MEDIA INFORMATION

TO THE MEDIA:

There are those who say basketball is much more than a game here in the Commonwealth of Kentucky — it's a religion. If anyone ever doubted that, they should have been convinced this last spring and summer.

For only the third time in 55 years, the University of Kentucky has a new head basketball coach. The attention paid to the retirement of Joe B. Hall and the arrival of Eddie Sutton has been nothing short of phenomenal. For us here at the University, the transition has been a marvelous, although hectic, one.

So this 83rd season of Kentucky basketball gets underway with even more "hoopla" than ever. It's an exciting time here, as October 15 rolls around, the leaves start turning and pulses quicken as the magic of Kentucky basketball nears. No doubt, when the Wildcats open the regular-season Nov. 22 at Rupp Arena, it will be a special moment, as Eddie Sutton officially takes the reigns of what many people consider the premier basketball program in America.

The Kentucky sports information staff is looking forward to the season and once again working with our friends in the media. It is our goal to cooperate with you fully and help you in any way possible. This media guide was prepared with that in mind and if you have any ideas or suggestions, please let us know. As always, we stand ready to serve you as you, the working media, cover the Wildcats. Your contact at our office for Kentucky basketball will once again be Brad Davis.

Here's to a great 1985-86 basketball season — for the Kentucky Wildcats, and for you.

WORKING MEDIA CREDENTIALS — Credentials for UK home games are issued for working media only and should be requested as early as possible. Although Rupp Arena boasts one of the largest press rows in the country, space limitations sometimes force us to limit credentials. Requests must be made in writing on company letterhead and are honored only from sports editors of daily newspapers and sports directors of radio and television stations. Requests from weekly newspapers and radio stations will be accepted only from those who will be attending games in a working capacity and will be filled on a space-available basis. All requests for media credentials should be made to: Brad Davis, Assistant SID, Memorial Coliseum, Avenue of Champions, Lexington, KY 40506-0019. Credentials will be mailed if time permits; if not, passes will be held at the media Will Call gate, located on the Patterson Street Entrance to Rupp Arena. Credentials are not available at the public Will Call window on the High Street Concourse Level.

A limited number of parking passes are available and should be requested at the time of requesting credentials. Credentials will be in badge form this year. Those people with a "Media" pass will have an assigned seat number — check seating charts for location. Those people with a "Photo" pass will be allowed only on the floor. No "photo" passes are allowed on press row and no "Media" passes are allowed on the floor.

PHOTOGRAPHERS — Please note new NCAA guidelines which require that all photographers remain at least six feet behind the end lines. The photo zones are appropriately marked on the Rupp Arena floor. Because of space demands, shooting on the press row sideline is permitted at Rupp Arena with the game officials determining the boundaries (because various officials have different "do's and don'ts' " regarding photographers on the side). Photographers are not permitted on the scorer's table and bench side of the floor. Photographers are prohibited in the bench area unless prior permission has been obtained from Brad Davis.

MEDIA INFORMATION

MEDIA ROOM — The media room is located in the Rupp Arena dressing room area, behind the visitor's bench. Working facilities, with necessary outlets and a limited number of telephones, are available. A pre-game meal will be served. Drinks will be available at halftime and after the game.

MEDIA SERVICES — The University of Kentucky uses the sophisticated "Final III" computer statistics system, which was used during the NCAA Final Four at Rupp Arena last spring. Working media will be provided with the following:

KENTUCKY LOCKER ROOM POLICY — After the 10-minute cooling-off period, the UK locker room wil be open to all members of the media for a **15-minute period.** After this time, the locker room wil be closed to the media so the players can shower. Please keep in mind that for much of the 15 minutes, Coach Sutton and two players will be in the interview room. Media representatives wishing to interview players NOT in the interview room are advised to go to the locker room, since typed quotes will be available from the remarks made in the interview room.


WEEKLY MEDIA LUNCHEON — Coach Eddie Sutton will conduct a weekly news conference/luncheon at the Wildcat Lodge. The exact schedule will be available at the Sports Information Office.



RADIO BROADCASTS — Broadcasting rights to UK games are assigned exclusively to the UK Network. One reciprocal rights fee waiver is guaranteed opponent schools visiting Lexington. Any additional stations must clear through UK Director of Broadcasting Keith Elkins (606-257-5633).

TELEPHONES — A limited number of telephones are available in the Rupp Arena Media room. Newspapers and radio stations desiring their own private lines, to be installed either on press row or in the media room, should contact Wayne Bentley at General Telephone (606-223-7144).

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS — An interview room is located adjacent to the media room. After the 10-minute cooling-off period, Coach Eddie Sutton and two Wildcat players will be brought to the interview room. The visiting coach will follow, if he is agreeable. The raised platform in the interview room is to be used by television photographers only. A "mult box" has been installed with both "line level" and "mic level" outputs. These are available for radio feeds also. Please do not place microphones on the podium. Lighting is provided and we ask that you do not use additional lighting.



PRACTICES — Media representatives are welcome at Wildcat practice sessions. Since practices are held at both Rupp Arena and Memorial Coliseum, it is advisable to call the sports information office to determine the practice site for a particular day.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS — We encourage you to interview our players. The best time to interview players is from 2:40 — 2:55 p.m. Please arrange lengthy, feature-type interviews through the sports information office. All telephone interviews must also be arranged through the sports information office, in compliance with NCAA regulations.

ATHLETICS DIRECTOR

CLIFF HAGAN

Cliff Hagan began his 10th year as University of Kentucky athletics director on July 1, 1985, overseeing a Wildcat program that is undergoing an ambitious program of planning, construction and completion. Under Hagan, a 1954 Kentucky graduate and one of the greatest basketball players ever at UK, projects totalling approximately \$13 million have been either completed or begun in the last year.

The major projects underway include:

- — A \$5.7 million swimming complex to be named after former Wildcat athletics director Harry C. Lancaster.

- A \$5.5 million football training facility, to be built adjacent to the Shively Sports Center. The project has received a \$1 million gift from Ohio businessman Ervin J. Nutter and will bear his name.

• — A new four-court indoor tennis facility, being built at a cost of nearly \$600,000.

Other projects completed include:

• — A beautiful recruiting-entertaining lounge, "The Wildcat Den," at the Football Offices complex at Commonwealth Stadium.

- Replacement of 120 yards of artificial turf and the addition of 40 more yards of turf on one of the football practice fields at Shively Sports Center at a cost of \$500,000.

• - New dressing facilities for women at Shively Sports Center.

• — The computerization of the ticket and sports information offices with "state-of-the-art" equipment.

On the "games" side of the ledger, highlights last school year included a second straight bowl appearance for the football team and advancement to the "Final 16" of the NCAA Tournament by the basketball team.

The 1985 NCAA Final Four basketball championship held at Rupp Arena under UK sponsorship was declared a smashing success, but there was no rest for the UK athletic administration as preparations for next spring's SEC Basketball Tournament and NCAA Women's Final Four have begun. Both will be held at Rupp Arena.

On the personal side, Hagan received a distinguished honor last year when the Boys Club of America National Awards Committee selected him as recipient of the prestigious "Boys Club Medallion," which is a means of recognizing individuals who have rendered, "unusally devoted service to a Boys Club over a considerable period of time.'






NEW ARTIFICIAL TURF PRACTICE FIELD WITH BASEBALL COMPLEX IN BACKGROUND

EDDIE SUTTON

University of Kentucky Basketball Coach

Little did Eddie Sutton know that one day he would become the head coach at one of those schools he dreamed about - the University of Kentucky. Now, 41 years later, Sutton works for what he calls, "the greatest basketball school in the country.'

The date was April 2, 1985. The place was the 18th floor of the Patterson Office Tower on the University of Kentucky campus. The occasion was a rare one, for only twice in the previous 55 vears had UK named a new head basketball coach — once in 1930 when a young man named Adolph Rupp was chosen, and

the world — and the game has allowed me to do that - people talk about Kentucky basketball."

It was that type of tradition that lured Sutton away from the University of Arkansas, where in 11 years Sutton had taken the Razorbacks from the basement of the Southwest Conference to a perennial national power.

