Watts given 10 years in prison

Punishment: Former UK football player receives prison sentence for deaths in truck accident

SOMERSET — Jason Watts was sentenced to 10 years in prison yesterday at the Pulaski County District Court. The small court room held a relaxed atmosphere before the sentencing started. Media representatives outnumbered friends, family and community observers by more than 2-to-1. Reporters and cameramen chatted with each other as if things were business as usual, while the Watts family held hands and waited for their son to enter. Danielle Steinmetz, the sister-in-law of the late Artie Steinmetz, and an unidentified woman sat in

the front bench next to a line of newspaper photographers. Steinmetz and Christopher Brock were killed in a Nov. 15, 1998 car wreck when Watts lost control of his truck and crashed. The room fell silent when Watts entered the courtroom, wearing a navy blue prison jumpsuit and stainless steel shackles. Watts had his eyes remained fixed upon his feet as he walked in front of the judge's bench and took his seat, just steps away from a firing squad of television cameras. After presiding Judge Daniel J. Ventures began the sentencing, he asked Watts' attorney James Lowry if he had any statements to make in Watts' defense. Lowry spoke to great lengths

about Watts' willingness to accept responsibility for the crimes he was being charged with. "When this accident happened, the very first thing he told us was 'I'm at fault, I don't have to have a trial,'" Lowry said, quoting Watts. He also spoke about Watts' recent speaking engagements, where he has spoken to groups of school children about the dangers of drinking and driving. He said that he and Watts were requested for the engagements and did not seek them out. Lowry said some have made claims that the speaking engagements indicate preferential treatment for Watts, who would otherwise be in jail. Watts delivered the speeches because he wanted to, and because the court

allowed him to, not out of any arrangement for a lighter sentence, he said. "If the court feels that this is preferential treatment, we will be glad to send him to jail," Lowry said. "It's easy to sit in jail." Lowry also made it clear they were not asking for probation at yesterday's sentencing, but said they will ask for shock probation at the appropriate time. When given his opportunity to give comments, Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery agreed that Watts had accepted accountability for the crimes he has been charged with. "That is to be commended," Montgomery said. "but he is responsible for the deaths of two people. He deserves to be punished."

Montgomery recommended that Watts be given two five-year prison sentences, to be served consecutively, for a total of 10 years. He recommended against probation. When Judge Ventures asked Watts if he had anything he wished to say to the court, Watts responded in quiet, tear-choked tones. "I'm sorry to all the people I let down," Watts said. Audience members sobbed audibly as Judge Ventures delivered the full sentence recommended by the prosecution and denied Watts probation. When asked to comment, Danielle Steinmetz said she was still very upset and confused by the whole issue. "It's a senseless tragedy," Steinmetz said. "It's too difficult to comprehend. I'm just trying to forgive Jason Watts."



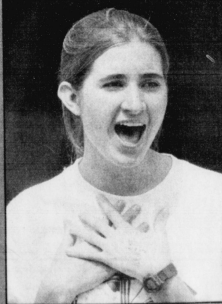

2 arrested in Haggin drug bust

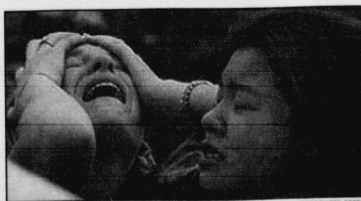
Shocked: Residents amazed by bust of students caught with 2 pounds of marijuana

More than two pounds of marijuana was confiscated in Haggin Hall last Friday night by UK police. Two residents were charged with trafficking within 1,000 yards of a school, according to police reports. Fayette County District Court records named the two residents as Dave Richardson, 18, a finance freshman, and Brad Fisher, also 18, an undeclared freshman. Richardson said he and Fisher were watching television when police knocked on the door of his room. According to police records, a source from the area provided reason for the police to believe that Fisher was selling marijuana. When police spoke with him, Richardson said he willingly gave the police his stash of marijuana. Richardson and Fisher were then taken into custody. "I'm in a lot of trouble," Richardson said. "Yeah, a lot of trouble." Following their arrest, police tried to obtain permission to enter Fisher's room. Fisher refused and police then obtained a search warrant, Richardson said. After searching Fisher's room, police found two more pounds of marijuana. Drug paraphernalia and \$341 cash were also confiscated, according to police records. "We are looking at one-five years," Richardson said. Students were shocked to discover that the arrests and confiscation occurred in their hall. Undeclared freshman Jeff Pritchett, a Haggin resident, was surprised that this incident took place. "I would have never have thought that such a large amount of marijuana would be in the residence halls," Pritchett said. Although students are shocked that this incident occurred, there are others who realize the consequences that come when dealing with drugs. "People dealing with drugs should understand that there are consequences that come with the lifestyle," said Phillip Nemes, a geology freshman and Haggin resident. The University is strict when it comes to trafficking drugs on campus. "One of the quickest ways to get kicked out of this institution is by trafficking drugs," said Associate Dean of Students Victor Hazard. "I feel everyone learned from my mistake. Richardson said. "I hope everyone I know will clean up their act and grow up."

25 Dead in Colorado

25 possibly dead in shooting

Gunmen dead also: Shooting spress claims lives, leaves community in shock, disbelief

LITTLETON, Colo. — Two young men in fatigues and black trench coats attacked students with guns and explosives in a suicide mission at a suburban Denver high school yesterday, and the sheriff said 25 people may have been killed. The gunmen were found dead in the library.

Several students said the killers — believed to be former students at Columbine High School — were gunning for minorities and athletes.

The gunmen were found dead with devices on them that authorities said could be bombs.

"It appears to be a suicide mission," Sheriff John Stone said.

At least 20 people were wounded at the 11:30 a.m. attack. Shots ricocheted off lockers as the gunmen opened fire with what students said were automatic weapons. One girl was shot nine times in the chest.

"At first we thought it was fireworks, then we saw them shooting," said Jake Apoeca, 16. "He saw us and then he started shooting at us. Then a guy in a white T-shirt threw two hand grenades on the roof. We hit the ground and then we started running."

Many students dived to the floors and sprinted for the exits. Dozens of students hid in classrooms before escaping with the help of police in an armored car. Others were trapped for hours while SWAT teams searched for the gunmen.

At one point, a bloodied young man dangled from a second-floor window, his right arm limp, and was helped down by two SWAT team members. His condition was not immediately known.

The sheriff said 25 people may have been killed, students and teachers alike. But by early evening, officers had yet to remove any bodies because of the danger of explosives and the need to preserve evidence. FBI agents and police SWAT teams slowly made their way through the building.

