TO THE PRESS-RADIO-TV

Here is your copy of the 1974 Kentucky Wildcats' Football Facts Book which we sincerely hope will aid you in the process of covering U. of K. football during the forthcoming season. If you desire additional information or have any questions not answered herein, please feel free to contact the Sports Information Office, (606) 257-3838.

WORKING TICKETS—Address requests to Sports Information Office as far in advance as possible. After Tuesday preceding the game, tickets will not be mailed. Pick up at the Information Window in Memorial Coliseum, except on game days, when they will be moved to the ticket window at Commonwealth Stadium.

COMPS—No individual game allotment.

TELECOPIERS—Two Telecopier niches, each equipped with dorm-type telephones which take only collect or credit card calls, are provided in the press box for use of out-of-town writers. A nominal fee will be assessed for use of a telephone. In addition, telecopiers and operators will be provided, again for a nominal fee. Telephone jacks are available along press row for persons wishing to order their own telephone installation; however, it is less expensive to use the aforementioned telephones. Please notify Sports Information in advance of your needs.

PRESS BOX—Limited to working personnel. Kentucky Sports Information will service play-by-play quarterly, half-time and final statistics, scoring summary, lineups and coaches' comments. Lunch is available in Commonwealth Stadium Press Box upon presentation of luncheon ticket.

RADIO—Broadcasting rights to UK games are assigned exclusively to the UK Network. One free reciprocal outlet is guaranteed opponent schools visiting Lexington. Any additional stations must clear through the UK Director of Broadcasting, Mr. Pete Manchikes (257-2655). Working passes will be supplied approved stations by Sports Information Office.

TELEVISION AND MOTION PICTURES—Live television coverage prohibited except under NCAA auspices. Accredited TV stations or newsreel agencies permitted to make motion pictures of game action for delayed showing provided that no more than 200 feet of highlights of any game are used. An agreement to this effect must be executed before permission will be granted. Application should be made to the UK Director of Broadcasting and forms may be signed for the entire season. On request, the University Film Lab will provide TV stations with a 100 to 200-foot newsclip of game highlights (processed 16 mm color film) at actual cost. Film can be shipped on Sunday following game.

THE OUTLOOK

In their second year under Fran Curci, the Wildcats return some key starters on offense, but face the tremendous task of shoring up a defensive unit hard hit by graduation.

Leading the returnees on offense are Southeastern Conference "Player of the Year" Alfred "Sonny" Collins, starting quarterback Mike Fanuzzi, running back Steve Campassi, center Rick Nuzum, tackle Warren Bryant and tight end Elmore Stephens.

Collins earned more honors than any sophomore in the history of U.K. football. In addition to being named on all the SEC all-star squads, he was UPI SEC Offensive Player of the Year, *Nashville Banner* SEC Player of the Year and *Birmingham Post-Herald* SEC Sophomore of the Year, along with other national and regional honors.

He finished the season with 1,213 yards, only 99 short of the SEC record of 1,312 set in 1949 by John Dottle of Mississippi, and was the SEC scoring leader with 80 points.

With the graduation of No. 2 rusher Doug Kotar (110 carries for 431 yards), Steve Campassi seems in line for a starting backfield spot on the strength of a sophomore season in which he carried 47 times for 209 yards and two TDs. Also seeing action from the running back spot were sophomore Bill Bartos and freshman Joe Dipre.

Fanuzzi, held out of action in 1972 because of a knee operation, earned a starting position after the third game of the season and finished as the No. 3 rusher (111 att. for 393 yds., three TDs) and leading passer (32 completions in 83 attempts for 559 yards and five TDs). Returning for his senior year also is two-letterman Ernie Lewis (62 carries for 185 yards and 23 of 43 passes for 317 yards and three TDs).

Favorite target of U.K. passers is Stephens (16 receptions for 282 yards and four TDs, including a 63-yard scoring run against Louisiana State). Graduated are Jack Alvarez (10x169) and Ray Barga (7x114). An outstanding young prospect is Fred Bishop, of Pineville, Ky., who caught seven passes for 103 yards, including a 41-yard TD catch against LSU, as a freshman last season.

Nuzum, who played offensive guard during his sophomore season, is described by Curci as one of the outstanding centers in the league. He and Bryant, who was named to the All-SEC Freshman team, are the only returning starters in the interior line. Missing are three-year veterans Rich Allen, Dave Margavage and Harvey Sword.

Field goal and extra point specialist Ron Steele is gone but punter John Tatterson returns this year, along with Kent Reyes, who kicked off and made one of three field goal attempts as a freshman.

The big holes to fill on defense will be those left by All-Conference selections "Bubba" McCollum, nose guard, and Darryl Bishop, safety; linebacker Frank LeMaster and tackle Fred Hamberg. Cornerback Jeff Woodcock and end Jim Hovey also played out their eligibility.

