## Students support African struggles

Giving earth a voice: UK chapter demonstrates for human, environmental rights at Nicholasville Rd. Shell station

Horns were blowing and people were shouting on the corner of Nicholasville Road and Southland Drive Friday afternoon, but rush hour road rage wasn't the reason.

Around 18 UK Amnesty International members gathered at the Shell station at the intersection to protest the oil corporation's involvement in environmental and human rights abuses in Africa.

Amnesty claims more than 2,000 Ogoni people of Nigeria died in the struggle against Shell's destruction of their envi-

ronment. Now they're worried the current Doba pipeline project in Chad/Cameroon will become another Ogoniland.

Ryan LaFollette, student area coordinator for Amnesty International at UK, said the organization is launching a new campaign with the Sierra Club called "Just Earth." The purpose is to defend those who give the earth a voice.

"There are human rights activists and environmentalists who put their lives on the line to protect forests, oceans and natural resources from pollution, political repression and greedy corporate interests," he said. "We want to make our presence known and let people know what they can

do to take action."

The group handed out literature to patrons of Shell while others held signs and shouted "No Blood for Oil" and "Honk for Human Rights."

LaFollette emphasized they are not asking anyone to boycott Shell.

"We want Shell to address the environmental pollution in the Niger Delta," he said. "We also want Shell to provide information about the guarantees it has made for the protection of human rights in Chad/Cameroon."

Amy Shelton, group coordinator of Amnesty International at UK, said they wanted to call attention to the issue and get more people to care.

"Amnesty International is concerned about the way human rights

are violated especially when people who have defended the environment have been attacked by their own government or by other groups more concerned with their own economic interests."

Amnesty International members from Transylvania University demonstrated with UK's members.

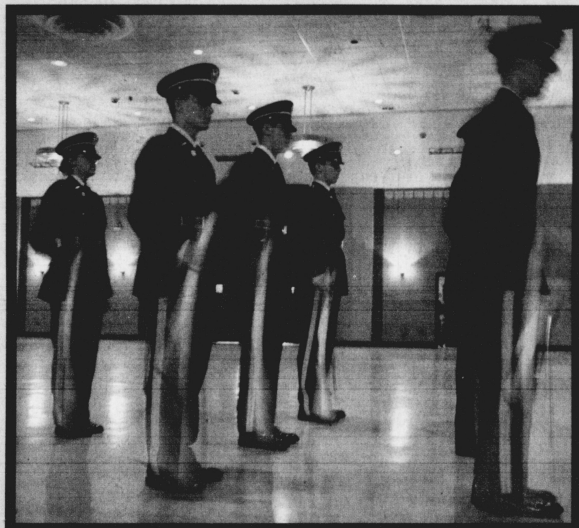
The gray skies and below freezing temperatures didn't seem to matter to the group.

"If there are people in Africa that get killed because corporations want more money, it's a small price to pay to come out on a cold day," said Amelia Davis, a UK French and International Economics sophomore.

Shell station employees declined to comment on the protest.

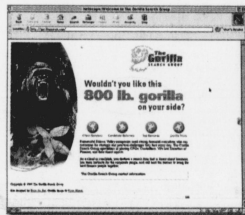
Above: Jefferson High School's drill team flashes their synchronized rifle ability.

## Further research links Jefferson, Hemmings

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. — After over a year of study, Monticello officials announced Wednesday that research has nearly conclusively proven that founding father Thomas Jefferson fathered at least one and maybe more children with his slave, Sally Hemmings.

Monticello officials commissioned the study after former University Pathology Prof. Eugene Foster published a study saying that, through DNA research, he had found a link between Jefferson's family and the Hemmings' descendants.

Daniel P. Jordan, Thomas Jefferson Memorial Foundation president, said the study was conducted by historians and scientists that already worked for Monticello. Jordan said the Foundation did not be-

gin its research hoping for any particular result.

"We came into [the project] with an open mind," he said.

The committee performing the research was charged with several tasks, including examining all evidence about the possible relationship between Jefferson and Hemmings and consulting with outside experts.

Foster said he was pleased with the outcome of the committee's research efforts.

The committee reached "more or less the same conclusions" that were reached through the DNA research, he said.

Foster was not involved in the Monticello study.

Foster pointed out that the Monticello researchers had more information at their

disposal than he had had while conducting his scientific study.

The committee reached four conclusions, which were announced Wednesday.

These include that Foster's DNA study was conducted in a valid, scientific manner. The report of the committee also states that the DNA study combined with other evidence indicates that Jefferson most likely fathered at least one and possibly all of Hemmings' six children. The study also indicated that many aspects of the Hemmings-Jefferson relationship remain unclear. The final conclusion of the committee is that the implication of the relationship should be used to enrich the public's perception of Jefferson.

Jordan said he does not feel the findings will damage Jefferson's image, but instead may serve to humanize a sometimes remote, historical figure.

"His legacy is secure," he said. The study was performed at a negligible cost, because all the participants already were Monticello employees, Jordan said.

Foster said there is still some DNA research that is being done with another possible Jefferson descendant, Thomas Woodson.

Foster said that confirmation of Woodson's heritage would be important because it would then show a third line of descent from Jefferson and Hemmings.

## N.H. candidates trade barbs

MANCHESTER, N.H. — Al Gore and fellow Democrats jumped "into bed with special interests" during the 1996 fund-raising scandal, rival Bill Bradley said yesterday, as he struggled with questions about his own health two days before New Hampshire's primary. Gore's team released a statement from Democratic congressional leaders asking Bradley to "abandon negative personal attacks. Sen. John McCain said, "There's only one man who is fully prepared" to be commander-in-chief, suggesting himself over Republican rival George W. Bush. Bush, the two-term Texas governor, said his executive office experience would make for a better president.