A native of Bucklin, Kansas, Sutton left his mark at the Fayetteville, Ark., school. After taking the Arkansas job in 1974, Sutton immediately worked wonders, guiding his first two teams to 17-9 and 19-9 records. Sutton got the Razorbacks in the NCAA

When he wasn't milking the cows, or working in the wheat fields, or cutting a load of hickory for the woodbox in the kitchen, or fishing for catfish down on the river, 8-year-old Eddie Sutton was in front of the old cabinet radio his family kept in the corner of the living room.

'We didn't have a TV set, or an indoor bathroom, but we had that old radio," recalled Sutton. "I remember listening to Fibber McGee, Amos and Andy and The Shadow.'

But most of all he remembered listening to Kansas and Kentucky basketball games.

"I grew up listening to Dr. Allen's teams (at Kansas) and Mr. (Adolph) Rupp's teams (at Kentucky). I used to pretend I was out there, playing for Coach Allen and Mr. Rupp, and being somebody.

"I knew one day, Lord willing, I was going to be a basketball coach."

Coach of the Year honors have been frequent. He has won national honors twice (1977 and 1978) and has been named the SWC's top coach four times.

Sutton created a monster in the Ozarks. His teams were nearly impossible to defeat at Barnhill Arena, Arkansas' oncampus home. Under Sutton's direction, the Hogs were 121-8 at Barnhill, a stunning percentage of .932. Razorback games have been sold out before the season begins for the last eight years and tickets to Arkansas' basketball games have become nearly impossible for non-season ticket holders to secure.

One of Sutton's finest coaching jobs came this past season when his youngest team challenged a schedule ranked 12th-toughest in the country by the NCAA and still managed 22 victories. The Hogs accomplished this feat despite having only two seniors and one junior on the squad. It came in 1970, when he accepted marked the ninth consecutive the head coaching job at year the Razorbacks won at least Creighton University. By 1974,

Sutton learned his trade as a player, then graduate assistant coach for the legendary Henry Iba at Oklahoma State. He graduated from OSU in 1958 and received his master's degree from the school in 1959.

His first coaching job came at Tulsa (Okla.) Central High School, where he built a 119-51 record in six years. In 1967, he took over at Southern Idaho Junior College,

a school that had never fielded a basketball team before. In three short years, Sutton compiled a remarkable 83-14 record.

His first major college test 21 games — another SWC mark. Sutton had built a powerhouse —

a team with a 23-6 record and ranked 14th in the polls. He spent five years at Creighton, compiling an 82-50 record and establishing himself as one of the finest young coaches in the game, before moving on to Arkansas for the 1974-75 sea-

In 25 years of coaching high school, junior college and college teams, Sutton has a record of 545-190. His major college record is 342-125.

Another tribute to Sutton's success is the number of head coaches he has turned out. Gene Keady (Purdue), Pat Foster (Lamar) and Bill Brown (California State-Sacramento) are head coaches who were one-time Sutton assistants at Arkansas.

Off the court, Eddie Sutton has always emphasized discipline and academics. Nearly 90 percent of the players who completed four years at Arkansas have earned degrees. He develops close relationships with his players, evidenced by the fact that players frequently stop by his office to chat. His open-door policy makes him accessible to those around him and hardly a day goes

by that a former player doesn't call to talk with Sutton.


On the court, Sutton's success has been built on what he calls the "three D's — dedication, discipline and defense." The Razorbacks have annually ranked as one of the nation's top defensive teams, drawing raves for their suffocating style of man-to-man defense. Sutton says the biggest difference Wildcat fans will notice on the court will be his teams' reliance on an aggressive man-to-man defense 90 percent of the time.

Offensively, Sutton teams have ranked as the best in the nation in field goal shooting in recent years. Arkansas' field goal shooting of 54 percent over the last 10

years ranks as the best in the country.

In his 11 years at Arkansas, Sutton has produced seven players who have been drafted by NBA teams. Sidney Moncrief, Ron Brewer, Alvin Robertson, Darrell Walker, Tony Brown and Scott Hastings have all enjoyed successful pro careers, while Joe Kleine, a senior on last season's Razorback team, was a firstround draft choice by Sacramento.

A nationally-known clinician and speaker, Sutton is also very active in various professional organizations. He has been a member of the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee and currently serves on the Board of Directors of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC), as well as the Board of Directors of the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.





Sutton is also active in various charity organizations.

The 49-year-old Sutton and his wife, Patsy, have three sons, Stephen, 20, Sean, 17, and Scott, 15

For ten seasons now, Hamilton has been a solid part of Kentucky's tremendous success and his value as a productive recruiter and defensive coaching whiz has not gone unnoticed.

Hamilton came to Kentucky in July, 1974, after serving three years as an assistant coach at Austin Peay. Since joining the Kentucky staff, Hamilton has helped coach the Wildcats to a 238-74 record. In addition, the Cats have won the NCAA championship, the NIT championship and six SEC titles in that time. Kentucky has been to a post-season tournament each year Hamilton has been on the staff. In fact, in 13 years as a coach on the collegiate level, only one team he has been associated with, his first at Austin Peay, has not been involved in a post-season tournament.



James Dickey joined the Wildcat staff in April, 1985, shortly after his boss for four years at Arkansas, Eddie Sutton, was named as the Kentucky head coach. Having built a reputation as an outstanding instructor and recruiter, Dickey will join assistant coach Leonard Hamilton and Sutton in all phases of coaching, including recruiting and practice and game preparation.

Dickey joined the Arkansas staff in 1981-82 and spent two years as a part-time assistant before being elevated to full-time status for the last two seasons. Arkansas compiled a 96-30 record and won a Southwest Conference championship while Dickey was an assistant. The Razorbacks competed in the NCAA tournament each of his four years there.

Dickey attended Valley Springs High School in Valley Springs, Ark. He played basketball for three years and as a senior earned All-State honors. Dickey then went to the University of Central Arkansas in Conway, Ark., where he was a four-

year letterman and a three-year starter.

After graduating from Central Arkansas in 1976, Dickey spent one year as an assistant coach at Harding College in Searcy, Ark., while working on his Master's Degree. He then spent two years as head basketball coach at Harding Academy in Searcy and in 1978 was named district "Coach of the Year" after his team won its conference championship.

After his stint at Harding Academy, Dickey returned to Central Arkansas as an assistant coach and spent two years there before moving to

Arkansas University in 1981.


Doug Barnes is another newcomer to the Wildcat staff, having joined the ranks at UK in August, 1985. His primary responsibilities are in the areas of practice and game preparation and scouting opponents.

Barnes comes to UK after nine years as head coach at the University of Arkansas at Monticello. Barnes became UAM's seventh head coach in 1976 and guided the Mean Green to a deceptive 105-142 overall record during his tenure, while bringing respectability to a program that had long been the doormat of the Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference. Prior to Barnes' arrival, UAM had not enjoyed a winning season since 1963. After his arrival, UAM made five appearances in the N.A.I.A. District 17 playoffs and posted the best and third-best single season records in school history, winning 21 games in 1981-82 and 18 games in 1979-80.

A native of Duncan, Okla., Barnes was a three-sport standout in high school, earning honors in basketball, football and track. He then went to Oklahoma State, where he was a starting guard for the OSU freshman team in 1965 and played one year at the varsity level under the legendary Coach Henry Iba. He received a B.S. degree in banking and finance in 1968 and spent the next two years as a marketing representative for Exxon Corporation in Dallas, Tex.

Barnes served as a graduate assistant coach under John Rose at Arkansas State from 1971-74. He was an assistant coach and manager of Tucker Coliseum at Arkansas Tech University in 1975-76, before being named head coach at UAM in 1976.

The 39-year-old Barnes is single.





WAYNE BREEDEN ASSISTANT COACH

After two years as a graduate assistant, Wayne Breeden enters his third year on the UK staff as a volunteer assistant. The former Wildcat manager earned a B.A. degree from the University in 1983 and completed his Masters' in 1985. Breeden has served on the basketball staff of the National Sports Festival in 1982, 83 and 85. He served on the staff of the 1984 Olympic Basketball Trials and has also conducted clinics in South America.



