Board to fund day-care center

Citing a need for working faculty, staff and students to have an affordable, on-campus facility for their children, the UK Board of Trustees approved the establishment of a campus day-care center that would be completed by fall 1990.

The facility, which will be located on the corner of Woodland and Columbia avenues, would hold about 135 children. More importantly, it will give UK employees the best of both worlds.

"People want it because ... they have to work and exercise responsibilities to their children," UK President David Roselle said.

The idea is based on a similar plan done by the University of Alabama-Birmingham, Ala., said Jack Blanton, UK vice chancellor for administration.

"We bring to you ... a unique idea, a unique proposition in terms of colleges and universities," Blanton told the board. "This is not just a baby-sitting service."

Under the agreement, Kinder-Care Learning Centers, Inc., of Birmingham would lease one acre of land for \$1 a year from UK to build the center, Blanton said.

At its own cost, Kinder-Care will construct and operate a facility for faculty, staff and students. A 20 percent discount will be offered to UK employees and students.

In return, UK will guarantee at least 75 children of University staff and employees and a 15-year lease, with three 5-year options to extend the lease, Blanton said.

A pool of about 5,000 children of University employees showed interest in such a facility, according to a survey done by UK, Blanton said.

"We did a needs survey," Roselle said. "That certainly was compelling to look further" into the idea of a center.

The proposal must go before the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Planning and Zoning Commission. There have been no objections to the program, Roselle said.

"At this point in time, it looks like a go," Blanton said.

The University did not have adequate funds to construct and operate a child care center, Blanton said, therefore UK sent out requests for proposals to the major child-care companies in the region.

Kinder-Care was the only company to respond, Blanton said.

The quality of staff will be excellent, Blanton said — "better than what you

would find" at other day-care centers.

The director of the day-care center and the assistant director of the staff will be required to have degrees in child care, he said.

At the end of the lease, the improvements to the property revert to UK, according to the report.

1989-90 budget includes pay raise, strains colleges

Trying to narrow an increasing gap between salaries at UK and median salaries at comparable institutions, the UK Board of Trustees approved a 7 percent average salary increase Tuesday for its faculty and staff.

The salary increase was the primary component of a \$671.3 million operating budget the board approved Tuesday.

The average UK faculty salary is \$39,604, about \$5,000 less than what faculty make at benchmark institutions.

The disparity between salaries was expected to continue rising unless measures were taken, UK officials said.

"It's a necessity because of the strong feeling that salaries are a top priority" at UK, said Bernie Vonderheide, University spokesman.

The gap has increased from \$636 in 1984 to its current level.

"Rather than catching up we're even that much further behind," said Ed Carter, vice president for administration.

To provide for the increase, UK's colleges and departments will be asked to dig deep. UK will take \$6.6 million — almost 3 percent — from college and department personnel, which will cause some problems:

•Many colleges may have to hold vacant faculty positions open longer;

•UK will be left with a \$1.7 million contingency budget — a level that will limit the University's flexibility, according to Larry Forgy, chairman of the board's finance committee. "We're getting to a dangerously

low level," he said.

With such a small amount, Forgy said UK might not be able to absorb "major kinds of occurrences," such as a cut in state appropriation.

"Other areas of UK also will suffer. Taking money away will affect the ability to carry out any deferred maintenance programs, Carter said.

Flexibility in buying instruction and research equipment to stay modern also "is certainly being diminished," Carter said.

The University's largest source of funding is the state appropriation, which is \$254 million, or 37.8 percent of the budget. While the state appropriation from the state is more this year, in real terms it declined 38.4 percent.

Other major funding sources for UK are hospital revenues from UK's Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, which accounts for 23 percent; tuition and fees, which make up 9.3 percent; and affiliated corporations, which account for 10.7 percent.

In addition to providing the salary increase, the new budget includes a 5 percent scale adjustment for entry-level staff positions, funding for faculty promotions, and a 3 percent increase in operating funds.

The 7 percent salary increase will cost \$13.6 million and the 3 percent operating expense increase will cost \$900,000, according to the report.

Although the increase in salaries "represents a turnaround," UK President David Roselle said the University will still be about \$4,400 behind its benchmark schools in faculty pay.

