Hurricane Isabel threatens N.C.

NAGS HEAD, N.C. — Hurricane Isabel closed in on North Carolina's Outer Banks on Wednesday with 105 mph winds and the potential for up to a foot of rain, threatening to cause ruinous flooding across a huge swath of the aiready soggy East. Isabel had weakened to a Category 2 hurricane from a Category 5, 160-mph monster, but was still expected to be dangerous when it hit the barrier islands Thursday morning with a storm surge of up to 11 feet. More than 230,000 people in North Carolina and Virginia were urged to move to higher ground, leaving the vulnerable Outer Banks mostly evacuated.

WASHINGTON — President Bush said
Wednesday there was no evidence that Sadadam Hussein was involved in the terrorist
attacks of Sept. 11, 2001 — disputing an idea
held by many Americans. The president
said, "We have no evidence that Saddam
Hussein was involved with the Sept. 11" attacks. His comment was in line with a statement Thesday by Defense Secretary Donald
Rumsfeld, who said he had not seen any evidence that Saddam was involved in the attacks. Yet, a new poll found that nearly 70
percent of respondents believed the Iraqieader probably was personally involved.
The administration has argued that Saddam's government had close links to al-Qaida.

# Students, prof held hostage at Tenn. college

Gunman kills himself and wounds two others; said during standoff he was a member of al-Qaida

DYERSBURG, Tenn. — A gunman took at least a dozen people hostage in a college classroom Wednesday afternoon before killing himself, police said. Two hostages were wounded during the nine-hour standoff.

Police heard gunshots from inside the building at Dyersburg State Community College around 11 pm. EDT. The gunman, 26-year-old Harold Klipatrick Jr., had left a note saying he "wanted to kill some people and die today." Dyersburg Police Chief Bobby Williamson said the injuries to the two hostages were not serious.

The gunman, believed to have a 9mm pistol and what looked like a butcher knife, had not made any demands during the day — aside from food and drink, Police Chief Bobby Williamson said. In the evening, he asked for six peperoni pizzas and two six packs of soft drinks, which police delivered.

The gunman claimed to be a member of al-Qaida, and

The gunman claimed to be a member of al-Qaida, and williamson said that although authorities had no reason to believe the claim, the FBI had been called in.

Justice Department officials in Washington also said they had no evidence that the gunman was a member of the terrorist organization.

Police said Kilpatrick was a Memphis man who was staying with his sister in Dyersburg, about 75 miles northeast of Memphis.

In the suicide note, left at his sister's house, he also said he didn't like Americans and had spoken with al-Qaida leader Osama bin Laden, Dyersburg Police Chief Bob-Williamson said.

Kilpatrick faced criminal charges of assault and kidnaphing in another case. Dyersburg police spokesman Charles Maxey said. He had no details but said Kilpatrick had been scheduled to appear in a Memphis courtroom Wednesday.

Williamson said there were 12 to 16 people in the basic math classroom when the standoff began.

The three students Kilpatrick released were all women, one of whom was pregnant. The teacher remained in the classroom.


Officers had been communicating to the gunman through student hostages on their cell phones, "but he won't talk directly to us," williamson said.

A SWAT team and about five hostage negotiators were among the officers called to the scene.

Police said Kilpatrick was not a student or college employee.

employee.

They were talking to his sister at the scene, but the gunman wouldn't talk to her, Williamson said.



# Stats show Kentucky becoming more diverse

PIKEVILLE — With growing minority popula-tions, Kentucky is becoming a more racially diverse state. The U.S. Census Bureau released estimates Thursday that showed the number of Hispanics increased 13.9 percent in the state from 2000 to 2002.

Increases were also reported among all other minority groups.

Despite the growth, Kentucky remains 88-9 percent Caucasian, said Ron Crouch, director of the Kentucky State Data Center at the University of Louisville.

African-Americans. he

African-Americans, he said, continue to be the

largest minority group, making up about 7 percent of the state's population.

ing up about 7 percent of the state's population.

The Hispanic population rose from 60,482 to 68,383 in Kentucky over the two-year period, with the largest increases in the state's farming communities, according to the largest estimates from the communities, according to the largest estimates from the largest estimates for Shelby county.

