

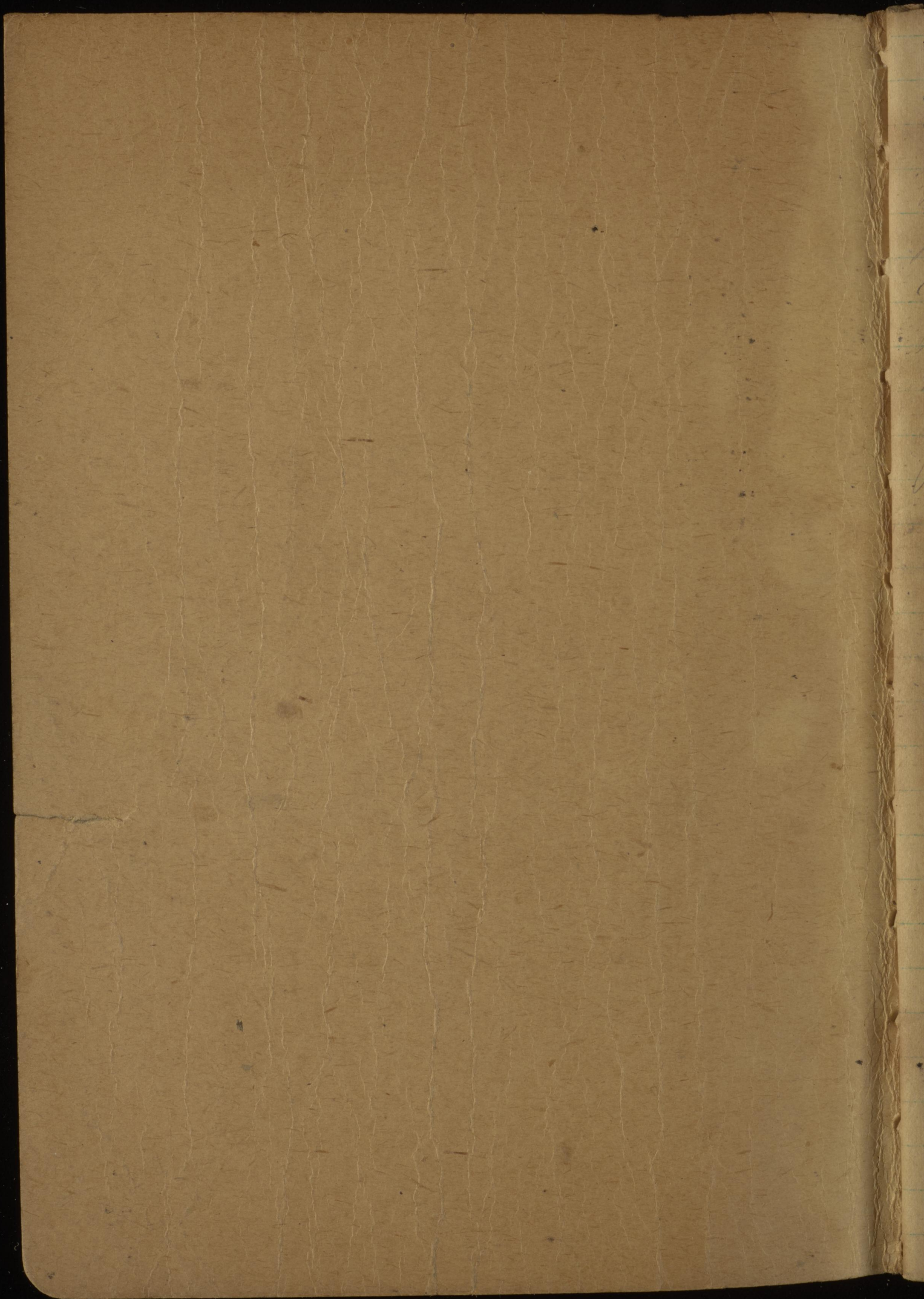

March 26

The last meeting of the Garden Club.
1920 was held on Sunday March
26 at the home of Mrs. J. P. Morgan.
Mrs. James Todd, the returning President
was in the chair and gave her
annual report, a resume of the year's
work, which she has so effectively
guided.

The annual report of the Treasurer
Miss Clay was also given, showing
the excellent financial standing
of the Garden Club during the past
year. She reported 67 paid members
\$245.55 the sum raised from the
flower sales, with \$100.45 of that
amount still on hand and a
balance in the Treasury from the
general fund of \$118.28 making
a total of \$218.73 the full amount
now in the Treasury.

Mrs. Carter gave a report of the Victory
School Garden work in which
she represented the Club and a
letter was read from Mr. E. A. Lipton
in which he returned \$24.24 a
balance left from the fund.

Which was saved for the prize
offered by the Blue Grass Fair
for exhibits from the City School
Gardens.

Mrs Morgan also reported the
success of the Harvest Fall Festival
in which exhibits were also made
from the Victory Gardens.

This being the time for the annual

The second meeting of the Garden Club was held with Mrs Bullock on Thursday April 1st

In the absence of Mrs Lodge the session of Pres. Mrs Carter opened the meeting and introduced the new President - Mrs McClellan who took the chair for the remainder of the meeting

She gave a brief address asking for the cooperation of the members in the year work. After which she read the constitution and by-laws.

The Treas reported 21 paid members and as this is only a small proportion of the membership.

Mrs Stokes was instructed to send out post-cards asking all who do not expect to renew membership to notify her at once so that vacancies can be filled from the waiting list. It was decided that the membership committee be a secret one. Known only to

Mrs. Sealey who was appointed
at the previous meeting to investigate
the present needs of the City School
Park some reported that of four
of them, Harrison, Dudley,
Lincoln and Ashington were

in need of funds.
Mrs. Roberts moved that the \$104.45 -
from the flower sales be equally
divided among them.

It was also voted to assist in
planting the grounds of the
Blue Grass Sanatorium with trees
shrubs and hardy plants, and
that the \$118.25 to the balance on
hand from the general fund
be devoted to this purpose.

Mrs. Benjamin moved that
Mrs. Walter Bullock be appointed
Chairman, to represent the Club
in regard to this work.

Mrs. Louis Longgins spoke in
behalf of the Garden Club, being
intended in the planting, during
the coming year, more such as
the office of State Forester

had been abolished by the Legislature
and the general raising of tobacco
was increasing the destruction
of forest trees. And it was unan-
imously agreed that this become
the specific work of the year.
Mrs. Haggins was appointed the
Chairman of the tree planting
committee. To investigate cost-
~~liness~~ and see in what way
the Club could assist in plant-
ing trees along the public high-
ways.

Instead of a program committee
for the entire year, the Pres. proposed
a new plan, of selecting 2 or 3 members
for each meeting, to prepare a
program.

Mrs. Carter and Mrs. Healy were
appointed for the next meeting.
Mrs. Cary reported that the
Hayette Park could not be secured
for the Sat. flower sale and it
was suggested that the Ben Shi
Theatre might be available.
Mrs. Morgan appointed to find out
and report at next meeting.
