Dean White presented a recommendation from the College of Arts and Sciences for approval of a new course, Art 11a, b, Descriptive Drawing.

*Art 11a, b. Descriptive Drawing. (2 ea.) I, II. Sternbergs.
A course designed for students majoring in the sciences and engineering. Descriptive drawing, freehand perspective, technical problems in rendering and illustration. Pencil, pen and ink, charcoal and watercolor.

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This recommendation was approved by the University Faculty.

Dean Stahr presented for the College of Law a recommendation that Law 191, Equity, be changed to Law 191a, b, same title.

Law 191, Equity (4 sem. hrs.): change to Law 191a, b, Equity I-II (2 sem. hrs. each).

This recommendation was approved by the University Faculty.

Dean Carpenter presented for the College of Commerce a proposed new curriculum in Economics and certain changes in other curricula offered in the College, together with a new course, Economics 186, Economic Research.

Economics 186, Economic Research 3 credits

3. (a) In the General Business Curriculum, in the section relating to electives add the statement "and three courses outside the College of Commerce."

(b) In the Personnel Management Curriculum, in the section relating to electives, add "including two courses in Commerce."

(c) In the Business Management Curriculum, in the section relating to electives add "including two courses in Commerce."

(d) In the Commerce Law Curriculum in the statement of electives for freshmen and sophomores, change to read "electives including six credits in Commerce", and for the junior year, change to read "electives in Commerce, nine hours".

(e) In the Secretarial Curriculum, the statement concerning electives in the junior and senior year should be changed to read "electives including twelve hours in Commerce."

The University Faculty approved the recommendations from the College of Commerce.

Dr. Mills, Chairman of the Rules Committee, presented a recommendation from that Committee as follows:

The Rules Committee recommends that the following paragraph relating to participation in campus activities be deleted from the Rules of the University Faculty:

In activities extending through the year, a student who has been eligible during one semester may be allowed to continue during the next semester regardless of probation, if, in the view of the faculty adviser and the dean concerned, he is deemed essential to the successful functioning of the activity, and it seems probable that he will succeed in removing his probation.

The above paragraph is found at the bottom of page 14 of the 1947 issue of the Rules of the University Faculty.

This change would remove the exception which allows students on

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academic probation to continue to participate in campus activities.