"I would say it is a lot more than that," he said. "It is

hard for many people to be counted for different reasons — language barriers, immi-gration concerns, lack of out-reach into the Spanish com-munity."

reach into the Spanish community."

The number of people in Kentucky identifying themselves as Asian rose from 30,201 to 34,544, a 144 percent increase, according to the population estimates.

Scott County saw an increase in its Asian population of 65.5 percent, up from 184 to 278 over the period. Oldham County had a 37.2 percent increase, up from 215 to 255.

The number of Pacific Islanders in the state rose by 10.8 percent, while those identifying themselves as multiratifying themselves as multiratifyi

Native Americans by 4 per-cent, African-Americans by 2.4 percent. and Caucasians by 0.6 percent. Crouch said the state's population ages 60 to 64 is 93.1 percent Caucasian. The group including 30-to-34-year-olds is 83.5 percent Caucasian. "In other words, the younger population tends to be more diverse than older generations," Crouch said. Donis said Kentuckians

Donis said Kentuckians have largely welcomed immi-

grants.

"People are very friendly," he said. "They're showing that in their hiring practices. There are companies here that 50 percent of their workers are Hispanic."

StormReady is a NWS program founded in Tulsa, Okla., in 1999. Through planning, educa-tion and awareness, citizens in StormReady communities

StormReady communities learn safety and communication skills.

According to the NWS StormReady Web site, commu-nities seeking StormReady certification must meet popu-lation-based guidelines, which

lation-based guidelines, which include communication, weather monitoring and community preparedness. StormReady primarily certifies towns and cities, but college campuses are beginning to apply for the program. UK is the fourth college in the nation to be StormReady, Priddy said.

Although an official dedication ceremony hasn't happened, Priddy said UK met the criteria and passed in August.

Along with the notebooks of weather plans, UK bought to Sovere Weather Sheliter signs and 130 weather radios. He was the program cost \$6.00. In all, the program cost

Amber alerts and chemical spill alerts. spill alerts. spill alerts. Priddy said he proposed he StormReady idea to UK's administration last October. He felt UK needed a better system for preparing and responding to severe weather. "People have always told the severe weather, they really didn't know where to go on campus," he said. "So I thought what we needed to do was try and solve that problem across the entire campus."

Although Lexington hasn't had a fornado hit ground
since 1986, when 200 homes
were damaged around UK's
campus, Priddy said tornadoes are always a threat.
This year, United States
experienced 400 tornadoes
with 27 in Kentucky, he said.
"It really is pretty obvious
that we could be hit," he said.
About a month after

proposing his idea, former Vice President of Auxiliary Services Ben Carr gave Priddy the go-shead and saked him to continuously with the project were 12 students from Priddy's biometeorology class he teaches every spring.

Priddy's students were trained to identify a buildings on campus in March.

If gave the class a chance to apply what they were learning to the real world, said Matt Boling, an agricultural communications senior and one of the students on the project.

"We got to get out of a classroom and do something that meant something and might help people," he said.

Along with members of Priddy's meteorology class, UK police officers and Physical Plant Division supervisors were trained and certified as official NWS StormSpotters.

StormSpotters are trained to identify and respond to se-

official NWS StormSpotters.
StormSpotters are trained to identify and respond to severe weather and the conditions that lead to it, including wind gusts, funnel clouds and heavy lightening.
Since some of the most populated buildings on campus are the dorms, resident advisers and hall directors received severe weather response training.

Tony Ralba, assistant di-

Tony Ralph, assistant di-rector of Residence Life, said training will greatly improve students' responses and better prepare RA's and hall direc-tors to help residents get to safe areas.

fors to help residents get to safe areas.

"The safe places are clearly identified which makes everyone grateful." he said. "Floor leaders can be confident in helping students because they know where to go."

Because budget cuts were taking place and funding for the project was low, Priddy said he negotiated with the NWS to allow UK to complete requirements in two phases.

Phase I began in March and ended in August with UK becoming StormReady Phase I will essentially be a continuand ended in August with UK becoming StormReady Phase II will essentially be a continu-ation of Phase I, Priddy said, where he and his crew will maintain and repair the ra-dios, install additional signs and weather radios and con-tinue severe weather training for UK Police, PPD and cam-pus leaders.

To maintain certification, each building is required to practice tornado drills twice a year, he said.

