednesday. University President Jim Ramsey announced the ban Friday, a day after two Indianapolis-based credit card promotions workers were escould be a such as the same promotions from the school to conduct the promotion, officials did not see the T-shirts until a confrontation between the workers and students ensued.

"I would like to add my own personal apologies to the students, faculty and staff who were appropriately of

fended by this deplorable incident." Ramsey said in an email. "What happened was simply not acceptable on our campus or in any community and we must do everything we can to make sure it does not happen again."

Bank One is considering taking legal action against the promotions company, since the T-shirts depicted the bank's logo without permission. Norris said.

Bank One was the only credit card vendor allowed on the U of L campus. U of L's five-year, St. 9 million agreement expires Friday and university officials were planning to stop on-campus solicitation in their next contract. The university is in middle of taking bids for a new contract.

When investigators discovered 749 voter registration cards in the Student Government office, they unearthed a scandal of grand proportions. Since then, that scandal has continued to grow, and is now at a point where it could overshadow many issues of dire consequence to all UK stu-dents — for that, SG President Tim Robinson dents — for that should step down.

SG's most important role is as a mouthpiece for students. SG flexes the muscle of the students' collective bargaining power in dealing with President Todd, the Board of Trustees and the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Council. More than any other organization on campus, SG is supposed to represent the student voice.

That voice has now been tarnished by Robinson's felony indictment on charges of "willful failure to return completed voter registration cards." When dealing with SG, campus and city leaders no longer hear credible arguments; instead, they hear the ringing of "indictment" and "felony." To restore integrity to the name of SG— and the voice of students—Robinson should resign.

Credibility is especially essential now, given the hard choices coming up for this university.

Crearbility is especially essential now, given the hard choices coming up for this university and its students. Facing severe budget cuts, the trustees must decide how much to raise tuition and whether there should be restrictions on enrollment. The city council is debating whether to constant a trider! Indicate precision between the city council is debating whether to create a student liaison position. Important decisions are being made about improving UK's campus and connecting it with the rest of Levington

Any discussion of these issues without a legiti-mate student voice would be disastrous.

Robinson now faces serious legal conse-quences. If convicted, he could receive one to five years in jail and have to pay heavy fines. Presumably, he will be spending considerable energy fighting these charges during the remainder of his tenure as president, which continues for the rest of this semester. The student body deserves an SG president who can sacrifice time and ener gy to its causes. It's questionable whether Robin

In hopes of restoring legitimacy to the institution that he has so stained with this incident, it should now be Robinson who resigns from SG.

Dividend tax cut hurts states, middle class

Now, I'm not that economically savvy. In fact, the furthest extent of my economic understanding comes from trying to calculate how much beer a penny can purchase if a 12-pack of Heineken costs \$14 (apenny will get the drinker roughly 10 percent of one fluid ounce of Heineken with 14 fluid ounces available in a 12-pack — trust me). But to me, the president's tax-cut program, which he talked about Tuesday, seems to have a lot of numbers and terms I just don't understand.

From our president's speech, Hearned that one of the man points of the tax-cut plan would end a tax on stock dividends. A dividend, to put it simply for people like me, is what a shareholder is paid when the company they have invested in has a surplus, or profit.

So at its core, invested money can make a shareholder re money when dividends are paid. Right now these h payments are taxable, but under Bush's new tax-cut n, they wouldn't be.

cash payments are taxable, but under Bush's new tax-cut plan, they wouldn't be.

That was the best idea I had heard all day. Since 90 percent of all the shares outside of retirement accounts are owned by the richest 10 percent of families in our country — they, and their money could really use the break. Their money has been out there working hard — digging ditches and climbing power lines in the snow for a living — and it's time it had some relief.

However, using the same formula I use in calculating pennies and the amount of beer I can buy I found that if the tax-cut passed, it could cost the Treasury \$364 billion over the next decade. Interest on this debt could amount to more than \$500 billion. That's roughly 9 trillion fluid ounces of Heineken, to put it in terms you might find more applicable.

But, while drinking a Heineken Tuesday night, watching our President and trying to calculate how much each sip cost me, I discovered (with the same formula) that removing this tax on dividends would reduce state income by \$4\text{ billion a year over 10 years.}

This is not good. States across our nation are already facing current budget calamities. The Kernel reported Wednesday that the Kentucky state budget estimates a \$384 million shortfall, and that the state has asked UK to compensate for a 9 percent decrease in state allocations.

The money that is generated through taxes on dividends is necessary right now I agree with President Bush that tax cuts are good, but this model does not fit the mold that our country needs. However, I really don't know that much on the matter, but my dad who climbs power lines in the snow for a living does. And he thinks it's a bad idea.