## Elian's grandmothers leave U.S.

CHANTILLY, Va. — Elian Gonzalez's grandmothers flew back to Cuba yesterday without the 6-year-old boy at the center of an international custody battle, convinced he will not find happiness in the United States. "We are leaving but Elian is still here," his paternal grandmother Mariela Quintana said. "He will never be happy because he grew up in Cuba." Mrs. Quintana and Raquel Rodriguez are scheduled to arrive in Havana around 4:15 p.m. EST.

## Albright headed to Moscow

DAVOS, Switzerland — Secretary of State Madeleine Albright is headed to Moscow yesterday to press a heavy arms control agenda and to size up Russia's acting president, Vladimir Putin. Albright is ready to discuss sharp cuts in U.S. and Russian long-range nuclear arsenals while urging Putin to approve "modest adjustments" in a ban on missile defenses. Before taking off, Albright said life in parts of the former Soviet Union often is tougher for ordinary people than when Communists ruled.

## Austrian says Haider must moderate

VIENNA, Austria — The man negotiating a possible coalition government with Joerg Haider's far-right Freedom Party, called yesterday for the party to soften its opposition to European integration and to prove itself ready for the responsibilities of power. Foreign Minister Wolfgang Schuessel, head of the Austrian People's Party, defended his decision to enter coalition talks with Haider's party despite Haider's past remarks against immigration and in sympathy

## IRA arms report due tomorrow

BELFAST, Northern Ireland — Northern Ireland's shaky new Protestant-Catholic administration is hanging in the balance as the province awaits a report due tomorrow on whether the Irish Republican Army has begun disarming. David Trimble, the Protestant leader of the new Cabinet, predicted yesterday that the four-party coalition would lose its powers or collapse outright if the report doesn't indicate IRA disarmament is under way. He made an 11th-hour appeal to the IRA to deliver something of substance to the disarmament commission.

## High-tech exec beaten, brain-dead

SAN JOSE, Calif. — A Silicon Valley entrepreneur visiting Beijing for a high-tech conference sponsored by the Chinese government was declared brain dead after he was severely beaten and left unconscious, relatives say. Family members told The San Jose Mercury News that Steven Leung, chairman of Mountain View-based Scenix and the president of Santa Clara-based Envix Communications, was found unconscious with a head wound on Jan. 18 in a karaoke bar. Leung, a resident of San Jose and the father of three, is being treated in a Hong Kong hospital. Relatives say they have received little information from Chinese law enforcement authorities.

## Knicks 120, Kings 111

NEW YORK — Latrell Sprewell scored 32 points and Allan Houston had 28 yesterday as the New York Knicks had their highest scoring game of the season in a 120-111 victory over Sacramento that made Jeff Van Gundy the Eastern Conference All-Star coach. The victory gave the Knicks a record of 26-15, moving them into a tie with Miami for the Atlantic Division lead. All-Star coaches are determined based upon records following yesterday's games, and Van Gundy got the call over the Heat's Pat Riley because of a formula giving the edge to whichever man has not coached an All-Star game most recently.

## Kenya Airways jet crashes into sea

ABIDJAN, Ivory Coast — A Kenya Airways jet en route to Lagos, Nigeria, crashed into the sea Sunday night, shortly after taking off from Abidjan, airport officials said. The plane, an Airbus 310, took off at 9:08 p.m. and crashed just a few minutes later, the airport officials said on condition of anonymity.

# Dining options present problem

**Dining debate:** Students have difficulty choosing whether or not to eat on campus

To eat or not to eat, that is the question. Whether 'tis nobler for the body to suffer the slings and arrows of campus food ... or just go to Tolly-Ho? This is the daily dilemma of several UK students who live on campus.

One might ask, what makes this decision so difficult? Each residential student pays \$875 for a diner account. The diner account can be used at any UK Food Service outlet except for Block and Barrel, The Lemon Tree and Intermzzo.

When broken down, this is a daily allowance of about \$6, enough for "a meal and a snack," according to a UK Food Services brochure.

Students have mixed feelings about eating on campus. Many students choose to eat on campus because they do have the diner account; it is almost an obligation since only \$50 carries over from fall to spring semester.

"I eat more on campus because I have the diner account; instead of having to have cash on hand all the time," said Krista Hinton, a pre-physical

therapy freshman. Eating off-campus can take a toll on a student's wallet.

Katie Bohon, sociology freshman, learned this lesson the hard way. "I hardly ever used to eat on campus. I went out to eat with my friends a lot at O'Charley's, until I saw my bank account decrease. Now I must eat on campus," she said.

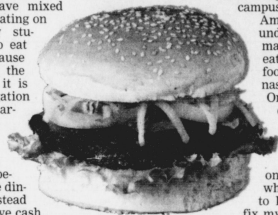
UK Food Services does offer some nutritious alternatives, which keeps some students dining on campus.

"I never eat out. I like to eat at Ovid's in the Young library because it's healthier for me," said Nikki Martin, an accounting sophomore.

Others experience sheer despair at the thought of eating on campus.

Amanda Gregg, an undeclared freshman, said, "I hate eating Commons food. It's cold, it's nasty and it's gross!" One more choice in dining does exist: the grocery.

A simple trip to Kroger can do the trick. "I only eat at Blazer when I have to; I go to Kroger a lot and fix my own food," said Amy Hulker, an ISC sophomore.

