GLSO PRIDE CENTER MERGER

It's a done deal. At a well attended meeting, the GLSO board voted unanimously to accept the Pride Center Taskforce's offer for GLSO to become the governing board of the Pride Center of the Bluegrass. (P.C.) As explained in last month's Newsletter, the Taskforce was empowered to open a community center and to turn it over to the Stonewall Network to manage.

Because the Stonewall Network is now defunct, and because the Pride Center bank account has always been under the GLSO 501 (c)(3) tax free status, it seemed logical that we assume the responsibility of running the facility. GLSO has assumed the lease that the P.C. Taskforce had signed renting space at 387 Waller Ave from the Metropolitan Community Church (MCC). We are certainly thankful that the MCC has grown and prospered, allowing them to make this space available for the Pride Center to rent.

The financial accounts for the Pride Center will be kept separate but within the responsibility of the GLSO treasurer. (This means more work--thanks Tim.) It also means that individuals can make tax free donations to the GLSO and/or to the Pride Center and the money will go into the account you specify.

The Pride Center is now supplying meeting and gathering space for organizations. Upstairs there is one small and

one large meeting room, and a foyer with all kinds of information available. Downstairs there is a large room that is the MCC sanctuary, and may also be made available. If your organization would like to use one of these rooms or to display information, call Terry at 255-5469.

A board to oversee the running of the Center has been formed and has five members. In accordance with our bi-laws, this is officially a GLSO committee and as such will always have at least one member from the GLSO Board.

Another committee has been formed to be responsible for the publication of the next edition of the *Pink Pages*. This publication willfinancially benefit the Pride Center as well asprovide valuable information for our community. You can look for it during Pride Month next year.

The Pride Center is up and running. It will need support from all of us to fulfill its potential. You can help by donating money or time or simply by attending events. See you there.

OUT ON VIDEO

Christopher Reeve makes his directorial debut with the HBO original movie *In the Gloaming*, recently out on video. Since Reeve directed this movie after his spinal cord injury, there has been a great deal of emphasis on his personal triumph. In addition to the one-hour movie, the video tape includes a short behind-the-scenes look at the making of the film.

In the Gloaming is the story of a young gay man with AIDS who returns home to die. Although Robert Sean Leonard's character Danny has AIDS, AIDS does not become the focus of this film. As a matter of fact, the words "AIDS" and "gay" are never said. Some critics have blasted the film for this, but I believe it works. Reeve's decision to keep so much unsaid really illustrates the dysfunction of Danny's family.

His parents, played by Glenn Close and David Strathairn, are presented as a "perfect" family on the outside -- so much time is spent focusing on the beauty of their home that it almost becomes a character. But, like so many families they refuse to articulate their problems, so those problems "must not exist." That they cannot say the words "gay" or "AIDS' is not surprising. They cannot accept the fact their son is gay -- he is returning from San Francisco where he lived with his lover who his family has never met or acknowledged. And, there is "no way" he can have AIDS even though he is dying in front of them.

So, In the Gloaming is a story about a family, which focuses on the relationship between the mother Janet and her son Danny. Because of the family's dysfunction, Janet allowed herself to become estranged from Danny who was clearly her favorite child. Now that he has come home to die, it is obvious so much between them has been unsaid. Janet struggles to become reacquainted with Danny and then let him go. The scenes between Close and Leonard are

well-acted. They feel understated and real, almost like eavesdropping on someone else's life.

Ultimately, that's what *In the Gloaming* was for me, a slice of someone's life. There were no great insights into AIDS or being gay, no ephiphanies or dramatic changes for the characters, not even a remedy for dysfunctional families. And frankly, I found that refreshing. *In the Gloaming* seems like a movie that could really happen.

GERTIE MAE NOE

Dear Gertie Mae Noe,

I've heard this is "Coming Out Month" but I don't understand how people can do that. I hate myself. Because I am gay I have no friends, no job, no family, and no self-respect. Living in Eastern Kentucky and being gay is so impossible that often I just want to die. I am seeing a therapist but that process seems so slow. The therapist says that cities such as Lexington and Ashland have gay communities. I can't see where I would fit in there either. I am terribly lonely but I don't think I"II ever be able to have a relationship. My life doesn't seem to have much hope.

