Leading political scientists will gather at UK March 10 for a "Con-ference on Ideology and Polarization in American Politics." The conference will focus on the extent to which party leaders are polarized toward conservative and liberal views and how that affects leadership of the rank and file party members.

He said Democratic leaders are more liberal than their followers while Republican leaders are more conservative than regular party

The opening speaker for the conference is Warren Miller, professor of political science at Arizona State University, who will deliver the Blazer Lecture March 9. His second lecture before the conference will describe how closely party leaders; views follow those of the members.

He said the evidence shows that in areas where leaders are chosen by primaries or in which there is strong competition between the parties the ideologies of leaders and members are more closely related.

Due to new regulations and sheer numbers of people, the College of Arts and Sciences urges students to see their academic adviser before advance registration begins on April 8.

"A lot of people have long-range issues to settle" which can't be dealt with in the rushed atmosphere of advance registration, said David Durant, faculty adviser in the English department.

Those issues include advice on scholarships and career plans as well as class scheduling, which is what students usually think of when going to advisers, said Barbara Mabry, assistant to the dean for students and advisers.

She said that in order for students to have a "comprehensive" meet-

each major, Arts and Sciences also has professional advisers who coun-cil UK's undecided students. They are responsible for helping the stu-dents decide on a major and guiding them toward it.

Mabry said there are more than 2,800 undeclared students enrolled at UK and the professional advisers send them to all colleges of the University, depending on the student's interests and talents.

Mabry said students often worry about their situation when it is "not really as bad as it seems," and advisers can find options for the student. Meanwhile, some students think they are doing well when there are problems they don't realize. She said a close relationship with an adviser could help a student avoid some of the "pitfalis" when charting their academic course.

#### A sure bet

Stealin Horses scores big in Nashville, prepares to sign major label contract

Iva Heartwood and her band, Stealin Horses, have been receiving the royal treatment lately. They just spent the last year recording a demo tape at the Castle, the largest recording studio in Nashville.



#### Students can use pass-fail in repeat option

The Senate Council yesterday approved a proposal that would allow students to use their repeat option while taking a class on a pass-fail basis.

The proposal would reverse a 1982 interpretation by the University Senate's rules committee that said students, who first took a class for grade, could not retake the class using their pass fail to rice. their pass-fail option.

Charles Byers, the University's academic ombudsman,

Charles Byers, the University's academic ombudsman, said he brought the proposal to the council in an effort to meet "rare" instances where students want to use a their repeat option and pass-fail option simultaneously.

"I believe the intent of the repeat option rule was to allow a student to repeat three courses for forgiveness for the first attempt, insofar as calculating the grade point average." Byers said in memorandum addressed to Senate Council Chairman Wilbur Frye.

Under the proposal, which must still be approved by the University Senate, students would be required to keep their original grade if they failed the class on their second attempt. Students would still be charged with a repeat option.

#### Reagan requests more aid for contras

WASHINGTON — President Reagan asked Congress yesterday for the final installment in a \$100 million aid package for Nicaragua's contra rebels, while House Democrats sought to drive home the point that past aid money remains unaccounted for.

Meanwhile, Attorney General Edwin Meese said he was Meanwhile, Attorney General Edwin Meese said he was taking action to secure the authority of Lawrence Walsh, the independent counsel investigating the Iran-contra affair. Walsh supported the move although there had been criticism in advance that the action could compromise his independence.

The president, one day after saying in a major speech that the Iranian initiative was a mistake, declared it was time to move on to other matters.

Vice President George Bush said he was "catching the dickens" from some people for not stopping the Iran initiative but declared the administration wouldn't be judged

tiative but declared the administration wouldn't be judged in the long run on "the agony of the Iran affair."

#### Meese bolsters status of special prosecutor

WASHINGTON - Attorney General Edwin Meese said yesterday he is appointing Lawrence Walsh to head a new office of independent counsel as "an insurance poli-cy" against legal challenges by Lt. Col. Oliver L. North that threatened to torpedo Walsh's investigation into the

that threatened to torpedo Walsh's investigation into the Iran-contra affair.

In doing so, Meese linked the independent counsel more closely to the executive branch of government, a result which Congress sought to avoid in enacting the 1978 Ethics in Government Act under which Walsh was appointed.


Walsh, however, endorsed the new arrangement.

In a statement, Meese said that a lawsuit filed by North, raising constitutional questions about the 1978 law, "Places a question mark over Walsh's exhibition."