Recent shootings involving U.S. schools:

- 1 Oct. 1, 1997 Pearl, Miss. Sixteen-year-old boy killed mother and shot nine students, two fatally.
- 2 Dec. 1, 1997 Health H.S., West Paducah, Ky. Three students are killed and five others wounded by 14-year-old student.
- 3 March 24, 1998 Jonesboro, Ark. Four girls and a teacher are shot to death and 10 people wounded when two boys, 11 and 13, open fire from the woods after setting off a false fire alarm at a middle school.
- 4 April 24, 1998 Edinboro, Pa. A science teacher is shot to death in front of students at an eighth-grade graduation dance. A 14-year-old student awaits trial.
- 5 May 19, 1998 Fayetteville, Tenn. An 18-year-old honor student allegedly opens fire in parking lot at high school killing a classmate who was dating his ex-girlfriend.
- 6 Springfield, Ore. A 15-year-old boy allegedly opens fire at high school killing two and injuring more than 20. His parents are found slain at their home.
- 7 April 16, 1999 Notus, Idaho. A high school sophomore fired two shotgun blasts in a school hallway. No one injured.
- 8 April 20, 1999 Columbine H.S., Littleton, Colo. Young men dressed in black trench coats open fire on students.

than four hours after the attack. Sheriff's spokesman Steve Davis said that suspect was believed to be a friend of the gunman but did not take part in the attack.

Wes Lammers, 17, was among several students who said the gunmen were targeting minorities and athletes at the 1,800-student high school.

Other students said the killers might have been part of a group of eight to 10 students who wear black trench coats every day and are known as the "Trench Coat Mafia."

"They were shooting people and throwing grenades and stuff," said

Kaley Boyle, a junior. Columbine High is in the middle-class suburb of Littleton, population 35,000, southwest of Denver. Nearby schools were locked down, with students prohibited from entering or leaving for hours.

Littleton became the latest American community shocked by school violence. Since 1997, a series of school shootings have led to calls for tighter security and closer monitoring of troubled students.

Two people were killed in an attack at a school in Pearl, Miss., three at West Paducah, Ky., five at Jonesboro, Ark., and two in Springfield, Ore.

Tuition to be set by UK trustees

Tuition: it's the one thing that binds all students together, and beginning in the fall of 2000, it will be set by a group closer to home — the UK Board of Trustees.

The change came about last week when the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education, which previously determined tuition, voted to turn the responsibility over to each of the state's eight public institutions of higher education.

"We thought it would give them more flexibility," said Debbie McGuffey, spokesperson for the CPE.

She said the change, which had been on the CPE's agenda as a discussion item for three months, is part of an overall effort on the part of the council to make the organization "less bureaucratic."

The only stipulation set by the council was that each institution will have to use tuition for one-third of its operating budget, excluding the costs of "mandated programs," such as the UK Extension Service, which do not directly benefit students.

Edward A. Carter, UK vice president of management and budget, said that Student Government Association President Nate Brown had a hand in making sure that such programs were excluded from the total from which student-based funding was to be determined.

"It suddenly dawned on (CPE President Gordon Davies) that we'll have to make some adjustments" when Brown questioned him, Carter said.

Carter said the board will likely look at the trends at other institutions similar to UK. He said UK President Charles Wethington has expressed interest in taking some action to insure that students do not see huge jumps in tuition in some

years and none in others, in essence, smoothing rates out over a number of years.

The board must present its tuition recommendations for fall 2000 to the CPE for confirmation in September.

Carter said although no formula had been agreed upon for determining UK's tuition, he expected it to be a model much like that used by the council.

Administrators at other universities agreed with Carter that the change is a good one.

"We at Western are very pleased and excited to have the opportunity to determine our own destiny," said Gary Ransdell, president of Western Kentucky University. "We are encouraged by the ... autonomy to strategically structure our tuition to meet our funding objectives."

Brown said that he had spoken with President Wethington, as well as the student body presidents at the seven other state institutions, about the change.

"With each institution setting the tuition rates, there's more accountability to the students," he said, adding that he hoped the change wouldn't mean students end up paying for programs they don't use.

But some said they feared an even greater hike in tuition with the BOT calling the shots.

"I hope that they do keep (tuition) low, but then again, I really have doubts that they would," said David Kitchen, an undeclared junior. "Whether they like it or not, the University of Kentucky is a business."

"That's scary," said Lara Koenig, a history senior. "At least with the Council on Postsecondary Education there's some sort of statewide regulation, but with the Board of Trustees it's just kind of ... scary."

I have a confession to make.

No soy un gran fanático de la música latina.

Translation: I am not the biggest Latin music fan.

Now that's not to say that I don't enjoy it. I really do. In the last year or so, I've purchased CDs by Bailando Desnudo, Tom Ze, and Flaco Jiminez, among others.

But on my way to the Cubanismo show at the Student Center Ballroom Sunday night, I was telling my friend that I find myself listening to those artists as background music.

I just have a hard time slipping on the headphones and listening to Latin music. I usually pop one of those albums in when I'm cooking or cleaning or just sitting out on my porch. So that's what I mean when I say I'm not the biggest fan in the world.

As a result, I can hardly tell

you anything about the show Sunday night.

But I can't give you a whole lot of details about the music Friday night.

I know that they played a few songs off of their most recent release, 1998's *Reencarnacion*, but when background music comes to the foreground, you realize that you really don't know many of the song titles, especially when they are in another language.

Cubanismo! specializes in piecing together a wide array of instruments, blending them together to create a beautiful, Latin-flavored wall of sound. Their sound is tight and cohesive, and altogether crowd-pleasing, all signs of an incredibly talented and professional band that has worked hard at what they do.

Cubanismo!'s impressive mosaic of sound doesn't mean that individual talents were overlooked. Most members of this 15-person ensemble were given a chance to strut their stuff.

In front of a constantly-swaying, rock-solid horn section and a vast collection of drummers, Alemañy passed out the solos liberally. One particular standout was pianist Ignacio Herrera, whose funky, choppy piano runs were among the most enjoyably sounds of the night.

Also high on the list were the vocals. Many times, songs evolved into long, drawn-out jams with singers Rolo Martinez and Fernando Ferrer (I think) dancing, smiling and belting out a favorite phrase over and over.

Perhaps without those frontmen, the songs would've gotten a little tiresome, but their engaging personalities, and even more engaging voices, always kept things interesting.