The gap in staff and faculty pay at UK's 14 community colleges also will widen.

The current average salary for community colleges is \$25,177, while comparable institutions are at \$27,479. With the pay increase, faculty pay will remain about \$2,000 behind.

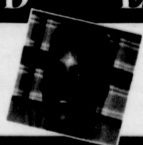

Miller says he'll stay at UK his senior year

Pitino announces choice of coaches

Despite the NCAA probation, Rick Pitino had no trouble adding two more to his coaching staff and talking one player into staying at UK.

Last Thursday, Pitino named Orlando "Tubby" Smith as an assistant coach and Billy Donovan as a graduate assistant coach.

Smith, 37, was an assistant coach at the University of South Carolina for three years under head coach George Felton. He previously was an assistant coach for seven years at Virginia Commonwealth University.

"Tubby Smith is a well-rounded coach," Pitino said in a statement released by UK's sports information department. "He has coached at both the high school and college levels and is going to give us an added boost in recruiting in the south."

The Scotland, Md. native said the decision to come to UK was a difficult one. "Leaving South Carolina is tough," Smith said. "But I feel that Kentucky basketball is tops, and I want to be apart of that great tradition."

When Smith joined Felton's staff in 1986, the NCAA was investigating South Carolina under the leadership of ex-coach Bill Foster. Six months later the program was put on probation for two years.

"I have no reservations whatsoever about coming into this situation," Smith said of UK's three-year probation. "We had the same experience at South Carolina and we turned that into a positive experience."

Donovan, 24, played under Pitino at Providence where he helped guide the Friars to a Final Four appearance in 1987. He also played for Pitino with the New

York Nicks during the 1987-88 season. Recently, he worked at a Wall Street investment banking firm.

"Billy Donovan will work with me each day during individual instruction in developing offensive moves of our players," Pitino said. "We are pleased to have him on our staff."

A third round draft choice of the Utah Jazz, Donovan said even though he had joined a firm on Wall Street, he wanted to stay in basketball.

"I just couldn't see myself doing this for the rest of my life," Donovan said.

After hearing Pitino might come to UK,

Donovan called his former coach.

"Coach told me he would have an opening as a graduate assistant and would love to have me," he said.

The new graduate assistant said that Pitino makes his players work to the best of their abilities by spending time with them individually and lifts the players confidence level.

Pitino also stresses teamwork. "You know when Coach Pitino got (to Providence) every guy there didn't understand what working together was," Donovan said.

There is even more good news for

Coach Pitino and his Wildcats.

Senior-to-be Derrick Miller has decided to stay at UK after meeting with Pitino.

"The grass isn't always greener on the other side," Pitino told Miller during their meeting.

"That's something my grandmother and grandfather used to tell me," Miller said. "When he said it, it kind of hit home with me."

After weeks of uncertainty about his future at UK, Miller decided that Pitino could help him improve and give him a shot at the NBA.

"He told me I needed to get stronger, but that he thought I had a good size," the senior guard said. "He said he would see to it that I would get a chance (at the pros)."

Miller's mother, Bernice, was not sure her son should stay at UK because of no live TV coverage during the 1989-90 season.

"I was talking to her the other day and we were talking about the (NBA finals) and she said, 'who's this Joe Dumars?'," Miller said. "And I said, 'See, you never saw him on television and he's in the NBA.'"

Miller thought about red-shirting just so could play on TV. He didn't, however, want to have to prove himself again for a starting position.

"I worked hard to earn a starting position and I want to keep it," Miller said.

UK Athletics Director C.M. Newton did give Miller permission to talk to other schools. But Miller only talked to UNLV and Minnesota and didn't make any visits.

SGA supports China students

Tip O'Neill to lecture on campus

Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill, former Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives and one of the more prominent national politicians in the last 25 years, will speak Oct. 24 at the Singletary Center for the Arts.

At its Tuesday night meeting, the Student Government Association Interim Summer Senate voted to allocate \$22,500 to bring the Massachusetts Democrat to campus.