W.B. "BILL" KEIGHTLEY EQUIPMENT MANAGER

Affectionately known as "Mr. Wildcat," Bill Keightley has been associated with the Wildcat basketball program since 1962. Keightley graduated from Kavanaugh High School in Lawrenceburg, Ky. Now a mail-carrier for the U.S. Postal Service, he is married to the former Hazel Robinson of Lawrenceburg. They have a daughter, Karen, a student at UK.



WALT McCOMBS ASSISTANT TRAINER

Walt McCombs is the trainer assigned to basketball on a daily basis. He joined the UK staff in 1972 and left in 1974 for a three-year stint at Clemson. Walt rejoined the Wildcat staff in 1977. A native of Belton, S.C., he is a 1971 graduate of The Citadel. He has two children, Crystal and Emily.

1985-86 KENTUCKY BASKETBALL PROSPECTUS



University of Kentucky basketball heads into a new era in 1985-86, as the Wildcats have a new head coach for only the third time in 55 years. Eddie Sutton was named the new UK coach April 2, 1985, succeeding Coach Joe B. Hall, who retired after 13 years at the helm. Hall, of course, succeeded the legendary Adolph Rupp, who spent 42 years at Kentucky.

Sutton brings to Lexington credentials as one of the nation's outstanding coaches. The 49-year-old Kansas native comes to Kentucky after 11 years at Arkansas, where he guided the Razorbacks to nine straight NCAA tournament berths. Only North Carolina can match that record.

At Arkansas, Sutton took his sport from the basement of the Southwest Conference to a state-wide phenomenon and a spot among the national elite. His record at Arkansas was 260-75, an average of 23.6 victories a season.

A 1958 graduate of Oklahoma State, Sutton played basketball under the legendary Henry Iba. While coaching at Tulsa Central High School, Creighton and Arkansas, Sutton developed his "Three D's of success — dedication, discipline and defense."

"I don't think you'll see much difference in the way we'll play and the way Kentucky teams of the last few years have played," says Sutton. "We emphasize discipline and a tough man-to-man defense. We will probably play more man-to-man than the last few Kentucky teams have."

Sutton will have a solid corps of returning players, headed by four starters from last year's 18-13 team that advanced to the "Final 16" of the NCAA tournament. Only 6-9 center Bret Bearup (6.3 ppg, 5.6rpg) will be missing from the starting five. The Centerport, N.Y., native graduated from UK this spring with a degree in business administration. Also gone is 6-5 guard/ forward Troy McKinley (4.6 ppg), known for his long-range jumpers. McKinley earned his degree in public relations.

Bearup and McKinley represent a loss of 10.9 points a game in offensive output, a stark contrast to the year before, when four starters averaging 43.2 points a game were lost from the 1983-84 Final Four team.

Heading the list of returnees is All-America forward Kenny Walker. The 6-8 senior from Roberta, Ga., led the Southeastern Conference in both scoring (22.9 ppg) and rebounding (10.2 rpg) last season, becoming the first player since Tennessee's Bernard King in 1977 to lead the league in both categories. Walker was named to nearly every All-America team last year and has already been selected for several pre-season All-

Joining Walker in the front court will be 6-7 junior forward Winston Bennett. The Louisville, Ky., product averaged 7.2 points and 5.3 rebounds a game last season.

At guard, the Wildcats return 6-1 senior Roger Harden (5.3 ppg) and sophomore Ed Davender (8.5 ppg). Harden was UK's playmaker last season, leading the team in assists with 142. Davender improved steadily as the season progressed and ended up starting in 12 games.

Other returnees include guards James Blackmon (6-2, Jr., 5.4 ppg), Paul Andrews (6-2, Jr., 2.1 ppg) and Leroy Byrd (5-5, Sr., 0.2 ppg). Blackmon started 18 games as a sophomore last season while Andrews got the starting nod in four games early in the year.

Also back are forwards Richard Madison (6-6, So., 5.1 ppg), Cedric Jenkins (6-9, So., 0.7 ppg) and Todd Ziegler (6-7, So., 0.2 ppg). Madison made steady improvement during the season be-

fore a knee injury kept him out of action for seven games. He rebounded from the injury and played well in the last several games of the year.

Sophomore Robert Lock (1.1 ppg, 2.0 rpg) is the early front-runner to replace Bearup at the center position. The 6-10 Reedley, Calif., product started in four games early last season while several veterans were sidelined with injuries.

The only newcomer to the squad will be 6-7 forward/center Irving Thomas of Carol City High School in Miami, Fla. Thomas earned prep All-America honors last season, averaging 18.6 points and 14.5 rebounds a game in leading the Chiefs to a 38-1 record and Florida's 4A state title. Thomas was heavily recruited and narrowed his list to Kentucky, Florida, Georgetown, UCLA and North Carolina before signing with the Wildcats during the early signing period last November. UK did not sign anyone during the spring signing period.

"As I watch the films of last season, I'm impressed with the talent level we'll have," says Eddie Sutton. "I have also noticed

how well-schooled they are in the fundamentals of basketball. That is something I've always stressed.

"We'll have a good basketball team. We face a tough schedule but I've always enjoyed the challenge of playing the top teams. I'm looking forward to it.


"It will be nice to have one of the premier players in the country in Kenny Walker playing for



us. He is truly one of the most exciting players I've ever seen."

The Wildcats will open the season at Rupp Arena Nov. 22 against Northwestern State of Louisiana. After a trip to Hawaii, the Wildcats return for their usual rugged December non-conference schedule, followed by the 18-game Southeastern Conference double round-robin slate.

Kentucky heads into the season as the winningest team in college basketball. Through the years, the Wildcats have won 1,376 games, while losing only 436. That's a winning percentage of 75.9. The Wildcats currently sport the longest string of nonlosing seasons in the country, having not been on the minus side of the ledger in 57 years.





QUOTING EDDIE SUTTON

ON COMING TO KENTUCKY:

Kentucky is the ultimate coaching position in college basketball. In my opinion, this is the ultimate basketball coaching position in the world. Coaching here is the realization of a dream; and 27 years of coaching high school, junior college and major college has allowed me to reach that dream.

Kentucky had a basketball tradition even before some schools started playing basketball. We have the greatest, most knowledgeable fans in the world. Some people ask me about the pressure that the fans put on a coach here, but I'll tell you one thing — that's a good pressure. I'd much rather be someplace where people care about basketball rather than being apathetic about it. The big pressures come when there is no one in the stands and no one cares what you are doing.

The tradition and reputation of Kentucky basketball extends around the world. I've traveled through Europe, China, Japan and South America as an ambassador for basketball and when those people think about U.S. basketball, they think about Kentucky.

If you don't like Lexington, you don't like living. The hospitality afforded to my family and me has been great. The natural beauty of this area is breathtaking. We had a chance to travel all over the state last summer, and every region is different, yet beautiful.

Lexington, to me, is just the rightsized city — not too big, but big enough that it provides plenty of cultural opportunities. But I guess the best part is the people. They're what makes this area so special.

NEW RULES IN COLLEGE BASKETBALL:

As a member of the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee, I voted for the 45-second shot clock. After using it for several years in the Southwest Conference, I can say that it does not affect the game except for the "farce" game — where the score is 16-12 or something similar. No one wants that type of game. Well, with the 45-second clock, you won't see them. Now, I would oppose a 24-or-30-second clock, because you take away coaching in that situation, but 45 seconds is a long time. The clock went off only one time in the years we used it in the SWC.

College basketball is at an all-time



high in popularity and I am opposed to tinkering with the rules too much. However, I feel the clock is a positive step forward and improves the game.

HIS ROLE WITH OTHER COACHES:

As third vice-president of the NABC (National Association of Basketball Coaches), I guess I feel added pressure to promote harmony among coaches. The coaching fraternity is just that — a fraternity. You go after each other for that two hour period when you're playing, but when you are off the court I strongly feel you should do your best to get along with other coaches.

When I first got into the business 27 years ago, there was a much warmer feeling among coaches. Now, with the added pressures to win and the scars from recruiting wars, there doesn't seem to be the camaraderie that once existed. I'd like to get back to that.

PROBLEMS IN COLLEGE BASKETBALL:

Winning at all costs is our biggest problem. Some institutions put so much pressure on a coach that he resorts to

violating NCAA rules in order to win. And by institutions, I mean everyone — alumni, administration, fans. I know some honest coaches who have become dishonest in order to keep their jobs.