UK must be re-certified in August 2005. Since some of the campus buildings didn't get radios, Priddy and others working on the project created departmen-tal tornado procedures. improve their response time. "Now we're not solely dependent on technology because now our officers have
been trained on what to look
for," he said. "Sometimes by
the time weather warnings
have been issued, the weather's already severe. Now an officer can identify a bad situation and give everyone the
heads-up."

said that although UK has always had a severe weather
policy, though most students
were not aware of it. He said
StormReady is more efficient
and visible.

"The past policy was nowhere near as thorough and we were nowhere near as prepared in receiving information and getting it out to people," he said. "Hopefully UK becoming StormReady will be a step to making Fayette County StormReady, as well."

Priddy said he believes StormReady will heighten stu-dents' awareness and quicken their response time.

"This system is a more organized, upgraded way to have
a response to severe weather
campus-wide," he said. "All
the things we put together—
communications and response
methods — that we hadn't
been doing in the past are a
great improvement, and that's
what this whole thing is
about. We've got this whole

### If the storm hits ...

Severe weather in-cludes everything from tornadoes to severe thun-

tornadoes to severe thunderstorms.

The UK Police are the first responders if severe weather hits campus, said UK Agricultural Weather Center Director Tom Priddy.

If severe weather occurred on campus, one of two events would take place;
In the first scenario, an officer would spot a potential severe weather optimized to the control of the control o

In the first scenario, an officer would spot a potential severe weather situation and radio the information to the dispatch who would disseminate the warming through radio networks. The dispatch is also responsible for notifying the NWS in Louisville.

Then, the NWS would issue a severe weather warning for Fayette County.

In the second scenario, the Louisville's NWS would detect severe weather activity in Lexington on their Doppler SWS would detect severe weather activity in Lexington on their Doppler and the weather radios at UK.

A siren located on South Canada and the weather radios at UK.

A siren located on South Canada and W. A siren located on South Campus would also sound during a severe weather situation, alerting those on campus. Priddy wants stirling the severe weather situation, alerting those on campus.

weather situation, alert-ing those on campus.
Priddy wants stu-dents to be aware of where a safer place is than where they're at when severe weather strikes.

when severe weather strikes.

"If they don't have very much time, it might be under their desk or up against the wall," he said.
"If they're outside, it might be getting inside the nearest building. If they're on the upper floors of a building, they need to get to a stairwell and go down to a lower floor."





When the Cool Cats hockey team slips onto the tice for the first time this weekend, it will be led by a trio of new coaches looking to revive a program that's returning from its first losing season in 15 years.

The club has witnessed a series of off-season shake ups. Those included the hirring of new head coach Mike Sonowski and assistant coaches Gordon Summers and Rob Docherty after last year's head coach, Phil Sweeney, left for a job in Michigan.

The coaches praised the team for its newfound excitement as well as the desire it has to learn.

Since then he has been known as the most successful coach in team history and was the last to lead UK to a national tournament in 1995. Summers said he is trying not to step on Sosnowski's toes when it comes to making head coaching decisions.







Cartainly backing Israel in its fight against terrorism is the right course for America. However, Jews must realize the folly of Bush's approach to foreign policy in general rather than conveniently forgetting it amidst his unprecedented support for Israel.

The short-term political goals of American Jews — securing peace for Israel and ending Arafat's regime of terror in Palestine and against Israel Jews — must not take precedent to the ideals of equality and fair treatment for the underprivileged that have been long-standing Jewish goals.

Israel would be better served, in the long term, by a fair and moderated foreign policy that allows for the peaceful formation of a Palestinian state. Bush's peace plan, with an unrealistic timetable and disproportionate implementation

by the two sides, is likely to never succeed.

Working for peace under fair arbitration may be more difficult, time consuming and frustrating. However, it is likely to be longer-lasting and more palatable to both sides.

Bush's pro-Israel "road map" seems more likely to precipitate a Palestinian civil war than a lasting peace, and Jewish Americans must, realize this before turning their support to the Republican agenda.

The majority of Jewis in this country are liberal for very good reason. While Bush's "might maker right" foreign polecies, quite well, it is likely to produce a hollow victory that will garner nothing but worldwide animosity and regional unrest.





