KENTUCKY vs. NORTH CAROLINA

"Millionaires Row" has been replaced by a bunch of hustling guys named "Joe" in the Kentucky lineup that lifts the lid on a promising 1966 season tonight against the North Carolina Tar Heels—and therein lies the story not only of this opening encounter but of Coach Charlie Bradshaw's hopes for the entire campaign.

The stars like All-Americans Rick Norton, Rodger Bird and Sam Ball collected their six-figure bonus contracts from the pros following a successful but frustrating 1965 season. In their place, Kentucky this season will be relying on a generally unheralded and inexperienced group that hopefully will catch fire as a team to improve on last year's 6-4 record.

The chances for this prospect to come about is due for a stiff test from the star-studded Carolina Tar Heels who will be engaging a UK grid outfit for only the third time in history and for the first time in 32 years.

Pacing the dangerous Tar Heels in a bid to spoil Coach Bradshaw's unblemished record (three wins and a scoreless tie) in opening games will be one of the nation's super stars in the person of do-it-all quarterback Danny Talbott. The Carolina ace, hailed as the greatest since Choo Choo Justice, won Atlantic Coast Conference "Player of the Year" honor last season as a junior on a losing (4-6) team. He won the conference total offense title with 1,477 yards (1,080 passing and 397 rushing) and also topped the league in scoring with 70 points.

UNC Coach Jim Hickey isn't forced to rely on Talbott's exploits alone, however. All told, the '66 Tar Heel squad shows 28 yettermen including ground attack leader Tom Lampman (444 yards), ends Bob Hume and Bo Wood, halfback Dave Riggs and tackle Hank Sadler.

Offensively, the visitors may boast a pre-season advantage over the Wildcats who lost heavily in this department of play. But Kentucky's youngsters came along fast in spring and pre-season drills with a varied attack that managed to roll up impressive scrimmage scores equal to those registered by the offensively-proficient '65 bunch.


Direction of the balanced attack seems likely to be shared by a pair of inexperienced but capable quarterbacks, Terry Beadles and Roger Walz.

Countering the threat of offensive superiority posed by Talbott will be the running and pass receiving of Kentucky tailback Larry Seiple, the pass catching of wingback Bob Windsor and end Dan Spanish and the bulldozing of new fullback Donnie Britton.


Defensively, the prideful Wildcats hope to be able to count on the edge that will assure victory that just might ignite a smouldering fire of team spirit. Like Carolina, which finished last in the ACC in total defense last year, the Wildcats of 1965 had most of their trouble stem from inability to hold opponents in check. However, there is an indication that Bradshaw's "Sixty-Sixers" may have made greater progress in correcting this fault than have the Tar Heels.

As the two clubs square off tonight, each holds one victory in the series that began way back in 1910. In that first meeting, significantly played in Lexington, Kentucky claimed an 11-0 decision. Twenty-four years later, the Wildcats repaid the debt by absorbing a 6-0 licking during a visit to Chapel Hill. In that game, Coach Chet Wynne's Kentuckians reportedly did just about everything to Carolina except score.

INSTANT REPLAY—Hopeful that this scene will be repeated numerous times during the coming season, Kentucky's Larry Seiple turns on the steam to elude Ole Miss defenders in one of the high points of the 1965 game in which he starred. The Wildcats tangle with the Mississippi Rebels next week in Jackson to open their Southeastern competition.







Alumnus Governor Boosts Wildcat Gridders . . .

Edward T. Breathitt, at 41, is the nation's second youngest Governor. A Hopkinsville attorney, he continues a family record of distinguished public service that dates back to pre-Civil War days when an ancestor, John Breathitt, served as the state's chief executive.

Governor Breathitt, who in his capacity as Governor, also serves as chairman of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees, began his career as a lawyer and public servant immediately upon graduation from the University of Kentucky College of Law in 1950. At the age of 27, he was elected to the State House of Representatives. Later he was State Personnel Commissioner and a member of the State Public Service Commission before being elected to Kentucky's highest office in 1963.

