FOREWORD

The <u>Inventory of the County Archives of Texas</u> is one of a number of bibliographies of historical materials prepared throughout the United States by workers on the Historical Records Survey Program of the Work Projects Administration. The publication herewith presented, an inventory of the archives of Marion County, is number 158 of the Texas series of counties.

The Historical Records Survey Program was undertaken in the winter of 1935-36 for the purpose of providing useful employment to needy unemployed historians, lawyers, teachers, and research and clerical workers. In carrying out this objective, the project was organized to compile inventories of historical materials, particularly the unpublished government documents and records which are basic in the administration of local government, and which provide invaluable data for students of political, economic, and social history. The archival guide herewith presented is intended to meet the requirements of day-to-day administration by the officials of the county, and also the needs of lawyers, business men and other citizens who require facts from the public records for the proper conduct of their affairs. The volume is so designed that it can be used by the historian in his research in unprinted sources in the same way he uses the library card catalog for printed sources.

The inventories produced by the Historical Records Survey Program attempt to do more than give merely a list of records—they attempt further to sketch in the historical background of the county or other unit of government, and to describe precisely and in detail the organization and functions of the government agencies whose records they list. The county, town, and other local inventories for the entire state will, when completed, constitute an encyclopedia of local government as well as a bibliography of local archives.

The successful conclusion of the work of the Historical Records Survey Program, even in a single county, would not be possible without the support of public officials, historical and legal specialists, and many other groups in the community. Their cooperation is gratefully acknowledged.

The Survey Program was organized and has been directed by Luther H. Evans, and operates as a nation-wide series of locally sponsored projects in the Division of Professional and Service Projects, of which Mrs. Florence Kerr, Assistant Commissioner, is in charge.

PREFACE

The Texas Historical Records Survey is a unit of the Texas State-wide Records Project which is sponsored by the Bureau of Research in the Social Sciences of The University of Texas, and operates under the Research and Records Section of the Division of Professional and Service Projects of the Work Projects Administration.

The objective of the Survey in Texas is the preparation of complete inventories of the archives of each county, municipality, and other local governmental unit. This publication, an inventory of the archives of Marion County, includes, in addition to descriptive entries for each extant records series, an historical sketch of the county and a map of its past and present boundaries; a discussion of the conditions under which the records are preserved; and abstracts of laws specifically applicable to the county. This inventory varies from certain other inventories of county archives being published in that the descriptive entries for each extant records series are presented in a condensed form; an essay on the governmental organization and records system of the county accompanied by charts of government, floor plans of the courthouse, and essays on the legal status and functions of each county official and agency are omitted.

The Inventory of the County Archives of Texas will, when completed, consist of a separate volume for each county of the state. Each unit of the series is numbered according to the particular county's respective position in the alphabetical list of the 254 counties. Thus, the volume for Marion County, herewith presented, is No. 158. Units of the Inventory are issued in mimeographed form for free distribution to state and local public officials, public libraries in Texas, and to a limited number of libraries and governmental agencies outside the state.

The records of Marion County were listed in the spring and summer of 1936, and a verification check was made in November 1939. The volume was compiled and edited in the state office of the Texas Historical Survey of the Work Projects Administration.

The courteous cooperation of the Marion County officials for whom this work was done is acknowledged.

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1. HISTORICAL SKETCH

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Marion County, with Jefferson the county seat, is in deep East Texas on the Louisiana border. Its geography, interesting in itself, is the more important because it has dictated the history of the region as long as white men have known it. In the eastern portion of the county, great forests of pine, oak, sassafras, and cypress grow in and around large bayous and lakes. In the west, the land is open, with a gently undulating, almost prairie-like surface. Here the dark red soil is deep and fertile, and the low hills mark rich deposits of iron ore. Thus, in the geography of the county is found the background for the four important phases of its industrial history: farming, shipping, mining, and lumbering.

