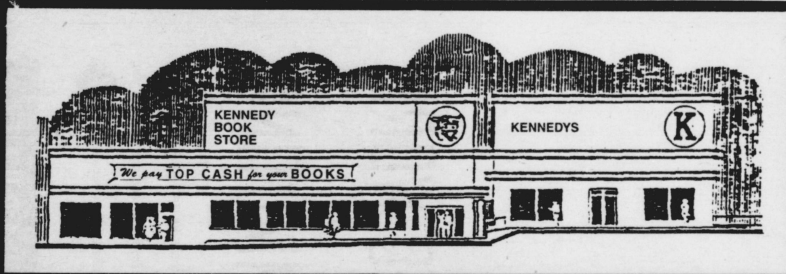

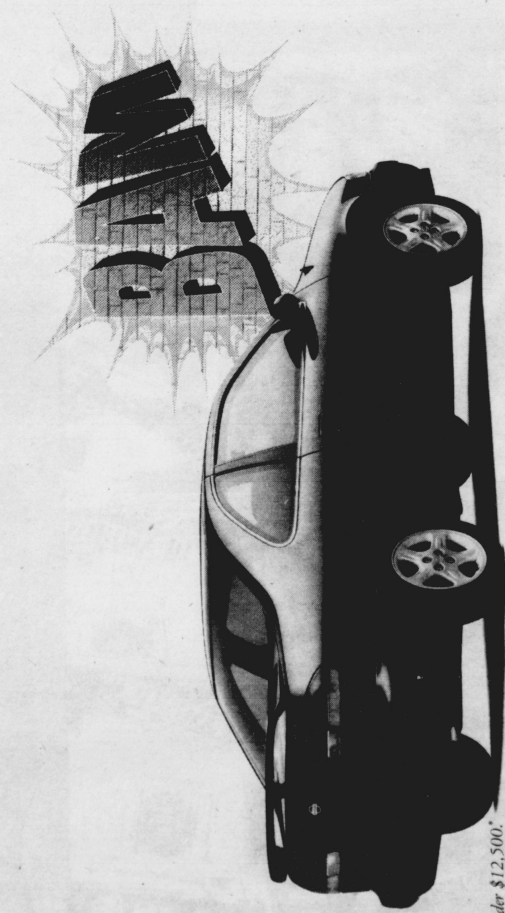

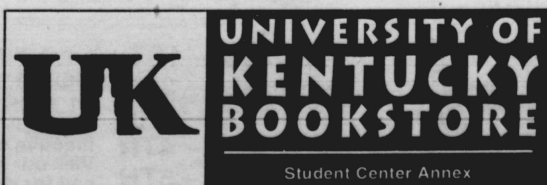

**Stress a factor in finals**

Finals week can invoke tension and pure terror for most UK students. A semester's worth of work often comes down to a two-hour test and the knowledge of this often puts students in a precarious position.

The pressure to push themselves beyond humanly limits by staying up all night and drinking large amount of caffeine can actually hinder test performance.

At least that is what the Counseling and Testing Center advises.

Learning skills instructor Perri Kersh recommends students start studying early for exams. She said it's best for stu-

dents to pace themselves to make it through the week.

Exercise is a key to maintaining a healthy balance during the inevitably stressful week, Kersh said.

Kersh said it's also important for students to maintain their normal sleeping, eating and studying habits.

What happens when this is not enough and the pressure gets too much?

For some, denial can help when classes are overwhelming.

"I put it aside and do something totally different," business management junior Alex Anderson said.

Anderson said he does start studying early and avoids late-night excess preferring to get an

early morning start before an exam.

Dutiful studying and arriving rested for the test is not in the cards for some. Hair-raising terror is often the encouragement they need to study harder.

"When I start to panic, I try to come up with ways to get out of doing it," accounting junior Trent Duke said.

Duke said that he often stays up all night by fixing himself a big pitcher of coffee.

Staying up for the entire finals week doesn't usually phase him, he said, as long as he gets a three hour nap in the afternoon.

But Kersh cautions against this type of behavior.

