SG, businesses partner to fight proposed law

More money: \$15,000 available for opposition

Student Government voted to Student Government voted to allocate \$5.000 to its campaign that is targeting the Lexington Area Party Plan in a full senate meeting Wednesday night.

SG had already allocated \$5.000 to buy posters, stickers and buttons to fight the plan. All of the \$10,000 came from the UK Student Government Reserves, what SG calls its "rainy day fund."

A coalition of area businesses raised \$5,000 to support SG's campaign, bringing the total to \$15,000.

The coalition's donations and the money voted on Wednesday will pay for producing and airing a 30-second commercial, which opposes the plan.

will pay for producing and any assessing as a 3-second commercial, which opposes the plan.

"What we've started is a traditional grassroots effort, or what I call a ground effort, but it's now time to go to the air," SG President Tim Robinson said.

The commercial will begin airing on numerous TV news stations Friday morning if the plan passes in the Urban County Council meeting tonight. Robinson estimates that the commercial will be viewed between eight and 12 times by Lexington residents over the

course of the next week. The council will vote again Dec. 13.

"You will not be able to turn on the TV without seeing this thing." Robinson said. If the plan to the commercial will be almost the work of the senate voted 15.4-1.

Senator laura Schmidt voted against the proposal Schmidt said too much money is being spent on the campaign and the funds could be used for other programs.

"I am against the party plan as it's unconstitutional," Hutchinson said. "But this is saturation, not exposure. Saturation is not group to the council votes. San Diego, other cities find ways to curtail college parties

Capped: San Diego State University students understand life under no-party ordinance

Dave Castle and his roommates are careful not to slam their front door. The San Diego State Univer-sity students live in a "capped" house — a situation where UK students may find themselves, too.

San Diego police enacted the College Area Party Plan in 1996. The plan is similar to the Lexington Area Party Plan,

which the Urban County Council will hear today and could vote on next Thursday.

"We're quietar – even straid to slam our door," he said. "The plan does cut down on parties, but it can be abused by neighbors."

As in San Diego, the Lexington plan would allow police to put a yearlong "cap" on properties that receive repeated noise complaints. After the cap, stucomplaints. After the cap, stu-dents living in the property could be arrested and face fines.

Twenty-six properties are capped now in San Diego — all rented by SDS students, said Bill Taitano, a police officer in the San Diego State campus area. About 100 houses have been capped since the program's inception in 1996, he estimates.

"There are a lot of family homes in this neighborhood," he said. "They're concerned about the drunk drivers and trash, urination and defecation in their yards. In one year we had 1,000 noise complaints."

Taitano said the plan has curtailed repeat offenders.

months ago, the property was already capped. The designa-tion ended in December, and by June, the house was capped

"We had two birthday parties — probably about 50 people at each — and then we received the cap notice in the mail without a warning," said Kevin Delant Like Student Government, which has allotted \$15,000 for signs, TV ads and other material to fight the plan, fears the program will run students out of campus neighborhoods. But that hasn't been the case at San Diego State, Castle said.



Legislature recommends pay raises

FRANKFORT, Ky. — The state would boost teacher pay by about \$100 million a year under recommendations presented by a legislative sub-committee on Wednesday. Besides higher base salaries, the list includes additional pay raises for teachers after 20 years and a longer school calendar. In addition, teachers would get the same annual cost-of-living raise as state government employees — 5 percent in most years. There was little discussion and no actual vote on recommendations.

Convict suspected of anthrax hoaxes

Convict suspected of anthrax hoaxes SPRINGDALE, Ohio — An escaped convict suspected of mailing hundreds of anthrax hoax letters to abortion clinics was captured Wednesdy at a copy shop outside Cincinnati after employees recognized him from his wanted poster. Clayton Lee Waagner — who once testified that God told him to kill abortion doctors — was one of the FBI's 10 most-wanted flugitives. He has been on the run since February, when he escaped from a jail in Clinton, Ill. Attorney General John Ashcroft called Waagner the primary suspect behind anthrax hoaxes committed against 200 clinics last month. The clinics received envelopes containing white powder and letters signed by the "Army of God." The powder was not anthrax.

