UK will provide a special election to get a student repre-sentative on the Board of Trustees, one administrator said.
Vice President of Student Affairs Patricia Terrell told SG
President Mary Katherine Thompson that the administration
will fund an election for a student trustee. Thompson said.

Thousands of students transfer to UK each year. In the 2001-02 school year, UK admitted 1,826 students out of 2,515 transfer applicants. Of those accepted, 1,390 transfers enrolled in UK during that academic year.

The seat opened when former SG President Tim Robinson resigned from SG and the board in late February Robinson resigned from SG and the board in late February Robinson resigned after pleading guilty to a misdemeanor charge of interfering with voter registration. State law prohibits his successor in SG from joining the board without being elected by the student body. The campus election will probably be held on the Internet, Thompson said. The costs will likely be minimal, she said, because UK already owns a Web-based voting system. No one has set a date for the election. North Korean jets intercept U.S. spy plane

Security: Iraq attempts to sway United Nations; Turkey refuses to allow deployment of U.S. troops

WASHINGTON — Four armed North Korean fighter jets intercepted a U.S. reconnaissance plane over the Sea of Japan and one used its radar in a manner that indicated it might attack, U.S. officials said Monday
Li. Cmdr. Jeff Davis, a Pentagon spokesman, said it was the first such incident since April 1969, when a

pected weapons program. Washington believes Pyongyang already has one or two nuclear weapons. The dispute over nuclear weapons increased last week when North Korea restarted a 5-megawatt reactor that could produce plutonium for such weapons. North Korea said Saturday that nuclear war could break out at "any moment." have made clear that this kind of development would be unwelcome and have serious consequences





Here's advice for the UK Senate Council, which is considering a proposed fee for dropping

which is considering a proposed fee for dropping classes: Drop it.

If the council approves the fee, students who drop classes during the "add-drop" period would

pay \$20 per hour dropped.

The fee will help counter UK's problem of paying too many teachers to teach too many unnecessary class sections, according to a memo Provost Mike Nietzel sent to the council.

Logically, if the measure was passed, stu-

Logically, it the measure was passed, students would sign up during priority registration only for the classes they knew they would keep. If Nietzel thinks that there is an overabundance of class availability from students dropping courses, he apparently has never seen any one try to get into classes at this school during

priority registration.

Moreover, he's never seen the rush of students vying for the extra spots that come available in a section after the first week of the se-

mester when their classmates drop the course.

In fact, UK just installed a new online waiting list system to organize the mass of students

who need to get in a class but cannot.

The mere existence of the system is proof that there are always students waiting for spots in the class of t in classes — not the wasted sections with numerous vacancies Nietzel suggests.

Also, the drop option is a crucial tool for all students as they pursue their degrees.
For freshmen, the first week of classes serves

as a taste of the college workload; the ability to

try out and then drop courses they do not like or cannot handle is an essential option. For upperclassmen, the drop option helps students decide what electives best supplement their majors and which sections best fit into their graduation timelines

The drop fee boils down to just an extra revenue source for a university facing a shaky

economy. With tuition expected to increase and finan-

cial aid potentially becoming scarcer, one more fee increase is too much to ask from students. The fee would eliminate a tool nearly every student uses to organize their academic