"I've had students who have completely blacked out after pulling an all-nighter, plus it catches up with them later in the week."

Dividing the material to be covered with other students can sometimes alleviate some test stress. This requires each member to be reliable though.

Accounting junior Matt Vish said he has found getting a good night's sleep and not cramming has worked well for him.

Still if the pressure gets too much, individual appointments are available at the the Counseling and Testing Center from 8 a.m to 4:30 p.m until Friday. Students can call Frazee Hall at 257-8701 for an appointment. Group learning skills and test-taking strategies sessions will be available also.

After all the torture of finals are over Kersh recommends doing something fun. So, a big scoop of ice cream, a cold beer or a shopping trip might be just the reward for a job well done.

In determining the date of the final examination, "classes which meet first" refers to the initial class meeting of the normal instructional week (Monday through Friday).  
NO FINAL EXAMINATION SHALL BE GIVEN BEFORE MONDAY, APRIL 29, 1996.  
If a final examination is to be given, it will be administered during the examination period as scheduled above by the University Registrar.  
Final examinations may be given at times other than the regularly scheduled time in the following instances:

**FACULTY:** In the case of conflicts or undue hardship for an individual instructor, a final examination may be rescheduled upon the recommendation of the chairperson of the department and with the concurrence of the dean of the college and the University Registrar.  
**STUDENTS:** Any student with more than two final examinations scheduled on any one date shall

be entitled to have the examination for the class with the highest catalog number rescheduled. In case this highest number is shared by more than one course, the one whose departmental prefix is first alphabetically will be rescheduled. The option to reschedule must be exercised in writing to the appropriate instructor two weeks prior to the scheduled examination.

If an examination schedule conflict is created by faculty rescheduling of an examination, the student shall be entitled to take the rescheduled examination at another time during the examination period by mutual agreement with the instructor.

In the case of undue hardship for an individual student, a final examination may be rescheduled by the instructor.

Except for the Colleges of Law, Medicine, and Dentistry, the above schedule of final examinations shall apply to all colleges of the University.

**ALL GRADES ARE DUE IN THE REGISTRAR'S OFFICE BY 4 P.M., MONDAY, MAY 6.**

To determine the final examination time for a course that meets at time other than the usual MWF or TR meeting pattern (e.g. MWF 8:30 a.m. - 9:20 a.m. or TR 10:20 a.m. - 11:35 a.m.), the course start time will be considered as meeting at the beginning of that hour (e.g. 8:00 a.m. or 10:00 a.m.).

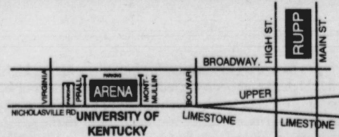

# Moving day easier with early departure

For most students, the only good thing about moving out of the residence halls is the vacation from papers, problems and professors. The process of moving is more of a hassle than anything else.

Moving is most painful for those students who have the last University-scheduled final from 3:30 p.m.-5:30 p.m. on Friday, because they must be out of the residence halls by 6:00 p.m.

Their only option is to pack the night before, which cuts into study time. For students like Aaron Maschinot, mathematics sophomore, packing becomes another excuse for putting off his studies.

According to Patricia Whitlow, associate director of residence life, students can do several things to make moving as painless as possible.

The first is to plan ahead. Students who have their own car should begin loading their non-essentials the day before their last final.

If possible, avoid the rush. Move out early in the day or later at night, when crowds of parents, friends and little siblings will not be underfoot.

Thursday and Friday afternoons are terrible times to move out," Whitlow said.

After they finish packing, students should double and triple-check their rooms for stuff they may have overlooked. Each year resident advisers find all sorts of things students inadvertently leave behind.

Parking also can be a problem. South Campus residents benefit from the Physical Plant Division's generosity during finals week because they open the barriers blocking the drive-ways.

The sheer number of cars that cram themselves into a limited area can make the situation hazardous for pedestrians and drivers alike. Students can avoid this by parking farther away. The longer walk will not matter because pre-loading took care of the heavy stuff.

