This, of course, causes journals to run hot and there is always a probability of their heating to such an extent before being detected by trainmen as to cause serious consequences. We will appreciate it greatly if you will assist us in the matter of preventing your employes and their families from removing the packing from journal boxes. You know best how this can be handled, so far as your employes are concerned, and we will, therefore, offer no suggestions as to how to accomplish the desired result. It may be that it can be done by posting notices around your tipple and commissary, or it may be that you will considor it more practical to have the matter handled personally by your