## Protesters demand Elian's return home

WASHINGTON — About 200 chanting, flag-waving protesters marched in front of the Immigration and Naturalization Service's office Saturday, demanding that 6-year-old Elian Gonzalez be sent home to his father in Cuba.

But Rep. Dan Burton, whose congressional maneuvering to keep Elian in the United States has infuriated the boy's father, said Saturday that the boy told him he doesn't want to go back.

"He's a very intelligent young man and I was able to ask him without any coaching a couple of questions," the Indiana Republican said after meeting for 30 minutes with Elian at the home where the boy is staying with relatives.

"The first question I asked him is how did he like living here and he said he liked it very much as he was blowing bubbles. And then I said 'Would you like to go back to Cuba?' And he was very firm in saying 'No' and this without any coaching."

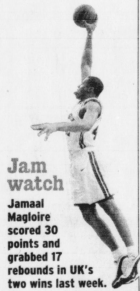

## Cats escape with win

Surviving the storm: UK overcomes Miami with a too-close-for-comfort non-conference victory

MIAMI — Kentucky's break from Southeastern Conference play was anything but leisurely.

Keith Bogans scored 16 points and Desmond Allison added 15 as 16th-ranked UK (15-5) beat Miami 60-57 Saturday for its fifth consecutive victory and 11th in 12 games.

"This was a crucial win for us because it's so important for us to keep our momentum going back into SEC play," said UK coach Tubby Smith, who had 11 points and seven rebounds.

The Cats led much of the game with the help of 20 offensive rebounds, but the Hurricanes used a 12-2 run late in the second half to go ahead 57-56 with 42 seconds remaining.

Tayshaun Prince hit a running jumper in the lane, regaining the lead for the Wildcats. Miami (23-9) had a chance to take the lead with 30 seconds to play, but Vernon Jennings' shot from under the basket hit the bottom of the rim. Sauti Smith grabbed the loose ball and called timeout as he fell out of bounds to save possession for UK.

"I'm not sure we could have gotten a better shot than Vernon had point-blank in the lane," Miami coach Leonard Hamilton said. "Unfortunately we just didn't make plays in the final seconds and their kids did."

The Hurricanes fouled Magloire on the ensuing possession, and he made two free throws with 3.4 seconds left. Jennings' 3-point

er at the buzzer didn't even reach the rim. Johnny Hensley led the Hurricanes with 18 points but shot only 5-for-15. Mario Bland added 10 points and seven rebounds.

UK had several chances to put the game out of reach before the closing minutes. They closed the first half on a 15-4 run and led 35-25 at halftime.

The Hurricanes went on a 14-3 spurt in the opening minutes of the second half and regained the lead 39-38. UK then opened a nine-point lead — its biggest of the second half — when Smith made a 3-pointer just before the shot clock expired.

Smith, saddled with foul trouble much of the game, scored four points. "This type of game can give you confidence or it can take your heart," said Wildcat coach Tubby Smith, whose club plays No. 11 Tennessee and No. 10 Florida the next two weeks.

"Coming on the road and stepping out of the SEC at this time is a tough thing to do," Smith added. "It was a war and if we had lost the game, then it would have been real tough mentally for us."

Miami shot 39 percent and committed only nine turnovers against UK's pressure defense, but the Hurricanes struggled to keep the Wildcats off the offensive boards.

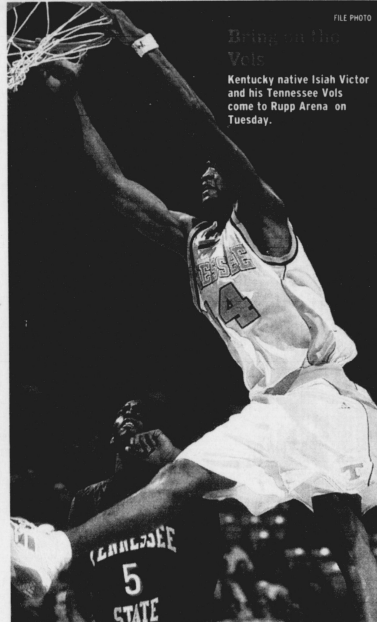
UK had as many offensive rebounds (15) as Miami had rebounds in the first half. The Wildcats out-rebounded Miami 40-31 for

the game. "They have good athletes and it became a jumping contest and they won too many of those," Hamilton said.

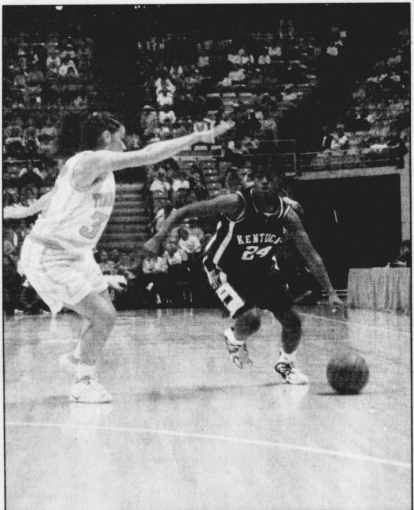
Desmond Allison scored 15 points on 6-of-10 shooting to help lead the Cats past Miami. He also had five rebounds.

## UT bombs away Cats

When it rains it pours: Hot-shooting Tennessee routs UK with three pointers, out-rebounds Cats

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — It was raining in Thompson-Boling Arena, as the Tennessee Lady Vols buried UK 77-48 behind an onslaught of three-point bombs.

UK's 2-3 zone allowed UT freshman guard Kara Lawson some good looks at the basket, and she responded by canning five long-range bombs in the first half alone, which sparked her to a game-high 22 points.