Central Campus residents can use Huguelet and Hilltop avenues but should avoid Rose Street. Students who park in the surrounding employee lots without a pass could be ticketed.

Residents of North Campus face a tougher problem.

"During move out, they're more flexible about Keeneland Drive, so that helps," Whitlow said.

The best thing to do is park on Keeneland Drive or Euclid, load up your stuff, and leave as quickly as possible, Whitlow said.



# Study groups save time

Panic begins to set in and all-nighters become a possibility.

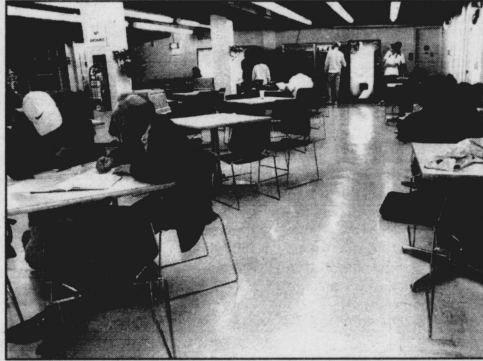
When it comes time to sit down and concentrate, Perri Kersh of the Learning Skills Center in the counseling and testing center said the best advice is to begin "as soon as possible," especially if a student hasn't kept up with class material.

"A lot of people tend to procrastinate because it is such a large chunk of information," Kersh said. "Divide the informations into sections or chunks so it seems more doable."

Kersh said if students haven't been keeping up and have too much to cover in a short time, an attempt should be made to get at least general knowledge of the material.

Study groups can also help save time and provide different perspectives on the material.

"I think groups are really helpful, but you should do an overview first," Kersh said. "It can help brain-

storm exam questions."

To retain more while reading material, Kersh recommended reading small sections after skimming it first. After reading for about 20 minutes, review the previous material and then take a break.

Reading in "marathon sessions" leads to more time lost in day-dreams and low retention. Kersh also suggested that students have a plan before they begin to study.

"Spend some time spacing your time out," Kersh said. "Decide where you are going to study and what you need."

Kersh said planning helps minimize procrastination and burn out part way through finals week.

"It's also important to give yourself type of reward," Kersh said.

Suggested rewards could be taking a walk, going to a movie or doing something with friends.

# Summer school an option

# PPD, SGA plan changes for fall

During the summer months, UK students do a variety of things. Some, as a result of their boredom, will spend their time at their parent's house playing Parchesi. A couple may decide to stay in Lexington and attend summer classes and venture into the local job market for an internship at the local Seven-Eleven.

Students who leave the campus for the summer months may be surprised when they return at summer's end. A number of pro-

jects on campus will be completed by the Physical Plant Division.

PPD will blacktop areas on campus based upon the amount of money that is made available by the UK administration. The Anderson Building tower will be renovated and many buildings on campus will be getting new roofs. A number of buildings on campus will also be getting some newly-painted walls.

Newly-painted walls will not be the only addition to UK. A more transient student population will infiltrate the Lexington Campus in a matter of a few

weeks.

According to university officials, of about 7,200 students plan on taking courses at UK this summer, females will outnumber males by a 10 percent margin. About seven percent of the population will be black and about 17 percent of the summer UK student population will be non-residents of Kentucky.

Many summer students, about 3,000 to be precise, will be seniors trying to complete classes as quickly as possible in order to graduate. Around 2,000 people on campus will be graduate students, many in the College of Education, who are furthering their education level.

Student Government Association officials plan on working hard over the summer months in their capacity as student officials.

Alan Aja, SGA president, said the group plans on tackling a number of proposals to make the Lexington Campus a better place to live.

Aja said that the group will sponsor a yard sale to raise money for child-care grants and it will bring back the brown-bag lunch sessions with student groups.

Plans for a campus-wide party to bring students from all sections of campus together are also going to be made by SGA officials.

"We believe it would be a good opportunity for students to get back together and an opportunity for us to welcome them back to campus," Aja said.