The most interesting thing on stage was, as expected, Alemañy.

The dynamic bandleader, besides doling out a heap of helping of energetic between-song banter, wowed the crowd with his powerful trumpet play-

ing. It's no wonder Alemañy left Cuba in 1994 as one of its hottest trumpet stars, his trumpet sound is unlike any I've ever heard.

Powerful, yet emotive. Grand and triumphant.

The most amazing thing about a Cubanismo! concert is the crowd.

Especially in Central Kentucky, where, admittedly, I wasn't sure how many people were going to attend.

I found myself using the band as a soundtrack for my crowd-watching.

As a member of the seated half of the audience, I found myself constantly sitting up tall, craning my neck just trying to watch people dance.

The Ballroom was basically packed, one half of the floor set up with chairs, the other roped off for the dancing machines. And that side of the floor was unlike anything I've ever seen.

I know one thing for sure. Cubanismo! was the perfect band, at least for those people, on this night.

Evansville sweeps Cats

After being shutout in the first game of a doubleheader, UK scores 5 runs in nightcap

Not great, yet somehow better.

The Wildcats lost both games of last night's doubleheader to the Evansville Purple Aces, yet the team's play was of a considerably better vintage than it was over the weekend.

UK was shut out in the evening's opener, 3-0. The Cats played clean defense and Jennifer Howland pitched well, but the offense failed to deliver when scoring opportunities presented themselves.

UK (21-34 overall, 4-12 Southeastern Conference) hitters continued to struggle with the bats, as a prolonged slump continued to plague the ball-

club.

They could not take advantage of three Evansville errors, amassing only four hits and stranding runners on base in the second, fourth, sixth and seventh innings, including the tying runs in their final at-bat.

Game two featured a veritable offensive explosion from the Cats.

After Evansville struck for three runs in their half of the first, UK answered with four in the home half.

Freshman Shanna Martini drove home two with a single, and the Cats added two more to take what would be a short-lived lead.

The Aces scored twice in the second to go ahead 5-4. UK responded by tying the game as Jennifer How-

land drove home catcher Sandi Dengler with a solid single.

That was the end of the UK offense for the night.

Evansville scored three more times in the sixth inning to seal the game at 8-5.

The Wildcats certainly had hoped to do better against the Aces, yet Coach Beth Kirchner did find a silver lining of sorts in UK's renewed intensity.

"We actually looked like we wanted to play, which was a huge improvement," she said.

Kirchner feels that the team will do well if it plays as well against SEC opponent Florida in Gainesville, Fla.

"We have a great opportunity playing in Florida this weekend," Kirchner said.

"If we come ready to play, with the same intensity, the same enthusiasm, we'll play good games."

Martini also found reason for optimism in the ballclub's enthusiasm.

"We looked alot better tonight," Martini said.

"We played well enough to win, but it just didn't turn out that way."

Pitcher Keary Camunas, who threw six innings in the second game, said that the team will have a breakout performance in the four-game set against the Gators.

"If we play as well as we did today, at least, we'll sweep Florida this weekend. We should do well against them," said Camunas, a junior.

"We haven't been on the road in a while, which is unusual for us. But Florida is a very beatable team. We should sweep them."

After this weekend's trip to Florida, UK will have just eight games remaining before the SEC Tournament, all against conference competition.

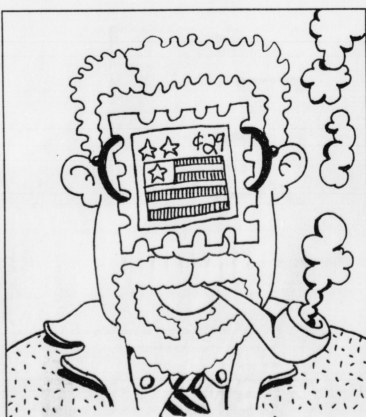

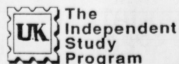

UK gets Senior Day win

UK loses to Vanderbilt on its Senior Day, but rebounds to beat Auburn in its season finale

No school wants to be the visiting team for the host team's Senior Day. The UK women's tennis team suffered that fate last Friday at Vanderbilt but returned the favor on Sunday when it hosted Auburn for its last regular season match.

The 12th-ranked Commodores celebrated their Senior Day by defeating UK 5-4 in a match that wasn't as close as the final tally indicates.

The Cats lost all but one of their singles matches, with senior Massoumeh Emami playing in the No. 2 spot and trouncing Vanderbilt's Callie Creighton 6-0, 6-1.

For the second straight match senior Christy Sigurski

played in the No. 1 singles spot, but fell to 12th-ranked singles player Julie Ditty 6-1, 6-0.

"I don't know how to describe what happened," Sigurski said. "I think everyone started really slow and didn't get into the matches."

Besides Emami, freshman Shannon Stafford was the only Wildcat to manage a win, picking up the first set against Jenny Miller. But Miller rebounded and took the match 6-7, 6-2, 6-2.

Down 5-1 and assured of a loss, the Cats somehow found a way, call it motivation, inspiration, a burning desire or perhaps all three, to roll over Vandy in the doubles matches.

"Doubles is a way to leave the match on a good note," Emami said. "Even when we're down

after singles we always play 100 percent in doubles so we can go away winning a few matches."

The Cats won all three matches to round out the score at 5-4.

Sigurski and sophomore Brooke Skeen won 8-4, as did Stafford and freshman Carolina Mayorga, and the 11th-ranked doubles tandem of Emami and senior Kelly Brown won 8-2.

While their 100 percent effort was evident in the scores, Emami said the pressure was off, which helped contribute to Vandy's doubles defeats.

"I guess we were all really relaxed, because we didn't have anything to lose," Emami said.

UK's own Senior Day was two days later against Auburn, and the Cats took advantage by whipping Auburn 5-1 and closing out its regular season at 13-8, 6-5 in the SEC and ranked 20th in the nation.

After being honored in a

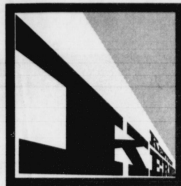
ceremony before the match, all three seniors dominated their opponents. Emami slid back into the No. 1 slot and beat Andrea Piski 7-6, 6-3. Sigurski beat Simone Jardin 6-1, 6-3, and Brown defeated Lucy Altman 6-4, 6-2.

Auburn opted not to play the doubles matches on Sunday, depriving the Cats of possibly a larger victory.

With their Senior Day, SEC win firmly in place, the Cats sit in sixth place, their highest finish since 1994, heading into the conference tournament.