When Texas was a province of Spain, and even before she was ever claimed as such, East Texas was inhabited by a peaceful, sedentary tribe of Indians, the Caddoes. These people were farmers, and their culture approached civilization in the anthropological sense of the term. They lived in villages of conical thatched huts, each village being surrounded by well-tended fields of corn, squash, and beans. It was this tribe of Indians that gave Caddo Lake its present name. In one of their legends, the origin of Marion County's lakes is told. It seems that the Great Spirit warned a certain chief to take his people out of the country in order to save them from a terrible flood that was to come. The chieftain followed instructions; and when the flood came, his tribe was saved, though many others were lost. The story also explains that the land subsided during the flood, and that the Caddo lakes have marked the spot ever since. One version of this story says that the flood occurred many years before white man came, and another says the lakes were created overnight in about 1812. At any rate the history of the Caddo tribe and that of the lakes are closely bound together in the folklore of those first Texas farmers.2

Late in the seventeenth century, Spain began to see that she must bolster her claim to Texas with something more tangible than the declarations of those few adventurous Spanish explorers who had marched through the province. Hence she decided to establish missions in East Texas, near the present site of Nacogdoches. On January 23, 1691, Don Domingo Teran de los Rios was appointed governor of the newly-created Spanish province. On the same day he was instructed to lead an expedition into East Texas to found missions and explore the countryside. Father Massanet, a missionary priest, was to accompany the expedition. He was to have full authority in founding the new missions. Teran was to manage

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the military escort and direct the explorations. When the expedition reached the site of the missions previously established, Teran turned religious affairs over to Massanet and began to explore the lands inhabited by the Cadodacho Indians. On this trip he passed through present Marion County from south to north. When he had reached the Red River, he followed it into present Arkansas; and then returned to the missions, again passing through Marion County. A popular story in Marion County today says that the Spaniards were unable to find their way around Caddo Lake, but were forced to cross it in Indian canoes. It is also said that these adventurers gave the lake its first name: Laguna Española.

When the period of French and Spanish rivalry had passed, and the missions had been moved to San Antonio, East Texas was again largely in the hands of the Indians. Yet there were a few Spaniards left; and some Anglo-Americans, most of them desperadoes, had filtered in from the east. By the early 1800's, East Texas, especially the lower portion, had earned the name of Bad Lands. 5

In the 1820's Anglo-American colonists began to immigrate to Texas, and many of them settled on the rich lands in East Texas, where timber and water were plentiful, and the Indians, friendly.6

Some time prior to 1836 Allen Urquhart came to present Marion County and established a ferry across Big Cypress Bayou, which runs into Caddo. Urquhart owned this ferry site, but he lived in Daingerfield, in present Morris County. On one of his trips to the ferry to collect fees, he learned that a group of people had attempted to lay off a town at a place called Smith's Landing, but had been unable to do so because of a faulty title. Urquhart then offered to allow the settlers to found their town on the land near his ferry. The settlers agreed, and the resulting village founded in 1836, was the beginning of the present town of Jefferson, Marion County. At that time, the territory was known as Red River County. Four years later, Jefferson and the surrounding country were included in Bowie County, which was created from Red River territory.8

During the early forties most of the Anglo-American immigration to Texas was by way of Caddo Lake and Jefferson. In 1842 the famous Regula-

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tor-Moderator feud came to a head, and involved most of East Texas. One of the most cold-blooded of all the killings in the entire affray occurred on the shores of Caddo Lake. Robert Potter, once a midshipman of the United States Navy, and former Secretary of the Navy of the Republic of Texas, had become involved in the feud. Following a particularly bloody shooting match, the story goes, Potter and his men retired to a plantation house late one evening to rest. Card playing and drinking occupied the men for a time; but when the morning came, they started out to take up the fighting where they had left off. The opposing gang, however, had outsmarted them. Hidden in the woods near the house, they waylaid the Potter men as they came out. Potter was killed just as he dived into the lake.

During the forties Jefferson became the head of navigation through Big Cypress and Caddo, down the Red River, and into the Mississippi. Most of the surrounding country was devoted to agriculture; and since railroads had not penetrated into that portion of the country, the farm produce was hauled to Jefferson by wagontrain, and loaded on the boats there. Hides, tallow, and cotton were the main exports shipped through Jefferson. 10

When Cass County was created in 1846, the land around Jefferson was included in the new county. Il For a time, Jefferson served as the county seat of Cass County, until the seat of government was permanently located in the town of Linden. In the shipping business through Jefferson grew larger and larger during the early fifties; and as a result of this activity, the population of Cass County gradually increased. Wealthy planters established large plantations along Big Cypress Bayou and Caddo Lake. The darkies in the cotton fields, the great white houses with tall, stately columns, the moss-hung cypress trees, and the quiet, shaded bodies of water made the region around Jefferson typical of the Old South. In 1852 George Addison Kelly, a former steamboat hand, took a job as foreman of slave-labor in the iron works of Lockett and Stewart in Jefferson. Soon he became a member of the firm, and later in the decade he bought the machinery and set up his own factory to build plows and other farming implements. One of his inventions has since become famous as the

