Contracts, facilities on agenda at athletics board meeting

Sports: Board will approve women's basketball coach contract, look at new basketball practice facility

Many questions about the future of UK athletics will be decided today.

The UK Athletics Association Board of Directors will meet in the Patterson Office Tower to discuss the many issues that will be on tap.

Topics include new contracts and a basketball practice facility, said UK athletics spokeswoman Amanda Polley. The new athletic budget recommendation will also be discussed.

ley. The new athletic budget recommendation will also be discussed.

"They're going to approve Mickie DeMoss's contract and talk about the practice facility." Polley said.

UK athletics spokesman Brooks Downing said he was unsure whether men's basketball coach Tubby Smith's contract would be discussed.

DeMoss was hired last month to be UK's head women's basketball coach after an 18-year stint with the University of Tennessee, where she was the associate head coach under Pat Summit. During DeMoss's career at the storied Lady Volunteer program, she helped compile 12 NCAA Final Four appearances, including six national titles. The Lady Vols had a record of 549-76 during DeMoss's tenure.

The board, which is headed by UK President Lee Todd, will also raise the issue of a proposed basketball practice facility. Approval for funding may be discussed during the meeting tomorrow, Folley said.

Continuing with the discussion of obstacles faced by third parties in the United States, I would like to address the obstacle of admission into the presidential content of the partial of


conceivable that a third party candidate, even an independently wealthy one like Perot, will be able to gain access to the debates.

In short, the Democrats and Republicans rigged the admission criteria to ensure that they have no competition. If hird parties are ever to have any chance of really competing with major parties, voters must be able to see their presidential candidates in the debates. Contrary to what the commission on presidential debates claims, if the criteria for admission to the presidential debates was lowered to something more realistic, such as a requirement that a candidate must be on the ballot in all fifty states in order to be admitted into the debates, there would not be a dizzying number of candidates in the debate ereating a confusion that would drive voters to drink.

In fact, in the 2000 election, it would have meant that four candidates would have been included in the debate—George W. Bush, Al Gore, Ralph Nader and Harry Browne. Had Browne and Nader been included in the 2000 debates, the public would have seen an interesting, lively debate with a rich exchange of diverse opinions, instead of the bland reality of the 2000 debates where the two major party candidates spent most of the time agreeing with each other. We must force the commission on presidential debates to make the standard for admission into the debates more realistic so that voters can see that they actually have more than two options.

Photographer in Iraq deserved to be fired

With more than 2,000 journalists in the photographers, is extremely intense in a time With more than 2,000 journalists in the Middle East covering Operation Iraqi Freedom, issues of journalistic integrity — fairness, accuracy and truth — are more pertinent now than ever. One photographer, however, has shown that the quest to get the best story or photograph often causes otherwise ethical people to make career-damaging decisions.

On March 31, the Los Angeles Times published a front-page photo of a British soldier pointing a gun toward Iraqi citizens and ordering them to take cover from possible Iraqi gunfire. After publication, editors noticed that several people in the background of the photograph appeared twice.

eral people in the background of the photograph appeared twice.

The photographer, Brian Walski, was contacted, and he confirmed that he had merged two photos taken seconds apart in order to achieve better composition. Walski, who had worked for the Times since 1998, was immediately fired for violating an internal policy that forbids altering the content of news photographs. photographs.

The pressure on journalists, particularly

With this in mind, Los Angles Times officials took the right action by firing Walski. He not only altered an image of a historical event, but he also violated the very principles journalists uphold — principles from which photogra-

ists uphoid — principles from which photogra-phers are not exempt.

Walski made a mistake that likely will haunt the rest of his professional career. More tragically, however, the actions of all news pho-tographers covering the war now will be more closely monitored for fear that others also may be altering impages. be altering images.

Electronically manipulating an image takes a matter of seconds and little talent. Capturing still images that chronicle history requires pa-tience, skill and innovation. The latter, not the former, is the essence of true photojournalism.

For more than a year, the common American has been inundated with programming such as "Showdown with Saddam" and "War with Iraq." With postgame-like commentary filled with maps that look like video games, laced with stock footage and live feed from the battlefield and peppered with reappearing images of Hussein and Bin Laden, even the most patriotic student is finding it harder and harder to decipher what is actually taking place, at home and abroad.

How are we, as students, supposed to make sense of it all, considering most of us have never had conversation with an Iraqi, traveled to Iraq, know what an Iraqi looks like or are even familiar with the diversity that is thriving in the oil-rich nation? In a country that has been in some state of conflict for the past decade. I wonder how an Iraqi views freedom and peace. To the average Iraqi woman or child, is peace merely the absence of war? One thing is for certain, and I think most of us would agree that, despite our views on war, everyone is against terrorism.

This administration's war on terrorism has taken on many different faces as the administration has attempted to use diplomatic means through the United Nations. such seemingly extremist conduct, but this sort of isolationtaken lightly.

Taken lightly and the state of the state of

France to demonstrate how upset we are with them and their role in the global political economy and non-violent approach to this conflict. Furthermore, perhaps we should give back everything that France, Germany Russia and other implicated countries have contributed to the United States. Unfortunately, that will not resolve anything.

This conflict is no longer a conflict with Iraq and only peace researcher, Daisaku Ikeda, writes, "If you desire peace, prepare for peace." We should be concerned with how we, as Americans, are going to prepare for peace once the conflict is Iraq is over. In our globalized world we are constantly reminded how easily problems cross national boundaries.

Developing a global culture of peace will require the cooperation of all nations and peoples. In the melting pot of the United States, this sort of isolationist propaganda with France and other nations is likely to be less constructive and/or funny than we think, and if left to worsen, may cause As Americans and students, we need to transcend intentionally developed nationalist sentiments and focus on a genuine dialogue that will address cultural plurality and a peaceful coexistence and emphasize our common goals, at home and abroad.