"I think that's awesome," Sigurski said. "It shows how much our hard work has paid off. I think we're set to do really well in the tournament."

Louisiana State hosts the SEC Championships, which starts Thursday and runs through this weekend. UK will try to match its success against the Tigers when they meet in the first round.

Derby will draw a crowd

The 125th Kentucky Derby is only a week and a half away, but has come about quietly this year.

The media throng surrounding the Derby has yet to assemble, as the races leading up to the crown jewel of thoroughbred racing have featured a rash of upsets and horses coming out of nowhere to scramble the picture.

The Courier-Journal, ran a graphic in yesterday's paper listing 21 horses as "definites" and another six as "possibles." Funny thing is, the Derby field is limited to 20 horses, a number that has not been challenged in recent years.

Truth be told, I am not a huge hockey fan. I watch during the playoffs, mainly because the action is much more exciting and attention-keeping.

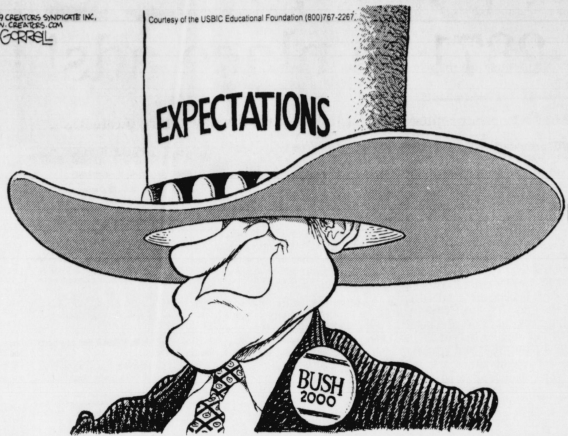

They are suing the makers of several video games, including *Doom* and *Quake*, because they promote violence and increase one's gun skills. They are going after the makers of several web sites that promote sex and violence.

Some of these, we will not deny, are worthy of a lawsuit or two. And maybe this will make companies creating products for teenage consumption think twice about their content and message.

But there are thousands of people who watch or play or surf these things. Those people did not take a gun and kill people in a prayer circle. Michael Carneal was an individual in need of help. But he was not heard in time.

This suit needs to be dismissed, because taxpayer money could be better spent on more individual counseling for students who need help. The money could be spent to reach out to students who don't come from stable families. Not only is the suit frivolous and founded on anger and resentment, it cannot and will not solve problems. It will not bring those little girls back. It will not make the pain and suffering in that town stop.

And it will not make the parents feel better.

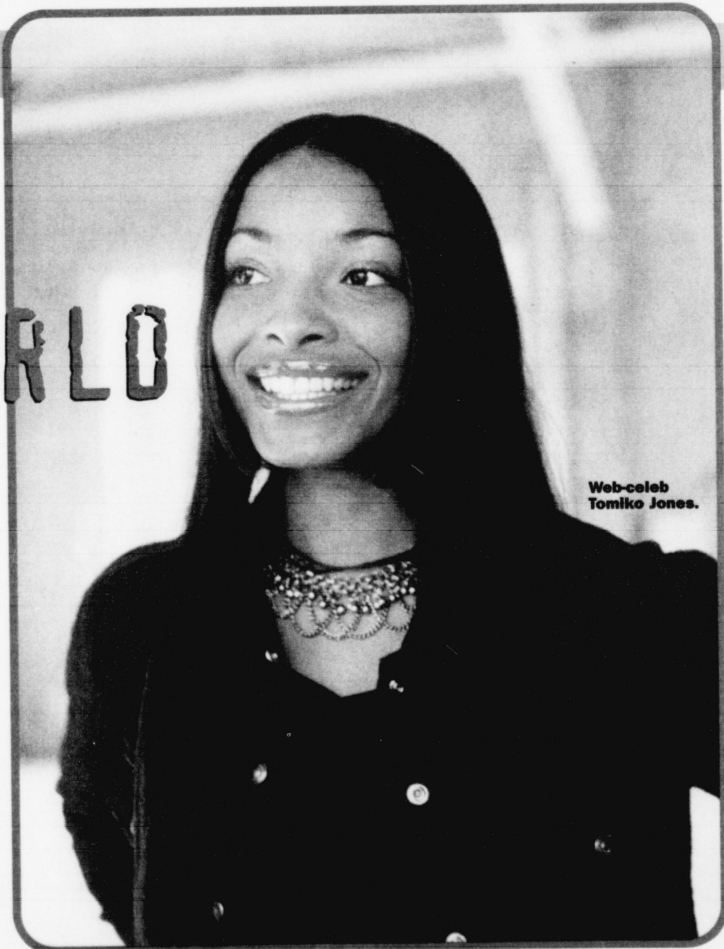

HE'S ON THE BALL

U. of Delaware sophomore John Bain has a lot on his mind — 1,476 pounds, to be exact. That's the weight of Bain's rubber band ball — unofficially the world's largest. He's working to get it over 2,000 pounds by April, the cut-off for the year 2000 edition of the Guinness Book of World Records.

It's been about a year since Bain, 21, started the ball to kill time at his job in the mailroom of a Wilmington, Del., law firm. Then it kept getting bigger. And bigger. "When it got to be about 40 pounds I thought, 'I might as well go all the way,'" Bain says. The current record is 1,022 pounds, held by Steve Partridge of Surrey, England.

Bain keeps his ball — now 4 1/2 feet high and 12 feet in circumference — in the garage of his Wilmington home. He used to work on it about 10 hours per week, but recently, the ball has grown too big for the rubber bands supplied by his sponsor, the Alliance Rubber Company of Hot Springs, Ark.

While Bain's shopping for a new sponsor, he's keeping himself busy — he's started another rubber band ball, which is about baseball-sized. "This one's for fun," Bain says. "The big one is just too hard to play with."

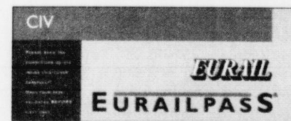

IMAGINE FINDING OUT THAT THE NICE GUY DOWN THE HALL FROM YOU IS facing charges of statutory rape. Or that your brainy class project partner spent time in a juvenile delinquency hall for arson. Or that your quiet new roomie has a rap sheet the size of your grocery list. Impossible? Hardly.

Many universities unknowingly accept criminal offenders or those charged with crimes because under federal law, universities can only obtain juvenile criminal records through parental consent. And really, when you think about it, what parents are going to rat out their kids and ruin their chances of getting accepted to college? That's right. Ze-ro.