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Kelly Blue Plow. This factory was one of the first and most important commercial enterprises of the period.14

From 1854 to 1856, the river was low, and there was little navigation. The following letter reflects clearly the psychological as well as the economic effect of these two bad years:

Jefferson, Texas, Jan. 20, 1856 Dr. A. L. Logan

Dear Brother:

We are having a cold winter here. The ground has been frozen 25 days, and two snows in that time. Ground still covered with snow. Our rivers keep low, so we have had no navigation in two years. We have two crops of cotton on hand and no prospect for selling it.

Groceries high and scarce. Corn sells for \$1.00 a bushel, pork five cents per pound. Prices for all stock high.

The hire for a negro man is \$180 to \$200, and for a negro woman \$150 to \$200. They sell high, too. Women from \$1,000 to \$1,200; men from \$1,500 to \$2,000, and hard to get at that.

The town of Jefferson improves some, but slowly, owing to navigation failing. Health good, except a few cases winter fever. The population is about three thousand. You speak of coming to Texas. This is a pleasant place to live in, but you might do better to go West. The land is better and a better range. A man can get 320 acres by settling on it. A good many move from here to get the land. There is no public land here.

Your brother, Wm. S. Logan. 15

In 1857 the state legislature appropriated \$21,298 to improve the channel through Big Cypress and Caddo. The county was instructed to raise at least one-fourth of this amount. The moncy was quickly raised, and the improvement project was started. But the outbreak of the Civil

War halted the work before much good was done. 16 However, shipping was good in 1859, with over 85,000 bales of cotton being exported through Jefferson. 17

As early as 1854, the state legislature had received petitions from the people of Jefferson and surrounding country requesting the creation of a new county. By act of February 1 of that year, elections were ordered in Cass, Hopkins, Titus, and Upshur Counties to test whether a majority of the citizens were in favor of forming a new county from their surplus territory. 18 The results of this series of elections are not available, but the petitions probably continued until early in 1860.

On February 8, 1860, Marion County was created from Cass and Harrison Counties, and named for Francis Marion, the famous Swamp Fox of the American Revolution. 19 That Marion would have been quite at home in the swamps and marshes around Big Cypress Bayou and along Caddo Lake is an interesting thought, in this connection; but it perhaps had nothing to do with the choice of his name for the new county. Jefferson was, by the act of creation, made the county seat of Marion County.

The act of creation named J. T. Sharp, Eli Moore, and D. S. McKay as commissioners to organize the county and hold the first elections. Following is a list of the first county officers: Shadrick R. Eggers, chief justice; John B. Finley, C. F. Moseley, W. H. Haywood, and Henry Mims, county commissioners; L. T. Gray, county clerk; N. A. Birge, sheriff; C. W. Stewart, assessor and collector, John K. Cocke, county treasurer, J. R. Layne, coroner; L. R. Bayliss, district clerk; and P. M. Graham, county surveyor. These men were installed in office on March 24, 1860. One of the first official duties of the commissioners court was the selection of a courthouse. Therefore, it was "Ordered by the court that Birges Hall, situated in the town of Jefferson, be and it is hereby known and designated as the Court House of the County of Marion until further ordered."20

The shipping business through the port of Jefferson increased during the year 1860, over 100,000 bales of cotton being exported from that city, in addition to large amounts of hides, tallow, and other farm products. 21 More and more each year Jefferson was becoming the goal of long wagon-

trains coming from the interior of northern Texas, and she had even gone so far as to build a short railroad from Swanson's Landing to the town limits. But with the coming of the Civil War, construction on the road was abandoned. Like so many other lines over the state, this one became a streak of rust before the war was over. 22

Far from being broken by the conflict, as was the railroad, the town of Jefferson was made by it, and only reached the heyday of her brilliant history in the latter sixties. When the war first broke out, the commissioners court of Marion County appropriated \$8,000 to purchase arms and munitions of war for the protection of the county. It was ordered that supplies be purchased to arm 100 mounted men. Taxes were levied to the full extent of the law, and county scrip was issued. As the war progressed, the county took whatever measures were necessary to care for the widows and orphans of soldiers, and for the destitute families of men who were in the army. The Dead Shot Rangers were equipped and sent away to fight. Funds were sent to them at intervals during the war, for new uniforms or for ammunition. The county was divided into boats, and a committee was appointed for each. These committees were to take care of relief problems in their beats and report to the county commissioners court.23 Marion County's activities during the war reflect clearly the fact that many of her patriotic citizens were wealthy planters. The local relief problems were handled in a way few other counties were financially able to duplicate.