Dear Child of God,

I don't know that I have ever read such a sad letter. I want to get one thing straight (so to speak) before I go any further, I am not a therapist so my suggestions are only from personal experience. I am very glad that you are seeing a professional. It sounds to me that you have found one that is at least gay friendly, that alone in eastern Ky. can be a rarity. In addition, you might want to consider seeing a psychiatrist. From my untrained standpoint, you might benefit from anti-depressant drugs. Talk to your therapist about this.

The process of therapy can be slow, but it can work. Maybe a new perspective will help You seem to blame all your problems on the fact that you're gay. This is not truly the case. This is a distinction that is sometimes hard to make, but your problems are not due to your being a homosexual, but to homophobia, both internal and external. Just being gay has not caused one of your problems. Think about it, if there was not hatred and fear of "gay", then what would be the problem with being gay?

The fact that you hate yourself is the most monumental obstacle that you face and the hardest to overcome. Yes, I believe that it is much harder to overcome internalized homophobia than it is to fight the hatred coming from other people. You are not alone with this; all of us have to confront our internal fears and hatreds as part of the coming out process. It can be difficult, but it is definitely worth the struggle. Surely your therapist is working hard on this problem with you. Gertie will also mail you some article that might help.

You know, I too am from eastern Ky. and I can sympathize with your loneliness. (With a name like Gertie Mae, where did you think I was from?) Let me assure you that you are not the

only one in your neighborhood. It can be hard to find other gay and lesbian people, but we are everywhere. If you can't find friends and do not have a job WHY NOT try moving to a larger city such as Lexington, or Louisville.....or San Francisco, for that matter! Whadda'ya got to lose?

We have community here in Lexington and everybody fits in somewhere and with someone, trust of Gertie on this one.

I'll keep you in my prayers.



IN & OUT

In & Out, in case you've been in a coma or lost at sea for the past month and somehow missed the saturation-level ad campaign, is a new movie that depicts what happens when a small-town teacher is outed by an adoring former student. The ads clearly have paid off, it opened strongly with a first weekend-box office in excess of 15 million dollars, possibly a record for a movie with a gay theme.

It remains to be seen if it will have "legs" or not, but I'll certainly be recommending it to everyone I know. Not only is it something of an historic occasion in mainstream cinema, it actually has a lot going for it. It's quite funny at times, and not just funny about the gay stuff. There are droll and pointed bits about masculinity, small town life, supermodels, superstars, and the tabloid media. Also, it's really all heart, the fun it pokes is so gentle that nobody gets very put down. It also features a very appealing cast, the ever amusing Kevin Kline, Debbie Reynolds, Glenn Close and interestingly enough Tom Selleck (playing way against his type as "out" gay man).

The movie is very lightweight and clearly isn't meant to hold up under close scrutiny. It's one of those escapist, crowdpleasing confections that Hollywood used to do so well before sex and violence became the trite old standbys that they are now. The

screenwriter, Paul Rudnick has obviously sat through a lot of movies in his formative years, the movie is peppered with cinematic references that mostly went over the head of the suburban audience I was with.

The downside of this is that there's nothing much in this movie that seems very original. The whole premise is firmly rooted in that sitcom universe of crossed signals that have been mined by TV gag writers for decades. Yet somehow in this case, the shopworn situations aren't a bad thing, because it all leads to a conclusion that is surprisingly unique, and possibly the first of its kind in a movie of this type.

When Kline's character, a prissy but evidently heterosexual English teacher in Greenleaf Indiana is outed on the Academy Awards Show he must face his family, his students, his neighbors and even his fiancee all questioning his sexuality and their great respect for him. This is not only disconcerting and embarrassing but quite naturally leads him to start questioning it himself. Some people might have trouble with some of the fast and loose generalizations that the movie makes about stereotypes and gender. It's true, Rudnick dredges up some of the most simple-minded generalizations about gay behavior here. But, after setting up this retro mindset, this movie takes the situation a small but very definite step forward.

The ultimate point of the movie is one of the best things about it - echoing the populist comedies Capra or Preston Sturges it suggests that rejecting homophobia in favor of respect for individual difference is just plain, old-fashioned American common sense. I couldn't agree more!

Campers will "rough it" --- there are no facilities. Those attending should bring their own supplies: warm clothes, sleeping bags, and food for both dinner and breakfast. Eddie will provide comfortable ground on which to sleep as well as the campfire and a clear sky.