# Possible field for 122nd Kentucky Derby

- ▼ **Alyrob**- Jockey- Corey Nakatani, Trainer- Wally Dollase.  
Pros- Is a son of the '87 Derby winner, Alysheba. Alyrob came on strongly in the Santa Anita Derby to finish second but was disqualified for interference in the stretch and finished last. This horse can run all day. A strong contender if he makes the field.  
Cons- Has no graded stakes earnings, making him ineligible if the field draws the maximum 20 entries. No gelding has won the Derby since 1929.
- ▼ **Blow Out**- Jockey- Pat Johnson, Trainer- Jim Keeler.  
Pros- Always makes a run at the end. Blow Out came on in the Arkansas Derby until he was wiped out by a horse in the stretch. Is sure to pick off some horses here.  
Cons- Has never won a stakes race. His back-running style in such a large field also is a concern.
- ▼ **Built for Pleasure**- Jockey- Undecided, Trainer- Thomas Heard Jr.  
Pros- He is the only horse in this field that has defeated Unbridled's Song this year. That was in the Fountain of Youth when this colt went off at 143-1.  
Cons- Has shown little since that big effort. He was unplaced in both the Florida Derby and the Flamingo.
- ▼ **Cavonnier**- Jockey- Chris McCarron, Trainer- Bob Baffert.  
Pros- Won the Santa Anita Derby going away. McCarron, a two-time Derby winner, chose this gelding over Louis Quatorze, so something must be right about him.  
Cons- No Santa Anita Derby winner has won the Derby since '89. Like Alyrob, is also a gelding. No California-bred has won this race since the 1960s.
- ▼ **City by Night**- Jockey- Robbie Davis, Trainer- Patrick Byrne  
Pros- Went off at 17-1 in the Lexington Stakes at Keeneland. Lexington winners or participants have run well in the Derby lately. Examples are Swale, who won in 1984, and Forty Niner, who was second in 1988.  
Cons- Is winless in three tries at Churchill Downs. Was almost caught at the wire in the Lexington, which is 3/16 of a mile shorter than the Derby. Appears to be not as capable as some of the others in going the Derby distance.
- ▼ **Corker**- Jockey- Corey Black, Trainer- Charlie Whittingham.  
Pros- His half-brother, Strodes Creek, was a strong second in the 1994 Derby. Is bred to go the distance. Whittingham has won the Derby twice (1986, 1989). He rarely brings horses to the Derby. But if he does, do take the horse seriously.  
Cons- Is lightly raced and only finished third in the Santa Anita Derby. His better days may lie ahead.
- ▼ **Diligence**- Jockey- Kent Desormeaux, Trainer- Nick Zito.  
Pros- Zito has won the Derby twice (1991, 1994). Was undefeated for the year before losing in the Blue Grass. A likely long shot who is playable.  
Cons- Does not like wet racing surfaces. Has never won a graded stakes race. I hope Zito has an easier time working for George Steinbrenner, this colt's owner, than the Yankee skippers.
- ▼ **EC's Dream**- Jockey- Laffit Pincay Jr., Trainer- Bill Spawr.  
Pros- Usually gets a piece of the purse. He appeared to not belong in the Santa Anita Derby, yet he finished a respectable fourth. Is owned by Sid and Jenny Craig of weight-loss fame. A good bet if you like them.  
Cons- Does not appear to be good enough to mount a threat. May be in too classy company. Would be a huge payout except he will likely be in the mutual field.
- ▼ **x-Editor's Note**- Jockey- Gary Stevens, Trainer- D. Wayne Lukas.  
Pros- Consistently makes a good stretch run. Was beaten soundly by Skip Away in the Blue Grass, but nobody was going to beat him that day. Stevens has first call on the Lukas horses. Stevens and Lukas teamed up to win Derbys in 1988 and 1995. Interesting he chose this one. Will be coupled with Grindstone.  
Cons- Is winless since September. Is not guaranteed to get a good trip in such a big field. The slower the pace, the slimmer his chances.
- ▼ **x-Grindstone**- Jockey- Jerry Bailey, Trainer- D. Wayne Lukas.  
Pros- Is bred to run the distance. His daddy, Unbridled, won the Derby in 1990. Is improving steadily.  
Cons- Is still lightly raced. His style is similar to that of Editor's Note, but he runs closer to the lead. Will likely hit it big later.
- ▼ **Halo Sunshine**- Jockey- Craig Perret, Trainer- Richard Cross.  
Pros- Is a son of Halo, who has had two sons win the Derby (Sunny's Halo and Sunday Silence), so the distance shouldn't be a problem. Got a terrible trip in the Arkansas Derby. He still finished third.  
Cons- Of the major Derby preps, the Arkansas Derby has only produced two winners. Since he's a closer, a good trip is not guaranteed.
