Baby Boomers Investigate Long Term Care Insurance

If you are employed and become ill or have an accident, your accumulated sick leave may cover your living expenses, at least for the short term, but what about the long term? How long could you live without a steady income if you were laid up for months or even years? And how long would it take before your savings and investments were depleted?

These are questions that most people in their 40s, 50s and 60s probably don't spend a lot of time thinking about, much less planning for. And unless a friend or family member has required long term care, it's a subject that most people know little about.

Ignorance is not bliss. I have found that people do not want to talk about the prospects of needing long term care, especially if they are young. The assumption is that it's something that happens to older people. However, in the blink of an eye, the need for day-to-day assistance can become a major issue. An automobile accident may lead to a recuperation period lasting for months, or an unforeseen illness might require years of convalescence. Of course, there is the worst-case scenario: the need for care for life.

There are any number of life-altering changes that can unexpectedly affect those between the ages of 40 and 64. Accidents. Stroke. Heart Attack. Breast or prostate cancer. AIDS. Parkinson's Disease. Multiple Sclerosis. Lou Gehrig's Disease (ALS).

In fact, according to an article published in the Orlando Sentinel on December 12, 2002, long term care needs are not confined to seniors. Forty percent of the 13 million people receiving long term care are

age 18 to 64, according to the independent advocacy group Americans for Long-Term Care Security.

So what happens when people need long term care due to an illness or accident? Health and medical insurance generally do not cover the cost of long term care. And when income from a job eventually stops, many are forced to live off their savings or investments - while that lasts. The financial and emotional impact can be greatest on domestic and same-sex partners, spouses, and children.

The financial impact should not be underestimated. According to the GE Financial 2003 Nursing Home Cost Survey, conducted by the independent research firm of Evans Research Associates and issued August 3, 2003, the average nation-wide cost of a year of skilled care in a skilled nursing facility is \$57,700, and can exceed \$85,000 annually in the five most expensive areas of the country.

The solution is at hand. The solution is planning. And part of that planning should include looking into long term care insurance. Often, unless the ill or injured person has a long term care insurance policy, the money for long term care comes right out of the household's pocket. Cases do happen where a domestic or same-sex partner, spouse, child, or other family member are forced to quit working to stay home and supply the necessary care.

The Future will take care of itself. But who will take care of me?

Some 60% of Americans who reach the age of 65 are expected to need long term care services at some point, while 40% of those receiving LTC services now are ages 18 to 64, says the Office of Personnel Management.* You may need long term care or you may be the caregiver. The Gay Straight Alliance for Youth (GSA) is an example of one program that we would like to expand. We would like money to advertise the GSA on teen radio stations. More money for financial support for youth wanting to attend GLBT or related events (we have a fund established). Money for tutoring and a college scholarship fund. A paid staff person to run youth Programming, who could visit high schools regularly and do training about working with GLBT youth. A place for youth to get together on weekends.



What We have Won by mary crone

The Kentucky No on the Amendment Campaign and the many volunteers that gave their time and money have won a number of important victories.

According to the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, state and local GLBT organizations have been somewhat neglected as a focus for GLBT political work. Over the last 25 years, national GLBT organizations have been building their funding base, improving their organizational structure, and honing their lobbying and communication skills. Local and state groups have too often not received the support and encouragement they deserve.

During this same time, the radical right has been building a grass roots base that now has disproportionate influence at all levels of government. As a result of that influence, 11 states had ballot measures this year seeking a state constitutional amendment seeking to forbid the recognition of same-sex marriages. Most of them, have probably passed by the time you read this.

But whatever the vote at the ballot box we have not lost; we have actually made progress. For the first time we have lunched a state wide, duel purpose campaign in Kentucky. We have gotten great media coverage, built strong coalitions, and strengthened our support base throughout the state.

Many of us have talked to friends and acquaintances about our lives and how this amendment will affect us. Door to door canvassing with No On The Amendment has put many GLBT folks on the doorsteps of Kentucky families. These conversations have educated people about GLBT issues and have widened our support within Kentucky. An unprecedented number of people have now heard from us face to

face, which is the most effective way to change people;s minds.

In addition, our state and local organizations have built more effective infrastructure, learned a tremendous amount about political organizing, and turned many individuals into activists. There were 18 staff members working on the campaign and over 2,300 volunteers.

No on The Amendment and the KFA Action Fund have together raised three times as much money as LGBT groups have ever raised in Kentucky. They received donations from 2100 individual donors as of Oct 22, and more checks are being written daily.

And our message has reached beyond the Lexington, Louisville areas. On Oct. 19th Seventy people showed up at the No On The Amendment rally in Bowling Green. The Mayor of Bowling Green was planning to ask the council to support the (so called) Marriage Amendment at a meeting on that evening,. No on the Amendment asked those 70 people to march to the council meeting. After they arrived, the mayor removed the amendment issue from the agenda. We do have political power when we organize.

Another positive outcome has been the number of new visitors to the Pride Center. Some just drop by to pick up a sign but others stay to look around, check out a book, or give a few hours entering data.

I hope you have seen and heard the radio and TV ads running during the last week of the campaign. They are excellent ads and reached even more people with our message of fairness. The No on the Amendment media campaign cot about \$250,000. This is why running a state wide campaign is expensive and why we appreciate our donors.

Now, it is time to use the energy we have raised and direct it towards the Legislative session starting in January.

By the time this edition of the GLSO Newsletter reaches you the November 2nd elections and the amendment suggestion will have been concluded. If John Kerry is now our President-elect and if the amendment failed we can breathe a sigh of relief, for now. If President Bush has been reelected and/or the amendment passed then we may be quite anxious and fearful for the future of ourselves and our brothers and sisters in the GLBT community. It will certainly be time to reflect and time to regroup.

It is quite serendipitous that the next consolation icon is the icon of Courage. In its reverse, courage, or fear, can be most destructive in any of its forms. Fear represses thoughts and feelings. Fear poisons the whole person and causes the individual to lose touch with reality and to start second guessing personal holiness (or wholeness) resulting often in depression, anxiety and a giving up. If fear can be kept under control and become Courage then it results in many positive things.

We have seen many positive results of courage over the last months and years. Remember the number of persons who

have courageously spoken out against the amendment and for the GLBT community: some who are gay, some who are not. Remember the public officials, political and religious, who have defended the rights of all GLBT persons and called the proposed amendment (hopefully still proposed) what it truly is: anti-gay homophobic legislature. These persons, numbering now in the thousands, of all walks of life, spoke out in courage and banded together for a common cause. Out of very real and honest fear of what such an amendment could do brought together many persons of diverse backgrounds and histories to speak in a communal voice of one mind and heart. Fear, become courage, has a tendency to bring people together and as Martha would say: That's a good thing.

Not knowing at the writing of this article how the vote has gone it is hard to say what we should do next but I do know one thing. If we now have another anti-gay president or if our state has amended our constitution to exclude us we need only further band together, give each other courage and strength, and wait for the democratic system to declare such legislation as unconstitutional on a Federal Level. Eventually the Supreme Court will come to our defense. Take courage.