"Offensive players with that

mentality figure out a way to get some points," UT coach Pat Summitt said. "I think Kara Lawson is one of those kinds of players."

But Lawson's hot shooting was just one of many downfalls for the Cats. UK was done in by poor shooting, as the Cats struggled to reach 33 percent for the game. They also struggled on the glass, getting outrebounded 54-32 for the game.

"I thought we both battled inside," said UK coach Bernadette Mattox. "They've got such a strong lineup. When you've got a lineup

that goes 6-foot-3, 6-5 and 6-3, and we've got to put somebody 5-7 on that last person, they're going to get their share of boards.

Leading the way was Tamika Catchings, UT's junior forward who finished with 15 points to match her 15 rebounds, including five offensive boards.

"Offensively, there's no doubt she's our best rebounder," Summitt said. "We don't have a better example of how to rebound the basketball than Tamika."

"The game left UK wishing they had put forth a better effort. I did not feel that our basketball team came out and played the best game they're capable of playing," Mattox said.

"We just didn't box out well or get to loose balls," said UK forward LaTonya McDole, who finished with 12 points to lead UK. She was the only Cat to crack double figures.

UK played UT close to the vest in the early stages of the game, but Lawson's back-to-back threes with 13 minutes remaining in the first half broke open the game. UK had chances to slice into the first-half lead, but McDole missed the front end of two consecutive bonus free throws, while UT got baskets from Catchings and center Michelle Snow, pushing the lead to 15.

The Lady Vols never really looked back from that point, even as they struggled from the field (10 of 31) in the second half.

UK was also hurt by the absence of Shantia Owens, who spent most of the game in foul trouble before finally fouling out with 11:42 remaining and without scoring a point.

UK played Saturday against No. 8 North Carolina State, but showed no signs of fatigue, as they shot 57 percent in the first half to take a 47-27 halftime lead.

"For such a short rest, I thought we had a lot of intensity," Summitt said.

"We really came out and turned things up defensively." Neither team turned the ball over that much, but UT's eight of 15 three-point shooting combine with UK's poor shooting was too much to overcome.

"We didn't make baskets," Mattox said. "They took 64 shots, we took 61. We just didn't make many of ours."

## Agassi claims sixth Grand Slam title

MELBOURNE, Australia — Better and better as time goes on, Andre Agassi claimed his second Australian Open and sixth Grand Slam title Sunday in an artistic and bruising victory over Yevgeny Kafelnikov.

Five of Agassi's most exquisite, feathery drop shots and dozens of powerful groundstrokes sapped the strength and spirit from the defending champion in a 3-6, 6-3, 6-2, 6-4 triumph.

At 29, Agassi left no doubt that he rules men's tennis. In less than a year, he has won the French, U.S. and Australian Opens and finished runner-up at Wimbledon.

This time he put the exclamation point on his win with three aces at up to 123 mph in the last game.

Agassi, the first player to reach four straight major finals since Rod Laver won the Grand Slam in 1968, pushed his career earnings to nearly \$20 million with the \$485,000 winner's check.

"I think he's hitting his stride right now," Agassi's coach, Brad Gilbert, said. "Ultimately he wants to keep improving. There are a lot more titles for him to win. He has three or four more good years left in him."

Agassi thanked Gilbert and his trainer, Gil Reyes, for telling him over and over that his best would be good enough all the time as long as he stayed in peak shape. And though Agassi didn't mention girlfriend Steffi Graf, who sat between them in the stands, he saluted her as they exchanged smiles.

This final proved, as everyone thought, anticlimactic to Agassi's brilliant and dramatic victory over Pete Sampras in the semifinals. There were too many errors, too many mis-hits by both players this time, and little tension.

Kafelnikov raced to a 4-0 lead in the opening set as Agassi struggled to find his range and inflict any damage on serve. But when Agassi broke back twice to make it 4-3, a sense of his ultimate triumph engulfed the match, even though he wound up losing the set. Agassi had gotten a bead on Kafelnikov's serve, and it was just a matter of time before he started holding his own.

That time came quickly as Agassi yielded only four points through his next four service games, then broke for a 5-4 lead with the help of two double-faults by Kafelnikov.

Agassi then came up with two stunning drop shots from the baseline that caught a flatfooted Kafelnikov by surprise and closed out the second set with a 116 mph serve that Kafelnikov netted.

Though the match was even on the scoreboard, there was little doubt in Agassi's mind or in the thoughts of spectators that he was on his way to victory.

He breezed to a 4-0 lead, again slipping in the occasional drop among powerful groundstrokes, and won the set with ease.

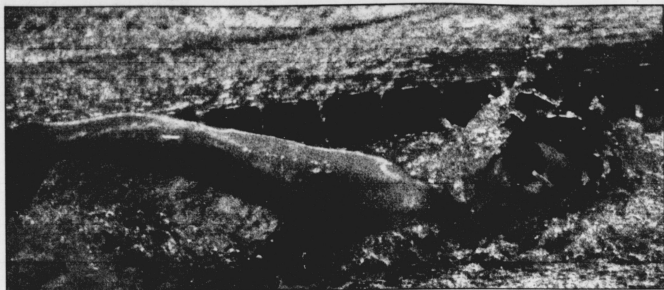
"My legs started feeling heavy at the end of the third set," Kafelnikov said.

The only nervous moment from then on came as Kafelnikov was about to serve the fourth set when a man wearing a red mask and holding a video camera leaped to the court and took aim at the players. But guards rushed to grab him and pulled him away.