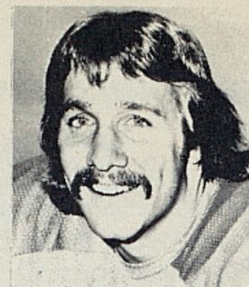

SERIES HISTORY: The Wildcats hold a 6-3-2 edge in a series which began Oct. 30, 1926 with a 13-13 tie on old Stoll Field. Led by John (Shipwreck) Kelly, Kentucky won 20-6 the following year and did not play Tech again until five years later when the Gobblers won, 7-0 in Blacksburg. The series was resumed in the war years of 1941 and 1942, with U. K. winning, 37-14, at Louisville, and then settling for a 21-21 tie at Roanoke. After another intermission-21 years this time-the series resumed with U. K. winning, 33-14, at Lexington. Coach Jerry Claiborne, a U. K. alumnus, brought his team back to Lexington three years later and beat the Wildcats of his old teammate and friend Charlie Bradshaw, 7-0. The Gobblers won, 24-21, the following year in Lexington to tie the series. Kentucky went ahead with a 7-6 victory at Blacksburg in 1969, won 33-27 in Lexington in 1971 and won again last year, 31-26 in Lexington.

LAST MEETING: Sept. 15, 1973 (Lexington) UK 31, VPI 26-Before more than 48,000 fans in new Commonwealth Stadium, the Wildcats built up a 31-6 halftime lead and then held off a determined Gobbler rally in the second half. Quarterback Ernie Lewis got the Wildcats out front with a 13-yard TD pass to Ray Barga early in the first quarter. After Mike Cassity recovered a Gobbler fumble on the Tech 17, Sonny Collins scored from the seven-yard line. Ron Steele added his second conversion for a 14-0 lead halfway through the

quarter. The 'Cats brought the first period to a close by scoring on Steele's 30-yard field goal, climaxing a 76-yard drive. Tech quarterback Bruce Arians scored on a one-yard run but Lewis retaliated with a 60-yard TD run and then sneaked in from the one on the Cat's next possession. Rick Popp replaced Arians and riddled the UK secondary with scoring passes to Kevin Dick and Billy Hardee, the latter with 10:42 left. Five minutes later, James Barber culminated an 80-yard march with a five-yard scoring run.

1974 OUTLOOK: New coach Jimmy Sharpe has made some changes on defense and has installed the Wishbone attack. He is expected to make good use of halfback Phil Rogers, who led the Gobblers in rushing last year with 1,036 yards. Up from the JV's are promising sophomores Charlie Brown and Steve Scott. The receiving corps is led by senior Flanker Ricky Scales, who snared 36 passes for 772 yards and seven TD's in '73. The interior line is in for a major reconstruction job as is the entire defense. However, there is a good defensive nucleus, including the return of three regulars and a part-time starter in the secondary. The Gobblers will be able to score, but they must learn to stop the other guys from crossing the goal line.

SERIES HISTORY: Relations between the Wildcats and the Mountaineers date back to Nov. 4, 1905. In that first game at Morgantown, the visiting Wildcats absorbed a 45-0 licking that stands as the biggest advantage either team has enjoyed. The series was interrupted after that contest for 34 years, not resuming until West Virginia visited Lexington for a return engagement in 1939 and absorbed a 13-6 revenge licking. The two teams met annually after that (with the exception of 1943 when UK did not field a team) until the series was broken off again following a game at Morgantown in 1947. Kentucky holds the edge in the series, 9-5-1. Kentucky's 20-point decision in 1965 was the biggest UK victory in the series since 1944 and the third largest win margin by either team-exceeded only by WVU's 45-0 win in 1905 and UK's 40-9 score in 1944.

LAST MEETING: No. 1 1969 (Lexington) UK 6, WVU 7-Plagued by mistakes, the Wildcats floundered all afternoon on a wet field, giving up a TD late in the second quarter after their punter fumbled a snap and lost 10 yards back to the 19. The Mountaineers scored in two plays and led, 7-0, after missing a 35-yard field goal attempt as the half ended. Kentucky got on the board with four minutes remaining in the third quarter, when Roger Gann plunged over right guard for two yards. A Bernie Scruggs pass to Gann for two points

was nullified because of an offensive pass interference penalty against the Wildcats. The Wildcats led in first downs, rushing and passing yardage, but the Mountaineers left with the victory.