"We wanted to get someone who everyone will know," said Robyn Walters, chairman of the SGA's speakers bureau. "With this being a predominantly Democratic state, we thought he would generate a lot of interest."

O'Neill will help SGA regain its reputation for having good speakers, said SGA President Sean Lohman.

"We want to build our reputation for bringing good speakers back up while providing an effective service for the students," Lohman said.

Based on last year's high turnout for speakers like Coretta Scott King, Lohman said he expects turnout for O'Neill to fill the Singletary Center for the Arts.

"If interest is high enough we may be able to move to Memorial Coliseum," he said. "O'Neill is excited about coming to UK and accepted the first date we offered. We had a scheduling problem, he was really understanding and was happy to work with us to change it."

O'Neill was elected to Congress in 1952, succeeding John F. Kennedy.

"I think having served with eight presidents, he has a great deal of experience he can relay to the students," Lohman said.

O'Neill will speak on current affairs and tell a few personal anecdotes before opening the floor up to questions.

"We will be having a press conference before the program so the students will be the only ones allowed to ask questions," Lohman said.

The event will be free to students.

Sigma Kappa offers rushees another choice

Students participating in sorority rush this fall will have one more organization to choose from. UK's Panhellenic Council, the governing body of UK sororities, voted last spring to invite Sigma Kappa to colonize a chapter at UK.

Sigma Kappa is the first sorority to come to campus since 1982, raising the number of UK sororities to 14.

One reason Sigma Kappa was invited to begin a colony because many sororities' pledge classes were getting too large, and bringing another sorority would be one way to limit them, said Susan West, Panhellenic

co-adviser.

Quotas, the maximum number of rushees a sorority can pledge, are set based on the number of students who rush. Last year's quota was 52.

English junior Debi Allen said she hopes the addition of Sigma Kappa will reduce pledge class sizes.

"Fourteen sororities is a lot for one campus, but so many more girls go through rush every year, that if we did not do anything, we might have to go to set quotas and some girls won't get in a sorority at all," said Allen, a member of Alpha Omicron Pi.

"Realistically, quotas for pledge classes will not be any lower for this fall," West

said.

If past trends continue, West said, the number of students participating in fall formal rush will continue to increase. Another sorority on campus will not make a significant difference in the numbers of girls in sororities, but she said it is a beginning toward reducing chapter sizes.

During the regular fall formal rush, Sigma

ma Kappa only will participate in the first round of parties - 30-minute sessions in which rushees get a chance to become acquainted with each sorority.

Sigma Kappa then will drop out of formal rush, and conduct their own rush in September.

Sigma Kappa now has chapters at four other Kentucky colleges and universities.

UK names two assistant coaches to Lady Kat squad

With the addition of two new assistant coaches, the UK Lady Kat basketball program is gearing up for the 1989-90 season.

Karen Booker, who served as a volunteer coaching assistant at Vanderbilt University last season, replaces former UK assistant Cindy Hauseman, who left UK last month.

Head coach Sharon Fanning stressed Booker's emphasis on academics as well as athletics.

Jerry McLaughlin, the other assistant coach recently hired, was an assistant at New Mexico State University and has served as a head coach as well.

"Jerry brings a great deal of experience and recruiting to the Lady Kat program," Fanning said. "Jerry has been in Division I for seven years, with two years as a head coach, and he is very familiar with recruiting on a national level."

It remains to be seen whether these additions in the coaching staff can turn around the Lady Kat program next season. Last year Kentucky suffered through an overall 12-16 record, including 3-6 in Southeastern Conference play.

Track team does well in recruiting

The UK cross country and track teams have enjoyed a good recruiting season and are looking to be very strong in the fall.

The women's program, which won the NCAA Championship in cross country last year, has signed seven runners, most of whom have impressive high school credentials.

Among the top of the females signed is Lisa Dresdel, of Spokane, Wash.

UK track coach Gene Weis said Dresdel "has been undoubtedly one of the five or 10 best high school-distance runners in the country."

She won the 3,000-meter high school championship at the Penn Relays and won the 3,000 meters again at the Golden West Invitational, the oldest high school track meet in the country.

