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MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE
November 10, 1930

The University Senate met in the Lecture Room of McVey Hall November 10, with Dean Boyd presiding.

The following report of the Committee on Duplication of Courses was approved:

✓ Psychology 121. Student Personnel. Three hours a week. Three credits. Prerequisites, General Psychology and senior standing.

✓ Education 169. Directed Teaching in Physical Education. Five credits. Four hours a week.

The motion to change the number of Senate representatives on the University Council from two to four was considered and ^{amended} so that it is to be presented at the next meeting of the Senate in the following form:

"Moved that the Council shall consist of the President (Chairman) the Deans of the Colleges and of the Graduate School, the Dean of Men, the Dean of Women, the Registrar (Secretary ex-officio), together with four members elected by the Senate. At the first election, two are to be elected for one year and two for two years and thereafter two members are to be elected each year for two years. Not more than one member may be selected from any one college."

It is further provided that the members elected annually from the Senate may not succeed themselves in office."

The social calendar as presented by the Dean of Men was approved.

MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE
January 12, 1931

The University Senate met in the Lecture Room of McVey Hall, Monday, January 12, at 4:00 p.m., with President McVey presiding.

The minutes of November 10 were read and approved.

Minutes of the University Senate - Jan. 12, 1931 - cont.

The following recommendations of the Committee on Duplication of Courses were approved:

College of Arts and Sciences

- ✓ English 145 - Elizabethan Drama. Three hours a week; three credits.
- ✓ Mathematics and Astronomy 53. - History of Astronomy. Three hours a week; three credits. (Prerequisite: Mathematics and Astronomy 51a,b)
- ✓ Political Science 154 - County Government. Three hours a week; three credits.
- ✓ Political Science 172 - Kentucky Government and Constitution. Three hours a week; three credits.

Changes in Courses

- ✓ Journalism 11 - Advanced Reporting. To take the place of Journalism 2a (This is a change in the course number only.)
- ✓ Journalism 12 - Feature Writing. To take the place of Journalism 2b. (Change of course number only.)
- ✓ Journalism 21 - Etymology. To take the place of Journalism 3a. (Change in course number only.)
- ✓ Journalism 111 - Verbal Criticism. To take the place of Journalism 3b. (Change in course number only.)
- ✓ Journalism 104a and 104b - Editing, etc. To take the place of Journalism 8a and 8b. (This is a change in the course number only.)
- ✓ Journalism 102 - Community Journalism. To take the place of Journalism 7. (This is a change in the course number only.)
- ✓ Journalism 103 - Newspaper Administration. To take the place of Journalism 9 (Change in course number only)
- ✓ Journalism 110 - Supervision of High School Publications. Three credits. (Content and prerequisites same as for Journalism S101; two credits)
- ✓ Political Science 156 - Government of Dependencies. Three hours a week; three credits. (This is a change in the title of the course which was formerly called Colonial Government. The content of the course is also slightly revised.)

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College of Agriculture

✓ Animal Industry 129 - Dairy Bacteriology. Two hours lecture; 4 hours laboratory per week - 4 credits. Prerequisite: Bact. 52.

Substitutions

✓ Drop Farm Engineering 5, Land Measurement and Drainage, two credits, substitute Farm Engineering 11, Land Measurement, Drainage and Terracing, three credits.

College of Education

✓ Education 178 - Method of Teaching Home Management and Family Relations in Junior and Senior High School. Three credits. Prerequisites: Home Economics 42 (Home Management), Education 160 (Technique of Teaching Home Economics) and experience in teaching.

✓ Education 177a - Directed Teaching in Music. Three credits.

✓ Education 177b - Directed Teaching in Music. Three credits.

Prerequisites for Education 177a,b - Applicants must have met the requirements for practice teaching in music as specified by the department of music in the College of Arts and Sciences, and the professional requirement for practice teaching as listed in the College of Education.

✓ Education 169a,b - Directed Teaching in Physical Education. 2½ credits each semester. Prerequisite: Must have met the requirements for practice teaching in physical education in the College of Arts and Sciences and the professional requirements for practice teaching as listed in the College of Education.

✓ Education ²⁰ - Industrial Arts and Elementary Grades. two credits; four hours per week.

Reinstatement of Course

✓ Education 146 - School Building and Equipment to be relisted in the offerings of the College of Education, as Education 207.

The following motion was considered at the November meeting of the Senate and in accordance with the Senate regulations was held over for further consideration at the next meeting;

"Moved that the Council shall consist of the President (Chairman), the Deans of the Colleges and of the Graduate School, the Dean of Men, the Dean of Women, the Registrar (Secretary-ex-officio), together with four members elected by the Senate. At the first election two are to be elected for one year and two for two years and thereafter two members are to be elected each year for two years. Not more than one member may be elected from any one college.

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It is further provided that the members elected annually from the Senate may not succeed themselves in office."

It was voted that the motion be approved and recommended to the Board of Trustees for adoption.

On motion it was voted that the two present representatives on the Council continue in office for the remainder of the year.
