Interest Is Mounting In Reunions Of '5 And '0

Ruppmen Take Fifth Southeastern Crown

This story is getting to be almost a habit. Each year as the spring issue of the Alumnus comes around, we have to dig out some new way to announce that the Kentucky Wildcats are champions of the Southeastern conference. This year is no exception, so pardon us if we again announce that on March 16 at Knoxville, Tennessee, the Kentucky Wildcats won the 1940 Southeastern basketball tournament for the fifth time during the reign of Coach Adolph Rupp.

Perhaps the story is a little different this year—first, the Cats made it two in a row, something no other Southeastern net team has ever been able to do; and second, because this championship was gained under the worst handicaps a coach could ever dream of. Although the netmen had only eighteen games on their regular schedule, exclusive of the tournament, they were pitted against another opponent most of the season—influenza.

All looked well for the Cats as they soundly trounced Berea in an opener December 9. First indication of what was to come arrived with the second encounter against Cincinnati, who caught the boys off balance and somehow ended up on the right end of a 39-30 score. The team got second wind, however, and gave the fans a Christmas present on December 21 by smothering Clemson, Southern conference Clemson, Southern conference champs, at Asheville. Apparently hitting their stride at last, the boys then outplayed Ohio State in every department to take a 36-30 decision in the Sugar Bowl at New Orleans, disposed of Kansas State easily in Lexington, took a close one from Xavier at Cincinnati, and returned to Lexington to take West Virginia into camp.

A late second half rally against Notre Dame at South Bend failed to register and the Cats broke their five-game win streak. Tennessee at Lexington came next, and the Ruppmen were on the winning side again. It was at this point that influenza caught up with Lee Huber, stellar guard and a key man, and he was unable to play in the two following games, against Alabama at Birmingham and Vanderbilt at

Nashville. This southern trip proved disastrous to the tune of two losses.

Northbound for Milwaukee to

play Marquette, two other squad members, Waller White and Jim King, were stricken with the flu, and were left in Chicago. A second half rally proved effective this time, however and the Cats took the decision. Again taking the comeback trail, wins were scored against Alabama at Lexington, this time de-cisively, and Xavier at Lexington. The second southern trip, however, was a great deal like the first, and two more losses were chalked up, this time at the hands of Tennessee at Knoxville and Georgia Tech at Atlanta. An easy win over Vanderbilt upon the return to the home court closed the see-saw season.

The Wildcats went down to Knoxville for the tournament as heavy favorites—to lose. The recent losses

TENNIS

A bumpy 11-meet schedule, ending with the Southeastern conference tournament, has tentatively been billed for Kentucky's 1940 tennis edition, according to announcement by Prof. H. H. Downing, '08, who this year starts his 19th season as the Cat tennis coach.

Bi-weekly workouts in the Gym Annex have formed the main activity of the squad to date, the result of that incurable malady, inclement weather, which is plague-ing every UK squad this spring. Coach Downing's squad of eleven includes Captain Bubby Boone, Joe Dunlap, Sonny Boland, Bob Young, Cliff Thompson, H. H. Seelbach, Billy Hedges, Wilmore Garrett, Grant Lewis, and Billy Richardson. Lee Huber, number 1 man last year, has been unable to report so far due to basketball practice.

Last year the Cats turned in a report card that showed 6 wins, 3 losses and one tie. Michigan State, Georgia Tech, and Cincinnati managed to stop the netmen effectively, and the Notre Dame meet was halted by rain as the teams were deadlocked in matches, sets and points. Kentucky's "pool-less wonders," so-called because the absence of a pool on the campus or in Lexington necessitates a practice "field" a mere 26 miles away at Eastern Teachers College in Richmond, finished another successful season last week.

Undefeated last year after meeting the stiffest competition from both Southeastern and northern teams, the Catfish managed to come out a little ahead of the game this year winning five, losing three, and tieing one, not counting their sev-enth place rating in the Southeastern conference meet. Principal reason for the poor showing in this meet, according to all concerned, was merely a matter of too much coaching-since the Catfish have no official coach—and too much practice by other schools in their own pools. Florida nosed out L. S. U. by a 64-60 count to retain its championship for the fourth consecutive year.

Eastern, strangely enough, was the first victim of the Catfish, followed by a tie in a triangle meet with Tennessee and Tusculum. Georgia Tech was taken into port next, but was followed by two close margin losses to Georgia and Florida. Murray State Teachers and Eastern again lost to the Fish, who then jumped back to the loss side of the ledger with two losses at the hands of Depauw and Loyola. A strong finish was made, however, with a win over Armour Tech.

On March 30 the Cats will defend their state title which they have held ever since a team was organized at Kentucky, at Eastern's pool in Richmond.
