standing on one foot with the other drawn up out of sight. In sitting upon a perch their joints lock which prevents them becoming unbalanced. For a roosting place they cuddle up against the trunk of a tree; some few crawl into a haystack; some under bushes; some in holes in the ground; some, like the grouse, dive into the snow, sit down and let the snow cover them. Enough air comes thru the snow for breathing. The Bob-white sleep on the ground in a close circle with heads turned outward to enable them to see the approach of enemies regardless of what direction they come. This formation also keeps them warm. Hawks and eagles sleep standing always prepared for flight. Ducks and geese commonly sleep standing on one foot or floating on water with one foot hanging down to guide them. The domestic duck usually squats. The chimney swifts hang by their toes with the tail as a brace.

Each bird is fitted for a particular kind of life. Types of birds with a bill like the swallows, swifts, kingbirds, whippoor-wills, and flycatchers sweep the air of such insects as mosquitoes and gnats.

The warblers, wren, robin, bluebird, oriole, mocking bird and many others keep the foliage cleaned of insect eggs, larvae, plant lice and caterpillars.

The chickadee, nuthatch, flicker and woodpeckers clean the bark of crawling insects found under the bark or in decaying wood. The woodpeckers are the only agents which can successfully hold in check forest insects and some kinds of fruit insects.

Then we have the caretakers of the ground floor—the meadow lark, quail, robin, sparrow, grouse, flicker, crow—who eat the white grubs of June bugs, grasshoppers, locusts, cutworms, army worms, chinch bugs. This class of pests has ruined millions of dollars worth of crops.

We then have the weed destroyers—The sparrows, finches, juncoes, siskin, lark, cowbird, quail, grouse, grosbeak and many others, who eat the seed of noxious weeds. . . . The vulture rids the fields of decaying animals. About 16 varieties of hawks are very beneficial to the farmer in ridding his grounds of rodents.

The finest eyes in all the world are those of birds. Many have eyes one hundred times as sharp as man.

## HEMEROCALLIS

On Friday, July 20, the Garden Club of Lexington conducted a forum or round table discussion and an exhibit of Hemerocallis at the Garden Cottage at Ashland. It was a beautiful morning.

The Garden Cottage chairman and committee arranged tables in front of an old lilac hedge. The green cambric covers on the tables furnished a pleasing note in the color harmony of specimen blooms which ranged from palest yellow to the deep maroon of the variety Black Swan.

Mrs. J. C. Lamb, president of the Fayette Rose and Garden Club, was introduced and the meeting turned over to her and to Mrs. Bruce Isaacs, both enthusiastic growers and hybridizers of the Hemerocallis. In the midst of Mrs. Isaacs' informative and interesting talk, the photographer arrived and Mrs. Lamb's talents were clearly demonstrated as she took over and held the attention of the group while the photographer took his pictures with no confusion and no delay. Mrs. Isaacs proceeded with her history of the plant, the varieties, her interest in evening bloomers, lists of preferred varieties, their hardiness, their use in difficult locations, their strength in all kinds of weather crises. At the end of her talk she was presented with the Ashland Cottage Award of Merit ribbon, an honor which she well deserves. These ribbons will be awarded for outstanding achievement in any of the fields of Garden Club work, such as Horticulture, Conservation, or Civic Improvement.

After the presentation, many specimen blooms were admired and discussed. Mrs. H. H. Pitzer, member of the Fayette Rose and Garden Club, who brought a fine collection of her own, was in charge of labelling and helped to place unnamed varieties. There were tables for Hybrids, Recent Hybrids, Seedlings and Unnamed Varieties. Probably the outstanding seedling was one sent by Mrs. Clay, of Paris, Ky., but there were many real beauties. Miss Virginia Clark, of the Garden Club of Lexington, brought a splendid collection from her farm, raised with no more than rainfall for water and all in excellent condition.

In the Cottage were arrangements featuring Hemerocallis done by Miss Clark and Mrs. Stella Monroe Young, of the Fayette Rose and Garden Club, which added greatly to the show.

It was a meeting to lift the spirit and cause the hearts of gardeners to rejoice for the work was good. The cooperation was as fine as the enthusiasm was marked.

REMEMBER THAT SEPT. 21 DEADLINE!

Q. When and where should rhododendron and laurel be cut back to prevent bushes from getting too tall and rangey?

A. It is not possible to cut back flowering rhododerdron without reducing the amount of bloom the following year and perhaps two or three years. If they have gotten out of hand, shorten some of the main branches back to within 2 or 3 feet of the ground, sometime in April.