NASA space shuttle blasts off

NASA space shuttle blasts off
CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — After nearly a
week of delays, space shuttle Endeavour blasted
off under heavy protection Wednesday on a flight
to deliver a new crew to the international space
station. The shuttle left a beautiful golden and
peach contrail as it rose from its seaside pad
shortly before sunset, carrying seven astronauts
and a load of station supplies. It was NASA's first
mission since the Sept. 11 attacks and security
was tight. Endeavour had been poised for lithoff
since last Thursday. A jammed docking mechanism at the space station and bad weather forced
delays.

Technology stocks propel Dow Jones

NEW YORK — Surging technology stocks propelled the Dow Jones industrials more than 220 points higher Wednesday, allowing the blue chip index to close above 10,000 for the first time since before the Sept. 11 terror attacks. The advance also lifted the Nasdaq composite index past 2,000 for the first time since early August. Investors were betting that the battered tech sector would trigger a new bull market, and they don't want to miss out on the market's next upturn.

Bin Laden suspected to be 'holed up'

TORA BORA, Afghanistan — Anti-Tailban
forces battled guerrillas loyal to Osama bin

a cave complex where they believe the terror suspect is holed up. Up to 1.500 tribal fighters pushed
down a valley in the White Mountains toward
Tora Bora camp as American B-52s pounded the
area with 250- and 500-pound bombs, setting off
orange flashes and plumes of smoke in the forested mountains. Anti-Tailban commanders said
their troops advanced to within a mile of the

sending the Arab, Chechen and Pakistain fighters of bin Laden's al-Qaida network scurrying to
higher ground. At the Pentagon, spokesman Rear
Adm. John Stufflebeem said U.S. special forces
were in the area. He said Afghan fighters had already entered some caves in the area searching







Remembering to take pill may be remedied by patch

Stick it on: New type is as effective as pill, costs the same, available on campus in 2002

"It becomes a habit," the journalism junior said.
But she said others might have a harder time remembering, which is why the newest type of birth control may suit them.
The Food and Drug Administration approved a new form of birth control last Tuesday that is the first reversible, noninvasive, weekly form of birth control — the first of its kind, the Ortho Evra transfermal contraceptive patch. The patch is thin and beige and can be worn on the buttocks, abdomen, upper outer arm or upper torso excluding the breasts.
Pam Woodrum, a health educator and nurse practitioner at UK's University Health Service, said students should expect to be able to get the patch there.

"More than likely we will have it once it becomes available," she said.

And it may be easier to remember the patch than the pill. An FDA-cited study suggests about 90 percent of patch users replaced their patch once a week, whereas 80 percent of oral contraceptive takers remembered to take their pills everyday.

"For people with busy schedules, this could be a plus." Aguilar

The patch's cycle is similar to that of the pill. Women wear the patch for three weeks, replacing it each week, and take it off during the fourth week to allow menstruation.

Tests suggest the patch is 99 percent effective when taken correctly—the same rate of effectiveness as the pill.

Aguilar said she doesn't plan to switch to the patch because she said she would rather wait until it is not as new.

'I'd like to wait until there's more research on it." she said. The patch must be replaced on the same day each week in order to maintain the cycle, but it doesn't have to be replaced on the same day each week in order to maintain the cycle, but it doesn't have to be replaced on the same that the same part month as the pill—between \$25 and \$40. The patch will be available by prescription and should cost about the same per month as the pill—between \$25 and \$40. The Ortho Evra Web site said the patch will be available from health care professionals by early 3002.

The patch works in much the same way that existing patches used to curb smoking, fight heart disease and lower blood pressure do. The patch, which is applied once a week to the skin, slowly releases the hormones proyent ovulation and thicken the cervical mucus, making it more difficult for sperm cells to enter the uterus. Most side effects are not serious and those that are occur infrequently. Blood clots, heart disease and strokes are the most serious risks and these increase when users moke.