In an effort to weed out dangerous criminals, colleges are considering asking prospective students to disclose criminal activity on their application. In fact, the problem of what to do about student criminals is being addressed this month at the Illinois Association for College Admissions Counseling Annual Conference.

One scenario sure to come up at the conference involves a prospective U. of Michigan student who wasn't admitted because of a pending criminal charge. Mind you, the student hadn't been found guilty of any crime. UM's action has resulted in a national debate surrounding a university's right to judge students before the law does.

Everything was going great for 18-year-old Daniel Granger. He was president of his high school senior class and looking forward to taking that big step into college. He was really pumped



when he got one of those fat envelopes from UM, admitting him for the fall of '98.

But Granger's college plans took a wild turn when three 14-year-old girls claimed that he and a few of his friends gave them alcohol and had sex with them. He was charged with statutory rape and when news of the allegations hit UM, administrators demanded that he attend a meeting to discuss the events.

"They asked him direct questions like, 'Did you do it?' that he wouldn't have to answer in a court of law," says his father, Richard Granger. "If our system of justice states he is supposedly innocent, putting him through that procedure made him guilty."

After the intense and grueling interview, Granger received notice that his admission had been suspended until UM could complete an investigation.

In September, Granger filed a plea bargain — a misdemeanor charge of conspiracy to contribute to the

delinquency of a minor. This kept him off the sex-offenders list but earned him four and a half months of jail time and two years probation. It also dashed Granger's hopes of joining the ranks of college freshmen — following the sentencing, UM revoked his admission.

According to the university's report, "Daniel's matriculation poses a threat to the health and safety of members of our community, and his matriculation is not appropriate in light of the university's standards for the judgment and character of the incoming students."

UM students claim that administrators acted as if Granger had committed the crime before he entered the courtroom. "The investigation was completely unfair," says freshman Dana Kelly. "The university should have waited. Who knows? Those girls could have been making it up."

As for Granger, the dark cloud cast over him at UM might hamper any chance he has of joining the ranks of college freshmen. Wayne State U. has denied Granger twice (before and after the plea bargain) and Bowling Green State U. suspended his admission.

It's a serious dilemma — how to ensure the safety of the student body, while at the same time preserving an individual's right to an education. And as universities continue the debate, it's unlikely that Daniel Granger will be the last student whose education gets caught in the crossfire.

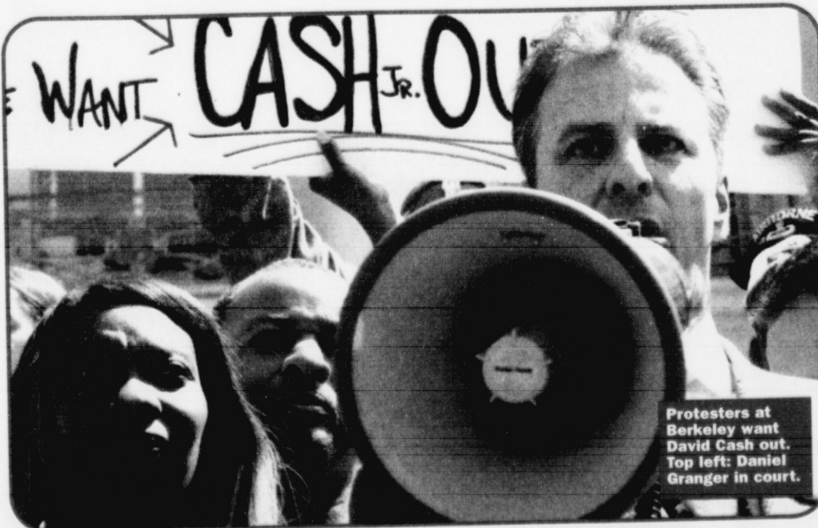
David Cash committed no crime, yet many of his classmates at the U. of California, Berkeley, want to see him booted off campus. Why? They believe Cash committed a moral crime because he didn't report that his friend, Jeremy Strohmeyer, sexually molested and killed a 7-year-old girl in a Nevada casino.

Strohmeyer pleaded guilty to the charges and will spend the rest of his life in prison without parole. But what about Cash? He's on his way to an engineering degree at a prestigious university. And it has no plans to investigate or expel him.

"This student has not been charged with any violation of criminal law or the campus student code that would provide a basis for any such review," Berkeley Chancellor Robert Berdahl remarks in a statement.

What's got students all riled up is that on "60 Minutes," Cash showed no sympathy toward the slain girl's family and even told the *Los Angeles Times* that the publicity made it easier to pick up women. "It wasn't just some scared kid who froze," says Preston Taylor, president of the Associated Students of U. of California. "It was a 17-year-old arrogantly boasting he had done what he did. That attitude is what really ticked us off."

Still the question remains: should he stay or should he go?

CRIMES OF HATE ARE COLLEGES DOING ANYTHING TO STOP THEM?

THE DEATH OF MATTHEW Shepard last October sank hearts and raised consciences nationwide. A series of hate crimes across America's campuses followed, and slowly, institutions known for higher thought and liberalism were becoming testing grounds for acts of malevolence.

In light of Shepard's death, hate crimes are being publicized more — but what are colleges and universities doing to stop them?

Not much, say some students and officials. "They haven't done anything to keep things from happening again," says senior Tad Whitaker, a journalism major at the U. of Wyoming where, before being brutally beaten and murdered, Shepard had just begun his freshman year. Whitaker covered the Shepard case for the school's student newspaper, *The Branding Iron*. "In a statement, they said they don't expect any repercussions as far as enrollment. Their motto is, 'let time take care of it.'"

Fighting Back

Reid Oslin, a spokesperson for Boston College, where an anonymous racist e-mail flooded the accounts of minority leaders last October, has a slightly different approach to countering hate crimes. He says the school's plan of attack was to take action — all the way to the FBI. "We were not able to apprehend the ones who sent the e-mail, but we did isolate it to 139 people who were in the computer lab between 9 p.m. and 12 a.m.," he says. "We involved the local district attorney, state attorney general and got technical assistance from the FBI."

In the same city, only days before, a swastika was found burned into the ceiling of a Boston U. elevator and

painted on a student's door on the eve of Yom Kippur, the Jewish day of atonement.

And while anti-Semitism is on the decline in the U.S., according to a recent report in *The Chronicle of Higher Education*, campus incidents increased by 15 percent in 1997. So what are college officials doing to keep these numbers from affecting their universities' golden reps?