While a student at the University of Kentucky, where he also obtained a degree in Commerce, he proved his capacity for leadership. While there, he was president of Lamp and Cross, senior men's honorary, and ODK, men's leadership and scholarship honorary fraternity.

His distinguished background also includes three years in the Army Air Force during World War II and the state presidency of the Young Democratic Clubs of Kentucky.

A native of Hopkinsville, he is married to the former Frances Holleman of Mayfield. They have four children—Mary Fran, who is 16; Linda, 15; Susan, 9; and Edward III, who is 7.

Governor Breathitt continues to be one of the most enthusiastic boosters of his Alma Mater and its football team.






University's President Knows Value of An Athletic Program . . .

When Dr. John W. Oswald became the sixth president of the University of Kentucky on Sept. 1, 1963, he brought to the position most unique qualifications that have since aided immeasurably in his administration of one of the nation's foremost and fastest-growing educational institutions.

John Oswald's background reflects the highest standard of excellence in educational preparation and also includes experience in athletics at both the player and coach levels.

The 49-year-old educator, who was born in St. Paul, Minnesota, received his education in the public schools of La Grange, III., and at DePauw University where he was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate in 1938. He also did graduate work on the Davis and Berkeley campuses of the University of California, receiving the Ph.D. Degree in plant pathology in 1942.

Following a World War II stint in the Navy as a PT boat captain and division commander, he returned to UC as a professor in his special field and later rose through the administrative ranks to the position of Vice-President for Administration.

Dr. Oswald's athletic experience, that now stands him in good stead as president of a university boasting an ambitious athletic program, came as a player in his collegiate days at De Pauw as he played guard on the football team for three years and later at California's Davis campus—where he tried his hand at coaching (by avocation) the grid team for a brief period.

In 1962, he was named by Sports Illustrated on its Silver Anniversary All-America team, composed of former football players who achieved special prominence in their chosen professions.

Dr. Oswald is a staunch supporter of Kentucky's athletic teams and advocates a fairminded approach that lends proper emphasis to the athletic program. UK athletics flourish within the proper perspective as an equal part of the total university.

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring inter-collegiate competition in ten different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

A board of directors, headed by University President John W. Oswald in the capacity of chairman, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program. Ex-officio members, in addition to the president, include Vice Presidents Robert Johnson and Glen Creech, Dr. W. L. Matthews in the capacity of secretary to the board, and a student representative—all appointed by the president. Twelve other men, drawn from the University faculty and the general public, also serve on the board as appointees of the president.

Supervising the steady growth and balanced

development of one of the nation's top athletic programs is Bernie A. Shively, a former Illinois grid All-American and a veteran of over 25 years in the post of Director of Athletics.





Bernie Shively — A Veteran Administrator . . .

Behind every successful athletic program in the country today is a capable administrator who diligently attends the many and varied responsibilities connected with a big business operation.

University of Kentucky is fortunate to have the services of one of the nation's most widely-respected Directors of Athletics in the person of Bernie A. Shively. A veteran of 28 years on the job, "Shive" (as he is familiarly known to thousands of sports fans) is a tall, silver-haired, former football All-American who has gained widespread respect and recognition for his fair-minded guidance of a harmonious program that today features September to June activity in 10 different sports and involves the use of facilities valued at several million dollars.

In addition to a fair-minded policy direction that has resulted in "big time" stature for the school's athletic teams, Shively during his 28-year tenure has directly supervised major expansions in the physical plant designed to keep pace with the growing patronage by a sportsminded public. Among these have been the doubling of the seating capacity of Stoll Field, construction of a four-million-dollar coliseum and preparation of a spacious sports center to

provide top facilities for spring sports teams and football practice.