- ▼ **y-Honour and Glory**- Jockey- Undecided, Trainer- D. Wayne Lukas.  
Pros- Has been highly touted since he won his first race at Saratoga by 10 lengths. Has good speed and if he obtains an easy lead, watch out. His owner, Michael Tabor, teamed up with Lukas last year to win the Derby with Thunder Gulch.  
Cons- His critics think he can't make the Derby distance. Was fading at the end of the Santa Anita Derby, in which he placed second.
- ▼ **y-Victory Speech**- Jockey- Jose Santos, Trainer- D. Wayne Lukas.  
Pros- Will be coupled with Honour and Glory because of common ownership. Has never been worse than third in his career.  
Cons- Never won a stakes race and is the less celebrated of the five Lukas horses. But Thunder Gulch won the Derby last year as the least celebrated Lukas horse.
- ▼ **In Contention**- Jockey- Anthony Black, Trainer- Cynthia Reese.  
Pros- Closed stoutly to finish a game second to favorite Unbridled's Song in the Wood Memorial.  
Cons- The quality of competition he faced before the Wood is a question to some. Will likely be a part of the mutual field, where few are given any chance.
- ▼ **Louis Quatorze**- Jockey- Chris Antley, Trainer- Nick Zito.  
Pros- Antley and Zito know how to win the Derby. The two won it in 1991 with Strike the Gold. If it comes up muddy, consider in exactas. Is capable on a perfect day.  
Cons- His dosage index is very high (5.50, the only horse in the field above five. Under four is considered acceptable for the Derby distance). Has still not won a stakes race. But remember this, Strike the Gold is that one horse to win the Derby that had an index above four.
- ▼ **Matty G.**- Jockey- Alex Solis, Trainer- Ron McNally.  
Pros- McNally never puts horses in when they have no chance. He's maybe the best trainer that has never won a Triple Crown race. This colt won the Hollywood Futurity in December at 35-1 odds.  
Cons- Is winless this year. Beside his Futurity tally, his only other win was a maiden race.
- ▼ **Prince of Thieves**- Jockey- Pat Day, Trainer- D. Wayne Lukas.  
Pros- Is a three-quarter brother to last year's Preakness winner and co-Derby favorite, Timber Country. Looked impressive in finishing second in the Lexington after being stuck on the rail. The distance should be no problem.  
Cons- Has been relatively inconsistent in his short career. Bled badly in the Santa Anita Derby, but seems to be over that. Just another Lukas horse everybody must deal with.
- ▼ **Semorlan**- Jockey- Russell Baze, Trainer- Bob Baffert.  
Pros- Was undefeated this year until his Blue Grass effort. Is from the same barn as Cavonnier, but they will not be coupled since they have different owners. His performance in Saturday's Derby Trial will determine his Derby status.  
Cons- How much better is he than his Blue Grass race? Time will tell. Since he is a son of Phone Trick, that would suggest he is a sprinter.
- ▼ **Skip Away**- Jockey- Shane Sellers, Trainer- Sonny Hine.  
Pros- This is the hottest horse entering the Derby. His workouts are superb. His Blue Grass win was breathtaking. If he repeats that performance, then it may be all she wrote.  
Cons- Dosage is the question again. His index is 4.33. Other than that, there are no cons. This horse is a freak.
- ▼ **Unbridled's Song**- Jockey- Mike Smith, Trainer- Jim Ryerson.  
Pros- The favorite, without question. Was smashing in the Florida Derby where he beat Editor's Note by five, Skip Away by six, and Louis Quatorze by eight. His owner has said he doesn't think this colt will lose again.  
Cons- Is known to be a fractious horse. He seemed to have trouble with the crowd at Aqueduct in the Wood Memorial. The crowd here will be much worse. No favorite has won the Derby since 1979. No Breeder's Cup Juvenile winner has won the Derby either. And his Wood victory was not as impressive as his Florida race. But the horse does not know these facts.
- ▼ **Zarb's Magic**- Jockey- Ronald Ardoin, Trainer- Bret Thomas.  
Pros- Was game in winning the Arkansas Derby over Grindstone last out. His dosage index is the lowest in the field at 0.70. This guy has distance written all over him. The possible pace setter.  
Cons- Is also a gelding. Louisiana-breds running for the roses is a rarity. Is likely the least respected Derby prep winner in the field. The quality of the competition he faced in Louisiana is a question. But in Arkansas he defeated Grindstone, Blow Out and Halo Sunshine. We'll see.