According to Myra Kodner, a spokesperson for Security on Campus, a nonprofit organization dedicated to the prevention of campus crime, hate crimes often go unreported. This is illegal according to the Campus Security Act of 1990, which was amended in October to give the legislation more teeth. "Things weren't being reported, so provisions were added requiring any authority of a school (nurse, coach, professor) who knows about a crime to report it," Kodner says.

The amendment comes at a crucial time, when gay-bashing, racial slurs and even murders are occurring on campuses nationwide. *The Diamondback*, U. of Maryland's student newspaper, recently caught flak for printing an anti-gay guest column. Last December, the U. of Rhode Island campus newspaper ran what several students say was a racist cartoon. Black students who protested the cartoon received threats.

Clemson U. saw a rash of alleged hate crimes strike campus in October. Local police chalked several eggings up to racially spurred incidents. And during homecoming week, the Minority Council's homecoming float was vandalized.

Criminal Behavior

Colleges seldom release statistical information on hate crimes to the public. University officials often form task

forces and committees in attempts to curb racist hate crimes, but many people fear these Band-aid remedies don't accomplish anything. "Just because you see it in the campus paper, doesn't mean the school files it in their campus crime reports," says Security on Campus's Kodner. "If they don't have a perpetrator, they just don't count the crime."

Contrary to popular opinion, hate crimes aren't limited to predominately white schools. They can happen anywhere — even at schools where the minority actually makes up the majority. Richard J. Machado, a former UC Irvine student — and the first person to be convicted of a hate crime over the Internet — was sentenced to one year in prison, then released from federal custody on a \$10,000 bond. In January '98, Machado sent e-mail death threats to Asian students, saying he would kill them if they didn't leave UCI, a school whose student population is more than 50 percent Asian.

More than a year later, UCI junior Thien Nguyen, is still disturbed by the incident. "I was a freshman and I knew some of the people who had received the e-mail," says Nguyen, who is also chair of the Asian Pacific Student Association at UCI. "I don't agree with the Court's decision that Richard Machado was a harmless, distressed young man who did it without malicious intent. It's one of those instances where you have the opportunity to really mobilize people and raise the level of awareness. I think there could have been much more mobilization and involvement on campus."

Sure, there could have been. And one day there will be. But the question is: How many more students will have to be victimized before campus officials take action?

"We definitely miss her but we were definitely able to fill in the blanks," Cunniff says.

The ladies also get a little help on the new record from two fellow divas and a basketball player. That's right, New York Liberty center Kim Hampton flexes her vocal muscles on "Friends," the album's closer. "Kate and Gabby are big basketball fans," says Cunniff.

"And Kim has a side career singing."

Country legend Emmylou Harris appears on the record's first single

"Ladyfingers." But it's the queen of '70s pop, Blondie's Debbie Harry, who chimes in for the album's most exciting moment. "We're big Blondie fans," says Cunniff. "It became really obvious that she should sing on this song called 'Fantastic Fabulous.'"

Sure they're fantastic, they're fabulous, but where can you see them live? The band's talking about making the rounds on the Liith Fair, but they'll also be doing other shows throughout the summer and they'll be focusing on college shows in the fall.

Cunniff is planning on bringing more than just the new music on the road. She wants to set up song-writing workshops for high school students to coincide with the band's tour dates. "Maybe 20 or 25 kids would come to sound-check and we'd spend maybe an hour with them," she says.

Forget those fake driver's licenses you're normally carrying around, you might want to break out that old high school ID when these rockers come to town.

"HOLLYWOOD SAMPLES ARE JOKES LIKE MARTIN," raps Black Thought on the Roots' latest effort *Things Fall Apart*. The 17-track album is a wake-up call to a rap world made turgid by money-grabbin' playas. It's also the Philadelphia sextet's magnum opus, a pure-to-the-bone hip-hop record that's anything "but" a G-thang.

Ripe with superb musicianship and thought-provoking lyrics, *Things Fall Apart* could go down as the most influential rap album since Public Enemy's *Fear of a Black Planet* — it's that good. Long a favorite with critics and hip-hop purists, the Roots appear to be on the brink of massive commercial success with this, their fourth album and first since 1996's acclaimed *Illadelph Halflife*. "We've always had the critical (acclaim), but with this one we're really getting in the lock with a broader audience," says Roots bassist Leonard "Hub" Hubbard.

the roots: hip-hop renaissance

Quite possibly the hardest-hittin' Philly export since Rocky, the Roots are a breath of fresh air in a hip-hop world dominated by stale, Puff Daddy-style pop recyclers. With an engaging blend of live instrumentation and lyrics that mix introspective wisdom with Beastie-style word play, the Roots are the vanguard for a hip-hop renaissance that includes

like-minded *artistes* such as OutKast, Black Eyed Peas, Black Star and Common. Question is, are they ready to carry the torch as hip-hop saviors? "I enjoy it," Hubbard says of the movement. "The general music public doesn't look at hip-hop as a style of music that has musicians at all — they grew up with people spinning

turntables. But then they come see us, they're seeing their favorite break-beats performed live for the first time. It's a new experience for them, and I think it's part of what helped [the public] embrace us."

If early reports are any indication, the Roots can expect big things both critically and financially this year. The group isn't about to start counting those Benjamins, though — they know the hip-hop world is a tumultuous one, subject to the whims of a somewhat unfaithful audience. It's a fact not lost on the Roots, who can, at the very least, go to bed knowing they're headed in the right direction.

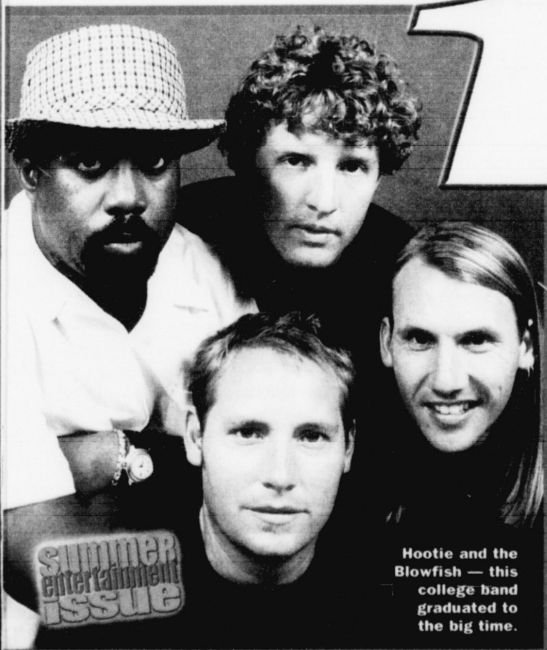

Going the Distance

"My only dream is to make enough money to not have to have another job," says Christian Cummings, a senior at San Diego State U. and drummer for the band d.frost, a trio that blends hip-hop, roots and blues.

