

State University, April 6, 1908.

The faculty met in special session at the call of President Patterson at 9 A.M. to take action upon the death of Professor Milford White, which occurred on Saturday, April 4th. A committee upon resolutions, consisting of Professors J.H. Neville, J.G. White, M.A. Scovell, C.W. Mathews, J.T.C. Noe, and A.S. Mackenzie, was appointed to prepare suitable resolutions regarding the death of Professor White, and arrangements were made for a suitable floral memorial.

RESOLUTIONS

On Death of Prof. Milford White Passed By the State University.

At a called meeting held in President Patterson's office at 9 o'clock on Monday morning, the following resolutions were passed by the Faculty of the State University:

When the soul of Milford White responded to the cryptic call of the music of the spheres, Kentucky lost one of her noblest sons. There are educators whose names have been oftener upon the lips of men, but there are few indeed who have been endowed with a greater serenity of spirit or a more inflexible sense of duty. Gifted beyond most of his contemporaries with charm of personality and vigor of intellect, his gentleness and his indomitable energy were a daily paradox.

Kentucky has a reasonable number of skilled specialists in educational science, but in breadth of outlook and clarity of purpose Milford White was perhaps without a peer. Neither eul-

ogy nor elegy is requisite in the case of one whose character was so eloquent of all that makes deepest appeal to the children of men. Therefore be it resolved:

1.—That we, the Faculty of the State University, express our heartfelt sympathy with the late Professor White's widow, and that we commend her to the care of the Mighty One.

2.—That we strive to emulate the example of our deceased friend.

3.—That these resolutions be entered upon the minutes of the Faculty, a copy sent to the leading Kentucky newspapers, and a copy to the widow of our former comrade.
