CLINTON WINS

West seals Clinton's landslide

President Clinton won reelection in a East-to-West landslide yesterday night as optimistic voters brushed aside Bob Dole's challenge to his economic leadership and his character. Congressional Republicans battled to keep their tenuous hold on the House and Senate.

Clinton rebounded from the 1994 Republican midterm rout and became the first Democratic president re-elected since Franklin Roosevelt.

Thousands jammed the streets of Little Rock, Ark., to hear his victory speech at the Old State House.

"I wish him well and I pledge my support," Dole said in conceding the race.

As for the Republicans, he told supporters, "We're going to keep the Senate, we're going to keep the House."

It was his last speech as a candidate, ending a remarkable political career that included 35 years in Congress and a record 12 years as the Senate Republican leader. "Tomorrow will be the first time in my life I don't have anything to do," Dole said.

Reform Party candidate Ross Perot was a distant third everywhere and well below the 19 percent he won in 1992.

He conceded defeat but was not ready to fade into the shadows.

"We going to have to stand at the gate and keep the pressure on and we will," Perot said in Texas, looking ahead perhaps to 2000.

Victories in 28 states and the District of Columbia gave Clinton 363 electoral votes — well above the necessary 270.

An electoral landslide assured, Clinton had one last hope for the night: that Perot's candidacy would not cost him a majority of the popular vote.

With 56 percent of the national vote counted, Clinton was at 50 percent, Dole 42 and Perot 8 percent.

Clinton was already weighing Cabinet changes as he plotted a second-term agenda and looked

for his place in history.

Indeed, the jubilation in Little Rock afforded Democrats just a brief respite from controversies and scandals raised by Dole and Perot.

The breadth of Clinton's victory was sobering news to Republicans who once held an Electoral

College advantage based on strength in the South, Plains and Mountain West.

Clinton began the night by becoming the first Democrat to win Florida in 20 years and hours later got the Pacific West sweep that guaranteed an electoral landslide.

Dole monitored the results from his Watergate apartment before calling Clinton to offer congratulations. He then headed to a Republican gathering. Ohio delivered a telling early blow to Dole's upset hopes: no Republican has ever won the White House without that state.

McConnell: Ky. not single-party state

LOUISVILLE — After all the campaign buttons and stickers were passed out, the crowd waited for the winners to come forward with acceptance speeches. Excitement and anticipation ran strong at Louisville's Galt House East ballroom as about 1000 Kentucky Republicans gathered to await state election returns.

When the final precincts reported their tallies, incumbent Mitch McConnell retained his U.S. Senate seat by about a 13 percent margin. McConnell was introduced by his wife, Elaine, who called him a man of "great integrity and courage... who works hard for the people of Kentucky."

As McConnell approached the microphone and waited for the cheers to subside he appeared confident in his victory.

"I'm not used to landslides," he said.

In his acceptance speech McConnell said his victory shows Republicans are a force in Kentucky.

"I think it's pretty safe to say this is not a one-party state anymore," he said.

McConnell also gave his condolences to his opponent Steve Beshear. "It's a great night for one candidate and not a good one for the other," McConnell said.

McConnell received 55 percent of the Kentucky vote, and Beshear received 43 percent.

With his third Senate victory, McConnell joins his idol, former Senator John Sherman Cooper as the only Kentucky Republican

to win three statewide races.

He is only Republican to win a statewide election in the past 28 years.

The Senator also laid out his plans for his next six years in office, focusing on a balanced budget.

"I voted balanced budget last year, and I promise I will vote the balanced budget again next year," said McConnell. "If it takes doing this on a bipartisan basis, then that's what we'll have to do."

In his tradition of dedicating,

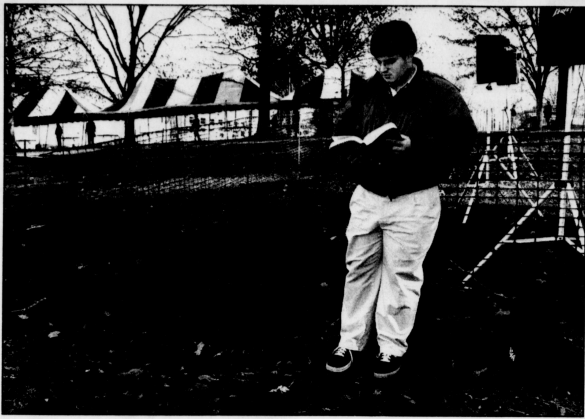
Clinton wins big in elections

Oh What A Day

Some came to heckle. Some came to get a glimpse of President Clinton, while others couldn't see at all.