Marion County, and especially the port of Jefferson, became the center of the meat supply for the Confederate armies, and the base of operations against General Banks. Because it was such an important point, it was the ambition of the Federal forces, later in the war, to take the port. Fleet boats operated in the bayous and lakes, transporting soldiers to the Mississippi. Much cotton was shipped through Jefferson for Confederate forces, and some was slipped through for whatever destination would pay the most. Thus, all during the war, Jefferson was growing larger, and more and more important as a shipping point.24 By the end of the war, she was just at the beginning of the most important ten years of her history, a decade which has since been designated as the Steamboat Era.

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One of the first important events of the new era was the incorporation of Jefferson as a city. This was on September 11, 1866. The city aldermen were ordered to drain and fill all low grounds and lots, to provide landings for steamboats and all watercraft, and to establish such quarantine regulations as would be necessary to prevent the introduction of contagious epidemics and infectious diseases. They were empowered to levy special taxes for building a city hall and jail, for erecting wharves, building bridges across Big Cypress Bayou, and aiding the improvement of navigation between Jefferson and Shreveport.25 Just after the war was over, General Buell and about two thousand soldiers were stationed in Jefferson. 26 For the first year or two, much cotton was confiscated as Confederate property, some of it unjustly. Two Treasury agents were indicted for fraud, but never came to trial.27 Klan of Jefferson and Marion County attempted to settle some of the difficulties, and many of its members were imprisoned in an old stockade on the hill just outside of town. 28 But even with the problems of Reconstruction, Jefferson continued to flourish, and reached the busiest, most exciting years of her Steamboat Era in the early seventies.

In those days, distances were measured from Jefferson just as they are measured today from Dallas, Houston, and San Antonio. All roads led to Jefferson, if they were north Texas roads, and most of them were filled with wagontrains and stagecoaches. In fact, popular fancy has it that the roads and trails were so filled with wagons hauling cotton to Jefferson and those leaving Jefferson with manufactured goods that passage was difficult at all times. Since most of the trading was done on a cash basis, the teamsters brought their money, most of it in gold, with them as they came from the interior. Much of the money was carried in tow sacks thrown into the bottoms of the wagons. Needless to say, robberies and killings were frequent where good hard cash was so plentiful, and so carelessly handled. 29

On the bayous and across the lakes, boats passed to and from the wharves at Jefferson. Most of the boats were manned by darky roustabouts. huge black rascals who kept the air ringing with their laughter and their songs. Bells rang and whistles sounded as the boats signaled to each other in passing, and the dark waters always reflected the flickering guide lights of the boats. Ships were frequently wrecked by snags or overhanging branches, and many of them were burned. There was excitement and danger in every phase of the river traffic. One story of the Steamboat Era that will live as long as Jefferson does, is the story of the Mattie Stevens, one of the best-known boats that ever plowed through the bayous. One night the Mattie Stevens was feeling her way through the moss-hung trees in Big Cypress Bayou, on her way to Jefferson with a full load. Among other things, she was carrying two kegs of gunpowder; and the captain was more than anxious to be rid of this dangerous cargo. The boat's guide light was a huge steel basket containing pine knots, with the light of the flames intensified by a polished reflector. In the cabins, the lights were kerosene lamps, and on the deck, the river hands were working by the light of pine knot flares. With all these open fires aboard, the captain expected to have his ship blown to bits at any moment. Since he had women and children aboard on this particular trip, too, he was doubly anxious to reach port as soon as possible. Hence, he was creeping through the cerie bayou late at night, hoping to make his destination before disaster could overtake him. Suddenly a pile of hay in one end of the boat began to smoke, and then burst into flames. Almost instantly the boat itself was on fire. The captain immediately gave the order to head for shore, and the crew managed to beach the vessel before the gunpowder exploded. But the flames had spread to the grounded end of the boat, and escape was cut off that way. Many persons jumped overboard, believing the water shallow, and were drowned in the ten feet of water at the stern. Some were suffocated, and others were trampled to death. The ship's carpenter managed to throw the kegs of gunpowder overboard before the flames reached it; otherwise, the entire boat and all of its passengers might have been lost. As it was, over sixty persons were killed, and many were injured.