Almost as impressive has been Christa Holms, of Des Moines, Iowa, who was both the 3,000-meter and 1,500-meter champion in Iowa for three consecutive years.

But UK also received a boost in short-distance running as well. Marcy Hoffman, of Chicago, Ill., was the state champion in the 100-meter and 200-meter dash.

Among other signees for the women's program are Shalonda Smith, of Jersey City, N.J.; Dannette Robinson, of Bettendorf, Iowa; Michele Schwegman, from Oxford, Ohio; and Dana Dietz, of Washington Crossing, Penn.

But the women aren't the only ones benefiting from an excellent recruiting season. The men's cross country and track program also signed seven athletes to letters-of-intent.

They managed to get some of the best in-state talent in Damian Nally, of Lexington, and Goldie Taylor, of Mayfield.

While all the incoming talent for next year may not immediately spell championships, it should keep UK's program among the best in the nation.

The credentials of the new assistants are a mix of experience and youth.

McLaughlin helped lead New Mexico State to 26-3 record overall and a 10-0 conference record. The Roadrunners were ranked 19th in the final NCAA poll.

Before working with New Mexico State, McLaughlin was a head coach for two years

at Siena College in New York. While there, he posted a 34-24 record.

McLaughlin turned that program around as well.

After going just 14-15 in its first season, Siena posted a 20-9 mark in McLaughlin's second season, enough to earn him the conference coach-of-the-year

award.

While Booker doesn't have as much experience as McLaughlin, she is very familiar with the SEC. Booker was a vital member of Vanderbilt University.

"I feel ... that she'll be an outstanding coach," Fanning said. "Having been a player at Vandy, she realizes the level of

competition and what it takes to be successful in the SEC."

Fanning also said that one of Booker's goals was for Kentucky to be at the top of the SEC. It may be too early to tell if the Lady Kats can reach that goal within the next couple of years, but they feel they are going in the right direction.

Davis, latest film "Earth Girls are Easy," fall short of their potential

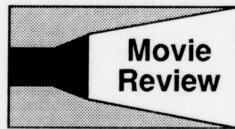

Satirizing bad space movies of the '50s and '60s (as if there were that many good ones) in the framework of a comedy/musical sounds like a promising premise. It sounds even better with a talented cast that includes Geena Davis (who won an Academy Award for her role in "The Accidental Tourist") and Jeff Goldblum.

But with all that going for it, "Earth Girls Are Easy" falls short of the promise it had.

The plot, in a nutshell, involves aliens who become infatuated with earth women they see on a television signal and crash their ship into Geena Davis' swimming pool. (Nobody said that plot had to be grounded in reality.)

The satire works in some places but for the most part it is understated. For the audi-



ence to appreciate satire, it has to be more evident.

Another problem is the on-screen relationship between Davis and Goldblum. The scenes could stand more editing. The chemistry between the two is not convincing, which is surprising since the two are married in real life.

There are some genuinely funny gags in the movie, including a weird dream sequence which Davis has.

Julie Brown, of MTV fame, adds a couple

of songs that are funny despite her truly aggravating voice.

In one of her songs about blonds, she sings something to the effect of "I see other people work, it makes me giggle, I

don't have to work, I just have to jiggle."

The obligatory night on the town scene with the aliens has its moments but for the most part it is contrived.

The movie does have some interesting

characters that add to and save certain scenes but they can't save the movie as a whole.

"Earth Girls Are Easy" is rated PG and is showing at South Park Cinemas.

Strong actions by UK Trustees a welcome sign

By approving both a 7 percent faculty and staff raise and a new day-care facility, the UK Board of Trustees and President David Roselle have sent a strong and clear message to its community: UK cares.

After Gov. Wallace Wilkinson's crippling 1988-89 state budget, UK faculty members received pay increases averaging only 2 percent, leaving the University even further behind its benchmark institutions in faculty pay.

But UK is taking steps to improve the situation, even though it will put a strain on many of UK's colleges and departments.

The University is taking \$6.6 million - about 3 percent - from college and department personnel. As a result, many colleges may have to hold vacant faculty positions open longer to keep their budgets in line.