Clinton, along with a virtual Who's Who of Kentucky politics, spoke to a crowd of more than 14,000 Monday on UK's Administration Lawn.

It marked the first visit to UK by a sitting president since Lyndon Johnson came to campus in 1965.

Just after taking the stage, Clinton was interrupted by a heckler criticizing the president for allegedly accepting contributions from Asian interests, including the Taiwanese Mafia.

"I just want the truth. No more stonewalling, Mr. President," shouted Mike Russell, a Teamster from Bracken County in Northern Kentucky.

The heckler's actions angered some and prevented many bystanders from hearing the president's speech.

Many of the spectators had waited for more than three hours to hear Clinton.

Even Clinton played off the taunting.

"I welcome people from the opposition," Clinton said, "because unlike them, my America includes people of all different beliefs."

Many UK students didn't get a glimpse of Clinton or any of the other speakers.

With the stage for Monday's rally on top of a large hill, many spectators in the back of the crowd couldn't even see the podium.

"It kind of makes it a waste of time to come out here and just see the backs of heads," said Brian Lewellen, a music education senior.

"I could have stayed at home and watched it on TV," natural resource junior Steven Pulliam said.

The two 14-year-olds from Bourbon County Middle School arrived more than two hours early to claim their spot atop the media guardrail so they could see President Clinton.

"Are we going to say you're on your own, or are we going to build a bridge to the 21st century we can all walk across?" he said.

The girls picked the latter.



Beshear loses hard fought race

Former Speaker of the House Tip O'Neil once said, "All politics are local."

O'Neil's theory held true yesterday as Democrats captured the crown jewel and kept their man in the White House, while voters showed out in record numbers to keep Republicans in the U.S. House and Senate.

Two former UK graduates battled a bitter war for a seat in the U.S. Senate.

U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell, a Republican incumbent, soundly defeated former lieutenant governor and attorney general Steve Beshear yesterday.

McConnell, a member of Phi Kappa Tau social fraternity, billed himself as a candidate with "clout and seniority."

The mood was somber at the Clinton/Gore and Beshear/Victor Party at the Marriot/Griffin

Gate Resort in Lexington.

Campaign staffers attributed the loss to

McConnell's enormous campaign war chest.

McConnell raised and spent close to \$5 million dollars in his battle with Beshear, a member of Delta Tau Delta social fraternity.

Beshear raised only about \$2.5 million dollars. Democrats attributed the loss to a variety of factors.

Gov. Paul Patton felt Democrats did well in the Bluegrass state.

"We were able to put up a good fight," Patton said. "We put up a good fight throughout the com-

monwealth."

Many at the Marriot/Griffin

Gate Resort were surprised at the closeness of the presidential race in Kentucky at the victory party.

"I thought that Clinton would have fared a little better," Dale Howard, a political science junior said.

Howard felt angry that Kentucky voters had chosen McConnell

over Beshear.

"Mitch McConnell represents all that is wrong with America," Howard said.

Howard was not the only UK student who decided to show up for the planned party.

Erik Hostetter, who worked with the Beshear campaign, felt bad that his candidate had lost.

"It really hurts because we worked really hard, and we played by the rules," Hostetter said.

Republicans picked up one House seat in Kentucky, winning the Third District and defeating Democrat freshman Rep. Mike Ward.

In local races, Ernesto Scorsone, a UK graduate defeated Republican Mitch Mead and Democrat Kathy Stein slammed Pete Palumbo in her bid for Scorsone's old seat.

In congressional races Republicans fared well.

Scotty Baesler turned out to be the only Democrat representing the commonwealth.

Ernie Fletcher, a Lexington physician, blamed his loss on negative campaigning.

Baesler discounted Fletcher's claim to sour grapes.

"He's just upset he lost," Baesler said.

a race to an individual, McConnell said he dedicated his third race to his wife, Elaine.

His first two Senate wins were dedicated to Cooper and to his father who died in 1990, six weeks before his re-election.

McConnell joins a Republican-dominated Kentucky House contingency as five of the state's six districts elected Republicans to the U.S. Representatives.

The first district elected Ed Whitfield. Ron Lewis was voted in for a second term in the second district while Anne Northrup narrowly won the third.