1974 OUTLOOK: The outlook is brighter for the Mountaineers as 17 starters and 35 letterman return from last year's 6-5 squad, but success will depend on consistency at quarterback. Candidates for that berth are junior Ben Williams, who started the last five games in 1973, untried but talented sophomores Kirk Lewis and Tom Loadman, and junior Chuck Fiorante, who was hindered last year by a shoulder separation. Overall, the Mountaineers will be experienced—nine starters return of offense and eight to defense—and are potentially explosive with highly-skilled wide receivers and quick running backs. Defensively, they appear to be in good shape although they lack depth in the secondary. Middle guard Jeff Merrow, an all-East candidate, anchors a strong front line which also returns tackle John (Tree) Adams and end Andy Peters. Linebackers Bruce Huffman and John Spraggins both have good ability while the secondary returns starters Charlie Miller, Marcus Mauney and Jack Eastwood.

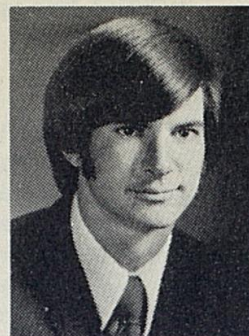

SERIES HISTORY: The Hoosiers have had an upper hand, winning five straight games since their series with the Wildcats was resumed in 1967 after a 40 year interruption. Although the neighboring rivals first met in a tie game at Lexington in 1893, they played only seven games up to 1927. The teams fought on even terms in the early going, with Kentucky winning in 1904, Indiana in 1905, Kentucky in 1918 and Indiana in 1919, 1926 and 1927. A 17-3 victory in Bloomington last year gave the Hoosiers an 8-1 lead.

LAST MEETING: Sept. 29, 1973 (Bloomington) IU 17, UK 3-After a scoreless first quarter, an Indiana punt was downed on UK's 11 where quarterback Mike Fanuzzi, just substituted into the game, retreated to his end zone and was slammed down by end Mark DiSalvo for a safety. Down 2-0, Kentucky punter John Tatterson kicked off and the Hoosiers marched 71 yards in 11 plays, with Ken Starling diving over from a foot away on third down. The Wildcats marched from their own 33 to the IU 3 but with only 25 seconds remaining in the half, the line was offside and Ron Steele came in and kicked a 25-yard field goal. In the final period, with a first down on his own 22, Wildcat quarterback Ernie Lewis retreated to pass, was hit, the ball flipped up and was kicked around, then came to a stop in the arms of a Hoosier on UK's 1-yard line. IU scored two plays later.

1974 OUTLOOK: The Hoosiers have 42 lettermen back, 22 departed. Of these, starters returning total seven on offense, six on defense. Biggest replacement problems are up front, both offensively and defensively. On offense, center of line is gone—three-year starting guards Dan Boarman and Dean Shumaker and center Chuck Sukurs. All other offensive starters are back save captain and halfback Ken Starling and development of freshman Courtney Synder and consistency of Dennis Cremeens lessens that loss. With Willie Jones established at quarterback—although he must beat back some imposing competition—Indiana is rid of last year's early unsettled situation. Most of the defensive front is gone, including both tackles and one end, Single greatest loss is tackle Carl Barzilauskas, who went in the first round of the professional draft by the sixth-selecting club.

SERIES HISTORY: The Kentucky-Miami series began way back in 1894 with a 28-6 UK victory in Lexington, but the teams have met each other only eight times. Kentucky followed that initial victory with wins in 1899, 1902, 1903 and 1911. Miami got its first victory the following year in Lexington and then tied the Wildcats when the series was resumed five years later. Miami won the 1920 game 14-0 at Oxford, giving the Wildcats a 5-2-1 edge as the series is being resumed 54 years later.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 16, 1920 (Oxford) UK 0, MU 14-In what was described as one of the hardest fought games ever seen at Oxford, the Wildcats and the Redskins fought on even terms throughout the first half, with neither able to get on the board. Miami returned the second half kickoff 35 yards and drove near the Wildcat goal line but UK held. Kentucky stopped another Redskin drive but failed on the third try and the Redskins went ahead 7-0. In the final quarter, after a series of line plunges and kicks from both sides, McGinnis from Miami returned a Wildcat punt for a TD. Munns again kicked the extra point to end the scoring.

1974 OUTLOOK: New head coach Dick Crum, defensive coordinator the past four years for the Redskins, will have a job rebuilding a graduation depleted defense that ranked tops in the nation last year. Senior middle guard Brad Cousino, a 6-foot-0, 195 lb. All-American candidate returns with impressive credentials—96 tackles and 91 assists and 32 “sacks” of opposing quarterbacks last year. The offensive line remains intact from tackle to tackle, but there may be an all new running back combination in senior Randy Walker at TB and sophomore Rob Carpenter at FB. Senior QB Steve Sanna is back to key the attack, with senior Larry Harper a prime target. Crum is expected to open up the offense, remain firm on defense and keep the Redskins on the warpath.