## Downs recovering from setbacks

UK starting pitcher Scott Downs' statistics from last season seem impressive, but they don't tell the whole story.

The second-team freshman All-American was 5-5 with a 3.30 ERA and two complete games. Downs also struck out 102 batters in only 76 innings. To top it all off, he set a UK single-game strikeout record with 18 against Indiana.

But last season was riddled with adversity. An emergency appendectomy plus an ailing shoulder ended his rookie season prematurely.

While this was supposed to be a recovery season for Downs, he has come back from his September shoulder surgery to dominate.

Ask Alabama. He pitched a complete-game victory against the Tide three weeks ago. Or ask Tennessee. Downs hurled another complete-game win over the Vols. Going into last weekend, Downs was 3-1 with a 2.49 ERA.

"I think I'm overly pleased, and the coaches are pleased," Downs said.

What makes the story more remarkable is that Downs is not yet 100 percent. He still complains about pain after throwing, but he said his health is improving.

"I'm still in a recovery process," Downs said. "The arm is more healthy now than what it was, but it still has a lot of way to go."

There were high expectations on Downs when he enrolled at UK. The Louisville native was named Kentucky's Mr. Baseball his senior year after lettering three years as a pitcher.

As captain of his team at Pleasure Ridge Park High School his senior year, Downs went undefeated with a 13-0 record and a stunning 0.43 ERA. That year, he saved his best performance for last when he pitched a three-hitter and struck out 14 batters in the state championship game.

Downs is starting to live up to the high expectations. One man not complaining about Downs' performance this season is UK coach Keith Madison.

"Scott Downs I think is one of the top pitchers in college baseball," Madison said. "I'm very proud of him and pleased with the way he's throwing."

Downs believes his success comes from making important pitches at important times.

"It's just that I think I'm throwing pitches when I need to and hitting my spots real well," he said.

Last weekend against Florida was Downs' worst performance of the year. He pitched six innings while giving up 10 hits, four earned runs, two walks, two hit batsmen, and one wild pitch.

But more importantly, Downs got the win.

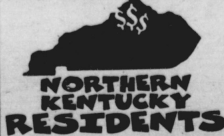

the less amount of pressure, because the amount of classes a student carries is considerably less than what they take during the fall and spring semesters.

In the past 15 years, summer enrollment has increased 60 percent. This increase has enabled summer school to add the variety and number of classes offered.

Messer said the amount and type of classes offered depends on demand. "We try to cater to the needs of the students whether they are just starting or are teachers doing graduate work."

Those who attend or teach summer school each have a different view of what summer school should be.

Spanish teaching assistant Priscilla Fritts said the quality of students in the summer sessions take a drastic drop.

"Students tend to neglect class because of the amount of wonderful outdoor days," Fritts said.

Elementary education freshman Juaacklyn Cunningham plans on using the summer sessions to prepare for fall.

"It's so hard to catch up at this University," she said. "I just want to get ahead."