If the NCAA would be realistic in their approach to rules, 95 percent of all cheating would be eliminated. I'm talking about the "nickel and dime" rules that have little, if anything to do with keeping college athletics clean. Years ago you could give a player \$15 a month for laundry money. A lot of people share my view that we should once again provide our student-athletes with spending money — perhaps \$50 or \$75 a month.

We have made advancements in recent years by ruling that student-athletes can receive Pell Grants.

You'll never eliminate what I call the "baracudas" — the big-time cheaters. You have dishonest people in every profession. They're always going to be there, but I truly don't think there are very many in college athletics.

Other problems we are facing include drugs and gambling. I always invite an FBI agent and doctor to explain to our players what the consequences are of these vices.

I don't like to see newspapers print

the point spreads. As a member of the NABC Board, we have tried to discourage newspapers from printing the spreads, but haven't gotten anywhere.

And, of course, there is the crisis of academics. I applaud the latest legislation by the NCAA to strengthen academic requirements for eligibility. That has been very much needed. Fortunately, we have an excellent record here at UK and we have had a great record at Arkansas. Our graduation rates are in the 80-90 percent range, and we're very proud of that. I may be old-fashioned, but I still think of myself as an educator and teacher first and foremost.

WHAT HE EXPECTS OF HIS PLAYERS:

I expect our players to be great representatives of their families, the basketball program, the University and the state of Kentucky. There probably aren't any athletes in the United States with any higher visibility than Uk basketball players.

They have an opportunity to be great examples to young people and they can also be bad examples. We try to emphasize how important it is for them to set a good example and be good role models for other young people. It is my responsibility to make sure they understand that.

On the court, all I ask for is their best. If you do your best and don't win, you can still hold your head high.

STRATEGIES IN BASKETBALL:

Most strategy takes place long before the game is played. That's when games are won or lost — during your pre-season drills and during your practice sessions. That's when you teach your players your system and get them ready for what happens in a game.

Once a game begins, you have to make adjustments. I've always considered myself a good bench coach, but much of that preparation takes place before. You really have to know your opponent and know what their tendencies are.

PHILOSOPHY OF BASKETBALL:

It all comes down to what I call the "Three D's — Dedication, Discipline and Defense."

Everyone has desire to do well, but you have to have dedication. You have to pay the price to do well. You can't just wish you are good, you have to work at it and be dedicated to the task.

I've never known a successful person in any walk of life who hasn't been disciplined. Discipline is necessary, whether

you are a basketball player or a businessman. I am referring to an internal discipline — discipline of time, discipline of behavior, things like that.

And finally, there is not a team sport on any level that wins consistently without good, solid defense. That's the stabilizing force in your program. Defense is more consistent than offense. You have bad shooting nights, but defense can remain consistent.

Of course, there are other aspects of basketball that are important, such as fundamentals, team play and 100 percent effort. It's all important to build a good, solid program.

THE 85-86 WILDCATS:

Well, it's very difficult to evaluate them until I get on the floor with this group. We've looked at the film from last year and I'll say this — Coach Hall did not leave the cupboard bare. We have some talent to work with.

If everyone stays healthy, we should have a very competitive team. Again, though, it's hard for me to judge just how well we'll do because I'm not that familiar with the Southeastern Conference.

I have been very impressed with our young men — not only as players, but as people as well. They are a delightful group of young people to be around.

CHANGES FROM UK TEAMS OF PAST:

Our philosophy of basketball is not that much different from what our fans are used to. We'll probably play more man-to-man defense and we'll probably press more than in the past. I'm sure you will see more fast-break action, but you won't see any drastic changes.

HIS GOALS FOR THE KENTUCKY PROGRAM:

Every year, I meet with the seniors and it's been my experience that most seniors have the same goals:

Number one — win the conference. This allows you to get into the NCAA tournament, which can lead to goal number two — win the national championship. If you go in the NCAA enough times, you'll win it eventually. Programs like North Carolina were in the NCAA tournament many, many times before winning the national title.


Another goal is to win at least 20 games each year. That seems to be a benchmark that means you've had a good season — especially when you are in a conference as good as the SEC.

Basically, what I hope to do is take the tradition provided by Mr. Rupp and enhanced by Coach Hall and build on that. Our future here at Kentucky is very, very bright.





1986 SEC BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

The Southeastern Conference basketball tournament will return to Rupp Arena, March 5-8, 1986. Rupp Arena was the site of the 1982 league tournament, the most successful post-season event since the renewal in 1979. The winner will represent the SEC at the NCAA tournament. The SEC champion is decided by the regular-season 18-game round-

The tournament consists of five sessions. Pairings are based on the final regular-season conference standings, the teams being seeded by their order of finish.


The seventh through tenth seeds play in the first round Wednesday, March 5. The two winners advance to the second round, joining the other six teams Thursday. The second round includes an afternoon session and an evening session.

The four winners play in the semifinals Friday night, with the championship game scheduled for Saturday afternoon, March 8. NBC-TV will televise the finals live across the nation

The basketball tournament was the first championship event of the 53-year-old Southeastern Conference. The first two were held in Atlanta, Kentucky winning the first and Alabama the second. No tourney was held in 1935, but it was renewed and hosted in Knoxville the next two years. It went to Baton Rouge in 1938 and back to Knoxville for two more years before moving to Louisville, where it stayed until 1952.

Birmingham was the tournament site from 1979 to 1981, where Tennessee, LSU and Ole Miss captured the crown. In 1982 the tournament was held in Lexington with Alabama winning. Georgia won the 1983 affair in Birmingham and Kentucky took it in 1984 in Nashville. Auburn captured the title last season in Birmingham, becoming the seventh different champion in the seven years since the tournament was

Overall, Kentucky has dominated, winning 14 titles. Tennessee has won four; Alabama two, Vanderbilt, LSU, Ole Miss, Georgia Tech, Auburn and Georgia one each.

In the seven years since the tournament was renewed, Wildcat players have been the leading scorers of the event on three occasions: 1979 (Kyle Macy); 1982 (Dirk Minniefield) and 1984 (Melvin Turpin).

In the history of the tournament, Kentucky holds 39 individual or team records.

The largest crowd to ever watch an SEC tournament game

was 21,981, which showed up at the championship game between Alabama and Kentucky at Rupp Arena in 1982.

The University of Kentucky has built an impressive record playing at Freedom Hall in Louisville over the years. The Wildcats have won nine SEC Tournament titles and defeated some of the best teams from around the country before Wildcat fans in Louisville.

Kentucky began playing in Louisville in 1936 when the Cats lost to Notre Dame, 41-28. In fact, the Cats under Adolph Rupp lost the first three games they ever played in Louisville and all three were to the Fighting Irish. However, since that time the Wildcats have been devastating and have rolled up an 86-20 record in Louisville. Broken down, the Wildcats are 41-15 in regular season play, 43-3 in SEC Tournament play which was held in Louisville from 1941-52, and 2-2 in post-season competition.

Kentucky's most impressive string of victories in Louisville came when the Cats won 32 straight games between 1946 and 1951. Only seven of the 22 teams Kentucky has faced in the 105 games in Louisville have been able to knock off the Cats. The longest running series was with Notre Dame with the Wildcats holding a 23-9 advantage. The Cats hold a 4-0 advantage over DePaul in Louisville and are 3-0 against Kansas in Freedom Hall.



While most schools have elaborate boosters groups which raise cash for the various athletic programs, the Committee of 101 is a service-oriented group which makes no direct cash contribution to UK. The organization, which has the motto, "dedicated to the support of Kentucky basketball," sponsors the annual "Get-Acquainted Pre-Season Banquet," which has become a Kentucky tradition. The banquet kicks off the season with a sold out crowd of about 800 on hand. The Committee also sponsors the post-season awards banquet.

The group's activities extend to non-UK related efforts, including raising money for such charities as Cardinal Hill Hospital, Big Brothers/Sisters and the Bluegrass Boys' Ranch.

The most visible work the Committee does is ushering at Wildcat home football and basketball games, as well as events like the 1982 SEC tournament, the 1984 Mideast Regional and the 1985 Final Four. In an effort to promote Kentucky basketball, the Committee produced an album titled, 'Great Moments in Kentucky Basketball.'

