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Welcome, Georgia

The sovereign State of Georgia has provided three football opponents for the University of Kentucky this year.

The first of these was Oglethorpe University, which is located in Atlanta. Oglethorpe's Stormy Petrels met the Kentucky Wildcats last Saturday at Lexington and, for the second consecutive year, took a severe lacing. The score was 59 to 0 in favor of Kentucky.

The second of these Georgia teams on the Kentucky slate is the University of Georgia, which is appearing here this afternoon, and the third will be Georgia Tech. The home of the Georgia Bulldogs is at Athens, which isn't far from Atlanta. Kentucky will be celebrating Armistice Day by battling Tech at Atlanta.

This is the first time Kentucky and Georgia ever have met on the gridiron, although they have tied into each other many times in basketball. In fact, it was the Georgia Bulldogs who really started the Wildcats toward their dominance of Southern basketball back in 1921. It was in the tournament of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association that year at Atlanta that Kentucky defeated Georgia in the finals by 20 to 19.

Kentucky and Georgia are both members of the Southeastern Conference, which is recognized as one of the most powerful athletic organizations in the country. At present, Kentucky, being undefeated in the conference and having won one loop victory, is on top of the conference ladder. If they win today they will have a more secure footing there but if they lose, they will dip down and Georgia will surge upward.

So far this season the Wildcats have defeated Virginia Military Institute, representing the Southern Conference; Vanderbilt of the Southeastern Conference, and Oglethorpe of the S. I. A. A. Kentucky has held memberships, at one time or another, in all three of these conferences. Actually, Kentucky was a charter member in each of the three.

Georgia opened the season with a victory over the Citadel and then lost to Furman and Holy Cross but showed great improvement in the Holy Cross game last Saturday at Athens.

While this game is the beginning of a new Southern football rivalry, it is the renewal of a coaching rivalry that dates back to the time that Ab Kirwan, now coach of the Wildcats, was head football coach at Louisville Manual, and Wally Butts, Georgia's mentor, was coach of football at Louisville Male.

During the three years that Kirwan and Butts opposed each other, teams coached by Butts defeated the Kirwan-coached teams two times to one for Kirwan's boys. Kirwan would like mighty well to even the count against his old rival.

This game today should be a "natural," if ever there was one. On the Georgia team there are two former Male High athletes while on the Kentucky team there are half a dozen who played at Manual, including the Wildcat captain, Joe Shepherd, quarterback and one of the greatest punters in the business.

Although the game is being played here in Louisville's duPont Manual Stadium, it is considered a "home" game for Kentucky. Next year the Wildcats will return the visit and the game will be played at Athens.

The Kentucky student body and Kentucky fans welcome Wally Butts back to Kentucky and they welcome the Bulldogs. May the Kentucky-Georgia football series continue pleasantly for years to come.





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



Tomcats lost only three games in 89 starts, tying four games and winning 82. The Tomcats lost one game in 1925 and two in 1932, but between those games were undefeated. They scored 2,875 points, an average of more than 31½ points per game.

Players always lose weight during a game, gaining all or most of it back by the water they drink and the steaks and fixin's they eat after the game. "Big Bill" Edwards, of Princeton, claims some sort of a record in weight-losing, however. He dropped 30 pounds in a Princeton-Yale game; history fails to record whether he got it all back.

One of the most remarkable tie games in football was played in 1931 by Yale and Dartmouth, rivals




on and off since 1884. The score was 33 to 33. After a brilliant second half comeback, in which Dartmouth cut down Yale's halftime advantage of 26 to 10, the score was Yale 33, Dartmouth 30. Morton, of Dartmouth, essayed a field goal from the 23-yard line to tie the score at 33-all.


The football team of the University of the South, now known as Sewanee, played 300 minutes of football in five days, winning from Texas, Texas A. & M., Tulane, Louisiana and Mississippi. Moreover, none of the five teams was able to score on the doughty Sewanee eleven.


Neither Morgan nor Bluefield, leading teams of the Colored Intercollegiate A. A., was defeated in 1934, and Morgan's goal line was uncrossed. Kentucky State, regarded as national champion by other Negro colleges, was undefeated, allowing only two points to opponents.

In 1916 J. Preas, of Georgia Tech, kicked 16 extra points against Cumberland, aiding in giving the Yellowjackets a 222 to 0 victory. Cumberland, according to the Tech records, has never come back for more.






Summer school students at the University of Florida enjoy a water waltz to the tune of a portable radio, flanked by the stag line.