We think that's a small price to pay. UK simply cannot afford to lose any more faculty members. Sooner or later, the University will catch up. We just all have to tighten our belts a little more in the meantime.

Tuesday's BOT meeting wasn't all bad - the announcement of a day-care facility for UK faculty, staff and students is great news to a University in desperate need of such a facility.

By raising salaries and building a day-care center, UK is sending strong messages to its community and the country. UK is still reeling a bit from the negative publicity surrounding the wrongdoings of its basketball programs. This can only help to improve UK's image.

NCAA regulations should be more fair

College athletics was purged of another coach accused of wrongdoing by the NCAA after the University of Oklahoma's Barry Switzer stepped down as head coach of one of the most renegade football programs in the country.

While no one could fault Switzer's results on the field (three national titles, 12 Big Eight Conference championships), OU's off-the-field results were disastrous.

This year, five players have been arrested and charged with felony offenses ranging from sexual assault to drug possession to gun charges. Then the NCAA rocked Oklahoma with three years probation after it was found guilty of 20 violations (Switzer was named in four of the 20 charges).

Switzer finally resigned, citing frustration with NCAA rules.

"We have created a system where neither me nor the program can buy a pair of shoes or a decent coat for a player whose parents can't afford these basic necessities," Switzer said.

Switzer made a valid point, even though his sincerity rang hollow. Oklahoma made a mockery of the rules. But the NCAA rules do need to be changed to allow for greater fairness to the athletes. The NCAA should address this issue at its next convention.

We hope the NCAA will realize that if the rules are changed then there won't be a need for cheating or illegal inducements. Amateur athletics doesn't need anymore Barry Switzers.



Hard hit

Sanctions against men's basketball program could be positive for UK

When UK was courting Rick Pitino, New York Times sports columnist Dave Anderson was baffled why Rick Pitino would even consider leaving the New York Knicks and the Big Apple, with all of its metropolitan offerings, and come to small-town Lexington to coach college basketball at UK.

Aside from the cost of living in Lexington being much lower than what it is in New York City and that you can walk down Broadway in Lexington, even at night, without fear of being attacked, one need look no further than the five NCAA banners hanging from the "House that Rupp Built" on the Avenue of Champions.

Pitino is under 40 years old, and when UK is off probation, he very well could double that number before he retires.

Pitino also is keenly aware that UK basketball will return to its appropriate position in the universe as the pinnacle of college basketball before the end of the century.

While it was entirely appropriate for UK to be placed on probation by the NCAA, the next few years in college basketball probably will not seem quite right.

There will be Southeastern Conference teams to take UK's place as the conference favorite each year and there will be little difficulty finding 64 teams to fill the NCAA tournament, but somehow it will not seem right with the Blue and White not playing basketball in the March classic, much less have a losing season.

The pressure of playing or coaching in New York City is said to be terrible. With so many media outlets and millions of crazy fans, every dropped fly ball, dropped pass or missed layup is examined on the micro level.

But Pitino will not find things much different at UK. As Rex Chapman can attest to, every move of a UK basketball player or coach also is intensely watched. The only exception, however, is that you are treated like a god.

One of the factors that led to the downfall of Eddie Sutton was that he thought deity entitled him to write his own rules, however unethical they were. While that was acceptable to some UK fans, the NCAA and UK President David Roselle abruptly brought Sutton back to his mortal status.

It also will be interesting to see how Pitino, a New Yorker, is accepted by the "Bubba constituency." As Gov. Wallace Wilkinson reminded Jim Wright at last year's Democratic National Convention - much to the embarrassment of the state - Bubba doesn't much like people who don't speak English.

While Wilkinson was referring to Spanish, New Yorkers' rapid-fire delivery is just as foreign to some Kentuckians. UK fans have not had to deal with a Northerner as a basketball coach since be-

fore Adolph Rupp arrived on campus in 1930, and when they discover that Pitino says paragraphs in the time it took Sutton to say a sentence, it will take some adjusting.

Pitino also must remember who he is responsible to. While Sutton paid lip service to the "wonderful fans of the state of Kentucky," he seemed to forget that he had to play by the rules.