# INTER GREEK PROGRAMMING ASSEMBLY (IGPA) COMPOSITION

The Inter Greek Programming Assembly is composed of members of the Inter Fraternity Council, the Panhellenic Council, and the National Pan-Hellenic Council. It is the only Greek Council on campus that is composed of members from all aspects of the Greek Community. IGPA seeks to bring members of all organizations together in order to benefit various charitable organizations. Each fraternity and sorority on campus has their own charity. Many Greek organizations raise money for these charities by conducting events, which involve every chapter on campus. Most often, the events are competitions between chapters or teams of chapters. Events are wide and varied, ranging from talent shows to home run derbies. Having these competitions allows the Greek Community to come together and do some good for a specific cause.

Greek Organizations that wish to conduct events must submit their request to the Inter Greek Programming Assembly, who then looks at the concepts of the event to ensure that all aspects of planning and execution have been taken into consideration. IGPA then approves the event, and it is placed on the calendar for the upcoming semester. IGPA also makes sure that the competitions are fair. If after the event there are any problems with fairness or if the event was in violation of a rule (for instance, if there were alcohol at the event), IGPA is in charge of disciplining the chapter that con-

ducted the event.

IGPA is in charge of planning for Greek Week. Greek Week takes place in the fall, and focuses on bringing Greeks together and enforcing their presence on campus. Greek Week this year will be the week of September 22-26. During Greek Week, there will be many events for Greeks on campus, including a Night of Dialogue (co-sponsored by THE CAUSE), a participation event at a UK soccer game where prizes will be given away and a Greek blood drive.

IGPA also plans Greek Service Week, which is a week of volunteer opportunities for members of the Greek Community. In the past, we have worked with the Manchester Center, Shriner's Hospital, and Lexington Big Brothers/Big Sisters. Greek Service Week culminates in the annual Greek Banquet, which honors outstanding chapters for their work throughout the year.





# **CHAPTERS**

Epsilon Chi Chapter
Since its founding on December 4, 1906, Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. has
supplied voice and vision to the struggle of African-Americans and people of color
around the world. Alpha Phi Alpha is the first intercollegiate Greek-letter fraternity established for African-Americans and was founded at Cornell University in
Ithaca, New York. Epsilon Chi was established on the University of Kentucky's
campus on April 1, 1965, and has since had a long standing tradition of leadership
and service on UK's campus and in the Lexington community. Any interested student should go to Alphaphialpha.net for more information.

Alpha Kappa Alpha hails as the first historically black Sorority founded on January 15, 1908 on the campus of Howard University by nine visionary women. By "merit and culture" this Sorority has strived throughout the years to be of "service to all mankind." Current program initiatives include the Ivy Reading Academy, National Family Volunteer Day, Minority Cancer Awareness Week, and Black Dollar Month to name a few. The Iota Sigma chapter represents Alpha Kappa Alpha at the University of Kentucky and was chartered in 1975. Notable programming includes the Sickle Cell Walk for Life, the Vine Book Club, and Healthy Weight Week.

Delta Sigma Theta was founded on January 13, 1913 by twenty-two illustrious women at Howard University. The founders of DST envisioned an organization based on Christian principles that consisted of collegiate women who believed in serious and strong community endeavors. The Mu Epsilon Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta, located here at UK was chartered May 9, 1975 by thirteen dynamic women. The sorority's major programs center around the I-wePoint Thrust. Economic Development, Educational Development, Physical and Mental Health, Political Awareness and Involvement, and International Awareness and Involvement. Delta Sigma Theta strives to strengthen in Sisterhood, Scholarship, and Service.

On Friday evening, November 17, 1911, three Howard University undergraduate students, with the assistance of their faculty adviser, gave birth to the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity. This event occurred in the office of biology Professor Ernest E. Just, the faculty adviser, in the Science Hall (now known as Thirkield Hall). The three liberal arts students were Edgar A. Love, Oscar J. Cooper and Frank Coleman. From the initials of the Greek phrase meaning "friendship is essential to the soul," the name Omega Psi Phi was derived. The phrase was selected as the motto. Manhood, scholarship, perseverance and uplift were adopted as cardinal principles

Three African-American men founded Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc. at Howard University in Washington, D.C., January 9, 1914. The founders, A. Langston Taylor, Leonard F. Morse, and Charles I. Brown, organized a fraternity that exemplifies brotherhood, scholarship, and service while being "a part of" the general community rather than "apart from" the general community. At the University of Kentucky, the Mu Theta Chapter of Phi Beta Sigma continues that trend. The chapter, chartered September 16, 1980, has continued to strive for excellence upholding our motto, Culture for Service, Service for Humanity. Phi Beta Sigma and Zeta Phi Beta are the only constitutionally bound, brother and sister organizations in the NPHC.