O. When is the best time to prune maple trees?

A. Maples are apt to bleed profusely if pruned during the winter or spring, although the loss of sap does little or no harm. However, the bleeding will prevent painting the wound so it may be better to prune them in late summer when the sap is not running.

Q. What should be done to a lawn which is over-run with moss under large trees?

A. The prevalence of moss is almost surely due to the fact that the tree roots rob the earth of food and moisture and the grass cannot grow well because of lack of fertility. (See article on Shade Tolerant Plants).

Q. What is the proper time to start vegetable seeds in flats so that the growing seedlings will be large enough for transplanting in the garden?

A. Since the time in which vegetable plants can be planted in the garden depends on the region, two months before they are to be planted outdoors is the time to sow the seeds. You can start tomatoes, eggplant, celery, early cabbage, cauliflower and broccoli in this manner.

Q. When is the proper time to start gloxinia tubers indoors?

A. Start them during February and March in a light humus soil.

Q. Will natural organic compost produce more nutritious vegetables than commercial plant foods?

A. Some "organic gardeners" think so, but soil and nutrition scientists at agricultural experiment stations say that the nutrient elements in compost are no different from those in plant foods.

Q. Will sucker plants from own-root lilacs produce the same flowers as the parent bush?

A. Yes. They will produce flowers identical with those of the parent plant.

Q. How can honeysuckle vines be killed?

A. Spray with End-o-Weed when the leaves are ¾ developed. Since this will kill about 90% of the stand, a second application will exterminate the rest.

O. When is the best time to transplant a hydrangea plant?

A. Early spring is best, although you can successfully move them in October, also.

Q. Why is late winter the best time to prune grapes?

A. Winter killed canes can be pruned out. Spring pruning is not recommended because the sap begins to flow and the swelling buds are easily broken off.

## OUR NATIONAL BIRD THE BALD EAGLE

The BALD EAGLE (Haliaeetus leucocephalus) — our national bird — is a symbol of our nation's freedom. It was adopted as the national emblem of the United States on June 20, 1782. They are found in every state in the Union and both continents. His image appears on some of our coins, sometimes in flight and sometimes perched with outstretched wings ready to fly. He is very fearless and fierce but always calm. His place among birds is compared to the lion among animals

He cares not if he is in the torrid zone of the south or the arctic climate of the north. He will soar upward in a graceful sweeping manner passing from summer into winter in a few moments into the high altitude, suddenly descending like a sky rocket. He is a bird of great strength and swift powerful flight and is master of its haunts. Man is its chief enemy.

He gathers his food on land and water, high or low. His power of sight is almost beyond imagination. He will sight a small object of food two or three miles and dart in a straight line for it. His food is varied; it may be fish — dead or alive — Carrion, rabbits, mice, snakes, chickens, young lamb, etc.

The Bald Eagle is dark brown in color, head, neck and tail white. Length 30-43 inches; wing spread 6½-7½ feet. The immature birds, 1-3 years old, are mainly black. The young remain in the nest for two and one-half months and do not attain the plumage of adults for three years. The first year they are larger than the parents.

Their nests are large structures of sticks usually in high tree tops but sometimes on high cliffs five or six feet in diameter and up to twelve feet high. They mate for life and usually return to the same nest each year. One is known in Vermillion, Ohio, that was used continuously for 35 years. The eggs are two in number, white, with slight brown marks. He has been the inspiration of many literary tributes.

Tennyson wrote:

"He clasps the crags with crooked hands; Close to the sun in lonely lands, Ringed with the azure world, he stands . . . . The wrinkled sea beneath him crawls; He watches from his mountain walls, And like a thunderbolt he falls."

## STRUCTURE

A bird is built like a streamlined boat — sharp in front to cut its way thru the air. As it flies its feet are either drawn up or lie backward. When about to alight the feet are lowered just as an airplane lowers its landing gear when about to land. The tail of the bird serves as a rudder in flight, as a brake to check its speed when alighting, as a balancer when perching and to express its emotion. When approached by an enemy its tail immediately goes into action. Ground flying birds have short wings, cannot make short turns and usually fly in a straight line. High flying ones have long wings, can turn sharply and fly in irregular courses. Their bones are hollow and filled with air for buoyancy. All birds tails have the same number of feathers, 12 of them. In moulting only two at a time are shed so not to interfere with flying.

They sleep with their heads buried in their feathers on their shoulders, never under their wing as is generally presumed. Most of them sleep on their feet squatting down. A few sleep