The UK basketball coach is a state celebrity, admired by thousands of fanatical fans. When Sutton's program broke the rules, it not only violated NCAA regulations, but it violated the trust of its fans.

Unfortunately, in some parts of the state, UK basketball is all there is in some people's lives. And Sutton and his assistants never seemed to realize that they had to play by the rules.

Anyone who read the May 31 edition of *Sports Illustrated* easily could get the idea that Roselle is the real Elliot Ness of college athletics.

Roselle was depicted as a tough, no-nonsense president who forced one of the state's legends to resign from athletics director (Cliff Hagan) and threatened a demigod (Sutton) if he did not step down.

Roselle's handling of the investigation should be a model for any school that is in trouble with the NCAA. He was fair, thorough and professional in handling the investigation, and he probably saved UK basketball from being banned.

The next move Roselle needs to make to harness the athletics department is to make the UK Athletics Association answerable to him. Currently, the Athletics Association operates independently from the administration, which during the last few years, was not unlike allowing the kinder to manage the kindergarten.

As long as athletics is separate from the administration, there still could be the potential for more trouble with the NCAA.

After the athletics department is put in its proper place, Roselle should take away Wildcat Lodge - which is a testament to the excesses of UK basketball - and turn it into a day-care center, college hotel or something else the entire campus can benefit from.

The effects of the UK scandal will have a significant impact on the Big Blue psyche for several years. Just like the Chicago White Sox fans fol-

lowing revelations of the 1919 Black Sox Scandal, UK fans saw the ugliness of a program, except it not only violate the fans' trust, but disregarded the rules, violated ethical standards and showed contempt toward higher education.

UK fans were told that their beloved Wildcat program was as corrupt - if not more - than those "other" schools. It will be Pitino's job to not only restore winning basketball to UK but bring integrity to a program that appears to have been bankrupt for it for decades. Ending the nation's fiscal debt would be an easier challenge.

Perhaps two or three mediocre or losing seasons at UK will do the state some good. With basketball out of the state's spotlight for awhile, perhaps it citizens will turn to more serious matters, like reforming education. Wishful thinking.

One person who may benefit from the sanctions is UK football coach Jerry Claiborne. Although Claiborne has run a much more honest program and has remembered his job as a college coach entails not only winning games but educating tomorrow's leaders, he never has received the respect from the state or athletics department he deserves.

Unlike Paul "Bear" Bryant did when he coached at UK, Claiborne never publicly has whined about playing second fiddle to Big Blue basketball.

Now, with football the only major sport left at UK, hopefully Claiborne will receive that well-earned support.

UK class to design home

A summer architecture class received \$3,000 from a UK alumnus to design a summer home for him in Central Kentucky.

Franklin Gray, senior vice president for design and construction of Gray Construction Co., gave six \$500 scholarships to a UK summer architecture class to design a small summer home for him in rural Central Kentucky.

Gray said he donated the money for the project because the "University's College of Architecture was a good experience for me."

"This is part of our company and our mission to give back what was taken," said Gray, who also is on the College of Architecture Advisory Board. "This is just one of the many avenues that higher education can work closer with individuals and private businesses."

Gray's contribution to the college will allow students to take part in the project from conception to completion, said Jose Oubriere, dean of the College of Architecture.

"This is another aspect of architecture we get to experience, and we would not have been able to participate without his support," said senior Stephen Thompson.

The summer class, taught by Gary Murphy and David Wittmer, will spend about five weeks in a Pence Hall studio designing the structure and about seven weeks building it at the rural site.

"The class allows us to go beyond the concept of design and actually experience the full process of making a building," said senior Penny Gawthorp. "We are redefining what it means to be a master-builder."

Murphy and Wittmer are recent UK graduates and are partners in Prajna Woodworks, a local design and construction firm.

"What's been interesting for the students has been to develop a concept that can be built at full-scale," Wittmer said.

The students participating in the project are Sonja F. Anderson of Owensboro, Ky.; Gawthorp of Gassaway, W.Va.; William Douglas Kays of Louisville, Ky.; Michael Russell of Campbellsville, Ky.; Jeff Stivers of Paris, Ky.; and Thompson of Rochester, N.Y.