The fate of the <u>Mattie Stevens</u> was shared by many another stern-wheeler just like her, and even today, the decaying hulks of ships may be seen protruding from the surface of the water in Big Cypress Bayou and Lake Caddo.

Stories and descriptions of the city of Jefferson during the Steamboat Era are unparalleled in the State. Here the farmers and ranchers brought their wives and families for vacations. Here they showed their wide-eyed children the only city in the state with a wonderful system of gas lighting, and one of the few cities in the United States where ice was produced artificially, to be bought and sold. Teamsters, and river boat men reveled in the cock fights and horse races that were held in the outskirts of the city. Politicians and salesmen sat in the Excelsior Hotel or in the Irvine House, reading the Jimplecute, and retailing news from other river towns. In the Lady Gay, and over at Charlie's Palace, the professional gamblers amused themselves with card games and drinking. There were dancing girls, blaring orchestras, and efficient bartenders.

A young ladies' seminary was established, and an Opera House did a flourishing business. Showboats plowed up the bayou to play for a week's stand. In 1871 and 1872 the Queen Mab Fetes were held, and so brilliant were these festivals that they rivaled even the colorful Mardi Gras of New Orleans. Jefferson was booming, and she could see no end to her wonderful career. In 1873, a \$70,000-bond issue was voted, the fund to be used for the construction of a courthouse. Prior to this time, Marion County had held court in Birge's Hall, and, at various times, in Freeman's Hall. But in times of such fabulous wealth, Jefferson, as county seat, wanted a magnificent county-owned courthouse to be built. The bonds were issued, the money was raised, and the construction was started on the building in 1873. In 1874 the new courthouse was accepted by the county. It was a large, two-story building, and stood on a hilltop in the edge of town. It is said that the only important trial ever held in this courthouse was the trial of Abe Rothschild, a jewelry salesman, for the murder of Diamond Bessie Moore, his traveling companion. This trial was the talk of all northeastern Texas, and everyone lined up on one side or the other. The accused murderer was acquitted, but public sentiment found him guilty. Later in the seventies, this building was abandoned, and the town literally moved away from it, down toward the river. The old building still stands on the hilltop outside of the town, and is now being used as a Negro schoolhouse. Jefferson's heyday was not destined to last forever. In the early seventies the railroads came to Marion County to share the glory of the steamboats. But the proud Jefferson would not allow a line to come through her limits, though an agent of Jay Gould, and even Jay Gould himself came to town to request that privilege. Not accustomed to being refused, the railroad agent is said to have declared he would build around the town, and that grass would grow green in the streets, and bats inhabit the belfries of Jefferson's vacant business houses. In 1873 the fates seemed to join hands with Jay Gould against Marion County, for in that year the river traffic received its death blow. In a mistaken attempt to improve the ship channel, the great raft -- an accumulation of river debris located just above Shreveport -- was cleared away. But instead of improving the channel, this all but destroyed it. The water level in the bayous and lakes dropped quickly, and too late it was discovered that the raft had been serving as a dam to back the water into the ship channel. Shipping from Jefferson became seasonal at first; and when the water sank lower and lower as the years passed, it became impossible. The people of Jefferson were convinced that they should have dealt more kindly with Jay Gould, for he was apparently in league with the gods themselves. The city which had attained its importance as a river port, and which is said to have reached a population of approximately 30,000 in its greatest years, rapidly

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declined in both importance and population during the late seventies and early eighties.

When shipping on the river became next to impossible, the citizens of Jefferson began an attempt to make the place an industrial center. The Kelly Plow Company enlarged the scope of its activities; mills and lumberyards were built; a foundry, and even a smelter were established. For a short time, the county seemed to rally its forces, and the people looked forward to an iron smelting boom. But the coal in the county was not of the right kind, and freight was too high to ship it in. Jefferson even built its own narrow-gauge railroad. But all efforts failed; it was a losing fight from the beginning. The population of the city continued to dwindle, and gradually it became a quiet country town, like dozens of other farming towns in the northern part of the state. The pendulum had described its arc. Marion County had been an agricultural region, had dabbled in lumbering and in mining, and then had reached the heights as a commercial center. Destroyed commercially, the county had attempted industrialization, had again dabbled in lumbering and mining, and was again forced to become a farming county.