SERIES HISTORY: The Wildcats and Tigers first got together on the football field in Lexington in 1934-the year after the SEC was organized-and played another game the following year at Montgomery before interrupting their series for nearly two decades. Each held a victory out of the early meetings and the 1954 game, which resumed the rivalry, resulted in a 21-14 decision for UK. Games between the two since have been fraught with frustration. Kentucky walked away with a memorable 14-12 upset victory in 1961 on the Tigers' home ground, where no Auburn eleven had been beaten in 30 straight games. Prior to that victory, UK had been able to score only once in five years on the stingy Plainsmen. Before the series was interrupted three years ago, the Tigers had won five straight games by impressive margins, outscoring the Wildcats 151 to 32. The 38-6 Auburn victory in 1971 gave the Tigers a 14-5-1 edge over the Wildcats.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 2, 1971 (Montgomery) UK 6, AU 38-Led by quarterback Pat Sullivan, who would win the Heisman Trophy that year, and split end Terry Beasley, the Plainsmen drove 74 yards in eight plays on their first series of downs and got on the board with a 37-yard field goal by Gardner Jett. They came back two minutes later and scored on a 58-yard pass from Sullivan to Beasley. The Wildcat defense held in the second quarter, but

Auburn scored twice in the third quarter, first on a six-yard pass from Sullivan to Dick Schmalz and then on a six-yard run by Owens. The Wildcats got on the board late in the quarter as Gary Knutson plunged over from the one, culminating a 75-yard, nine-play drive. A pass for points failed. Auburn scored midway through the fourth quarter on a one-yard run and ended the day with a seven-yard scoring pass with two seconds left on the board.

1974 OUTLOOK: Coach Jordan has converted to the Veer-T offense and the Tigers are expected to come out swinging this year. The running attack will be solid and he has the quarterbacks—Phil Gargis, Chris Vacarella and Randy Walls—who can make the new attack buzz. The defense lost some quality operatives, but still looks extra tough, especially the secondary, which returns regulars Mike Fuller and Jim McKinney. Key to the defense is the linebacking corps, anchored by All-SEC Ken Bernich and Carl Hubbard. Regular Rusty Deen leads the defensive front from an end position, with junior Liston Eldins moving in at the other flank. A seventh straight bowl appearance is predicted for the Tigers.

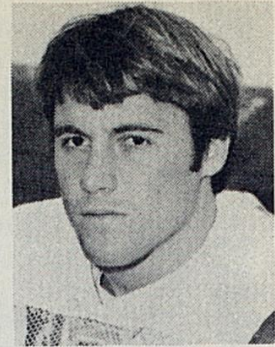

SERIES HISTORY: Kentucky faired fairly well in the first few years of the rivalry which began in 1949, but the Wildcats have fallen on hard times recently. Getting off to a fine start, they defeated the Bayou Bengals 19-0 in the inaugural and 14-0 the following year. After skipping 1951, the series resumed, with LSU winning 34-7 at Lexington. Kentucky gained a tie the following year at Baton Rouge and won 7-6 in Lexington in 1954. The teams swapped victories in 1956 and 1957 and then disaster struck the Wildcats. They fell, 21-0, and 32-7 to the Tigers at Baton Rouge and 9-0 at home before winning, 3-0, at home in 1960. Then came a 13-game losing streak, beginning with a 21-14 LSU victory at Baton Rouge and running through last season, when the Tigers won, 28-21, in Baton Rouge.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 20, 1973 (Baton Rouge) U. K. 21, LSU 28-On the kickoff in Baton Rouge, Greg Woods fumbled the ball and downed it on the one. Sonny Collins crowded into the middle, fumbled, and Mike Williams recovered in the end zone for a TD. LSU converted and led 7-0 with twelve seconds gone. Kentucky came back late in the quarter and scored on an eight-yard Collins run after LSU fumbled a Wildcat punt and Mike Cassity recovered on the enemy 16. Early in the third quarter, Mike Fanuzzi shocked the Tigers with a quick look-in pass to Elmore Stephens, who high-stepped for a 63-yard TD.

Steele's kick was wide. Five minutes later, the Wildcats went 69 yards in five plays and scored on a 31-yard Fanuzzi to Bishop pass. Collins swept right end for a two-pointer and UK led 21-7. The Tigers scored their second TD with 27 seconds left in the half on a one-yard plunge that culminated a drive that carried 74 yards in 12 plays. LSU took the second half kickoff and marched 53 yards in 13 plays, with Brad Davis scoring from the one. Jackson missed the conversion. The Tigers put their winning score on the board early in the fourth quarter as Romain scored from the nine and Broussard passed to Davis for a two-pointer.