Agassi's victory was his fourth straight over Kafelnikov.

# UK captures duel victories

The UK men's and women's swimming and diving teams each captured dual meet victories Saturday over the University of Cincinnati on Senior Day.

Like the week before against LSU, the UK men's squad (4-2) captured the final event of the meet, the 800-yard freestyle relay, to win the meet by a score of 162-151. The win over the Bearcats clinched a winning season for the UK men's team, who have won their last three consecutive meets.

Junior Shaun Zitani led the men's team with two victories on the day, including a blistering time of 20:14 to win the 50 freestyle. Zitani's time, his best of the sea-

son, met the NCAA provisional time standard and the 2000 U.S. Olympic Trial cut. He also won the 100 freestyle and earned a second place finish in the 100 butterfly.

Macon White won the 200 freestyle and placed second in the 100 and 500 freestyles, while anchoring UK's winning 800 freestyle relay.

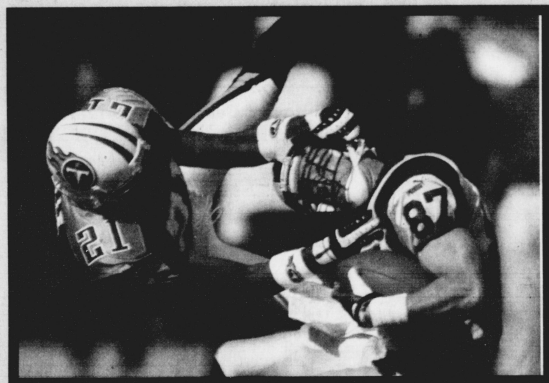
Freshman diver Clayton Moss won the 1-meter and 3-meter diving events, while sophomore Aaron Kirkpatrick placed second on both events.

The UK women's team wrapped up an undefeated season, going 7-0, with a convincing 173-143 win over Cincinnati. This is the first time in the history of UK swimming and diving that the women's team has finished the season undefeated.

Sophomore Carolyn Rader led the Cats with victories in the 500 freestyle and the 100 and 200 butterflies. The Grafton, Va., native also claimed a second-place finish in the 400 individual medley. Rader's time of 2:01.56 in the 200 butterfly met the NCAA provisional time standard.

Junior standout Melissa Olson won the 200 and 400 individual medleys and placed second in the 100 backstroke. Olson's time of 4:18.70 in the 400 individual medley missed the NCAA automatic qualifying time by less than two seconds.

Sprint freestyler Annabel Kosten captured the 50 and 200 freestyles, while diver Michelle Glowatch notched a pair of second place finishes on the 1-meter and 3-meter diving events.

# Hometown honors Farmer

**Living legend: Former Clay County and Wildcat star takes a look back at career**

One of UK's "unforgettable" was honored in his hometown on Friday.

Richie Farmer, whose no. 32 jersey has hung in the Rupp Arena rafters since 1992, was accorded the same at Clay County High School. His Tiger jersey was hoisted to the top of the gymnasium along with the jerseys of girls' star Kim Jones and Farmer's legendary high school coach, Bobby Keith.

There are first three jerseys to be immortalized at Clay County, whose basketball tradition is as storied as any in Kentucky's basketball-crazed state. Farmer is grateful to have been able to play for and be honored by one of the state's great basketball high schools as well as doing the same at UK, one of the nation's best collegiate basketball schools.

"It was a great honor, a super nice ceremony. Any time you get your jersey retired, it's a great feeling," said Farmer. "In Clay County, the basketball is like it is with UK — all the kids grow up wanting to be a Tiger as well as a Wildcat. I was fortunate enough to live both. I have to thank and give all credit to God for the blessings in my life. Without him, nothing is possible."

Today, Farmer is married with two young boys and works in the insurance business in Manchester. He is very satisfied with life as a family man.

"I enjoy it and I wouldn't trade it for anything," said Farmer.

And yes, the boys, at 1 and 3, do show an interest in basketball.

C.M. Newton, who was named UK's athletic director after Richie's freshman season, has announced his retirement

effective at the end of his contract this summer.

Few individuals had as close a view of Newton's work as the architect of UK's basketball renaissance as Farmer, who played before the probation, during the two-year sentence, and helped the Cats to their first NCAA Tournament appearance after the sanctions expired.

He said that Newton's extensive resume in all aspects of college basketball made him the tremendous asset to UK sports he has been.

"I think C. M. brought a lot of class to the program, as all can see," said Farmer. "He has played and coached the game. He's on every committee there is. His experience on the playing floor has contributed to his success on the administrative side."

Farmer also expressed admiration for Newton's ability to hire top-notch coaches.

"In my opinion, he has the two best basketball coaches in the country — Tubby Smith and Bernadette Mattox," said Farmer. "He brought UK back

to where it should be in nationally — number 1."

Another key figure in Farmer's UK career, Rick Pitino, has seen little but struggle since leaving for Boston in 1997. Farmer still feels a connection to his former coach, and believes that Pitino will eventually get the last laugh.

"Once someone is your coach, he's always your coach," said Farmer. "We want to see him do his best. I know he hates to lose — he's a true competitor."

"He's going to do his best to get them back on track. Whatever he does, I know he will ultimately be successful because that's his nature."

Farmer was a hero to many current UK students who idolized the Cats as youngsters. To him, the team's older fans and those who followed his college career through the eyes of youth were a large part of what made his time in blue the great experience that it was.

"My time at UK was invaluable to me. The fans, and those at UK now are a lot of the ones that made it so special."