Jim Bunning won by a large majority over Covington mayor Denny Bowman. Hal Rogers maintained his seat, running unopposed in the fifth district.

Ted Jackson, Northrup's campaign chairman, said this is the first time Republicans have won a 80 percent of the state's seats.

He said this is especially surprising because registered Democrats outnumber registered Republicans in the Commonwealth by a 2 to 1 margin.

Jackson also said the abundance of negative campaigning was not unusual in the state races.

"I think for the most part if the campaign is to negative the voters will tell them," Jackson said.

Voter turnout high locally

Perhaps due to recent visits to UK by both President Clinton and Republican challenger Bob Dole, politically aware students turned out at the polls in large numbers.

Volunteers at the polling center on Cooper Drive said they had a steady stream of voters in the morning hours but turnout dwindled off later in the day. Pollsters said that overall, more voters turned out this year than in past years.

Pollsters at the Newman Catholic Center said that voter turnout was about the same as it was in 1992, which was a record year for voter turnout in Fayette County. Pollsters said that since there were more registered voters in their precinct this year than in the last election, more people voted overall.

Jeff Martin, a political science sophomore, saw the president

speaking on Monday and said he voted for Clinton because of the president's efforts to make college more affordable and his overall record in foreign and domestic affairs.

Volunteers at the Newman Center said that about half of the voters who showed were college students.

"I voted for Dole and McConnell because I believe the Republicans have a lot better ideas than the Democrats, especially in regards to their flat tax plan," said Amy Kessling, a chemistry junior.

Pollsters said that except for a mistake on the ballot forms, everything went smoothly and there were no problems with any of the machines.

The presidential ballot form showed Carl Owenby as Ross Perot's running mate instead of Pat Chote, Perot's real choice. According to pollsters, this mistake was due to the fact that when Perot filed his papers in Kentucky, he had to declare a running mate early on, and had since changed

his mind.

Pollsters said that no one brought the mistake to their attention.

"I voted for Perot only in protest of the two other candidates who are out of touch with the people," said Tim Moss, an engineering freshman. However, Moss said he supported Mitch McConnell for Senate.

Jamie Mathews, a communications freshman, said she voted for Clinton because she feels that, overall, the country is better off now than it was four years ago.

"I voted for Steve Beshear in the Senate because I feel McConnell has not served our state well in his past years," Mathews said.

Pollsters attributed the increased voter turnout both to new voter registration laws that make it easier for voters to vote in their home district, and to the "motor-voter" registration program.

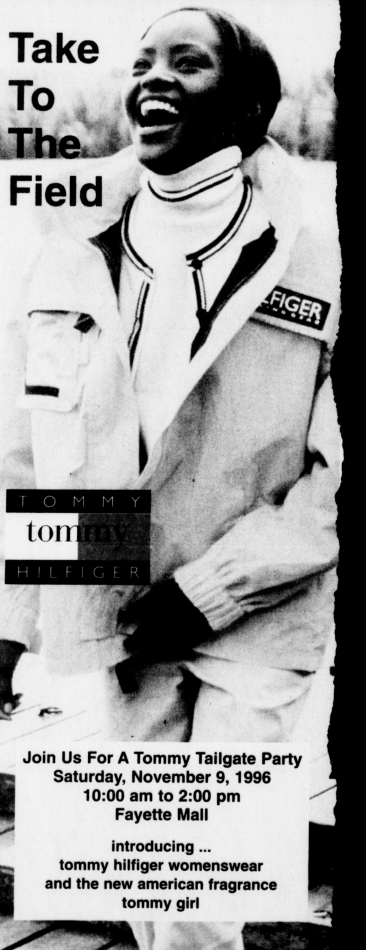

Opie's new film to show at Worsham

For those destitute college students looking for cheap entertainment, SAB's cinema committee is presenting a free advance screening of Mel Gibson's *Ransom* at 8 p.m. at the Worsham Theatre.

Ransom boasts more high-profile Hollywood talent than any film in recent memory. Hot off his multiple-Oscar-winning *Braveheart*, Gibson stars with Renee Russo as the wealthy couple whose son is kidnapped. Gibson plays a fierce business tycoon who takes matters into his own hands when the FBI rescue operation fails. He appears on television to announce he is turning the kidnapper's demand for \$2 million into a bounty on their heads.