1974 OUTLOOK: Coach Charlie McClendon has 40 lettermen returning, including all of his offensive backs, headed by Brad Davis and Steve Rogers, with junior Lora Hinton and sophomore sensation Terry Robiskie close behind. Davis has carried the ball for a total of 1,464 yards, needing only 404 yards to eclipse Billy Cannon's all-time career mark. Sure-handed, experienced receivers are abundant and the Tigers return quarterback Bill Broussard from last year. There were some critical losses in the offensive line but a number of lettermen return. The defensive line is virtually intact and populated with sophomore and junior personnel. Linebacking shouldn't be any weaker and potentially could develop into the best ever for the Tigers. Four seniors are gone from the defensive backfield, but there is some fine young talent ready to fill the gap. This could be the year of the Tiger.

SERIES HISTORY: A victory last year in Athens broke a seven-year drought for the Wildcats and left them with a 6-19-2 slate against the Bulldogs in a series dating back to 1939. The two schools met almost annually from that time until the series was broken off after the 1949 game and not resumed until 1956 at Athens. During the 22 years that Wally Butts coached the Bulldogs (1938-60), Georgia won nine of 14 games. The Wildcats took the initial game in 1939 and tied the following year, but did not pick up another win until 1947. Despite such Georgia superiority (19-6-2), the games have been interesting as reflected by the fact that Butts' four SEC champions managed an average win margin of only 11 points over the Wildcats.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 27, 1973 (Athens) U. K. 12, UG 7-In another thrilling Bulldog-Wildcat encounter, Georgia had completed six straight passes to the U. K. 29 in a drive toward the winning TD at Athens. Quarterback Andy Johnson threw one more time, but his pass slipped off Richard Appleby's fingers and Darryl Bishop intercepted. Bishop returned a few yards and dropped the ball, which was recovered by Frank LeMaster with 37 seconds remaining. Georgia struck first and early, getting a break when Kentucky failed to move the ball after taking the opening kick-off and John Tatterson's punt covered only 14 yards to his own 39. Moments later, Georgia scored from the two. Kentucky came back to

cover 80 yards in 10 plays and tie the score on a quick pass over the middle from Mike Fanuzzi to Elmore Stephens for 25 yards. In the next period the Wildcats used the second of two interceptions to score what proved to be the winning points. The first pick-off occurred when Jeff Woodcock tipped a pass by reserve quarterback Ralph Page into the hands of Bishop, who returned from his end zone to the U. K. 27, ending a Bulldog drive that carried to the Cat 24. A few plays later, LeMaster intercepted a Page pass and returned it 24 yards to the Georgia 28. Kentucky settled for a 22-yard field goal by Ron Steele and then ended the scoring by getting two points when Johnson fumbled and his Bulldog teammate Jimmy Poulos recovered in the end zone. The play was set up by a Tatterson punt that Parker downed on the Georgia one-yard line.

1974 OUTLOOK: Georgia has enjoyed much success the past three years (11-1-0 in 1971, 7-4-0 in 1972 and 7-4-1 in 1973) but Coach Vince Dooley's 11th Red and Black edition is a real question mark. The man who was at the throttle the last three years (QB Andy Johnson) has graduated, and there is no telling who will take his place. Junior Ralph Page, who played little behind Johnson in 1973, and soph Matt Robinson, who played mostly at safety with the 1973 frosh, rate 1-2 on 1974 spring practice results. Coach Dooley has decided to switch from the Slot 1 to the veer. He lost three-fourths of his talented backfield of 1973 (QB Johnson, TB Poulos and FB Burns) and has only one veteran back returning, senior Horace King, who flip-flopped with Poulos at TB and FL in 1973. The defense will be anchored by All-America candidates senior tackle Dan (The Decker) Spivey and soph linebacker Sylvester (The Sacker) Boler. Senior cornerback Larry West, handicapped by injuries throughout his career, has been a starter in the past and is counted on for heavy duty this season. There will be new starting faces at noseguard (senior Chuck Kinnebrew), weakside tackle (junior Bobby Gibbs), strong safety (Junior Bubba Wilson) and free safety (senior Abb Ansley).

SERIES HISTORY: Kentucky's win over Tulane last year cut the Greenie margin to 5-4 in a series dating back to a 10-3 Wildcat victory at Lexington in 1910. The teams skipped 22 years before Tulane returned to Lexington and defeated the Wildcats 6-3. They played the next three years in a row, with Tulane the victor in each. Sixteen years later, Kentucky went to New Orleans and blanked the Greenies 37-0. The Wildcats won in Lexington the following year and then lost 20 years later in New Orleans. The series will continue next year.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 3, 1973 (Lexington) U. K. 34, T. U. 7—Nationally ranked and in line for a major bowl bid, the undefeated Green Wave couldn't contain Wildcat sophomore Sonny Collins, who scored three times and carried 176 yards in a shocking upset at Commonwealth Stadium. The Green Wave, unbeaten in six previous starts, was ranked fifth nationally in both total and rushing defense and seventh in scoring defense. They had permitted only 206 yards per game in total offense (U. K. got 413), 89.3 in rushing (352 for the Cats) and 8.8 points per game. In all fairness, it must be pointed out that Tulane was without the services of injured All-American defensive tackle Charlie Hall. The Greenies went on to a fine season, capping it off with a victory over arch rival LSU.