## Player charges back for win

**Skin it: Gary Player wins Senior Skins Game after being blanked for 18 holes**

MAUNA LANI, Hawaii — Gary Player's adoption of a one-word Japanese proverb proved valuable in the Senior Skins Game.

After being blanked through the first 18 holes, Player made the biggest comeback in the history of the tournament with an 18-foot birdie putt on the first playoff hole to win four skins and \$220,000.

That was \$10,000 more than Senior PGA Tour rookie Tom Watson earned. Jack Nicklaus was third with \$90,000 on four skins. Arnold Palmer won \$80,000 with three skins.

"In Japan they have a special name for patience: nintai," Player said. "It means special patience."

"I had great patience today. I came into this tournament thinking just have patience, even if it comes to the last hole. That patience paid off today."

Until the 16th hole, Player was not a factor in the four-man field.

Nicklaus eagled the first hole and birdied the seventh

for four skins. Watson birdied the second and third holes for two more and Palmer birdied the fourth and ninth for four.

Watson appeared to be in control with a 6-foot birdie at the 413-yard 14th, raising his total to \$210,000.

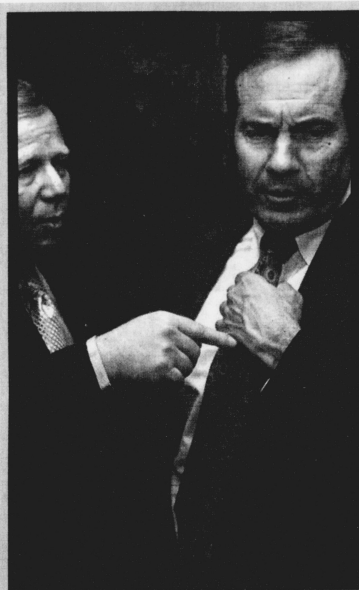
But Player started to gain momentum at the 368-yard 16th hole at the Mauna Lani South Course with a birdie. He birdied the next two holes, but couldn't muster any skins as Watson matched him shot-for-shot.

"I wasn't having a hard time," Player said. "I never missed a fairway. I was down the middle all day, but they were just getting eagles and birdies. I ended up with four birdies in a row, however."

The fourth one, at the par 3, 199-yard 15th, was the biggest.

The comeback was the biggest since 1991 when Nicklaus holed out on the third extra hole to go from \$125,000 to \$310,000 and wrest the championship from Lee Trevino.

The title was Player's first since winning the inaugural Skins Game in 1983 and the skin on the first extra hole was his first since the 12th hole at the 1989 tournament.

# 'Beholder' an eye sore

Bad directing and lackluster performances leave the audience wanting more.

The myth goes something like this: Guardian angels watch over you and protect you in dangerous circumstances and they always appear as someone you never expect.

Ewan McGregor stars as The Eye, a British intelligence agent who has lost his wife and child because of his devotion to his work. He becomes so isolated with his high-tech voyeurism that he becomes delusional and talks to his daughter who is not there.

McGregor's latest mission, tracking femme fatale Ashley Judd, leads him to a trail of cold-blooded murder throughout various cities. Judd, who plays Joanna Eris, spends the majority of the movie murdering people and changing disguises.

The Eye first finds Eris at a museum where he tracks her to a lakefront home. At this site The Eye sees one of Eris's victims. He then becomes infatuated with Eris in a way the movie depicts as love. However, it is hard to believe he could somehow fall in love with Eris right after he witnesses the murder she committed.

The chase of the movie begins when The Eye chases Eris from city to city. The camera has a clever way of changing from city to city though the technique gets old after a while.

The Eye watches as Eris, clearly a woman with a messed-up past that has caused her to go astray, continues to murder, love and then, finally, lose.

Judd looks gorgeous and also plays a convincing femme fatale. Despite the convincing aspects of Judd's performance, the movie lacks believability. Another criticism of Judd's performance is that her crying is laughable at times.

McGregor does a good job portraying a computer nerd but also suffers from the movie. The script does not allow him to exercise his talents.

Some of the storylines have surprises that have the prospect to be great, but they

fall flat when they are not explored well enough. One instance is when Eris and The Eye meet at a diner and discuss the losses they have tried to overcome. This is the best scene of the movie; yet it is cut short for a mandatory chase scene.

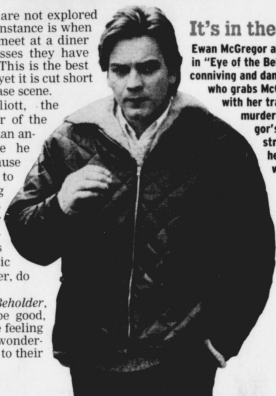

# 'Angela's Ashes,' moving at times

Time is a funny thing. When the best moments of a life occur, time soars rapidly. Moments that you wish would speed by seem to trickle through the hourglass of existence.

Frank McCourt's childhood must have seemed like an eternity. Based on the best-selling autobiographical book of the same name, *Angela's Ashes* takes a look at Frank McCourt's youth in the poverty-stricken streets of Limerick, Ireland.

The film opens in 1935, with the Statue of Liberty fading into the horizon as the McCourts unwillingly return to Ireland from the land of opportunity, America.

Spanning over a decade, *Angela's Ashes* examines the horrors of poverty and the sacrifices that must be made to survive.

The film doesn't just show hardship for the sake of pulling the audience's strings, it examines why these conditions exist.

One reason for the family's never-ending poverty is that they continually have children. Why? Because they are Irish Catholic and can't use contraceptives. Frank's father, an unemployed alcoholic,

drinks because of his feelings of shame, disgust and inadequacy because he can't properly provide for his family. He can't get a job because he's a Protestant and from northern Belfast, which is cause for discrimination and classism in the town of Limerick.