Even more interesting than the big-name leads is the incredible supporting cast. Two of the best, Gary

Sinise and Delroy Lindo, contribute their talents as a New York homicide detective and an FBI agent, respectively. Other notables include Dan Hedaya (*Blood Simple*), Lili Taylor (*I Shot Andy Warhol*), Liev Schreiber (*Walking and Talking*) and New Kids on the Block's own Donnie Wahlberg.

Opie Taylor himself, Ron Howard, who has made a name for himself as one of the better Hollywood directors, takes on directing duties for *Ransom*. Although his films are usually viewed as glossy or watered-down, this project promises a grittier look with a hard-nosed intensity. In addition to the outstanding cast, Howard assembled an impressive group of off-screen help.

Piotr Sobocinski, responsible for the stunning cinematography in Krzysztof Kieslowski's *Red*, is behind the camera for the first time since that Academy-Award-nominated work.

Gibson said of Sobocinski's work, "It's pretty innovative the way the film is lit. They've created a kind of noir experience, but in color."

Ransom also features one of Hollywood's most successful screenwriters, Richard Price, author and screenwriter of *Clockers*, as well the penner for *The Color of Money* and *Sea of Love*.

In a press release, Howard compared his new film to his other accomplishments: "Seemingly light years away, *Ransom* is a closer cousin to *Apollo 13* than anything else I've done in terms of trying to create for the audience a real nail-biting experience. I think that what really differentiates the films in the end are the twists and turns in the story, and the performances that these world-class actors have given."

In the past, SAB has presented advance screenings of *Sense and Sensibility* and *The Chamber*, but this is perhaps the most impressive treat of them all.

Sluggish play highlights Cats' exhibition opener

NOT QUITE The Cats' Ron Mercer has a few problems on an ally-ship attempt in Monday's exhibition game against Athletes in Action.

It might be time to rethink these preseason predictions for the UK men's basketball team.

The Wildcats struggled with a tough Athletes in Action team Monday night, winning the game 79-62 and leaving doubts as to whether the team will be anywhere as good as last year's national championship squad.

Coach Rick Pitino, whose pre-game festivities included welcoming President Clinton to UK in the afternoon, was not surprised by the team's performance, hoping that their struggles against AIA will bring the team back to reality.

"What it did was pour cold water all over our faces, and tell us that we weren't very good," Pitino said. "This is just a mirror image of what the Blue-White scrimmages have been all about and practice as well."

"If I could have asked for a game that I wanted, it is this game."

However, Pitino said that the team is making progress. "I told the guys that I'm not disappointed because I've watched them every day since Oct. 15," he said. "Our major concern is throwing the lob and dunking, and not becoming a good basketball team."

Pitino was less than impressed by his team's play, implying that they were just out

on the court, not putting 100 percent into the game.

"We need to take our tuxedos off, get good and dirty, get the fans behind us every possession — because that's what its going to take to win every ball game out there."

"You can't turn the ball over 29 times and beat anyone on the schedule."

Pitino didn't want to scrap the hopes and dreams of Big Blue fans, either. He said this team is just going to take a little longer to develop.

"That doesn't mean that we won't be a great basketball team come March, because I think we can become that. It's going to be a long process this year."

Forward Jared Prickett, who captured the team's first double-double with 13 points, 12 rebounds and four blocks, said the team has little chance of repeating the championship.

"We don't have the chemistry to win a championship," he said. "We're not the same team from last year. We didn't play as good as we could have, but personally I think I played all right."

Forward Derek Anderson, who scored 17 points against AIA, said the team has some work to do before facing Clemson on Nov. 15. He said the team has been watching tapes on the Tigers, who are returning all five of their starters from last season.

"We've got to work on the defense," he said. "We've just got to play good fundamental basketball."

treatment from us. He deserves a chance to start and a chance to play professionally, and both of those things couldn't have been accomplished this year."

Sheppard, who would have been a senior this season, would have backed up Derek Anderson at the off-guard position.

Pitino hasn't been bashful about saying that Anderson would see a large number of minutes in every game, thus leaving Sheppard with very little playing time.

"I'm excited about getting a chance to play again next year," Sheppard said, "to be able to work on my game for a whole year and

concentrate on getting better."

Entering this season, Sheppard had averaged 5.9 points and 1.8 rebounds a game in his three-year career.

In last year's run for the national championship, Sheppard played in 34 of the 36 games. He averaged 5.5 points and 2.1 rebounds in a little more than 12 minutes a game.

