MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE, MARCH 31, 1927

The Senate met in special session at the Little Theatre on March 31, President McVey presiding.

The minutes of March 14 were read and approved.

The following were recommended to the Board of Trustees, and are to receive the degree of Doctor of Law with the 1927 Class:

Vincent Massey. Minister Plenipotentiary from Canada to the United States.

Rainey T. Wells. President of Murray State Teachers College.

Cale Young Rice. Poet and dramatist.

The following recommendation of the Rules Committee was approved:

Undergraduate part-time students are charged fees at the rate of \$3.00 per credit per semester. Graduate and Law part-time students are charged fees at the rate of \$4.00 per credit per semester. No refunds are granted following changes in classification. Note: This abolishes special \$10.00 fee in Art.

The following recommendation was referred to the Committee for further consideration:

"At the close of each semester and of each term of the summer session, those in charge of any department or organization shall post lists of students who are delinquent in their financial obligations to the University and shall notify these delinquents and shall send the lists to the Registrar. No student will be allowed credit for his semester's or term's work, not to register for the next semester or term, nor to graduate, until all such obligations have been satisfactorially met. "

The Senate approved the following recommendation from the faculty of the College of Agriculture:

Instead of Geology 3 and Zoology 5 being required subjects, give option between Geology 3 and Zoology 10 as required subjects.

The following plans suggested by the Committee of Freshmen Week were approved:

"The work to be done within the week may be briefly outlined as follows:

1. Enrollment
2. Physical Examination
3. Mental Test
4. English Examination
5. Payment of Fees
6. Lectures and Campus Trips
7. Evening Program, etc.

Lectures on such subjects as:

1. How to Study
2. Organization of the University
3. Honor and social societies
4. Budget (financial and schedule of time)
5. Customs and rules.
6. Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. etc.

In order to systematize the work of the week, the freshmen -- there were 510 boys and 210 girls last year -- will be divided into sections of thirty each. This will make seventeen sections of boys and seven sections of girls, with provision for late-comers. Each section will be assigned a faculty leader and a student assistant with headquarters in one of the following buildings which will be used for the purpose: Administration, Law Neville Hall, White Hall, and the Armory.

The tentative schedule for Freshmen Week, which is impossible for us to have mimeographed, is in the office of the Dean of Men for inspection and suggestions. This schedule will be presented to the Senate Thursday, March 31.

If we are to have Freshmen Week, it will be necessary to give the fact publicity before the high schools close and to get the faculty leaders together before the close of the present semester that they may thoroughly understand the plan."

The following motion was adopted: " Announcements shall state that attendance throughout the week is required of all students entering as freshmen for the first time (b) For the 1927 Freshmen Week will include the dates September 15 to 20 inclusive.