Shively's first claim to fame came during undergraduate days at University of Illinois as he achieved All-America recognition as a guard on the 1926 grid team made famous by teammate Red Grange. The future UK Athletic Director also won the Big 10 heavyweight wrestling title and lettered in track.

Following graduation in 1927, he accepted a position at UK as a line coach in football to start a long-time association. In the days since, he has served as head football coach for one year (1945), track and baseball coach and headed the physical education department.

Shively also has found time to be active in civic and alumni affairs and has attained national prominence through dedicated service in national athletic organizations. He currently holds membership in the powerful NCAA Executive Committee. Only recently, he completed a second term as chairman of the University Division NCAA Basketball Tournament Committee and formerly served with the NCAA Summer Baseball group.





Wildcat Coaching Staff

RAY CALLAHAN (Kentucky '56)—No stranger in state grid circles, Callahan is a former Kentucky back and guard from Lebanon who enjoyed a highly-successful coaching career in prep ranks following graduation . . Prior to joining Bradshaw staff in 1963, he assisted at Versailles and Manual High and guided Danville to state AA title.

WALLY ENGLISH (Louisville '58)—A former quarterback for the U. of L. Cardinals, English works with the offensive backfield. He has a background of playing and coaching experience in Kentucky and Texas. First joined Bradshaw staff in 1965 as graduate assistant.

LEON FULLER (Alabama '61)—This new addition to the UK staff, who tutors the defensive backfield, played his final two seasons at Alabama when Bradshaw was an assistant. He won All-SEC honor as a defensive back and was named on the Academic All-America.

PHIL OWEN (Georgetown '53)—Like five other current Wildcat assistants, Owen entered collegiate coaching ranks by making Kentucky his first stop . . . Joined Bradshaw staff in 1964 after successful, nine-year tenure at Mt. Sterling High . . . He directs talented frosh team this season.

CHARLEY PELL (Alabama '63)—Entering his second season on the Kentucky staff, Pell enjoys the confidence of his new boss stemming from a three-year player and coach relationship while both were at Alabama . . . Works with the defensive interior line.


JIM POYNTER (**Kentucky '61**)—One of four former Wildcats on the staff, Poynter had a great high school coaching career before returning to UK early this year. In five seasons at three schools, his teams posted composite record of 40-10-1.

GEORGE SENGEL (**Kentucky '48**)—Louisvillian Sengel's career as a Wildcat wingman overlapped that of Coach Bradshaw by a couple of years and his former teammate asked Sengel to stay on the staff he had joined in 1961 . . . The 44-year-old Air Force vet had nine years of coaching schoolboy ranks in Florida and Kentucky prior to becoming UK end coach.

DOUG SHIVELY (Kentucky '59)—A youthful veteran of seven years in the coaching profession, Shively is a former Wildcat wingman and son of UK's Athletic Director. After one season at a Texas high school, Doug moved to Virginia Tech—his point of departure in coming to UK.

CLARENCE UNDERWOOD (Marshall '38)—Back "home" after 10-year absence, this tough-but-popular veterans has responsibility of shoring up UK defense. Spent 8 years here prior to successful 10-year stint at Jefferson High in Port Arthur, Texas. Compiled 77-26-6 record and was state "Coach of the Year."

RALPH BERLIN (Iowa State '62)—This 30-year-old Marine Corps veteran serves as head football trainer for the Wildcats . . . He's a veteran of six years in training field.





Wildcat Coach Sets Winning Tradition . . .

After four hectic years, Charlie Bradshaw stands high as a coach and gentleman fully vindicated in his promise to rebuild the shattered foundations of Kentucky football into a solid front and re-establish a winning tradition.


Exemplifying the faith placed in his hard work philosophy and procedures is the unique "lifetime" contract tendered the youthful and determined ex-Wildcat upon the successful (6-4) completion of an adversity-plagued 1965 season. The new pact, believed unique to college-coach relationships, assures Bradshaw of tenure similar to that given academic personnel. At such time as he ceases to perform his current coaching duties, he will have the opportunity to take another position on the University staff.