The Committee of 101 was born in 1966 when 101 employees of IBM's Lexington plant each gave 25 cents to send a telegram to the late Coach Adolph Rupp at every away game the Wildcats played that season.

From those modest beginnings, the club grew into the service organization it is today, which includes 250 members. Since membership is limited to that number, a waiting list for people wishing to become involved is kept. Persons interested in joining the Committee should write to:





Dues are only \$10 a year but each member is required to "roll up his sleeves and go to work," according to Committee president Van Florence. "We consider ourselves a working organization. We host the post-game receptions at the Wildcat Lodge, sell programs and things like that. Any time manpower is needed in UK athletics, we're there.'

Other officers of the Committee include Vice-President Waddill Woolums, Treasurer John Folz and Secretary Ron Stanfield. The Committee is governed by a 10-member board and meets once a month during the athletic seasons.







RUPP ARENA

HOME OF THE WILDCATS

Rupp Arena affords the University of Kentucky its third basketball home in 61 years, and with its 23,000-seat capacity, brings a distinction as the nation's largest basketball facility. The Wildcats are celebrating their 10th season in the arena in 1985-86.

An awesome structure in sight and scope, the arena is divided in two seating areas — the lower level features 10,000 fully cushioned, theater seats in block coloring of blue, red, orange and purple, offering a spectacular splash of color — and an upper level of 13,000 seats on epoxy-coated metal bleachers. The latter can be visually isolated to provide a more natural setting for small shows.

Built by the city of Lexington, the arena is named in honor of Kentucky's legendary former coach, Adolph Rupp, and is the major portion of \$53 million Lexington Center complex which includes a convention-exhibition hall, a 50-store trilevel enclosed shopping mall, a luxury Hyatt Regency Hotel, and a block away, the historic 1,200 seat Lexington Opera House, which was recently renovated.

The arena is fully air-conditioned, equipped with a specially designed, high quality sound system appropriately named "Big Bertha," and complete lighting for events and color television coverage. Special attention has been paid to such facilities as dressing rooms, service entrances and storage areas.

The Wildcats command an exclusive dressing room 365 days a year, while other facilities include six team size and eight smaller units.

The portable basketball court, which lies on a concrete sub-flooring 118' beneath the ceiling, is 60' x 120' and is made of a light shade of northern maple trimmed in Kentucky blue. The floor was specially designed to convert from the 94' length required for college and professional basketball to the 84' length for high school by simply removing two panels.

Four 35' x 4' custom-made scoreboards are placed so spectators can see at least three of the boards from any seat in the arena

THE WILDCATS AT HOME

Although Kentucky lost three regular-season games at Rupp Arena last year for the first time since the arena opened in 1976-77, the Wildcats still enjoy one of the best home-court records in the country. In nine years in the largest built-for-basketball arena in the country, the Wildcats have racked up a 123-14 record for a winning percentage of 89.8.

Kentucky's formidable home-court advantage has been a trademark through the years. Before moving to Rupp in 1976-77, UK forged out enviable records in Memorial Coliseum, and Alumni Gym.

JOE HALL YEARS

Joe B. Hall







Thirteen years ago, the University of Kentucky basketball program was at an impasse. The man who had led the program for 42 years, the legendary Adolph Rupp, was retiring. A vital search to find the man to carry on the torch ensued.

History will show that Joe B. Hall was unquestionably the right

In the past 13 years, Hall not only maintained Kentucky's reputation, he embellished it as he averaged more wins per season than Rupp. With the tremendous parity in college basketball over the last 13 years, Hall's record is indeed remarkable. The Wildcats made 10 trips to the NCAA Tournament, earned three visits to the Final Four and won an NCAA title. Hall produced a 20-9 record in the pressure-packed NCAA Tournament.

Last season, Hall faced one of his most difficult assignments ever. The Wildcats lost four starters off the 1984 NCAA Final Four squad. For most teams, that would have doomed the season. However, by the end of the year, Kentucky and Coach Hall had proved that, above all, they were winners.

In the NCAA Tournament, the Cats knocked off Washington, the Pac-10 champion, in the first round. In the second round, Nevada-Las Vegas fell to the Cats in a torrid shootout. Only a Chris Mullin finger that found its way into Kenny Walker's eye and a talented group of St. John's Redmen prevented the Cats from taking another step toward the Final Four.

But, Kentucky and Joe Hall had made a dramatic statement that nobody in the basketball world missed. Kentucky basketball is still one of the elite programs in the competitive world of collegiate basketball.

Over the past 13 years, parity in college basketball is registered by the fact that 31 different teams have reached the NCAA Final Four. In that time, only two schools made more visits than Kentucky.

JOE HALL YEARS

In the SEC, the Wildcats dominated a league that now ranks among the nation's elite. After the demanding 18-game conference schedule, Kentucky emerged from the smoke as the conference champion eight times in Hall's 13 years.

oy ns Hall's 13-year aggregate record as head coach was an outstanding 297-100, 74.8 winning percentage. He averaged 22.8 wins per season. Hall sat high atop the list of active SEC coaches in conference victories, winning percentage in conference games, and overall career winning percentage when he announced his retirement in March.

The highlight of his career was the three Final Four berths his teams accumulated. His 1977-78 squad, which featured Kyle Macy, Jack Givens, Rick Robey, and Mike Phillips, captured the coveted NCAA title and his 1975-76 team won the NIT championship. He was named the "National Coach-of-the-Year" in 1978 and garnered the SEC Coach-of-the-Year award four times in the last nine years.

Through the years, the University of Kentucky basketball program has produced one of the top graduation rates in the country. In the last decade, more than 80 percent of the players who have completed their eligibility at UK have earned a degree. Coach Eddie Sutton brings with him the same dedication to the importance of earning a degree. During his tenure at Arkansas, 90 percent of those players who completed their eligibility with the Razorbacks earned a de-

In the last seven years, two Wildcat basketball players have been awarded the Sullivan Medallion. The Sullivan Medallion is the highest single honor that can be received by a UK student. Since 1977, the award has been presented to a male and female student who most exemplifies the characteristics of heart, mind and conduct as evidence of a spirit of love for and helpfulness to other men and women. The Wildcats honored recently were Jack Givens (1978) and Kyle Macy (1980). Other Wildcat basketball players who have been awarded the Medallion are Gayle Mohney (1928), George Skinner (1933) and James Line (1951).





KENTUCKY BASKETBALL — THE TRADITION

The dull thump-thumping of a basketball on a dirt, backyard court. Sneakers squeaking on a gym floor in the dead of summer. An automobile parked in just the right spot, its radio straining to bring in a distant signal. The deafening roar of 23,000 voices screaming their hearts out to somehow help their young, blue-and-white clad heroes pull out another victory. Five extraordinary athletes racing for the easy two points at the end of a trademark fast break. A veritable parade of former All-Americans returning to honor their old coach. Kentucky basketball. Not just basketball, Kentucky basketball.

No other college has won as many basketball games as the University of Kentucky. Likely as not, none ever will. The count now stands at 1,376 games, and there is no end in sight. Joe B. Hall coached the Wildcats to 297 victories in his 13 years. His predecessor, the legendary Adolph Rupp, compiled more victories than any coach in the history of college basketball — 880. Rupp took a good basketball program and put it on a pedestal from which it never has fallen. Yes, it has lost its balance a time or two, but only temporarily.

Winning, then, is an evident characteristic of Kentucky basketball. Rupp demanded it. By example he taught Kentucky fans to demand it. Certainly this put pressure on Joe Hall when he succeeded a legend, but Hall would have

had it no other way. He and his players responded with the SEC championship his first year, a trip to the NCAA finals his third and the national championship in his sixth season.

There is something else, though, that comes along with the wins and trophies. It is a spirit that has infected practically all of Kentucky. Indeed, the term "Kentucky basketball" refers as much to the state as to the school. With all due respect to the excellent programs at Louisville, Western Kentucky and other fine schools in the state, there is nothing quite like Kentucky basketball. You have to see it to believe it.