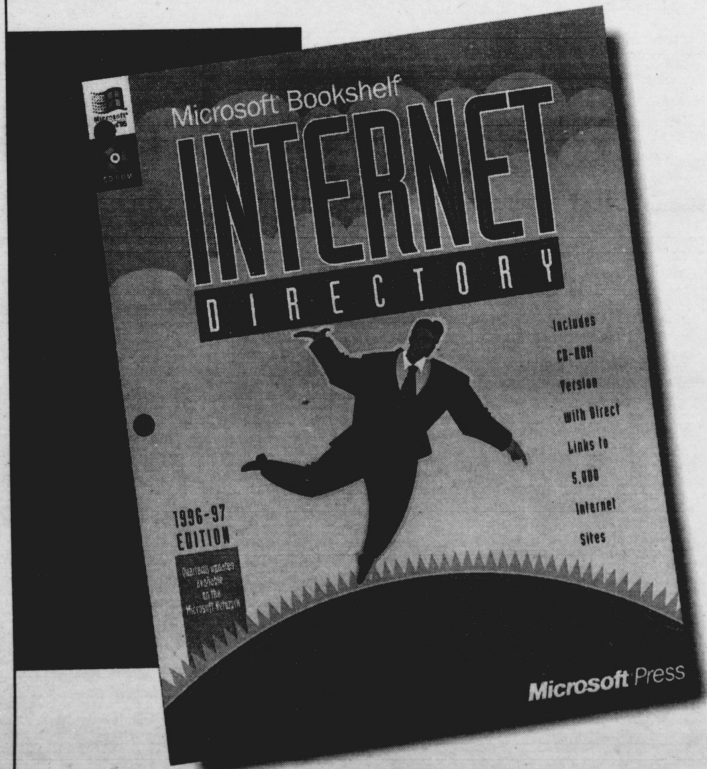

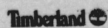

Next year, I know that I will have friends when I return, so when Mom drives away and leaves with my baggage to carry up the steps of my residence hall, I will not be alone.

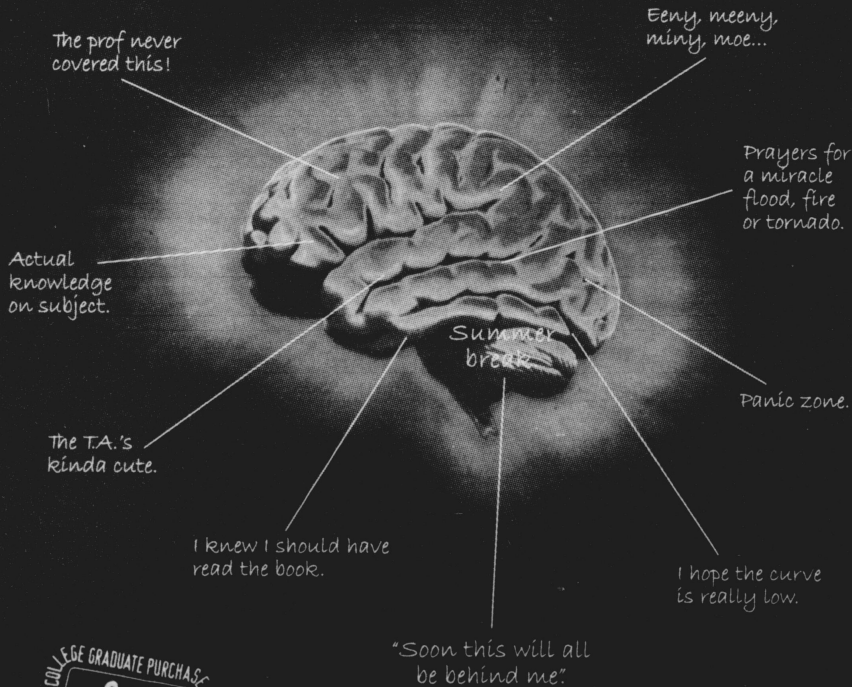

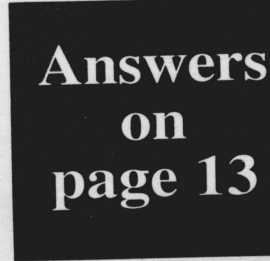