The late eighties and the nineties passed, and the history of Marion County followed a course as monotonous and uninteresting as the path of the Negro cotton pickers as they crept through the fields, from one end to the other, and then back again. The turn of the century brought no change to Marion's history—the description remained the same:

East Texas. Languid, lazy rows of cotton winding their serpentine way over red hills bared to the scorching sun. Motionless pines, becalmed like schooners at sea, awaiting a breeze that will carry their balsam-like fragrance afield. Cattle placidly chewing the cud in the dubious shade of bois d'arc trees. The only motion a bent figure moving slowly up the aisles of a cotton patch, the only sound a plaintive song of the negro share-cropper, low, resonant, melodious. . . .

East Texas. Nothing to do but plow, plant and plow again.
Darkies singing and dreaming of a heaven filled with porkchops; shuffling off on Saturday through dusty lanes to obtain
a salt-pork-and-black-eye-peas substitute from 'Mistah Will
th' sto'man.'

Peace over all. Quiet, persistent peace; the same yesterday, the same today, the same tomorrow, the same forever. . . . 30,

In other parts of East Texas the quiet was shattered by the discovery of oil. Jefferson County was booming with the Spindletop Field. And before the thrill was worn away from that discovery, came the Joiner success in Gregg County, almost next door to Marion County. Jefferson, too, hoped for the rejuvenation that might come with an oil field. Sev-

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eral attempts were made to include Marion in the East Texas oil parade. But the roughnecks said there simply were "no holes drier than the ones they dug in Marion County." 31

So Marion County was forced to content herself with another phase of the development of her natural resources. And this time she chose something she was sure of. She was tired of gambling and uncertainty. Caddo Lake and Cypress Bayou could be made into a state park with a little help, for these excellent fishing waters had become a famous vacation land. With the aid of the Civilian Conservation Corps, then, Marion County succeeded in establishing the Caddo Lake State Park. And Jefferson basked in the reflected glory. This was in 1934 and 1935. 32

But in 1937 came the unexpected. The Rodessa pool of Louisiana was discovered, and another oil boom was on. This time it was nearer than ever to Jefferson. And this time some of the holes dug in Marion County were not dry. Within the year, she had four producing oil wells; and within another year the number had jumped to 125. Jefferson was the scene of a new excitement. A real estate boom accompanied the discovery of oil, and new buildings rapidly replaced the decayed ruins left over from the past. The population increased almost two thousand in a single year; and Marion County knew that the curse of Jay Gould was broken. The bats could no longer roost in her vacant houses; for none was vacant. The sound of the hammer and saw drowned out the song of the Negro cotton picker, as tall derricks sprang up in the fields and among the whispering cypress trees. 33

Just as Marion County was beginning to accept the new regime, with pipe lines and oil trucks instead of wagontrains and steamboats, and greasy roughnecks instead of sweating black stevedores, Texas senators in Washington began to urge that a series of dams and locks be built along Red River to restore the old ship channel. If this project is approved, Jefferson may again become a shipping center, and Marion County may profit at last by her rich deposits of iron ore and bituminous coal. 34

County Boundaries

By act of creation, February 8, 1860:

Beginning at the South East corner of Cass county, and running thence North with the East boundary line of said county of Cass, thirteen miles; thence due West to Big Cypress Bayou in the county of Titus, and thence with the meanderings of said Bayou in a South Easterly direction, to the North West corner of Harrison county, and thence down said Bayou with the North line of Harrison county to the place of beginning . . . 35


First change, by act redefining Marion-Harrison line, December 8, 1863:

. . the county line between the counties of Harrison and Marion shall be as follows: Commencing at a point in the centre, or channel, of Big Cypress Bayou, opposite the northeast corner of Upshur county; thence down said Cypress Bayou to a point opposite the north-east corner of a survey for 2214 acres, made by virtue of the head-right of Alexander Johnson; thence south-east to the centre of Little Cypress Bayou; thence down said stream to its junction with Ferrey Lake and Caddo Lake, to the south-east corner of Marion county; which said line shall hereafter be known and recognized as the boundary line between said counties. 36

