PRODUCTION AND WORKING FORCE -
STRIKE OF MAY 1, 1943

I give you next attached a tabulated sheet showing a compilation of figures which I have had compiled for my own benefit to show the effect of the strike in May, 1943 on our working force and production.

This also shows in a pretty substantial way how the working force and production was affected from the week ending February 5th up until the beginning of the strike. The falling off in production during this period was caused partly by vacations and partly on account of going to the six-day week on March 1, showing a drop in our average daily production from 3,170 tons per day during the month of February to 2,956 tons per day during the month of April even though our total weekly production was increased during this period. I have had this record made for my file and give you two copies herewith for your file and somebody else whom you might wish to pass it on to.
