NATION Clinton trying to save peace process

WASHINGTON — President Clinton strug-gled yesterday to keep the Mideast peace process from falling apart, but Israel immediately sus-pended U.S.-brookered negotiations with Syria. As Israel reeled from the third deadly bombing in a week, Israeli diplomats notified the State Department that talks with Syria at the Wye con-ference center in eastern Maryland would be sus-pended indefinitely.

The negotiations, which are focused on security along the Iszeli-Syrian horder, were due to resume Monday after a weekend break. Secretary of State Warren Christopher, returning from a trip to Central and South America, was due to participate in some of this week's sessions.

But Gaddi Baltiansky, spokesman for the Israeli Embassy, said the department had been ontified there would be no session on Monday. He said the Israeli delegation, which met last week with a Syrian delegation, would remain in Washington to see if there would be a resumption later.

Cuba sanctions may have big impact

Cuba sanctions may have big impact

WASHINGTON — A new bill aimed at toppling Field Castro by tightening U.S. sanctions
against Cuba could end up causing pain to U.S.
business, too, Officials say.

A provision allowing U.S. citizens to sue foreign corporations that use confescated property in
Cuba could create "economic chaos" with American trading partners like Mexico and Canada, several Cuba experts said.

And it could help foreign companies gain market share in the Caribbean's largest country.

"It certainly doesn't do anything positive for
U.S. business," said William LeoGrande, professor of government at American University. "It
does run the risk of disrupting normal trade and
business relationships with our closest allies."

John Kavulich, president of the U.S.-Cuba
Trade and Economic Council, calls the bill tlantamount to "laying out a welcome mat for U.S.
competitors."

Last week, congressional leaders and President
Clinton agreed on the measures in the bill, aimed
at drying up foreign investment in Cuba. It is
expected to pass easily in both the House and
Senate.

Children rank as most-abused group

Children rank as most-abused group

WASHINGTON — Two-thirds of sex offenders in state prisons attacked children, and a third of these victims were offspring or stepchildren of-their attackers, the Justice Department reported yesterday.

In a report based on the largest survey ever of state prison inmates, the department said children under age 18 bear the brunt of sex offenses and that child molesting remains a crime most often perpetrated by relatives and acquaintanness rather han strangers.

The department's Bureau of Justice Statistice stimated that state prisons held 43,52 immates stated that the state of prisons held 43,52 immates stated that the state of prisons held 43,52 immates extinated that state prisons held 43,52 immates extinated 64,82 state immates convicted for under 18. That represents 65.5 percent of the estimated 64,82 state immates convicted of raping or sexually assaulting victims of all ages.

"This high rate of child victims is behind the heightened concern and the growing number of states passing laws that provide for notifying neighborhoods when sexual predators move in, and David Bestly, acting executive director of the National Victims Center, a private advocacy group in Arlington, Va. "The majority of sex crimes are committed against children because they are more helpless, easier targets and easier to intimidate into silence."

The Justice Department data are consistent with a 1992 national survey of crime victims by Beatty's group. "Of those who were sexually victimized, 61 percent said it happened when they were under 18 years old," he said in an interview.



A native of Sighet, Transylva-nia (Romania), Wiesel and his family were deported by the Nazis

to Auschwitz when he was 15

His mother and younger sister perished there, but he and his two older sisters survived.

After the war, Wiesel studied in Paris and later became a journalist in that city, ver he remained silent about what he had endured as an immate in the death camps as a teenager.

During an interview with the French writer Francois Mauriac, Wiesel was persuaded to end that silence.

Wites as silence.

He subsequently wrote "Night," an account of his experience during the Holocaust. Since its publication in 1958, the book has been translated into 25 languages.



"Right now we are trying to find out what programs we need," said Roseann Hogan, director of planning and assessment. "I don't know if the faculty can support the kind of curriculum we have here."

The UK Planning and Assessment reports that UK has lost an average of nine percent of its freshmen from the fall to the spring semesters and an addition-

al 14.2 percent do not return in the subsequent fall semester.

Many freshmen who enter college do not have the basic math skills and at least 34 percent of freshmen had to take remedial level math courses.

However, Director of Administrations Joseph L. Fink said the main problem with freshmen entering UK is that many of them are not challenged academically enough in high school.

The biggest area that 1 see needs improving is study skills," Fink said. "Students do not know how to budget their free time between classes and many spend their time socializing, working outside of school and sitting in the television lounges."