The dome shaped plastic device acts as a physical barrier to fertilization by covering the cervix. They should be used with spermicide. Diaphragms are six times less likely to prevent

Oral contraceptives are taken every day. This method is 99 percent effective in preventing pregnancy if taken correctly. If just one day is missed, another form of birth control must be used for the rest of that month's cycle.



Emergency contraceptive

This form of contraception is a series of pills taken within 72 hours of unprotected sex and is intended for emergencies. This is not the same as RU-486, also known as the French abortion pill.



Female condom

These plastic pouches are held inside the vagina with a flexible plastic ring. They are less effective than the male condom in preventing STDs and pregnancy and are also more expensive.



These plastic or metal objects are inserted within the uterus by a clinician. It prevents implantation of the fertilized egg by speeding up the passage of the zygote through the uterus. IUDs have been linked to an increased risk of uterine infections and painful menstruation.



Norplant progestrin implants

Implants are a long-term form of birth control, which last five years. They are inserted under the skin and may pose serious health risks and side effects.



Depo Provera

The shot prevents pregnancy for three month it poses side effects that can last for several months.



Condoms

Latex condoms are recommended over lambskin and polyurethane condoms because lambskin condoms do not prevent diseases and polyurethane condoms break more often.





Civil liberties crushed by Ashcroft

The Roman "maxim inter arma silent legis" — "in war the laws are silent" — seems to have become the guiding principle for Attorney General John Ashcroft's vision of fighting terrorism.

Thanks to his law-enforcement free-for-all, 1,200 suspects languish in prison, 5,000 await "voluntary questioning," attorney-client privacy in federal prisons is effectively a thing of the past. The Times of London reported Monday that Ashcroft's first traft of the anti-terrorism bill draft of the anti-terrorism bill

draft of the anti-terrorism bill would have done away with a detained suspect's right to a trial.

Although the Senate stopped that effort cold, The New York Times reported Saturday that Ashcroft now plans to do away with the FBI's policies against spying on political and religious organizations organizations.

Under the rules, instituted after the FBI's '60s and '70s domestic ha-

rassment campaigns, undercover FBI agents cannot investigate groups meeting in churches, mosques or synagogues without probable cause or evidence that someone in the group broke a law

Anti-terrorism officials claim Islamic militants, aware of the FBI limitations, have been meeting in mosques, but Ashcroft's comments reveal a more virulent contempt for religious freedom and an outrageous desire to ex-tend the tentacles of his investigative beast

"... Any organization that makes it part of its mantra ... to kill innocent American people ... we're interested in them," he said on ABC's "This Week." "If a religion is hijacked and used as a cover for killing thousands of cover for killing thousands of Americans, we're interested in

Ashcroft continued, "There aren't areas of this culture that are authorized by virtue of some cloak they draw over them to be criminal and to assault and kill Americans.

After paying lip service to religious liberty, the attorney general said "for so-called terrorists to gather over themselves some rope of clericism ... and claim immuni-ty from being observed, people who hijack a religion and make out of it an implement of war will not be free from our interests

Never mind the president's as-surances that a war on terrorism is not a war on Islam. Never mind the millions of Muslims in the United States and

worldwide who have condemned the Sept. 11 attacks and continue to practice a peaceful religion.

And never mind the Constitution's guarantee of the right to practice religion, discuss beliefs and even confess sins without wondering if the government

is listening.
Ashcroft seems prepared to turn professions of faith into an indictment or even blackmail to gain a coerced convert to his cru-

sade.
"God bless America" is not re "God bless America is not re-stricted to a god whose followers unquestioningly wave the flag while surrendering whatever freedoms get in the way of Ashcroft's frustrated search for smoking guns.

Monitoring suspects with probable cause is good law enforcement; infiltrating religious organizations is unconstitutional.

The Constitution was not de signed to be silent, even during war, and it needs more than ever to speak loudly enough for Ashcroft to hear.