1974 OUTLOOK: Tulane stormed to a 9-2 regular season record in Coach Bennie Ellender's third year in 1973, and the Green Wave will field another strong team this fall. The defense, anchored by 6-6, 260-pound All-America tackle Charles Hall, will have 22 returning lettermen for its nucleus, with only starting positions (both ends and the monster or strong safety) vacated by graduation. Replacements must be found for the entire left side of the offensive line, but Ellender does have five returning offensive starters back, led by QB Steve Foley. With several redshirts and freshmen coming up, the depth situation should continue to improve and that pleases Ellender, who used more than 50 players in the first half in most of Tulane's 1973 encounters.

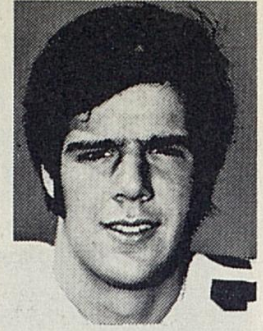

SERIES HISTORY: The Wildcats and Commodores first met on the gridiron in 1896 at Nashville and the series is one of the South's oldest from the standpoint of first meeting and number of games. The record stands solidly in Vandy's favor, 26-16-4, with the Commodores registering 12 shutouts in the first 20 years and U. K. failing to get into the win column until 1939. The Wildcats' 27-0 homecoming rout of Vandy in 1960 ended a three-year trend to close games, but the rivalry got back in the groove in 1961 as U. K. struggled for a 16-3 decision. Kentucky's biggest margin since that time was 34-0 in 1965, Vandy's 42-6 in 1969. Last year's win was U. K.'s third in a row after Vandy won the previous two. U. K. had a seven-game string—six victories and a tie—before that.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 10, 1973 (Nashville) U. K. 27, V U 17—Determined to shut off Sonny Collins, Vandy limited the U.K. star to 83 yards, his lowest total since he gained 91 against L S U, but the results were disastrous for the Commodores. Wildcat quarterback Mike Fanuzzi connected on six of 11 passes for 138 yards and hit Elmore Stephens and Ray Barga with TD throws of four and 41 yards, respectively. On an eight-play, 80-yard TD drive that gave U. K. a 7-3 halftime lead, Fanuzzi hit Stephens for gains of 28 and 32 yards, the last to Vandy's one-yard-line, setting up a scoring plunge by Collins. Darryl Bishop's fumble recovery sent U. K. on a 26-yard march that ended with another Collins' TD for a 14-3 lead; After an eight-yard Vandy punt, Fanuzzi angled a first-down strike to Barga, streaking up

the middle for a 41-yard TD. A couple of minutes later, Buba McCollum recovered a Vandy fumble and Fanuzzi took U. K. across in two plays—a 20-yard throw to Stephens and a four-yarder to Stephens. The Wildcats then had to fight off a determined Vandy rally in the second half.

1974 OUTLOOK: Coach Steve Sloan begins his second year at Vanderbilt with a nucleus of seasoned veterans and a crop of promising youngsters. Sloan suffered some key losses via the graduation route, but appears to have more depth to rely on for the upcoming season. The Commodores will have 38 lettermen returning, including 16 starters. Heading the offensive returnees is quarterback Fred Fisher, who led the SEC last season in both total offense and passing. The running chores will fall to Jamie O'Rourke and Lonnie Sadler, both 500-yard plus gainers last season. The receiving corps includes the top four receivers plus redshirt Walter Overton, leading receiver in 1972. The defense will be spearheaded by Tom Galbierz at noseguard and defensive back Scott Wingfield, No. 3 in the nation last year in interceptions. One of the chief losses Vandy suffered last year was Hawkins Golden, who led the nation in field goal percentage as he hit on 12 of 14, the longest from 55 yards.

SERIES HISTORY: A two-point win in Gainesville last year evened the Wildcat-Gator series at 12 games each after Kentucky had stayed ahead since whipping the Gators 52-0 in Lexington in 1917. Through 1955 the Wildcats held a 12-4 advantage, with Florida managing only a pair of victories prior to 1952. An unusual moment occurred in 1955, when Delmar Hughes, Wildcat quarterback sidelined earlier in the game with a broken nose, came off the bench and kicked a 20-yard field goal to give U. K. a 10-7 decision. A year later, Lou Michaels kicked a rain-soaked football 34 yards with two seconds remaining in the first half to put the Wildcats ahead to stay. After a 10-year lapse, the series was resumed in 1967, with Florida winning 14-7, beginning a streak that now stands at eight straight.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 17, 1973 (Gainesville) U. K. 18, U F 20-Bothered by mistakes and injuries, Kentucky seemed hopelessly beaten for three quarters in Gainesville. However, Ernie Lewis, the Wildcats' third quarterback of the day, ignited a rally that left Florida hanging by its fingernails, possibly saved only by a flying interception on the game's second to last play. Training 20-3, entering the last quarter, Kentucky stormed back for a couple of quick touchdowns plus a two-point conversion. The Wildcats got their first TD on a five-yard pass from Lewis to Elmore Stephens and the second on a five-yard run by Bill Bartos. With less than 40 seconds on the clock and no times out remaining, Lewis took the