Playing in a college band has traditionally meant free beer at frat parties and enough cash to buy guitar strings and drum heads. But things changed in the early '90s when Hootie and the Blowfish and the Dave Matthews Band made beaucoup bucks on college campuses for the record industry.

And now it's getting even easier for college bands to make a name for themselves. That's thanks to new technology that has made recording a CD as simple as microwaving popcorn and the Internet, which has put national promotion at a band's fingertips.

35" Mudder stole the classic Iowa advice — "if you build it, they will come" — from the ballpark and took it to the moshpit. As soon as the group started selling out central Iowa clubs, radio stations and record labels took notice. Since then, the band has opened for several national acts, they've had songs added to a Des Moines rock station and they're just waiting for a killer record deal to come along.

But bands aren't always holding their breath waiting for a record deal. Just ask senior Dorian Ham, a rapper for the Ohio State U.-based B.A.S.S. Nation. "Even if we don't get a contract, it doesn't matter, because we're still doing what we want to do," Ham says.

The College Factor

"To me, it seems a lot easier for a college band to get a following and a record deal than it is for just some band in some city," Calek says. "Your target audience is so centralized. If you can get your school behind you, that's a huge advantage."

But being a college band also has some drawbacks, like band members graduating at different times. "You never know who's going to be here next semester," Ham says. "So you have to be able to adapt quickly to new musicians."

Four of the five members of Mudder have had to take semesters off from school to devote more time to the group. "College becomes a real issue," Calek says. "I would assume most college bands are managing themselves, and that really cuts into your day."

d.frost spends up to four hours a day rehearsing, working on promo mailers and devising a business strategy. "Playing in a band is a huge time commitment," says d.frost's Cummings. "You have to take it seriously because there's so much competition out there."

But even if a band doesn't go all the way, there's always the frat parties with their promise of beer for nothing and chicks for free. Because hey, you're with the band.

- Befriend college, local and community radio stations.
- Cozy up to all the local media.
- Get in good with the presidents of the Greek system for guaranteed gigs.
- Sell CDs at all shows.
- Sell CDs on the Ultimate Band List (www.ubl.com).
- Audition at the annual NACA convention. They do college bookings nationwide.
- Don't ignore basement shows. You can win the most devoted fans this way.

- Record your material to a DAT, then have CDs burned locally or on campus.
- Play out of town as much as you can. No time for a full tour? Take a weekend and play in another town. If you can host a show for an out-of-town band, chances are they'll do the same for you in their town.
- Take advantage of fellow students: broadcast department = video; student journalist = band bio; photo major = publicity shots; art major = logo; theater department = audio, lighting and staging for shows.
- Start an e-mail list of all your fans and e-mail them whenever you have a show.
- Schmoose the head of your college entertainment department. That way, when a national act plays at your school, you'll have a shot at opening for them.
- Promo shows by passing out leaflets at high schools, colleges and coffeehouses.

"IF YOU SEE ONE MOVIE THIS SUMMER, SEE STAR WARS. If you see two movies this summer, see Austin Powers: The Spy Who Shagged Me." So goes the trailer for the sequel to Austin Powers, proving that even Mike Myers' ad people have a sense of humor.

And while the cinematic resurrection of Yoda and Obi-Wan Kenobi is sure to attract more hype than that movie about that 87-year old boating accident, we've got to confess that we're secretly more excited about the return of Britain's most shagadelic secret agent.

It's *The Spy Who Shagged Me* with Myers returning to the dual role of secret agent Austin Powers and his arch-nemesis Dr. Evil. This time, Powers is heading back to the '60s, so he can reclaim the "mojo" (the life force that gives him his shagging abilities) that Dr. Evil stole from him.

A serious mission, but the secret agent doesn't stand alone. Seasoned bombshell Heather Graham offers a helping hand and ample pick-up line opportunities as CIA operative Felicity Shagwell. Sure, fans will have their preferences between her and Powers' wife Elizabeth Hurley, but Myers won't say which is his favorite hottie. "Both are equally shaggable in different ways," Myers says. "And I have the science to prove it."

Okay, but we all know there is more to this spy than his legendary libido. Austin Powers is about an era, an attitude — all reflected in his groovy duds. But don't let Myers' on-screen composure fool you — pimpin' out in '60s fashions isn't all it's cut out to be. "They're hot and uncomfortable and raise your body temperature to 1,000 degrees Kelvin," he says. "(The United States) should take the lead of Canada in adopting their own version of the 'Anti-Velvet Act of 1970.'"

After graduation, he shunned a college education and instead hooked up with the city's renowned Second City comedy troupe, which Myers jokingly refers to as "The Devry of comedy." It was during his "comedy college" years with the troupe that Myers was discovered by "Saturday Night Live" producer Lorne Michaels.

At "SNL," Myers was the mastermind behind some of the most memorable skit characters, most notably Wayne, the happy-go-lucky, head-banging slacker brought to the big screen in the 1992 box-office smash *Wayne's World*. And while the movie that made "schwing" a household word has already seen one sequel,

it's unlikely Myers will resurrect the character again. Austin Powers is his bag now, baby. "I would love to make more [Austin Powers movies] in the way that they made a lot of Pink Panthers," Myers says.

A long-running series about a British secret agent? Hmmmm ... kinda reminds us of another series we know. But honestly, who would win in a fight between Austin Powers and 007? "I don't want to say because James Bond is a legend," Myers says. "But let's just say we'd be opening a can of JB whoop-ass. Enough said."

Myers may be trapped in London's swinging '60s in *Austin Powers*, but in real life he's doing things outside the paisley and polyester. His current projects include writing a script for a big-screen adaptation of the "Saturday Night Live" sketch "Sprockets," where he'll star as Dieter, the avant-garde German talk show host. He's also set to star opposite himself in *Just Like Me*, the story of a romantically-frustrated man who finally meets his match, an exact duplicate of himself in female form, as well as the comedy *It's a Dog's Life* and the Irish drama *Pete's Meteor*.

Not too shabby for a comic who admits that "I never have a plan. My philosophy is: It's just nice to have a job where there is no heavy lifting."

