## UK to install bars in some dorm windows

Starting in late May, new aluminum bars will be added to south campus dorm windows to improve safety

Auxiliary Services, along with Capital Projects Management, also ran field tests on different bar prototypes by filling punching bags with lead and simulating different impact loads.

The final design is a 1-by-four-inch thick solid alternation with the solid out inches that will hug the inside of the window. The bar will stand four inches away from the window and will be anchored into the concrete walls. The total cost to make and install the bars is expected to be \$374,890.

### **Quick reactions** to heart attacks benefit long run

**Symptoms:** Seeking help can hinder future problems

By Chrissy Tigas

People who delay seeking medical attention after having a heart attack put themselves at further risk of complications and death, said one UK professor.

"There are a quarter of a million people who could have a better lifestyle and be saved, who could have any life because they'll be saved," said college of Nursing professor Debra Moser.

According The American

Heart Association, out of
about 1.1 million heart attack
patients each year, 44 percent
die. Moser said that a substantial number of deaths resulting from heart attacks might
be prevented if patients seek
treatment earlier.

Moser is the principal investigator in the UK branch of an international initiative called The Promotion Study, which uses individual nurse counseling to encourage patients to react sooner when they have the symptoms of a heart attack.

A heart attack is a blockage in one of the arteries that supplies blood to the heart. Most heart attack within swait several hours before they seek treatment, though the optimal time to be treated is within one hour. Student Government Presidentelect Rachel Watts and Vice Presidentelect Matt Rippetoe must each do 50
hours of community service this summer for violating SG election rules, the
SG Supreme Court ruled at an appeals
hearing Tuesday night.

Rippetoe said fulfilling the community service won't be difficult, and that
he plans on attending various philanthropy events.

"I'm not going to do anything differently than I would do anyways as
vice president, because I would attend
anyway," he said Watts and Rippetoe
must also pay a \$100 fine to SG.
The post-election saga may not be
over yet, however. One presidential candidate has said he might try taking his
complaints into Fayette District Court.
Tuesday's decision overturned a
prior ruling by the SG Election Board
of Claims on an election violation

## 3-year plan addresses dorms, diversity

Administrators have drafted a 3-year plan to move UK toward top 20 research status.

The 2003-2006 Strategic Plan that was drafted this week calls for increasing enrollment, opening a new residence hall, and improving diversity among faculty.

UK has a goal to "increase African-American and women faculty to at least four percent and 36 percent, respectively," the report says.

Another goal is to increase African-American administrators to at least five percent and women administrators to at least five percent and women administrators to 46 percent.

The plan also calls for rais-ing the academic standard for in-

coming freshman. Specifically, UK wants to raise the middle 50 percent of incoming freshmen's ACT scores from 23 to 28. Another goal is to increase the retention rate of sophomores to 83 percent.

Angie Martin, associate vice president for planning, budget and policy analysis, said she is pleased with the draft.

The three-year plan is more flexible than a typical five-year plan, Martin said.

She said that the ACT goals would be reached by raising the standard in which UK accepts incoming freshman.

With enrollment still rising, dorn overcrowding will continue to be an issue.

"The Strategic Plan now calls for one campus facility to be

built by the end of the plan," Martin said.

UK hopes this would accommodate 30 percent of the undergraduate population.

Studies show that students
are more productive and have
better grades when they live in
an on-campus environment, Martin said.

Initiatives are planned for
the UK Medical Center as well,
said the vice president for medical center operations, Frank
Butler. He said that because the
Medical Center is 86 percent to 98
percent self-supporting, income

from additional resources is

from additional resources is needed.

"That (money) has to come from patients." Butler said, "(There's) very little state money for that.

UK has proposed to allow the Medical Center to explore commercial opportunities, which will allow UK Hospital to be more competitive, Butler said. "There are health issues endemic to Kentucky." Butler said he said cancer, heart disease and diabetes are areas that need more resources.

UK also included among other items plans to increase recruitment of postdoctoral scholars from the current figure of 232 to a goal of 275, and increase doctoral degree enrollment overall from 2,154 to 2,350.

### McCoy may be forever remembered

PIKEVILLE, Ky. — Descendants of Randolph McCoy have given up hope of erecting a statue in a Pikeville park to honor the patriarch of the family that was involved in a bloody feud with the Haffields in the late 1800s. The life-size, bronze statue would be placed in a small cemetery on the outskirts of town. The Pikeville City Council hasn't said no to the family's request in February to the place the statue in the park. But is hasn't said yes. Pikeville resident James Smith said many people feel that placing the statue in the park would be romanticizing criminal behavior. "I don't believe we should be putting up the statue," Smith said. "Killing is killing." The feud between the McCoys of Kentucky and Hatfields of West Virginia is believed to have stemmed from a dispute over a pig in the 1870s. ### Arafat announces new Cabinet

Arafat announces new Cabinet RAMALLAH, West Bank — Yasser Arafat and his prime minister-designate, Mahmoud Abbas, ended their standoff over the composition of a new Cabinet on Wednesday, clearing the way for a new Mideast peace initiative backed by Washington. The long-awaited cabinet holds out the prospect of ending 31 months of Israeli-Palestinian fighting and establishing a Palestinian state. It calls for an end to Palestinian attacks and a freeze on any expansion of Jewish settlements in the West Bank and Gaza, followed, perhaps as early as this year, by a Palestinian state with provisional borders.