Second change, by act annexing a portion of Harrison County to Marion County, April 30, 1874:

. . . the line dividing the counties of Harrison and Marion shall hereafter be as follows: adopting the existing line between said counties from the east line of the State running in a westerly direction to the junction of the Big and Little Cyprus bayous; thence up said Little Cyprus bayou, along the center of the main channel through to the southwest corner of a survey of land made in the name of R. Maulding, the same being about four miles above the bridge over Little Cyprus, on the road from Jefferson to Marshall; thence westerly on a line parallel with the general course of Big Cyprus bayou, to the east line of Upshur county; thence north with said last named line to Big Cyprus; and all that territory lying north of said dividing line, shall be and become a part of the county of Marion. 37

2. HOUSING, CARE, AND ACCESSIBILITY OF RECORDS

Marion County, created on February 8, 1860, secured its organ-ization through an election held on March 15 of the same year. The first order of the commissioners court selected Birge's Hall as a temporary courthouse, pending further arrangements.2

On November 19, 1860, the court declared the house of W. M. Freeman to be the courthouse from that date until such time as a permanent building could be erected by the county. Freeman's Hall, as the building was known, continued to be used as a courthouse until 1874, although various additional buildings and rooms were rented from time to time. Dopplemayer, Phelps and Jones, Reuben Wright, and J. M. Murphy were all paid rent for rooms used for county business.4

By order of December 3, 1872, commissioners were appointed to carry on the business incident to building a courthouse. 5 P. M. Comegys was paid \$200 for the courthouse plans, on March 31, 1873; and on May 27, 1874, the courthouse was accepted by the county.

For some reason, probably because it was not near the center of the town, the courthouse proved inconvenient and unsatisfactory to the citizens. Several offices in town were rented for courthouse purposes. 7 Finally, on April 24, 1879, the following notation was entered upon the records of the commissioners court:

This day came on to be heard the petition of the citizens of Marion County to remove the courthouse to some convenient building situated in the business portion of the city of Jefferson.8

On June 4, 1879, Edward Guthridge, W. J. and W. F. J. Williams offered Marion County the upper portion of three buildings on Vale Street free of expense for 5 years, to be used as a courthouse. The offer was accepted. 9 On February 13, 1885, Judge S. W. Moseley was authorized to draw \$2,500 from county funds to purchase a brick building known as the Murphy Building, for a courthouse. 10

The removal of the county offices from the official courthouse led to a complication. On April 3, 1869, the county had accepted a donation

of land from D. N. Alley, with the provision that in the event of failure by the county to erect public buildings on the land, or in the event of their removal at any time, the land was to revert to the donor or his heirs. 11 The courthouse completed in 1874 was called "the new courthouse on the Alley donation . . . "12 At least ten years after the removal of the county offices from this building, the commissioners court, sitting as a board of equalization, declined to consider the assessment rendered by D. N. Alley on property where the "old courthouse and jail are situated." The opinion of the board, as recorded on July 10, 1889, was that the property belonged to Marion County. 13 This situation evidently arose because of the clause in the donation providing for reversion of title to land in the event of removal of county offices. On November 11, 1889, the county attorney was authorized to bring suit to clear title to this land. 14 Although no notation has been found to that effect, the county must have retained title; for on February 12, 1906, the county judge and county clerk were authorized to offer "the old courthouse and jail and the lots belonging thereto, for sale in the Jimplecute . . . "15

Construction of the present courthouse was ordered on September 10, 1912. Elmer G. Withers submitted his plans on September 11, and was named supervising architect on the following day. 16 The building contract was awarded to L. R. Wright and Company, upon their bid of \$41,000. This building was finished and accepted by the county on June 20, 1913. 17 It still serves as the Marion County courthouse.

The present Marion County courthouse, rectangular in shape, with two main floors and a basement, is a good example of modern architecture in public buildings. It has hollow brick and tile outside walls, plastered inner walls and ceilings, and cement floors. It is considered 90 percent fireproof. Ventilation is good throughout the building. Lighting conditions, while they are generally fair for the building as a whole, are quite poor in some cases. In most of the individual departments, the records are being housed under fairly good conditions. They are not exposed to dampness or soot, and few of them are crowded.