snap at the Florida 22, rolled to his left and was tackled by David Hitchcock for a damaging seven-yard loss to the 29. Lewis passed out-of-bounds quickly to stop the clock and then came back with a sideline pattern to Bishop, virtually the only option open as U.K. sought to improve its field goal position. Wayne Fields made an acrobatic interception at his own 17 to thwart the threat.

1974 OUTLOOK: Coach Doug Dickey's first priority is to replace Nat Moore and Vince Kendrick, who dominated the Gator running game for two seasons. He also must replace four key defensive starters and find depth everywhere, most importantly behind Don Gaffney at quarterback. Sophomore Jimmy Fisher, Cleaver Hayling and David Wright will be chasing Gaffney. The Gators led the league in defense last season and they hope to maintain excellence in that area; however, they had four big losses in a pair of tackles, John Lacer and David Hitchcock, and two all-conference players, end Ricky Browne and safetyman Jim Revels. Key personnel switches include moving Wayne Fields, leading pass interception man the past two seasons, from monster to running back, and Jimmy Ray Stephens, second-team ALL-SEC center last season as a sophomore, to tight end.

SERIES HISTORY: Tennessee holds a 41-19-9 edge in the series that is among the oldest football rivalries in the nation, dating back from a 60-0 Wildcat victory Oct. 21, 1893 in Knoxville. Except for three war years (1917-18 and 1943), the two schools have met annually on the gridiron with the result that the Vols hold a distinct edge of 38 wins to Kentucky's 19 and nine ties. The seniors on the 1955 UK squad became the first class in 43 years to graduate with the accomplishment of never playing in a game in which the Vols emerged victorious and they bowed out in a blaze of glory, triumphing 23-0 over the bowl-hungry Vols in the most one-sided Kentucky win since 1935. Tennessee took the 1961 meeting for its first victory in five years, but UK's courageous "Thin Thirty" fought back to win a 12-10 squeaker in 1962. The Vols caught Kentucky in a letdown in 1963 to annex a 19-0 decision, but Kentucky capped a strange 1964 campaign in glorious fashion by capturing a hard-fought 12-7 victory over the equally inconsistent Tennesseans. Without passing star Rick Norton, injured the week before in the Houston game, Kentucky could not cope with the Vols in '65 and dropped a 19-3 decision. Tennessee has won the eight other games since that date, holding on for a two-point victory last year.

Since 1925, the two schools have stimulated their grid rivalry with a rotating trophy—a battered old beer barrel. Many shenanigans on the part of the rival student bodies have added to the color of the series. Following the 1953 UK win, disgruntled Tennessee students raided the Kentucky campus and “kegnapped” the barrel—holding it until persuaded to return it by threats of reprisal against their coon dog mascot, Smoky. In 1955, UK students visited the Tennessee campus hiding place of Smoky and “dognapped” him. UT students promptly retaliated by painting up the Kentucky campus in a surprise raid and carting away “Colonel,” UK’s stuffed wildcat mascot. A trade was engineered at the ’55 game. For a couple of years, things were comparatively quiet. Then the stunts erupted again in 1958 as Vol students caught a guard “napping” and slipped away with UK’s stuffed Wildcat. Despite promises to return it at halftime of a nationally-televised basketball game, the mascot wasn’t given back until nearly four months later. A post-game sidelight to Kentucky’s victory in 1959 saw a strange calm shattered by rioting UK students protesting a faculty refusal to reward the win with a traditional pre-Thanksgiving holiday. Up to 5,000 demonstrators and onlookers carried on for about four and one-half hours, marching on the UK president’s home and setting a bonfire at a main intersection in downtown Lexington. The famed beer barrel, which had remained in hiding during “Tennessee week” in 1960, came up missing almost four months later under unusual circumstances. Vanderbilt students “kegnapped” the trophy in a surprise attempt to gain support of Vol fans for the Commodores’ basketball team which was meeting the Wildcats in Knoxville in a playoff for an NCAA Tournament berth. The stunt backfired, however, as UK won. Embarrassed Vandy students did not return the trophy until several months later. Twelve years ago, another chapter was added to the keg’s history as two UK freshman players forgot to bring the barrel to the game and the Vols left town without claiming it. Kentucky sent the keg on to Knoxville later. Since then, the old beer barrel has been silent.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 24, 1973 (Lexington) U. K. 14, U. T. 16—A last second 34-yard field goal attempt by Ron Steele just ducked under the crossbar and spoiled a Wildcat rally that had cut a 16-0 Vol lead to 16-14. After surrendering Tennessee’s final TD early in the final quarter, the ’Cats came back, as they had done for a good part of the season. Quarterback Mike Fanuzzi, after a run of 59 yards to the Vols’ eight-yard line, stepped back in the pocket, saw his receivers covered and ran to his right for Kentucky’s first score of the afternoon. Steele kicked the extra point. Less than three minutes later, Kentucky, taking advantage of a muffed punt attempt, scored its second TD of the period as Steve Campassi crashed over from the two. Steele’s kick cut the margin 16-14.