Bradshaw, a 41-year-old former UK end and assistant coach, returned to his alma mater in 1962 to take on the difficult task of repairing a sputtering Kentucky football machine that had not run well since the early fifties Bowl Era.

The magnitude of the repair job never will be fully understood by anyone less closely connected with it than the self-sacrificing Bradshaw. Only

he could take a positive approach to the almost impossible problems—and, more importantly, stick with it in the face of increasing odds. How he tackled the assignment of producing a winner out of the meager raw material reflects the type of person Charlie Bradshaw is—the personification of qualities of inner fortitude, outwardly serious demeanor, ability, confidence, integrity and quiet determination. He is an inspirational leader possessing the valuable trait of exuding enthusiasm and confidence to a degree that inspires those around him—players and assistants —to get the job done in a way that pays off with success. He demands great effort of himself and others in the belief that success cannot be purchased easily.

Bradshaw's influence not only is paying off with success on the gridiron—his 1965 team posted the school's best record since 1956—but also is being felt around the state. Coaches, alumni, general public and prospective Wildcats are rallying to the side of Bradshow's long-range program in a fashion never before seen in the State of Kentucky.

your ensemble. Shoes of textured leathers, alligator and even wool are in the footnotes.

Shoes should be comfortable and designers have obliged with low sturdy heels and rounded toes. You're climbing, walking and on and off your feet for the duration so treat them kindly. Shed your spikes in favor of a new sporting pair. Trims will include buckles, straps, lacing and tailored bows. There will be straps, toe-less and heel-less styles for variety. Keep in mind boots—not as clumsy as other seasons—for cold stadiums.

Handbags are smaller so let the men tote their own thermos of coffee—you won't have room. Like shoes there is a distinctive array of colors and materials.

Topping the accessory field are hats. They are small and fit down over the new sleek hairdos. They are decorative and do the job of keeping ears warm.

Appropriate helmets are done in crushable felt. There are also berets, beanies, hoods and caps that are styled in soft fabrics. Even fall's small brimmed roller can be packed with ease.



If an especially bright future is forecast for the team and you will be headed for a southern bowl game, knits are suggested. Chances are weather will be sunny. A sleeveless knit will be appropriate with a coordinating jacket or coat. It can be dressed up or down as the occasion demands.

Do take time out to think of your wardrobe when backing the team. You shouldn't punt—be prepared.







U-KATS Leading the Way Toward Better Kentucky Athletics

The brightest new star in the Kentucky athletic firmament is U-KATS, the University of Kentucky Athletic Team Supporters, Inc.

This group is dedicated to the purposes of boosting the University of Kentucky athletic teams and promoting and developing athletics in Kentucky's primary and secondary schools.

Already engaged in this movement are more than 2,000 U-KATS members from all corners of the Commonwealth and Ohio, West Virginia, Georgia, Michigan, Tennessee, Indiana, North Carolina, Missouri, Arkansas, Illinois, California, Florida, Virginia and the District of Columbia. U-KATS is conducting its first membership drive with a goal of 20,000 members for the present fiscal year.

These Are the Basic Facts:

UK is now recruiting out-of-state for 75 per cent of its football players; 50 per cent of its basketball players; 70 per cent of its baseball players; 40 per cent of its trackmen; 60 per cent of its swimmers; 50 per cent of its golfers; and 50 per cent of its tennis players. The other state schools in the SEC recruit 60 to 70 per cent of their athletes from their home states.

Florida produces about 75 major-college football prospects a year in its state high-school programs, Georgia about 60, Alabama 100, Mississippi 100, Louisiana 100, Tennessee 60 and Kentucky 15.

Kentucky's primary and secondary school programs rank last among Southern states in number of schools and athletes peraticipating in all sports except basketball, despite the fact that most of the states are not superior to Kentucky in resources or population.

