



On the front cover page of this Journal is a picture of the Lincoln High School at Franklin, Kentucky. This is a new school building recently erected for the colored youth of Franklin and that vicinity. This school has all modern facilities and was erected during the past year at a cost of \$40,000 with the aid of government funds. It is a two story brick structure, fire proof, and T-shaped for proper lighting. It contains six standard classrooms and a gymnasium-auditorium that seats five hundred. It also contains an up to date library and principal's office.

Prof. G. Briscoe Houston is the energetic and progressive principal of this school. Superintendent James T. Carman and his Board of Education helped sponsor and plan this modern school. The K. N. E. A. commends all who helped make possible this most noteworthy project.