Young Frank watches brothers and sisters die and his father continually lose jobs. Eventually his mother, Angela, is reduced to sleeping with her own cousin in order to give her family a place to live after Frank's father runs off for good.

But as the late Mario Puzo once wrote, "Sometimes out of the greatest misfortunes come unforeseen rewards." When he's stricken with typhoid fever and hospitalized on the brink of death, Frank discovers Shakespeare and a love for literature and writing that will eventually be his ticket out of Ireland.

Director Alan Parker (*Midnight Express* and *Mississippi Burning*), is no stranger to the themes of suffering and captures the morose, unspeakable hardships of the McCourts with dark, grainy realism. At times unbearably sad but always powerfully moving, *Angela's Ashes* is a heartwrenching look at the human condition, the sacrifices of a mother and, most of all, the power of perseverance.

### Polish-born FSU kicker faces deportation from bribery charges

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Sebastian Janikowski, who left Florida State after winning a national championship to seek a career in the NFL, could face deportation if he is convicted of trying to bribe a police officer last weekend.

Janikowski's lawyer entered an innocent plea Monday for the Polish-born kicker, who came to Florida at 15 to live with his father.

Janikowski, 21, was taken into custody early Sunday after allegedly offering an officer \$300 to release his roommate, who had been arrested.

Immigration and Naturalization Service spokeswoman Lynn Durko said a resident alien who committed a felony would be looked at closely by the INS.

Whether or not an alien convicted of a felony is deported is a case-by-case basis.



"Talking hypotheticals, if he's convicted and it's a felony, he would be placed into removal proceedings and it would be up to the immigration judge as to whether someone is removable," Durko said.

Bribery is a third-degree felony, but it is up to the state attorney's office to officially charge Janikowski, and he can be charged with greater or lesser offenses.

The two-time All American has kicked 50 field goals the past two seasons.

Janikowski, who plans to work out for NFL scouts next month, has been projected as high as a late first-round draft pick, usually high for a kicker.

### "The Pill" sells as acne fighter

NEW YORK (AP) — Demand for one brand of "the pill" is soaring, with a little help from sales to women who don't want it as a contraceptive.

Sales of Johnson & Johnson's Ortho Tri-Cyclen contraceptive pill have tripled in the last three years, making it by far the No. 1 brand, partly because it is the only oral contraceptive that also may be sold as an acne fighter.

"It's like getting two drugs in one," said Darla Brown, 28, of Houston, who has used the pill for two years. "And it has worked wonders on my skin."

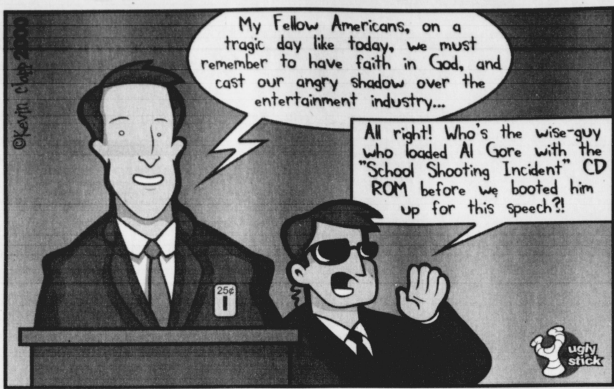

While it is currently not possible to predict how many cases of Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease will result from exposure to BSE in the future, it is sobering to contemplate the suffering of these individuals and their families and to realize that many experts predicted that transmission of disease from livestock to humans would never occur.

Here in the U.S., we need to be mindful of the enormous economic

losses caused by BSE in Europe and realize that trans-species transmission of these infectious agents, and the attendant risk to humans, is a reality rather than a remote possibility.

## Network TV more interested in money

Sometime last year I read that none of the 26 fall shows had a minority playing a leading role. Several journalists, politicians, and military advocacy groups have responded by accusing the networks of being insensitive, narrow-minded, uncreative, and even racist.

The lack of minorities in these shows is probably not the result of a racist agenda — but the absence of minorities in the lineup is surprising. It is surprising that almost all the characters are white because many of the networks' new shows are set in cities where, in real life, a large proportion of the population is considered a minority. The NAACP threatened to boycott the shows and advertisers. I hope the NAACP's attempt to convince Americans not to watch TV is successful. I think the idea of boycotting TV shows is a great idea. We would all benefit if we kept our TVs off. The networks' failure to include minorities in the fall lineup is just one example, among many, that proves that the networks today are no longer concerned with following traditional standards of acceptable behavior.

Networks no longer enlighten, inspire, inform or educate people. Instead the networks' new priority is to drive ratings and increase profit. As a result the networks are producing shows that are degrading to our culture and our society. Perhaps the most damaging and horrible affect of the networks' new priority has been the replacement of the information media with the entertainment media. Last year the Hoover Institution sponsored a conference called "Media Circus: The State of the Media". At this conference Robert Zelnick, the Media Fellow at the Hoover Institution, and James Risser, the director of the Graduate Program in Journalism at Stanford University, discussed the state of the network news programs. Both men came to the conclusion that today's entertainment media is causing journalism to decay and is a threat to our country. Both Zelnick and Risser believed that network news organizations no longer have a sense of public responsibility. Both men agreed

that today the news is more entertainment than information and as a result reporters and anchormen are no longer informers but are now entertainers. Zelnick believes "the primetime infotainment has influenced to some extent the coverage of your more solid news programs, your evening news, [and] some of your morning news programs." Because the networks are more interested in entertaining than informing they often sensationalize the news and even completely fabricate stories to capture your attention.