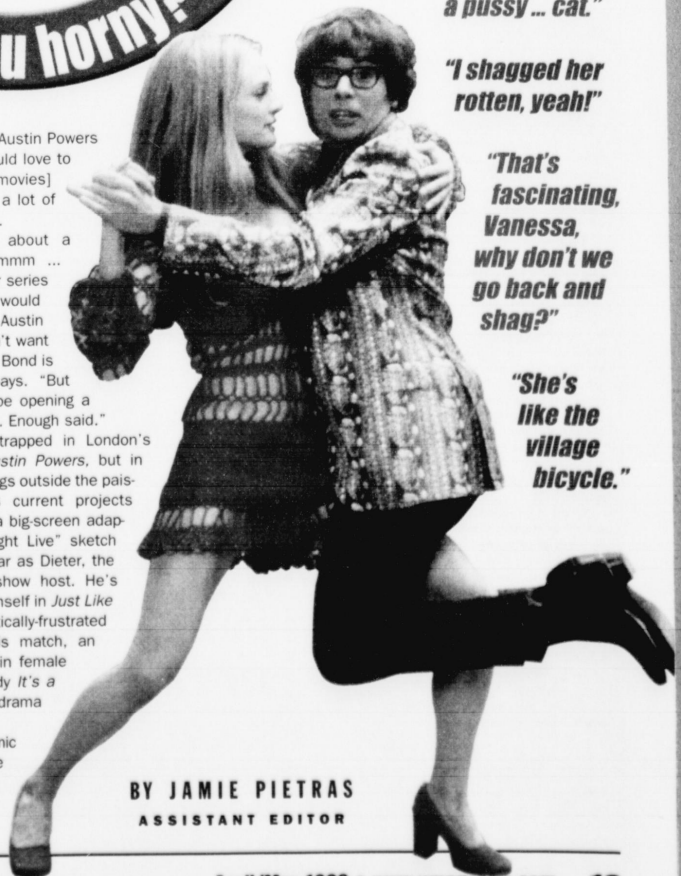

Stunt Monkey

Who needs guitar lessons to make it in the music biz? When Aram Sarkissian, guitarist/vocalist for Stunt Monkey, told his guitar teacher he wanted to play punk, he got the boot. And Michael Rossi, the bassist for the San Jose, Calif., trio suffered a similar fate. His guitar teacher "strongly recommended" that he stop taking lessons.

But this story has a happy ending — kind of like a Stunt Monkey song. After jamming with different bands in high school and taking a short break to attend college, the two started playing together. They picked up drummer John Volcamp, recorded their debut album *For the Ear* (Tastes Like Chicken Records) and grew up to be shiny, happy rock stars. Or at least they're well on their way.

"Right now, we're on fire," Sarkissian says. "We're totally into it. It totally makes us happy."

Three months after sending out a lo-fi demo CD, the band is already playing San Francisco and L.A.-area clubs, and have had two singles on Live 105, the Bay Area's alternative rock station.

Stunt Monkey combines clever, catchy and happy lyrics with a unique pop sound — and a little bit of old-school punk thrown in. There's no tormented or mean punk attitude here. Even "Suicide" sounds happy when Stunt Monkey sings it.

Burning London: The Clash Tribute

The Clash were the seminal punk band of the late '70s/early '80s, so the number of high-profile rockers that turn up on this tribute album should come as no surprise.



The Urge and Rancid churn out a pair of straight-up punk covers of "This is Radio Clash" and "Cheat," respectively, while the Indigo Girls chip in a folksy, acoustic rendition of "Clampdown" that works a lot

better than you'd imagine. But the high point on the album has to be the Mighty, Mighty Bosstones frenetic take on "Rudy Can't Fail," though the Afghan Whigs mellow remake of "Lost In the Supermarket" and Moby and Heather Nova's ethereal collaboration on "Straight to Hell" aren't too far behind. Unfortunately, like all other tribute albums, this one has its duds. Third Eye Blind's as annoying as ever on "Train in Vain," and "London's Burning" just doesn't sound quite the same coming from Silverchair. But, if you can program your CD player to skip a few choice tracks, then you've got a worthy tribute to the founding fathers of politically charged punk rock.

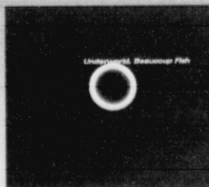

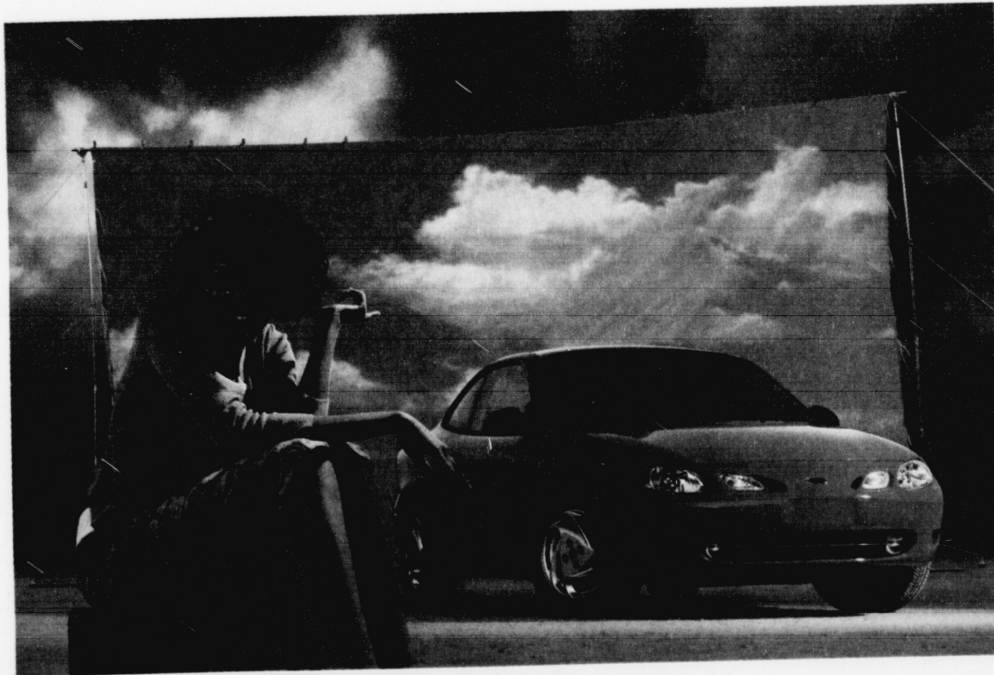


