

Lexington, Ky. Sept. 4th, 1908.

The faculty met in the President's office at 3:30 P.M., those present being, President Patterson, Professors Patterson, Pryor, Anderson, Mathews, Miller, Pence, Corbusier, Noe, Tuttle, Zembrod, Frankel, Lafferty, Maxson, Hooper, Stout.

The minutes of the last two meetings were read and approved. The correspondence with Professor John L. Patterson of Louisville, relating to the securing of the degree of Ph.D., was read but the faculty seemed not ready to take action and it was permitted to lie over until the next meeting.

Dr. Tuthill addressed the faculty with reference to the possibility of giving a course in history during the Freshman year, at least in the College of Arts and Sciences, and hoped that it would be possible to arrange such a course. Professor Miller suggested, and it was informally agreed, that the matter of arranging such a course be referred to a committee, with power to act, and the President assigned for duty the committee that drew up the schedules for the new catalogue.

Professor Miller suggested a fresh consideration of the re-organization of the old organization of college professors known as the Monday Club, and believed that with the accessions to the faculty in recent years, the work of the Monday Club could be carried out with great interest to all concerned. The suggestion was seconded by Professor Hooper and a committee appointed to investigate its feasibility, the committee consisting of Professor Miller, as chairman, with Professors Anderson and Pryor.

On motion the meeting adjourned.