From the Wildcat Legacy

NOTEBOOKING THE TRADITION

Members of the first University of Kentucky basketball team (1903) chipped in a total of \$3 and purchased their own ball. They also bought their own shoes and uniforms. Walter H. Mustaine, new director of the Department of Physical Culture at the University, threw out the ball, told the boys to elect a captain and start playing. They played their first game Feb. 6, 1903, losing to Georgetown College, 15-6, in Lexington.

✓ Early basketball games at the University of Kentucky, then known as State College, were played on the gym floor in Barker Hall, which, in 1903, was a new three-story structure with broad lower wings on each side. The south wing housed what since has become known as Buell Armory, where the cadets drilled on a dirt floor. In the other wing was a shiny new gymnasium, described as a "splendid room with a ground floor, an elevated running track and all the apparatus necessary for complete gymnastics training."



John Maurer, University of Kentucky basketball coach during the 1927-28, 1928-29, and 1929-30 seasons.

played halfback at the University of Illinois in the same backfield with the immortal Red Grange and was a teammate of All-American guard Bernie Shively, who later became UK's athletic director. In basketball, Maurer was an All-Western Conference forward two years and captain of the Illinois team his senior year.

Basil Hayden, who became the University of Kentucky's first basketball All-American in 1921, coached the Wildcats during the 1926-27 season, becoming the first UK alumnus to return as coach. Forty-six years later, Joe B. Hall, who was on the 1948-49 UK squad, became the second alumnus coach of UK.

The University has had only two undefeated seasons in its illustrious basketball history. The first was 9-0 in 1911-12, and other 25-0 in 1953-54.

Kentucky currently sports the longest string of non-losing seasons in NCAA college basketball. The Wildcats have not had a losing season in 57 years. The last time Kentucky finished on the minus side of the ledger was in 1927, when UK was 3-13.

Stories of the dedication of Kentucky fans are legend in the Commonwealth, but none of UK's super fans can top the mark held by Lexington's Steve Rardin. When Kentucky bowed out of the NCAA tournament with a loss to St. John's last March, it marked the **501st** consecutive game that Rardin has watched in person.

The last time Rardin missed a Kentucky game (home or away) was on New Year's Eve, 1968, when UK lost to Wisconsin in Chicago. "My wife had a New Year's Eve party and wouldn't let me out of it," said Rardin. "We've made sure that hasn't happened again, though."








AMERICA'S "TOP DRAWER" PROGRAM

Quoting NBC commentator and former Marquette coach Al McGuire:

"My genuine opinion of the Kentucky basketball program is that there is only one and it is top drawer, Park Avenue, and that all other basketball programs in the country think they are, but they are not. The closest ones to get to it (Kentucky) are North Carolina, maybe Indiana and UCLA. But at Kentucky, basketball is a type of religion, such a fanatical obsession that they expect to be national champions each year, and they live and die with each ball game. One of the things that is so different about Kentucky is that they have more than 100 stations that the games are broadcast over, while most colleges that have three or four think they are the greatest thing since sliced bread. Kentucky puts SRO -23,000 people — in Rupp Arena; if they built an arena seating 50,000, there would still be a waiting list.

I'm not looking to throw a party for Kentucky, but that is how I feel. I think it's an honest appraisal because I've seen all the programs, touching them as a coach, a player, and as an NBC broadcast commentator the past four or five years. I have touched all the so-called capitals of basketball, but when it gets down to the short stroke the only true capital of basketball is Lexington. I even think there are times when the horses kinda bend down a little to the roundball."

KENTUCKY IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

Kentucky has made 30 appearances in the NCAA tournament — more than any other school. The Wildcats have played in college basketball's showcase for six straight years. That post-season tournament streak extends to 11 straight years when including the NIT.

Through the years, Kentucky has captured the NCAA title five times. Only UCLA can boast of more titles. Likewise, UCLA is the only school that can boast of more overall NCAA tournament victories (55) than UK (50). Through the years, Kentucky has racked up an impressive 50-27 NCAA tournament record.



WHO WERE?....

THE "FABULOUS FIVE"

One of the most frequently-asked questions tossed at basketball historians and sports authorities is, "Who were the 'Fabulous Five' of Kentucky?" The answer is Alex Groza (center), Ralph Beard and Kenny Rollins (guards), "Wah Wah" Jones and Cliff Barker (forwards). This famous 1947-48 team, captained by Rollins, won 36 and lost 3 while sweeping to Kentucky's first NCAA title. The 36 wins still stands in the NCAA record book as the most wins in a single season by any school. The Fabulous Five then went on to participate as a unit in the Olympic Games — helping the USA team capture the world championship. Rollins graduated after the 1948 season, but the remaining foursome continued to play havoc with collegiate basketball and copped another NCAA title for Kentucky in 1949 with a record of 32-2.

Kentucky won the game, 59-43. Of course, McGuire went on to coach at Marquette and is now an NBC-TV basketball color analyst, while Hagan now serves as the athletics director at UK.

THE FIDDLIN' FIVE

Before the 1957-58 season began, Coach Adolph Rupp commented about the upcoming season, "They might be pretty good barnyard fiddlers, but we have a Carnegie Hall schedule, and it will take violinists to play that competition."

When the Wildcats became notorious for, as Rupp put it, "fiddlin' around and fiddlin' around then finally pulling it out at the end," the team was tagged with the nickname "The Fiddlin' Five."

The "Fiddlin' Five," became Rupp's fourth national championship team when it defeated Elgin Baylor and Seattle in the title game at Louisville's Freedom Hall, 84-72. After the game, Rupp said, "Those boys certainly are not concert violinists, but they sure can fiddle."

RUPP'S RUNTS

The 1965-66 UK team earned this nickname because the biggest man among the Wildcat starting five was guard Tommy Kron, at 6-5. Center Thad Jaracz, who worked his way into the starting lineup, was also 6-5, while forwards Larry Conley and Pat Riley were 6-3 and guard Louie Dampier was 6-0.

The team became one of Rupp's favorites during his long tenure at Kentucky. Before the season started, Rupp commented, "I honestly believe that man-for-man we just might have in the making a better team than we had in 1958, when we won the national championship."

The Runts did indeed turn out to be one of the outstanding teams in UK's glorious history, compiling a sparkling 32-2 record, but coming just one game shy of the NCAA title when beaten by Texas Western (now UTEP) in the finals, 72-65.

RULES CHANGES FOR 1985-86 **COLLEGE BASKETBALL**

The 45-second shot clock tops the list of new rules in college basketball for 1985-86. The clock, in various forms, has been experimented with by different leagues for the last several years, and the NCAA Men's Basketball Rules Committee formally adopted the 45-second clock while meeting concurrently with the Final Four in Lexington last April.

According to Edward S. Steitz, secretary-rules editor of the committee, "We adopted precisely what had been researched by 25 conferences last season." Steitz also said that 68 percent of the coaches who responded to the rules committee's annual questionnaire favored implementation of the shot clock. The lack-of-action counts were eliminated with the adoption of the clock.

Other new rules in effect this season in-

Other new rules in effect this season in-

clude:

• when a player is fouled intentionally in the act of shooting and the field goal attempt is no good, the shooter will be awarded two free throws and the fouled team will be awarded the ball out of bounds.

• a line parallel to the end lines and six feet behing the end lines. Non-game personnel, such as photographers, will not be permitted between the restraining line and the end line.

• moveable backstops and goal supports in multi-purpose arenas will require positive securing. clude

• The Rules Committee also authorized experimentation for the 1985-86 season that in-

perimentation for the 1985-86 season that includes:
• a three-point field goal, with a line 19 feet, nine inches from the basket at the top of

feet, nine inches from the basket at the top of the key.

• the use of the rear-boundary arc that will decrease the area of the front court.

• use of a new rectangular backboard that will be six inches shorter at the bottom than the current models.

The Southeastern Conference will experiment with the smaller backboards during the coming season. The SEC has also voted to place the 45-second clock above floor level and, if possible, above the backboard.

Great strides toward academic excellence have characterized Dr. Singletary's presidency at UK. The Schools of Dentistry and Pharmacy consistently rank among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history, and mathematics have also gained nationwide attention while the UK Library now rates among the best in the Southeast.