The offices of the county clerk, sheriff, county school superintendent, tax assessor-collector, county judge, treasurer and surveyor are located on the first floor of the courthouse. On the second floor are jury rooms, the office of the district clerk, the district courtroom, and a witness room. The justice of the peace of precinct 3, the county seat precinct, has his office in the basement, immediately below the office of the county school superintendent. The basement vault which

- 17 -Housing, Care, and Accessibility of Records (First entry, p. 20) houses retired records of various agencies, is below the county clerk's re vault. This lower vault can be reached only by means of a circular stairway from the clerk's vault. 30 At least 75 percent of the records of Marion County are housed in the vaults of the county and district clerks. The county clerk's office and vault are in the northwest corner of the first floor of the courthouse. The vault is well equipped with shelving and steel file boxes. There is sufficient room in this vault to allow for ordinary expansion for the next it few years. Tables and chairs are available in both the office and the se vault for persons consulting the records. The district clerk's office, 0 on the northwest corner of the second floor, is similarly equipped. However, additional shelving will be needed for this office in the near future. The office shared by the county treasurer and county surveyor is directly across the corridor from the county clerk's office. The surveyor has a steel case for his blue prints, and records of field notes. Tables and chairs are available for visitors. The office of the county judge adjoins the treasurer-surveyor office on the east. There are no facilities for housing records in this office, since all of the records of the department are kept by the county clerk. The east and west offices of the tax assessor-collector are on the south side of the first floor. Housing facilities are ample at the pres-TO ent, and will account for some expansion of the records. Some of the records of the department are kept in the basement vault. t The office and book room of the county superintendent are located on the northeast corner of the first floor. These rooms are equipped with wooden shelves, but more shelving and some steel file cases will be needed within another year. The sheriff's office, on the north side of the first floor, adjoins the county superintendent's department. This office is equipped with wooden shelves and one wooden file case. The equipment is sufficient for present needs, and will probably account for future expansion. The office of the justice of the peace is in the basement, under the superintendent's department. Records are kept in one wooden cabinet and on one table. Steel shelving and one steel file case are badly needed for this office. The district courtroom is in the center of the second floor. It serves both the district and the county court. A basement vault, under the county clerk's vault, houses records of all of the various county agencies. This vault is poorly equipped; records are kept on tables and in wooden cabinets, and cardboard files. Shelving is needed, and there is ample room for it to be installed. Additional chairs and tables for research workers are also needed.

Explanatory Notes

In the inventory proper, each records series is described in a separate entry. The records are shown under the office or agency of origin or of final destination and are grouped thereunder by subject matter; entries are numbered consecutively throughout the inventory in one series (1-280).

- 19 -Abbreviations, Symbols, and Explanatory Notes (First entry, p. 20) Entries are of two kinds: the master entry, describing the record indicated by the title; and the artificial entry, which cannot be located in the county by title, being included with other recordings or papers. Entry titles shown in all capital letters are those appearing on volumes or file boxes, or, if enclosed in parentheses, the titles assigned to containers not titled. Parenthetical titles added to actual titles, and shown with initial capitals only, have been supplied to clarify titles or to correct misnomers. The current or most recent title is used as the title of the entry, with inclusive dates of the series; earlier variations of title are shown, with limiting dates. First and last dates covered by a particular record are shown in the title-line of the entry. Continuous records are shown by a hyphen between the beginning and closing dates, as 1860-95, or by two dashes after a date, indicating that the record is current, as 1915 --; lapses in the record are indicated by a comma between the inclusive dates, as 1901-6, 1912-14. Numbers or letters in parentheses after the number of volumes or file boxes indicate laboling. Title-line cross-references are used to complete a series kept separately for a period of years, or to trace location of an artificial entry, and are complemented by body-of-entry cross-references. To correlate closely related records, such as original reports, shown under the office of destination, and copies of the reports, shown under office of origin, the third-paragraph cross-reference is used. The third paragraph cross-reference is also used, in some instances, to show prior and subsequent records, where the purpose of the records is apparently the same, but the form is different. "See also" cross-references placed after subject headings refer to records classified under a different grouping within the same office or under another office, but dealing with the same subject matter. If no statement is made concerning the condition of records, it is assumed that they are in good condition. Volume and file box dimensions are given in inches. Dimensions for volumes are given in the sequence of height, width, thickness; dimensions for file boxes, in the sequence of height, width, depth. 85
