The Kerney, wishes to apologize for not running in Tuesday's issue a front-page banner headline relevant to the appearance of Dr. Walter Judd on the campus Tuesday and Wednes-Judd on the desired some such recognition. Speaking with clipped words and machine-gou rapidity, this world traveler and medical missionary to China made inadequate audiences in Memorial hall "take it" while he bombarded with facts and figures concerning the suicidal and determining part this country is playing in the disintegration of China. In stressing the necessity for knowing what's going on in the world—a point stressed so heartily by many of our better speakers that it may recentually penetrate—Doctor Judd touched a sulnerable spot in the American's armor. Sensational exposes of World War atrocity stories and propaganda have led the present generation to place tongue in check when told any story of unsavory action. "It must be propaganda," they say. "It was in the last war." It's a safer attitude than blind gullbillity, but it's not an intelligent attitude when the truth of the unsavory is substantiated by government documents and eye-witnesses.

Especially has this incredulity been apparent
in our treatment of savage atrocities committed
by the Japanese. Even more important and at
the same tinge subject to remedy has been our
ignorance as to the part we play in the slaughter
of Chini and in darkening our own future. It
is the ignorance which, Doctor Judd says, sends
him home as a missionary to his our people.

In the last six months of the Chino-Japanes
war, 70 to 80 percent of all Japanese imports
have flowed from the United States. One of the
greatest of these import items is raw cotton, a
staple which Japan hopes to develop in China
when it is "beaten to its knees." In simple lan
guage, this country is helping Japan defeat
China so Japan can become somewhat self-sufficient and eliminate her imports from us. We
stand to lose eventually not only Japanese trade
but also that of China as long as we continue to
aid the island people.

The missionary believes that Japan is so dependent upon this country, especially since the
outbreak of the European war, that only a firm
threat of cessation of trade is needed to bring
the Japanese military clique to a halt. Certainly,

it even more difficult to defeat China and the
United States without our raw materials.

The recent abrogation of our trade treaty
with Japan now leaves the way open to possible