UK is justly proud of its 22 SEC basketball championships, but the Wildcats have won only one SEC football crown and have never won a title in baseball, track, swimming, golf or tennis. UK football teams rank last in the all-time standings of the present member schools of the SEC.

The UK Athletics Association, under the guidance of Athletic Director Bernie A. Shively, is beginning a program this year which is designed to make the Wildcats contenders for the SEC crown in all sports. The four new state universities will also be engaged in upgrading their athletic programs in the coming years. All these projects are dependent upon the development of better schoolboy athletics in Kentucky.

U-KATS believes Kentucky's children have the same latent athletic abilities as the children in our sister states. It seeks to open the doors to the development of this latent ability. Such a program requires the support and involvement of every Kentuckian who is concerned with the athletic progress and the well-being of the young people of the Commonwealth.

Each member of U-KATS pays a \$10 annual membership fee, of which \$5 goes to the athletic program of the high school of the member's choice. The other \$5 goes into a central fund to support the administrative costs of the organization and to be invested in Kentucky school programs as the U-KATS board of directors sees fit. No U-KATS funds will be in any way invested in the University of Kentucky or its athletic programs.





A New Era—A New Program— At The University of Kentucky

A few days ago new thousands of young Kentuckians enrolled in the College of Arts and Sciences on the University of Kentucky campus and thereby set in motion Kentucky's widely-hailed academic plan.

For the next two years they will continue their courses of study in that college. Then, at the beginning of their junior year, they will select their major field of study or their professional school.

That's the story, in brief, of a plan and project which has excited educators. And as an editorial in The Cincinnati Enquirer says, "We cannot help believing that the course upon which the University of Kentucky is embarking is one that will attract nation-wide attention. Neither do we doubt that it will equip University of Kentucky students to tackle their careers with an especially useful insight."

The story had its beginning almost three years ago. UK President John W. Oswald, in a report to the academic faculty and the Board of Trustees, issued a challenge. He recalled the charge made by many that American universities were producing over-trained and under-educated products.

Thus was set into motion a great series of consultations and examinations. Out of them grew a decision, approved by the faculty, ratified by the trustees. The University, it was agreed, would establish new patterns and new requirements. Each student, upon graduation, would be armed with a background in several fields of the arts and sciences. Each student, therefore, would be equipped better to assume his role as a responsible citizen.

The new catalogue puts it this way:

"To help the student acquire a breadth of understanding, the University will require of each student entering in September, 1966, and thereafter, in addition to six hours of English Composition, or demonstration of proficiency, completion of a sequence of 2 courses in at least five of the following areas of general study: I Mathematics-Philosophy

II Physical Sciences

III Biological Sciences

IV Foreign Languages

V Humanities: Literature, Art, and Music

VI History

VII Social Sciences

VIII Behavorial Sciences"

Today as you watch the Kentucky football team in action, as you rub elbows with the student body, you as a supporter of the University, you as a citizen of the Commonwealth are participating in a program designed to develop a well-rounded personality, an individual capable of contributing to society.

Dr. Oswald in remarks made to members of the 1966 General Assembly, made these observations regarding the new student as he—or she—embarked on a new career:

"There, under proper counsel and guidance, they will undertake an examination of several of the broad fields of study, the several fields of academic discipline.

"They shall be exposed to the literature of the ages, the discovery of the scientists, the philosophy of the economist and the sociologist, the exacting mental exercises of the mathematician and linguist.

"And then at the close of two years they shall, by virtue of their probing and study, be better able to make that all-important choice, the choice of the field to which they want to devote their life.


"But in doing so, in making their choice, they shall not be unaware of the activity of their neighbor.

"The engineer will understand the searching of the historian. The teacher will be aware of the trials and tribulations of the businessman. The lawyer will share the fears and joys of the sociologist.

"Hopefully, all this will make for a well-rounded personality, the educated person."