Zeta Phi Beta was founded in 1920 at Howard University in Washington, D.C. as the sister organization to Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc. Zeta's purpose is to foster the ideals of service, charity, scholarship, civic and cultural endeavors, sisterhood and Finer Womanhood. In addition to being the only organization constitutionally bound to a fraternity, Zeta was the first to charter international chapters—in West Africa and Germany—and to form adult and youth auxiliary groups, the Amicae, Archonettes, Amicettes and Pearlettes. Zeta's mascot is officially the white dove and the sorority's colors are royal blue and pure white.

# NATIONAL PAN-HELLENIC COUNCIL (NPHC) COMPOSITION

The National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC), Inc. is currently composed of nine international Greek-letter sororities and fraternities. They include Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc., Inc.,

and Omega FSI FII Fraterinity, Inc. These organizations are also often reterred to as "The Divine Nine."

NPHC was founded on May 10, 1930 on the campus of Howard University in Washington, D.C. The purpose and mission of the organization when it formed was "Unamity of thought and action as far as possible in the conduct of Greek-letter collegiate fraternities and sororities, and to consider the problems of mutual interest to its member organizations." The concept of forming NPHC is rooted in the historical accounts and significance of predominantly Black, Greek-letter organizations. While each organization has their own distinct histories and heritages, the nine member organizations offer insight and unique perspective in the understanding and development of Plack accidencements and submid life. 
As there is a social aspect to Greek life, the focal point of NPHC member organizations is community awareness and action through educational, economic, and cultural service events. A unique aspect of NPHC member organizations is that serving their organizations is a lifetime commitment and goes beyond an individual's college career. Members are expected to join a graduate/alumni chapter following graduation. All NPHC affiliates and their members are expected to maintain a very active role in their organization and the community to which they belong which they belong.

The motivation to form campus-based councils to represent NPHC affiliates is not meant to promote a 'separatist' mentality. NPHC contends the establishment of councils on college campuses assists in maintaining a distinct identity as service based organizations as opposed to those that are strictly social in nature. There is a very active NPHC affiliate on the University of Kentucky's campus. The goal of UKNPHC is the foster unity among all the member organizations, forge positive collaborations, to be of service to the community. UKN-PHC hosts many social and service events each year, in addition to the myriad of activities sponsored by each organization. Notable events include the annual Greek-Nic and Homecoming Stepshow. In the past, UKNPHC has also hosted a Feed the Homeless Program and a month-long celebration for Black History Month. 

This summer, UK Panhellenic won the national Leadership award in the large university division. Panhellenic systems around the country apply for these awards every two years. With the exception of the Scholarship category, only one major award is granted per school. A new Leadership category was presented this year.

"We applied in three other categories, but I am glad we won this one because it's the newest and it proves our emphasis on leadership," Hahn said.

Leadership chair Jill Ditmer said, "It's great to be recognized nationally as being an outstanding Panhellenic organization. Many people put a lot of work into this and it has paid off."

Hahn said, "There are so many ways to get leadership positions in the Greek system." Some examples included in the award were Panhellenic's Candlelight before recruitment week, the two-day sophomore leadership retreat in the fall and chapter President roundtable discussions held once a month.

"Winning a national award is also a good opportunity to get UK's name out for positive recognition," Ditmer said.

According to Hahn, Panhellenic is the governing counsel over UK's 15 sororities. They plan different activities and oversee all sorority social events. "We try to unite the sororities by providing social events, activities and fundraisers."

In 2001, Panhellenic won the Excellence award, Scholarship award and Greek Affairs Dean Susan West won the Advisor of the Year. Since 1991, Panhellenic has won an award every time they have applied, according to West.

The Panhellenic executive board and Dean West will visit California to accept the award at a banquet Oct. 12.

"People see that sororities are more than about buying friends and going to parties," Hahn said. "Winning these honors proves the Greek system is creating strong leaders."