He started at the point guard position in 27 games his sophomore year, averaging 8.3 points.

Over the summer, Sheppard and his father, Ralph, helped run the Olympic torch from Louisville.

UK women's soccer team places 10 on Honor Roll

Gambling probe at BC

NEWTON, Mass. — Boston College coach Dan Henning acknowledges "some sort of a problem" with players betting on football games, and he hinted suspensions were imminent.

"We're dealing with a situation here where the NCAA has a rule, and there are going to be some individuals here that are going to live with some kind of problem if they have bet on a game," the embattled coach said yesterday.

Henning said two players, Kiernan Speight and another whom he did not identify, had asked on yesterday. Speight has denied any gambling.

Jeff Sheppard will sit out the 1996-97 season as a redshirt, as announced by UK Coach Rick Pitino prior to the Cats' exhibition opener against Athletes in Action Monday night.

As late as last Friday after the final Blue-White scrimmage, the coach had said that he was "99 percent" sure that he wasn't going to redshirt the 6-foot-3 guard

from Peachtree City, Ga. But on Sunday, Sheppard decided that it was best for him.

"I didn't want to," Pitino said following the 79-62 win, "but he told me I had no choice, that I had to do it. So I obliged. I think it is in the best interest for Jeff. He wants to do it."

Pitino said certain factors led to the decision.

"He is a special young man," he said, "and has sacrificed since he's been here, and deserves special

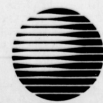

McCall shares experiences at UK

Nathan McCall, journalist and author of the bestseller *Makes Me Wanna Holler*, enlightened a full house in Memorial Hall on Monday night.

The audience was an array of people from UK students to the general public.

They came to hear McCall for a variety of reasons from genuine interest to class requirement to a desire to gain personal enlightenment.

After being greeted by a warm welcome, McCall opened by saying, "I came to promote my book and to share personal experiences and perceptions confronted by Blacks in America, especially Black males."

McCall said that a person proceeds in life according to how they perceive their future; thus if they keep a positive self-image, he/she can lead a better life.

One way to do this, McCall

said, is through obtaining an education.

Enrika Johnson, a special education freshman, said she gained insight about the origin of the hatred and anger that some Blacks feel and also where some of the problems that Blacks encounter come from.

"I learned how we can go about developing ourselves so that we can use that anger positively through education," Johnson said.

McCall said that children are born with "a sense of boundless possibilities for what they can attain in their life," but when children look around for confirmation that they can achieve their desires, the first place they look is in their immediate environment — their family.

But when that confirmation is not there, children develop doubts about their prospects in life.

Stephanie Andrews, a family studies senior, said family is the basis you have to start at home in order for success to grow in your

future. Without morals, standards, and values you will self-destruct Andrews said.

This event was collaborative effort of eight campus-wide organizations and college departments.

Chester Grundy, Director of African American Student Affairs, commented that "the most satisfying part of the planning of the lecture was getting the Athletic Department involved because McCall has a message that is so relevant and so important to young men, especially who haven't come to terms with their identity."

When audience members were asked what they had learned from his lecture the responses were all positive.

Adonis Morris, marketing and management senior, said that he thinks it's beneficial to have speakers like McCall come to UK because it offers diversity to campus events.

"Events like this interest me and makes me want to attend them."

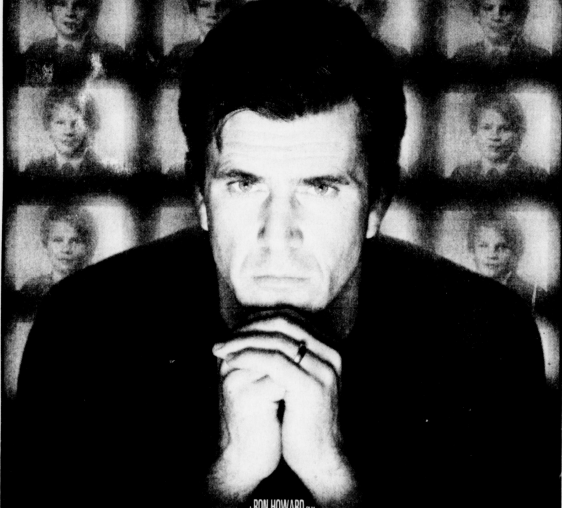
