# Move to block veto strengthens plea to end apartheid policy

Well, it's final. The United States has decided to take a concrete stand on the issue of apartheid.

That decision was made last Friday when the Senate, in a 78-21 vote, joined the House to override President Reagan's veto of the tough sanctions. The House overrode the veto 313-83 Monday.

No, the sanctions don't order outright American disinvestment, and they also don't call for a complete trade embargo, but they do take several significant steps to pressure the Pretoria government to stop its system of severe racial discrimination.

The people of the United States have long cried for action on the part of the Reagan administration. As it stands now, Congress is the only one to listen to those cries.

These new sanctions hit South Africa where it counts — in the pocketbook. They will ban new investment and new bank loans. Several imports from South Africa have also been banned. This, despite threats by South African President P.W. Botha to stop buying U.S. wheat if the sanctions nassed

passed.

These threats were made one day before the vote went to the Senate. Obviously our senators and representatives meant what they said because the desperate attempts by the South African government did little to phase the final

vote.
South Africa will no longer be receiving several important exports from the United States. Petroleum products, nuclear information and certain computers bearing U.S. names will not find their way into South African ports.
The point is that the United States has decided that something had to be done. Reagan's veto was seen for what it was—nothing more than a way to put off taking a stand against the practices of a government we do business with

ness with.

Something had to be done. America had to take a stand Reagan wanted a theoretical stand. The U.S. legislative body wanted a stand that will have results. Results won.

#### Daniloff warns of danger of incrimination

WASHINGTON - Nicholas Daniloff said yesterday

WASHINGTON — Nicholas Daniloff said yesterday that he delivered a packet from a suspicious Soviet contact to the U.S. embassy in Moscow last year, but did not go to the CIA or the embassy's intelligence officers.

Daniloff, the U.S. News and World Report correspondent freed last week from Soviet spy charges, said he avoided the U.S. military attaches and intelligence officers because "I'l was always sware that when you work in Moscow there is this kind of danger of incrimination."

But Daniloff, interviewed on ABC's "This Week With David Brinkley," said it is impossible for American reporters to do a thorough job of reporting on the Soviet Union without running the risk that the Soviet KGB will plant incriminating evidence on them.

#### Orlov and wife land in New York

NEW YORK — Soviet dissident Yuri Orlov, freed from nearly a decade of internal exile in the deal that allowed an American reporter to leave Moscow, arrived yesterday in the United States and pledged to continue the human rights work that led to his banishment.

"I'm very glad I have begun a free life," Orlov said, speaking through an interpreter at a brief meeting with reporters after he and his wife, Irina, arrived at John F. Kennedy International Airport about 2:30 p.m. EDT.

"I can say whatever I want freely. Now, I can speak my mind about how the Soviet Union should develop."

Orlov, 62, has been in poor health but said he felt well.

#### Iceland impatient with slow response

REYKJAVIK, Iceland - Icelandic officials on Sunday

REYKJAVIK, Iceland — Icelandic officials on Sunday made known their growing impatience with the Soviets for failing to say if they accept the hall proposed for the Reagan-Gorbachev meeting in Reykjavik.

The officials said that with Iceland's meager technical resources stretched to the limit, they urgently needed an answer on whether Moscow accepts the Hofdi, a Reykjavik bayside house, as the meeting place.

A Soviet spokesman said he was aware of this impatience and hoped an answer would be forthcoming by today.

The Iceland officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the Soviets were asked to decide three days ago whether the Hofdi suits them. With the summit less than a week away, it would be extremely difficult to come up with an alternative venue, they said.
