

UK students cook up healthy recipes

Nutrition and food science students are taking their experiments from the lab and moving them into the kitchen.

An experimental foods class is modernizing a recipe book by the UK Woman's Club called "Stay for Tea: Centennial Edition," using food chemistry experiments to change the recipes. Professor Tammy Stephenson said the purpose of this project was to make traditional recipes in the book healthier.

More than 100 recipes, including pecan pie, spinach artichoke dip, Tex-Mex dip and gingerbread cookies, are being modified to lower fat, cholesterol and sugar. Stephenson said the UK Woman's Club approached her with the suggestion to modify the "Stay for Tea" cookbook since Kentucky is known for its poor health and eating habits.

"We have the highest rate for obesity and obesity-related diseases in Kentucky," she said.

Stephenson said her classes were previously assigned to create a healthy food product and this opportunity provided "a real-world application." Each recipe is tested multiple times to ensure a consistent product before publication, she said.

Students have replaced ingredients that have high counts of fat and sugar with artificial sweeteners and new llow-fat products. For example, waffles were made with whole-wheat flour and eggbeaters, and a chocolate bread pudding recipe was made with an egg substitute, skim milk and trans-fat free margarine.


