

### KENTUCKY NEWSPAPER PROJECT RECEIVES NEH FUNDING

The UK Libraries have been awarded a grant of \$274,942

from the National Endowment for the Humanities to fund the Kentucky Newspaper Project from September 1, 1987 to August 31, 1989. The new grant will continue the bibliographic control phase of the project while expanding to include the preservation microfilming of previously unfilmed newspapers held in Kentucky repositories.

# KENTUCKY LIBRARY NETWORK SECOND ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

The Kentucky Library Network's second annual membership meeting was held Friday, May 8. Elections were held for the KLN Board of Directors. Those elected were:

KLN membership has grown 16% since last year; it now has 89 members. KLN staff is now complete and the offices are in the basement of KDLA. Most of the work in 1987 has been in public relations, recruiting new members and making sure that the operating budget and union catalog budget

were refunded for 1987-1988, and it was. Future work for KLN staff will be designing a "strategic plan"; a professional planning coordinator met with KLN Board members May 7 to get the process started. KLN will also be looking for new funding sources for the future. Bill Hansen also said that his personal bias for KLN's "highlights for the future" includes: a) data conversion to machine readable records for all Kentucky libraries, and b) a telefacsimile network for Kentucky libraries.

Next came KLN Committee
Reports for : the User Services Committee, the Communications Committee, the Monitoring & Evaluation Committee, and the Union Database Committee. Typed copies of the Database and Union Catalog Committee's annual report were distributed. There were no typed reports for the other committees, but if you're interested in a summary from notes taken at the meeting, call Patty Powell at 257-8397. During lunch, Howard McGinn, Director of the North Carolina Information Network, spoke about the North Carolina libraries' experience and how they are emphasizing business information services and working through the state's area development offices to publicize the network. Each county's library is encouraged to participate in the network;

if they don't join, any group within that county may join the network as the county representative. The North Carolina Governor is very supportive of the network and has given OCLC demonstrations to businessmen in the state.

Autographics, the company which will produce the KLN union catalog on microfiche, gave a presentation about the company's history and products. They began 30 years ago in the typesetting/printing business, switched to computer publishing in the early '60s, and did computer card catalogs in the early '70s for the Pratt Library and Baltimore Public. They created a ten-year cumulation of the Monthly Catalog of US Government Publications on computer-output microfilm using the Government Printing Office's OCLC archival tapes. A copy of this cumulation is housed in the King Government Publications Department and is mounted on a MicroMax 800. In April, 1987, Autographics introduced a CD-ROM product at Baltimore. The presentation at this meeting was excellent. Their product should allow a system to grow into CD-ROM or whatever else the future should bring. A CD-ROM station was set up to demonstrate Autographics' newest software. Within 10 minutes, the average user is able to search the system effectively, with a little help from the demonstrator.

If anyone wants to keep up with KLN News, there is a newsletter that is published at least twice per year. Contact patty Powell if you would like to see her copy.

The new ARL Spec Kit, #132, is on library-scholar This flyer is communication. unusual in that it is from the scholar's perspective. It is based on the recent "Survey of Scholars" conducted by the Office of Scholarly Communication and Technology, American Council of Learned Societies. According to the summary in the Spec Flyer, "not all scholars are equally ready to jump into the electronic age." The differences depend primarily on discipline. The respondents answered 86 questions on library resources and use, professional reading, research and publication, computer resources, and personal and institutional characteristics. The statistical analysis divides the respondents into three groups: all academic scholars, research university scholars and college scholars. All Spec Kits are housed in the Reference Department of King South.
