Differences: Wethington issues an apology days after he allegedly threatened to fire two medical officials

The controversy over where to build the new Biomedical/Biological Science Research Building reached an all-time high last Thursident Charles Wethington allegedly gave two faculty members, who were open about their disagreement with his preferred building site, an ultimatum. The ultimatum posed two choices: The faculty members could affirm Wethington's preferred building site at Virginia Avenue and Limestone Street

or turn in their letters of resignation by 5 p.m. Fri-day evening, said Bill For-tune, professor of law and chair of the University Sen-ate Council.

The faculty members, Vereat Council. The faculty members, Vice Chancellor for Research Del Collins and Dean of the College of Medicine Emery Wilson, would not comment on the issue.

Collins did, however, confirm that Wethington did have a meeting last Thursday with the vice chancellors.

"I can not provide you

"I can not provide you with what occurred in the meeting," Collins said.

The Lexington Herald-Leader reported Saturday that Wethington denied ever making the allega-tions, and on Sunday he is-sued an apology to both Collins and Wilson for their opposition to the site of the new \$85 million building. "I respect their opin-ions and very much want them to continue in their administrative positions," Wethington said. "I sincere-ly apologize to them if they felt threatened by anything I said."

Greatness."
"We are here today due to the effort of many people," Terry Mobley, UK's chief development officer said. Mobley praised the leadership of the campaign committee who will continue to anchor corporate donors like Toyota and the McDowell Cancer Foundation.

McDowell Cancer Founda-tion.
While a chilly wind blew through the tent, UK Presi-dent Charles Wethington, campaign National Chair James W. Stuckert and Mob-ley announced the Universi-ty's first comprehensive funding-raising drive.

"Our task is ambitious," Wethington said,
"but we are not undaunted."
The time for the University to become self-funded is now, he said, in 1982, 4:1 percent of UK's budget cambit of the time for the 1989-90 school year, only 28:1 percent of UK's operating budget came from Frankfort.

The campaign is designed to help UK reach Top 20 status 2020. Money from the campaign will be used for research, endowed professorships, student scholarships and other programs.

the UK Band, Wethington and Stuckert officially unveiled the \$800 million goal. Participants rose, clapped their hands and sang the school's fight song. "On. "I of K." which is a support of the pooling of the goal. "But it will establish a foundation."

The foundation has already been established. UK has reached half of the goal with \$318,054,449. Wethington hopes to raise two-thirds of the goal before he steps down from the presidency of UK next summer.

Herpes vaccine could help women

Herpes vaccine could help women
TORONTO — Researchers have made the
first vaccine that protects against genital herpesbut there is a major catch: It works only in
women and only if they have never had coid
sores. The findings, reported yesterday, are a surprise. Until now, no vaccine has ever been shown
to work in one sex but not the other. Experts say
this could present unexpected trouble for creating other vaccines for sexually transmitted diseases, such as AIDS. The results were not the

designing the latest studies a decade ago.

French launch sweep vs. separatists

PARIS, France — French authorities launched a large-scale weekend sweep against Basque separatists, bringing in 11 people for questioning, seizing weapons and uncovering a clandestine bomb-making factory. Six of those apprehended Saturday night are suspected of belonging to ETA, an armed group that has been fighting for an independent Basque homeland in northern Spain. The other five are suspected of lodging the suspects at homes in southwestern France.

Weekend aimed at preparing for LSAT

Get ready: A preparatory test could pay off with a high score

UK students have a chance to get a leg up on the LSAT, the standardized test used for law school admission.

The University of Kentucky's Central Advising Service is holding a Law School Apritude Test Prep Weekend Sept. 22 and 25 sept. 22 sept. 2

a.m. Saturday.

The LSAT is a test required of all students applying to law school; scores on the LSAT are of roughly equivalent importance to a law school applicant's overall grade-point aver-

age.
The LSAT measures critical thinking ability, use of logic and reading comprehension.
Penny Miller, director of undergraduate studies for the Political Science Department, encourages all her pre-law students to attend the LSAT Prep Weekend.