## **Dixie Chicks fire** back at critics

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Dixie Chicks' lead singer Nae Maines says she spoke against President Bush and with Iraq last month out of frustration and regret schoice of words, but she makes no apologies for think-

talle Maines says she spoke against President Bush and war with Iraq last month out of frustration and regrets her choice of words, but she makes no apologies for thinking critically.

"I'm not truly embarrassed that, you know, President Bush is from my state, that's not really what I care about." Maines says in an interview with ABC's Diane Sawyer for 'Primetime Thursday, 'airing Io pun. Thursday, 'If was the wrong wording with genuine emotion and questions and concern behind it. .. Am I sorry that I asked questions and concern behind it. .. Am I sorry that I asked questions and that I just don't follow? No."

At a March 10 concert in London, Maines told the audience in reference to Bush's push for military action against Iraq. 'Just so you know, we're ashamed the president of the United States is from Texas."

Maines and the Texas based trio's other members—Emily Robison and Martie Maguire, who are sisters—also tell Sawyer the fallout was too harsh for the offense and they've always supported US. troops even though they questioned the war.

"We know some of our fans were shocked and .. and upset, and we are compassionate to that," Maguire said. "My problem is, when does it cross the line?". When is writing a threatening letter OK?"

The interview airs a week before they begin their US. tour May 1 in Greenville, S.C., and they appear nude on the May 2 issue of Entertainment Weekly with epithets such as a "Traitors" and "Saddam's Angels" written on their bodies.



## Shiites step into their country's power vacuum

### U.S. closely watching for signs of Iranian influence in anti-U.S. demonstrations

KARBALA, Iraq — Iraqi
Shiites are organizing local
committees, doling out funds
to pay salaries, collecting looted property and sending militias to secure hospitals and
electric plants.

The Shiites are fast filling
the power vacuum left by the
ouster of Saddam Hussein —
and some fear their dominance of postwar Iraqi politics could lead to an Islamic
theocracy like next door in
Shiite-dominated Iran.

Long repressed under Saddam's Sunmi-dominated oper-ment and representing 69 percent of Iraq's popularion of 24 million, the Shiteshave divided their religious loyalties between at least three leaders. Yet their opposition to a prolonged US. presence on Iraqi soil appears uniform, and some look to Iran as a model.

"The Iranian experience proved to be successful until now and I hope Iraq will be the same," said Naji Abdel-

Razzak, a 45-year-old civil servant in Karbala.

Added Kathem al-Nasiri, a cleric from the Hawaz seminary in Karbala: "We want to establish an Islamic, Shiite state, the same as what happened in Iran" — though he doubted the United States would permit that.

Thousands of Shiites demonstrated against the United States in Karbala on Wednesday, with messages such as "No to America, no to Israel, yes to Islam."

Reports that Iran seeks to influence Iraqi Shiites are setting off alarms in Washington.

"We have concerns about this matter, about Iranian agents in Iraq," said White House spokesman Ari Fleischer, responding to reports that Iranian-trained agents have crossed into Iraq to promote Shiite clerics and advance Iranian interests.

The Bush administration wants to set up a broad-based, democratic government in Iraq — with representation from Shiites, Sunnis and Kurds.

Paradoxically, however, it could bring about a government not necessarily friendly to U.S. interests.

Winning Shiite support is key to U.S. efforts to block the influence of Iran — and there are signs this may be possible. Senior Shiite clerics have insisted they will share power with Iraq's Sunnis and Kurds. Campus planners have said they are looking for spots with easy access to existing utilities and classroom buildings.

One of the dorms will more than likely be placed next to the Kirwan/Blanding complex on South Campus, which is already a prime spot to live because of its proximity to the new Johnson Conton.

It was also the last year of an all-male graduation class, thereafter Yale, and the rest of America, would be changed forever:



It has been the said that the late 1960s culture profoundly shaped the lives of those who lived it, either they were repulsed by the out-of-control rioters and looters, the disintegration of law and order, and the "troublemakers," or they found something, some cause or initiative, that they could believe in and pursue.

By 1968, the anti-war movement had begun to creep into America's cherished national institutions, laying the groundwork for a controversy that lingers to this day.
