Pride Center At a Crossroads"

The Pride Center is officially looking for a new home. The Center at Waller Avenue has served us well for the last three years but time has come to move on. The current lease runs out at the end of February and the plan is for a smooth transition into a new and better facility.

The Pride Center Committee is working toward finding suitable space. Our need is for at least 1,200 square feet of office space that can be configured into a variety of meeting rooms. The space must be completely handicapped accessible. We are searching for a convenient, preferably central location with ample parking. It is important that the new Pride Center be located in a safe and welcoming neighborhood. If you know of any property that fits these criteria call Jane at 389-7698.

Plans for the new Pride Center include having a staff person at the Center during regularly set business hours. The new Center will have a phone line, and web site to provide information and referral services to the community.

More than just a meeting space, visions for the new Pride Center include establishing a lending library of GLBT books, videos and other media; providing a massive community bulletin board for publicizing events, advertising good and services, and locating housing or roommates; and expansion of services to our GLBT brothers and sisters outside the greater Lexington area.

To financially support all of our

vision, GLSO has submitted two grants to funding agencies and we are working on a third. (Thanks Ginger!)

We will also continue our fundraising activities in the community. We would like to thank The Imperial Court, The Men's Chorus and Scott Ackerman for their recent donations. The Court, in particular, has been the major contributor to the Pride Center over the last three years

We have lofty goals and achieving them will not be easy. In our community "the heart is often willing but the will is often weak." Everyone sees the need for programs and services like the Pride Center but few of us find the time to be involved in making it happen. The Pride Center Committee and GLSO need you. We are grateful for the financial and moral support that we receive from so many in the community but we need your time and talents too. We want your ideas and energy.

HUGS of the Bible by Dotti Berry

During the upcoming fall season, Dr. Lisa Davison, Assistant Professor of Old Testament at Lexington Theological Seminary, will be leading HUGS of the Bible: Understanding, Hearing. and Growing through Study of the Bible. We are a totally inclusive body of Christ, seeking ongoing community with one another as well as reaching out to welcome and affirm all God's Children including but not limited to Lesbians, Gays. Bisexuals. Transgender and Allied Persons. We are not connected to the Seminary.

What kind of issues will we be addressing? These are some of the questions we ask ourselves. What does it mean to take the Bible seriously? How is the study of scripture different from a devotional reading?

Is it acceptable to question scripture? Is the Bible authoritative and relevant for the year 2000? If any of these questions have ever crossed your mind or if they spark your curiosity, then HUGS of the Bible may be the place for you.

As a group we will be equipping ourselves with tools to approach the Bible as something to be wrestled with, not simply as a pretty book we keep on the coffee table. Hearing the stories of faith will offer us the opportunity to embrace the message of love and grace found in scripture and to be liberated from the all too frequent use of the Bible to abuse and degrade others.

By taking the Bible seriously, we will seek a better understanding of what it means to be created in God's image with the Divine's breath within us. The evaluation of scriptural texts from a variety of angles will help us

to continue growing in knowledge of God and so also come to know ourselves better. Beginning "In the beginning," come join us in this Study adventure.

We plan to meet on Sundays from 11 a.m. - 12:30 p.m, starting on Oct 15. Our worship will be held at the home of Dr. Lisa Davison. 

The New Circle of Life

Red light - my car comes to an easy stop and the air that had been swimming around me is rushing to escape through the open windows, the sunroof and every other opening it can find. It is a beautiful day and I have decided to forgo the air conditioner in search of fresh air from the world outside.

As I sit still in traffic and still in my seat, the heat of the afternoon sun bares down on me and perspiration begins to force it's way through my skin, seeping into my clothes. The sweat that leaks from my body becomes strangely symbolic of the tears, struggle and pain of my summer.

The sweat on my brow feels thick and my hair sticks to my fore-head, just like it did that day in July when we buried my Momma.

Honk - the gentleman in the car behind me raises me from my den of sweaty self-pity and I take off from the light, fast.

Half from anger and half from embarrassment my car is racing now and the same wind that had rushed out just a few minutes ago has returned with a sweet vengeance. As the cool air flings itself all around me, touching my arms, my back and my neck I can feel the sweat begin to evaporate. The only places where liquid still pools are the crocks of my elbows and the backs of my knees, which are protected from the air as they fold in on top of themselves.

The coolness of my forearms and thighs is fantastic and I long to feel that release everywhere on my body. I brace the steering wheel with my left knee and push my right foot deep into the gas pedal.

Vrrrrooom - my car and my mind are racing now, one down Winchester Road and the other back to a place I had long since abandoned. I spread my arms out - wide, I fear I might touch a passing car but I am exhilarated not frightened. As the beads of sweat slip away into the atmosphere so does some of the pain of this time in my life.

"Look Momma, no hands!" I feel like a child again on my Mickey Mouse bike, with my arms outstretched, head back and eyes closed. I can see her standing impatiently on the front porch, dishtowel in her hands, waiting for the end of my "trick" so that she can go back inside and finish dinner.

The world has, as it always does, righted itself.

An inner sense tells me that an intersection is approaching and with it my impending demise so I lower my eyes to the horizon and pull my foot off the pedal. The wind again rushes quickly out of the car and the coolness of my skin gives way to tiny pin-pricks of heat but now they feel good to me because I know that with the changing of the light I will again feel the rush of goodness and life.

Green light - I feel alive. I am alive.

Coming Out Month Gay Straight Alliance

Its Coming Out month. GLSO encourages you to take <u>your</u> next step out of the closet. A big step, a small step, a hesitant step, it does not matter too much how big a change you make, it matters that you build your self esteem and become comfortable in your expression of who you are. For some of us, this means a struggle to overcome fear,

for others it means examining some habits that keep us in hiding. Each of us will come out in our own way and at our own pace.

This month we might also think about how our progress as a community effects young people. As more adult lesbigaytrans individuals come out to the straight world, as films and TV have become more accurate and varied in their portrayals of us, the harder it has become for young people to stay in denial or in the closet. (Some straight people even seem to be developing gay-dar. Yikes!)

We know that the average american high school is one of the most homophobic environments in our country. LBGT youth need our support. They need safe places in which to meet, talk, explore who they are, and develop self esteem.

There is now a collaboration forming between NCCJ (National Conference for Community and Justice) and GLSO to make a Gay Straight Alliance Youth Group a reality in Lexington. In other cities, groups such as P-FLAG (Parents, Friends and Family) and GLSEN (Gay Lesbian and Straight Educators Network) have been instrumental in getting Gay Straight Alliances started. 