Under Singletary's leadership, the University of Kentucky has also become a major research institution. The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center is an established leader in research on cancer and the aging. UK's agricultural college has provided important research in tobacco and equine diseases while other University research has focused on the field of coal and other energy sources.

Singletary's involvement in athletics is as impressive as his academic achievements. A former president of the Southeastern Conference, Dr. Singletary is a member of the NCAA Select Committee on Athletic Problems and Concerns in Higher Education. He is also chairman of the board of directors of the College Football Association.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the 16 years Singletary has been president, the University of Kentucky has grown in enrollment to about 23,000 students on its Lexington campus and more than 22,000 students in the University's 13 community colleges.

Recognition of his service to the University of Kentucky was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award, an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the

University A native of Gulfport, Miss., Singletary holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University. An accomplished administrator, Dr. Singletary served as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs for the University of Texas system prior to coming to Kentucky.

He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children, Bonnie, Scot, and Kendall.





UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY



The University of Kentucky's 716-acre campus is located south of downtown Lexington, Ky., which has a population of approximately one-quarter million people. There are approximately 200 buildings and other structures, walks, malls, gardens, playing fields, recreation space and parking areas on campus.

Academic Program

The University has 17 academic colleges: Arts and Sciences... Agriculture... Engineering... Business and Economics... Education... Home Economics... Library Science... Social Work... Architecture... Communications... Fine Arts... Law... Medicine... Dentistry... Nursing Allied Health Professions... Pharmacy.



Research

The University Library system contains approximately 1.7 million volumes and ranks 13th in the nation in microform holdings.

Among the major areas of research at the University are energy, engineering, medical (especially cancer research on the aging) and agriculture (especially in tobacco and equine).

Faculty

UK's faculty numbers 1,430 on the Lexington campus. Including a graduate family of approximately 950.

Student Body

Enrollment on UK's Lexington campus is more than 21,000. The students come from every county in Kentucky and 48 other states and the District of Columbia and 78 foreign countries.

Approximately 5,400 students live in UK's resident halls with another 1,156 students in UK's 25 fraternities and 17 sororities.



Alumni

The University has approximately 70,000 alumni around the world with more than 22,500 of them paid members of UK's Alumni Association. There are 65 alumni clubs across the nation, with 34 of them in Kentucky and 31 outside the state from California to New York.

Community Colleges

The Lexington campus also is headquarters for UK's Community College System. UK has 13 of these two-year colleges across the state with a current enrollment of 20,700 students.

Medical Center

UK's Albert B. Chandler Medical College has a wide range of programs in education and research. The five colleges — Medicine, Dentistry, Nursing, Pharmacy, and Allied Health Professions — have more than 2,000 students pursuing bachelor, master's and doctoral degrees in health-related fields.

The Medical Center also has a 470-bed University Hospital as part of its teaching and service programs.

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

Opportunities for UK students are not limited to the academic world. Involvement in the social and cultural aspects of University life also is important.

Recognizing this, the University provides the widest range of opportunities for personal and social development. If a student likes music, for instance, the Concert and Lecture Series brings outstanding soloists and symphonies on campus. There are chamber music concerts and hard rock concerts, impromptu

nis. An Olympic-size swimming pool, tennis courts, and several sports fields are available to students.

A similar variety of opportunities in drama, student government, athletics, service organizations, and recreation, is available.



The city of Lexington also offers UK students much in the way of entertainment. Lexington has a Philharmonic Orchestra, Chamber Music Society, the Lexington Singers, a Council of Arts, and a local Ballet Company. Movie theaters, international restaurants, coffee-houses, top-ranked acts of all types at fabulous Rupp Arena in the Lexington Center, historical landmarks, parks, and shopping centers, thoroughbred and harness racing, fine fishing in lakes, ponds and streams. all in easy distance of the UK campus.

Tailgating at football games, lining up for tickets to see nationally famous Wildcat teams in Rupp Arena or Lady Kats games in Memorial Coliseum, participating in the "Little Kentucky Derby," attending concerts at the downtown arena or in the 11,500-seat Coliseum on the UK campus, visiting the internationally famous Kentucky Horse Park . . . all just a few of the many attractions of Lexington and the University of Kentucky.


CENTER for ACADEMIC STUTORIAL SERVICES

WHAT IS CATS?

CATS is specifically the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services. It is a multipurpose academic facility. We are proud to be the first university in the nation to open an academic center for student-athletes. We, like all other universities, tell parents and recruits that the student-athlete's education is of utmost importance. The difference is that at the University of Kentucky we have made a sincere effort to provide the best possible educational environment, one that is conducive to academic success.



CATS provides our student-athletes with many advantages over the student-athletes at other universities. Examine the list below:






2. STUDY SKILLS — CATS provides us with an area where we can conduct organized weekly study skills classes. Many schools give their student-athletes a crash course in study skills. This is not enough. We have a Freshman Orientation Handbook and Study Skills workbook that each freshman student-athlete receives. The student-athletes attend organized classes in CATS, where they learn to utilize proven classroom study skills and university resources.



3. STUDY HALL — Most major colleges have required study hall for their freshmen student-athletes. These study halls are almost always in the evening after practice and are held in a campus facility borrowed by the Athletics Association. This is probably the time period least conducive to study or meeting with tutors.

The CATS facility not only provides us with our own large area for quiet study but is also




WHY CATS?

All major colleges spend a lot of time, effort and money recruiting student-athletes. All coaches and athletics administrations express concern for the recruit's education. Most schools use athletic funds freely to build better athletic facilities to attract better athletes. The problem is that those same schools would find it unbearable to spend those same large sums on an academic facilty. Our philosophy at the University of Kentucky is that colleges should be willing to provide funds not only to recruit the athletes and develop their physical talents, but also to afford the student-athlete every opportunity to succeed academically.

equipped with tutoring and small group rooms. Our center was specifically designed to meet the study needs of student-athletes.

The CATS Center is open all day and until 10:00 each night. This means that student-athletes at Kentucky are not restricted to attending required study hall virtually any time of day. Research has shown that the best time to study is immediately after class. Our center provides the student-athletes the opportunity to study at that time. This is definitely a CATS advantage.

4. TUTORING — We have tutors available for any subject. Our tutors come from the University and the community. We utilize the services of professors, graduate students and graduates who are well-qualified. We screen our tutors and although we hire many more than we need, we develop a core list of those most effective with our students. This core group works closely with us and thus we are able to monitor the progress of the student-athletes more closely. CATS Provides the proper atmosphere for tutoring. Sound proof rooms are available where the student and the tutor can meet. They don't have to worry about being bothered by others or bothering others while discussing important concepts. Our system is most conducive to learning.



5. READING COMPONENT — The reading program at CATS is designed to meet the needs of all student-athletes. Upon entering the University each student-athlete is given a reading test that measures that individual's strengths and weaknesses. Based upon the results, a student-athlete may be encouraged to participate in the reading program,



which provides both individual and small-group tutoring in a variety of areas such as reading improvement and advanced vocabulary development. It is the goal of the reading program to provide student-athletes with tools necessary to become more effective readers and studiers.

UK SPIRIT



ORIGIN OF BLUE AND WHITE SCHOOL COLORS Kentucky's famous Blue and White colors have adorned Wildcat teams since around the turn of the century.

Prior to a football game against Centre in 1891, State College students (UK was then called State College) held an ardent meeting for the purpose of choosing permanent college colors and a college yell. They decided on blue and light yellow, blue because it was typical of the bluegrass and light yellow because it represented the richness of the land. Also adopted at that meeting was the following yell, chosen because of its brevity:

'Rah! Rush! Ree! A! M! C!!!"

Neither the colors nor the yell stayed around very long. In a letter to Professor Gillis, R.C. Stoll, a member of the 1891-95 State College teams, recalled:

"We had some other colors — I really don't recall what they were. But we had a meeting in the chapel in 1892, my recollection is, to discuss the colors of the university

'After we decided on the now familiar blue and white, someone asked, 'What color blue will it be?

"I happened to have on a blue necktie and took it off and held it up. That was the blue which was adopted.'

After the turn of the century, State teams would be referred to often as the "Blue and White," with those colors being officially adopted in 1910.

The official blue has ranged from a navy blue in the earlier days to the now-familiar "Kentucky Blue," or royal blue.