"Many students put studying for the test off until the last minute, which is a mistake. Anyone who's even casually thinking about going to law school needs to be preparing in some way," Miller said.
"It's slowly becoming more difficult to get into law school," she said.
The University of Louisville, for example, just reduced the size of its incoming law school class, she said.
Unlike many standardized tests, most law schools expect students to take the LSAT only once. If one takes the LSAT three times, law schools look at an average of the three scores, not just the best of the three. A strong show, ling on the initial attempt is therefore crucial.

If a career from the beginning, Dr. Miller recommends taking the test at the end of one's junior year. Latecomers fare better during October of their senior year, she said.



'Defense won the game': Frosh Robertson causes key fumbles, embattled defense turns up heat when it counts

In a game that lived up to its billing as a shootout, Dewayne Robertson was a sliver bullet for UK.
True, the game was an offensive extravaganza, featuring Indiana's Antwaan Randle El's mercurial feet and Antwaan Randle El's mercurial feet and but the two most critical plays of the night belonged to Robertson, UK's freshman defensive tackle.
"The biggest play on defense was made by a true freshman," coach Hal Mumme said.
The play Mumme referred to was Robertson's fumble-inducing sack of IU QB Randle El.

With the score tied at 34 and Indiana facing a third and nine, Robertson surged through IU's offensive line, wrapping up Randle El.

"I guess the guard just missed his assignment and I came free right through there," Robertson said. "I didn't get the ball at all, I guess Randle just lost it."

Robertson may not have gotten a piece of the ball, but senior defensive end Matt Layow sure did. He scooped up the ball and returned it 21 yards for a TD. Seth Hanson's point after try was good, giving UK a 41-34 lead with 1:57 left in the game.

"I just saw that big ol' pigskin laying there on the ground and I just picked it up and put it in the zone where it be-longs," Layow said afterwards. Although Layow's TD put UK in the lead, Indiana still had time for one last

Randle El and his supporting cast took over at the IU 29 and promptly marched 54 yards to the UK 17. But then UK's defense stepped up its play.

On first down junior linebacker Chris Gayton dropped Randle El for a 3-yard loss. Then the secondary tightened up, foreing the Indiana QB into two incompletions and setting up a do or die fourth and I3 with 48 seconds left for the Hoosiers.



Lessons learned in student banking

In the age of online banking. ATM machines, and doityourself finances, the role of banks have changed dramatically over the past few years. Banks today have the responsibility to keep their customers informed so they can make wise financial decisions for themselves, without the antiquated assistance of a teller.

In a slight digression from my usual political commentary, I would like to use my column this week to address my own recent experience with one bank that failed to meet this responsibility, crippling my personal finances and costing me over \$100 in fees.

Like many students, I keep a small checking account funders and the control of t

be on both accounts for a direct deposit. It was from this fact that I learned my first important lesson of student banking: Don't trust the banks to tell you what they are doing to your account.

As a result, my mother was added to my account without my knowledge or consent.

In fact, simple phone confirmation from her was enough to allow her complete access to my money and financial records. I never signed off on this, but that is, according to my bank, irrelevant.

Lesson number two of student banking quickly followed the first. Never trust a bank to do what they say they il do my bank is my bank in the word of the first. Never trust a bank to do what they say they il do my mother were never made, and my account slowly spiraled towards zero.

As I'm sure many of you know, the fines for overdrawing an account are ridiculously high, so I check my balance before any major purchase.

Lesson number three was



As a result of this error, I made two small purchases totaling \$5. Each purchase was assessed a \$25 fee for inadequate funds. By the time this notice was mailed to me, it had also accumulated a \$12.50 overdue fee. The bank also charged me \$25 for the ATM inquiry, which inaccurately told my balance. Ironically, it was my mother, not me, who first discovered this financial plummet. Since she had added herself to my account, she was receiving the mailings from the bank. My account was \$95 in the red as a result of these fees. bank for all the second massively overdrawn.

In reality, I had still only spent \$6 over the balance. The fees for these purchases made up the difference.
When I finally confronted the bank, I learned lesson number four: Don't expect a bank to take responsibility for its mistakes. According to them, it

As I write this column, I am finally back in the clear after paying almost a \$100 to cover my bank's mistakes.