Attempting to promote a narrow agenda by shocking consumers Dateline NBC secretly rigged a pickup truck with explosives to make it explode on cue during a test crash. In June, 1998 CNN and Time magazine reported that the CIA and the American military used nerve gas on American defectors in Laos during the Vietnam War. The story was so shocking that the Pentagon and the national press investigated the issue. What both the Pentagon and the press discover was that CNN's report was based upon completely unreliable sources and unsubstantial evidence. CNN was forced to retract the story.

Why are the networks producing such horrible shows? Risser and Zelnick believe that the news market today is so big that the news no longer controls the market. Instead, the market controls the news. They point out that 25 years ago the news was published only twice each day. As a result the networks not only felt less pressure to broadcast breaking news when there was none but they also had time to check their sources and gain perspective. Today news is broadcast 24 hours a day, seven days a week. In an effort to compete the networks feel pressure to broadcast new and exciting news even when there is none. And more often than not the networks' idea of new and exciting news is stories that shock and entertain you.

## Fair play welcome

### Pro football needs to distribute more responsibility to minorities

Everyone watched the Super Bowl yesterday, but may not have noticed a rare species on the field, an African-American quarterback — Steve McNair of the Tennessee Titans. In fact, this was only the second such sighting in the history of the Super Bowl. A closer look at the sport's history shows a steady stream of racism clouding the successes of one of America's favorite sports.

No sports fan can miss the fact that black athletes have come to dominate professional sports by sheer numbers. While African-Americans make up around 13 percent of the general population, that increases to well over 65 percent on the football field. What those numbers don't tell us, however, is the distribution of power in the sport. Of the 31 teams in the NFL, only one team has a black partial-owner and he only had a small share of the team. However, the current white owners have been the owners for decades — so while discouraging, at least it's understandable.

The real indicator of racist attitudes in sports is on the field. The marquee player on a football team — the brains on the field — is undoubtedly the quarterback. The position requires a cool head, an accurate arm and, judging by field demographics, white skin.

The problem is that black quarterbacks have to fight two stereotypes as their careers develop. First, the perception is that black quarterbacks can't throw well, that running is their strong suit. That perception translates into them being moved to other (less prominent) positions where that skill can be "better utilized." More detrimentally, the unspoken perception is that black athletes are not intelligent enough to play quarterback (or coach). It's fine for a black player to be running back or wide receiver, because those position rely primarily on athletic ability, not mental ability as well. The same problems show up on the sidelines, where the lack of black coaches is shocking.

How does this hit home? Never in the college football history of the SEC has there been an African-American head coach.

Things are getting better. With the success of McNair this year, the success of Minnesota Vikings' quarterback Randall Cunningham last season and two of the top three picks in last year's draft were black quarterbacks. We hope that the historically white trend of quarterbacks continues to diversify. After all, a quarterback's statistics and history do not reflect his race.

# NASA attempts to map Earth in three dimensions

The primary objective of the Shuttle Radar Topography Mission is to acquire a high-resolution topographic map of the Earth's land mass (between 60°N and 60°S) in order to test new technologies for deployment of large rigid structures and measurement of their distortions to extremely high precision.

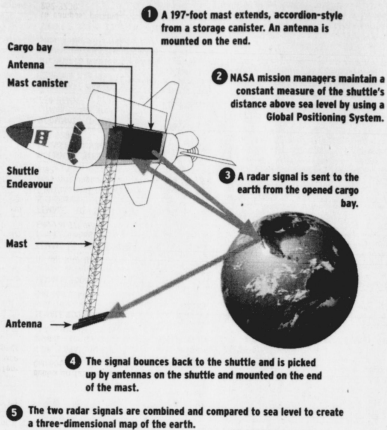
The Shuttle Radar Topography Mission represents a breakthrough in the science of remote sensing and will produce topographic maps of Earth 30 times as precise as the best global maps in use today. The information will be used to attempt to produce one of the most comprehensive and accurate maps of Earth ever assembled.

In addition, this mission offers a number of applications for data products and science, including: geology, geophysics, earthquake research, volcano monitoring, hydrologic modeling, ecology, registration and terrain correction of remotely-acquired image data; atmospheric modeling; flood inundation modeling; urban planning; natural hazard consequence assessments; fire spread models; and transportation/infrastructure planning.

There are lots of ways that people make use of topographic data. Scientists use information about topography to help in their studies of plants and animals. Elevation information provides clues about soil types, and can tell you how the surface of Earth changes due to the actions of glaciers, rivers, and the processes of mountain

## Mapping the earth

The space shuttle Endeavour will embark on its mission to take a three-dimensional snapshot of the earth's surface. Scientists are using radar technology to create the most thorough topographic map ever compiled. Here's a look at how it works.



1 A 197-foot mast extends, accordion-style from a storage canister. An antenna is mounted on the end.

2 NASA mission managers maintain a constant measure of the shuttle's distance above sea level by using a Global Positioning System.

3 A radar signal is sent to the earth from the opened cargo bay.

4 The signal bounces back to the shuttle and is picked up by antennas on the shuttle and mounted on the end of the mast.

5 The two radar signals are combined and compared to sea level to create a three-dimensional map of the earth.

Aircraft pilots require accurate topographic information for flight planning and navigation, and the military requires precise topographic information for training and real time operations. Knowing the exact height and location of mountain peaks enables the cellular phone industry to place towers in optimal locations for signal reception.