1985-86 UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY WILDCAT CHEERLEADERS

Crowds at Rupp Arena will once again be led by the awardwinning and nationally-known University of Kentucky cheer-

The UK Cheerleaders were named 1984-85 National Champions at the Ford College Cheerleading Championships last winter in Hawaii. The competition, seen nationally on NBC-TV and later on ESPN, was sponsored by the Universal Cheerleaders Association.

According to T. Lynn Williamson, cheerleader advisor, Wildcat fans can expect another good year from the UK squad.

'We have a lot of people coming back and we did well at our summer camp," said Williamson, who is now in his eighth season as advisor. "Our squad has won first place in the Southern Region two straight years, plus we won the national title last year, as well as runner-up in 1982, so we know we have quite a reputation to live up to.'

WILDCAT MASCOTS HAD COLORFUL NAMES

Over the years, Kentucky athletic teams have been spurred on in efforts toward victory by numerous colorfully-named wildcat mascots. Records indicate the first animal was given to the University in 1921. Named "Tom," this live Kentucky wildcat died quickly from being in captivity and was replaced with "TNT." Other live mascots followed — including "Whiskers," "Hot Tamale," and "Colonel" — only to pass from the scene due to death or being turned loose in the mountains after they did not thrive out of their native habitat.

ORIGIN OF "WILDCATS" NICKNAME



Kentucky's athletic teams are known to sports fans as the Wildcats. This first and only nickname borne by University varsities had its origin in 1909 in a speech made by Commandant Corbusier, then head of the military department of old State College.

Speaking to a chapel audience of students on the showing of the Kentucky football team in defeating Illinois six to two, the Commandant declared "they fought like wildcats." The tag was popularized by word of mouth and by the press with the result that has since become synonymous with all major Kentucky athletic teams.

FUNDraising is what the UK Development Office does by seeking contributions to the Annual Fund and individual colleges, by receiving gifts from wills, trusts and bequests and by uncovering corporate support for the University.

The UK National Alumni Association has a dual purpose — serving alumni with programs and membership benefits and serving the University with programs to undergird the continuing academic progress at UK, to attract quality students and to reward a quality faculty.

Among the most popular programs for alumni are area club gatherings and trips to Rupp Arena, the Kentucky Alumnus magazine, membership availability at Spindletop Hall and the basketball scorecard. Quality students are attracted to a university because the academic oppor-




The Association encourages exceptional teaching which is at the heart of a strong academic program by presenting up to six awards annually for Great Teaching. As one program to keep highly qualified professors at UK, the Alumni Professorship is now a designation carried by seven professors who not only contribute in the classroom but also in the research laboratory. How exciting to be taught by the very people who are creating new knowledge, who are discovering how quarks and neurons and monoclonal antibodies and minds work so that that information can be used to increase our life expectancy and enhance our quality of life as well!

In the past five years, funds for alumni club-sponsored scholarships have risen from about \$2,000 to nearly \$11,000 annually. Clubs also host UK Open Houses in their local communities for prospective students. Many alumni participate in a career advising network for students or serve on college advisory boards. The Association itself provides over 20 scholarships to outstanding students, marching band members and to each of the 13 community colleges. The Association also provides "real world" experience through its internship program with alumni publications, alumni administration and public relations.

Among the alumni who provide the "pride factor" are shuttle astronaut Story Musgrave who took a UK pennant into orbit last July; Dr. Joe Kramer who is seeing to it that movie script writers include his UK connection in the story of his life they are writing, and the Helton family of Pineville in which all four siblings and 11 grandchildren have earned degrees at UK.

One of them, Cinder Parsons, is active in the club program and has served on the board of directors. Altogether, 57 alumni volunteer their time to direct the activities of the Alumni Association. Another 65 serve as alumni club presidents and hundreds of others also serve as officers of local clubs. In 1985 Judge Julia Kurtz Tackett of Lexington is president of the National Alumni Association, a position she will yield to David Ravencraft of Washington, D.C. for 1986. The board and alumni clubs represent a nationwide network of pride in the University of Kentucky. Let it show!

THE WILDCATS ON RADIO

A vital part of the Kentucky basketball tradition through the years has been the ability of the legions of Big Blue fans to "catch the Cats on the radio." Listening to Kentucky basketball has been a tradition in the Commonwealth for decades. Nearly every Kentuckian has fond memories of sitting around a radio on a cold winter night, living and dying with the fortunes of the Big Blue.

As usual, the excitement and action of Kentucky's 83rd season of basketball will be broadcast to fans across the country on one of the largest college networks in the nation. The UK Basketball Network features 96 stations in six states, including Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, West Virginia,

Tennessee and Arkansas.

Anchoring the coverage once again is the powerful 50,000-watt clear channel "voice of the Wildcats," WHAS in Louisville, which for more than 50 years has beamed Kentucky basketball to at least 40 states.

To years has beamed reflectly basketball to a fleast 40 states. "I can distinctly remember listening to the Cats on WHAS when I was a kid growing up in Kansas," said new UK coach Eddie Sutton the day he was hired by Kentucky. "Our radio broadcasts have helped make us the premier program in the country by providing us with a national audience for a number of years."

The network also features a second 50,000-watt station in WCKY in Cincinnati, as well as ten 100,000-watt FM stations throughout the

state.

The rights to Wildcat basketball are held by Kentucky Network, Inc., of Louisville, which is currently in its sixth season of broadcasting UK sports.

The UK Network presents one of the most comprehensive lineups of programs on game night, starting 11/2 hours before tipoff with a statewide call-in show, followed by Cawood's Look at Basketball, the Coach Eddie Sutton Pre-Game Show, Wildcat Warmup and the game play-by-play. Following the game, the network presents the Wildcat Wrapup, Wildcat Scoreboard and the Coach Eddie Sutton Post-Game Show.





CAWOOD LEDFORD

Now in his 33rd season of broadcasting Wildcat games, **Cawood Ledford** is truly a legend in the Commonwealth. In many drug stores and barber shops across the state, conversations in the winter begin with, "Well, Cawood said last night..."

His brisk, informative style has won him a spot in the hearts of Kentuckians for years and to many people who never have a chance to see the Cats in person, Cawood IS Kentucky basketball. As one station promoted him once, "When you listen to Kentucky basketball, you don't just hear it, you SEE it, through the eyes of Cawood Ledford."

Cawood has made some of his phrases legendary in Kentucky, especially his traditional, "The Wildcats are moving to the right-hand side of your radio dial." When he appears at courtside at Rupp Arena, the Kentucky band salutes him in unison with a loud, "Hello, Cawood!" That's the kind

of respect Kentucky fans have for "their" announcer.

The native of Harlan County, Ky., (actually Cawood, Ky.) has been named Best Basketball Announcer in the Nation, in addition to being named Kentucky's "Sportscaster of the Year" 18 times. He is president of his own Lexington-based company, Cawood Ledford Productions, and has produced many award-winning radio and television sports programs.

RALPH HACKER

Ledford's sidekick on Wildcat broadcasts is **Ralph Hacker**, president and general manager of radio station WVLK in Lexington. Hacker is now in his 14th season as the color analyst on the UK Network, offering his knowledge to the broadcasts, as well as handling all pre-game, halftime and nost-game programs.

MEDIA OUTLETS

KENTUCKY TELEVISION NETWORK

The University of Kentucky has one of the largest collegiate television networks in the country, with eight stations in four states carrying selected Wildcat basketball games. Once again, WKYT-TV in Lexington and WAVE-TV in Louisville will co-produce the UK Network, which will televise six UK games live and five games on a delayed basis at 11:30 p.m. EST. UK telecasts are produced by veteran producer Roger Roebuck of WAVE-TV. (See season schedule for list of TV games.)

Once again, UK's announcing team will feature Rob Bromley, Bob Domine and Jack Givens. Bromley is sports director of Lexington's CBS affiliate, WKYT-TV, and is in his sixth year as an announcer on the UK crew. Domine is sports director of Louisville's NBC affiliate, WAVE-TV, and has likewise been on the UK crew for six years. Former Wildcat All-American Jack Givens, now a Lexington businessman, is the color analyst for the telecasts.