1974 OUTLOOK: Gone are Haskel Stanback, Bill Rudder and Steve Chancey, the Big Three of Tennessee’s running game for the past two years, but Paul Careathers will head up a new corps of running backs who may provide a few surprises during the season. Exciting newcomer Mike Gayles and veteran Terry Moore are definitely in the picture for first-team responsibilities. Chuck Sanford, who transferred to UT from Tennessee State, and Dale Fair are two more rookies who look forward to the chance to carry the mail in the Vols’ veer offense, as does speedy Eddie Lawson. Quarterback Condredge Holloway will be the key factor in the passing game and will create additional problems for the defense with his elusive running. UT returns Ricky Townsend, a two-time All-American, and punter Neil Clabo, who ranked fourth in the nation last year with a 43.6 average. The defense will be built around returnees Robert Pulliam (tackle), Hank Walter (linebacker) and Jim Watts (cornerback), but the hopes for solid play depend on such new faces as Ron McCartney (end) and Steve Poole (linebacker).

MEMORIAL

Kentucky's athletic complex off Cooper Drive was named "The Bernie A. Shively Sports Center" in April, 1969, in memory of the distinguished Wildcat director of athletics who died of a heart attack at his home December 10, 1967.

Shively joined the Kentucky staff in 1927 as football line coach, following a brilliant athletic career at Illinois. An All-American as a blocking guard for Red Grange, he also was Big Ten heavyweight wrestling champion and a track standout. He was named to the Helms Hall of Fame in 1972.

In 1933, he was appointed head of the UK Physical Education Department, and five years later became director of athletics. He continued coaching until 1946, handling football, track and baseball at various times.



DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY
President, University of Kentucky

Established in 1865 under provisions of the Morrill Act of 1862 as the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Kentucky University, the University of Kentucky today has approximately 32,000 students in the 15 academic colleges and Graduate School on the central campus in Lexington and in its 13 community colleges.

In 1878, the school separated from Kentucky University and became an independent institution supported by the state, and since 1916 has been known as the University of Kentucky, embodying the functions of teaching, public service and research.

Situated in the famed Blue Grass region of Central Kentucky, the University maintains several research institutes whose work increasingly affects state and nation: the Tobacco and Health Research Institute, the Office of Business Development and Government Services, the Institute for Mining and Minerals Research, and the Water Resources Institute.

It is fully accredited in its respective colleges and departments by all of the major professional societies and educational organizations.

President since 1969 has been Dr. Otis A. Singletary, who came from the University of Texas, Austin, where he was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs. He earlier had been director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity, and chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

He is the eighth president of the University. Unique recognition of his service to the institution came recently from the UK Alumni Association, which presented him its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.



HARRY C. LANCASTER
Director of Athletics

The University of Kentucky athletic program has realized a steady growth since Harry C. Lancaster was named athletic director six years ago, with Commonwealth Stadium representing only one of many accomplishments during that period.

While the finishing touches were being put on the stadium last year, workmen on the other side of the campus completed a new ceiling in Memorial Coliseum and then reworked and painted the floor where many national basketball champions and All-Americans have been produced.

The ceiling went with a new roof previously installed. In addition, a Nautilus weight system has been added to the improved weight rooms and half of a regulation football practice field has been covered with artificial turf at Shively Sports Center.

There have been many other improvements, including an all-weather surface on the running track, where a press box and additional seats also were added, and a scoreboard for the baseball field, to name a few.

From 1946 until 1970, Lancaster was known primarily as the No. 1 assistant to basketball Coach Adolph Rupp. His freshman teams compiled 204 victories against only 57 losses. He served 16 seasons as head baseball coach and gave the school its winningest seasons in history by compiling identical 18-8 marks in 1959-60.

A native of Paris (Ky.) High School, he lettered in football, basketball and baseball under Coach Blanton Collier. At Georgetown College, he lettered in football, basketball and baseball for three years and twice captained the football and basketball teams. He was Student Body president and president of Kappa Alpha Social Fraternity his senior year.

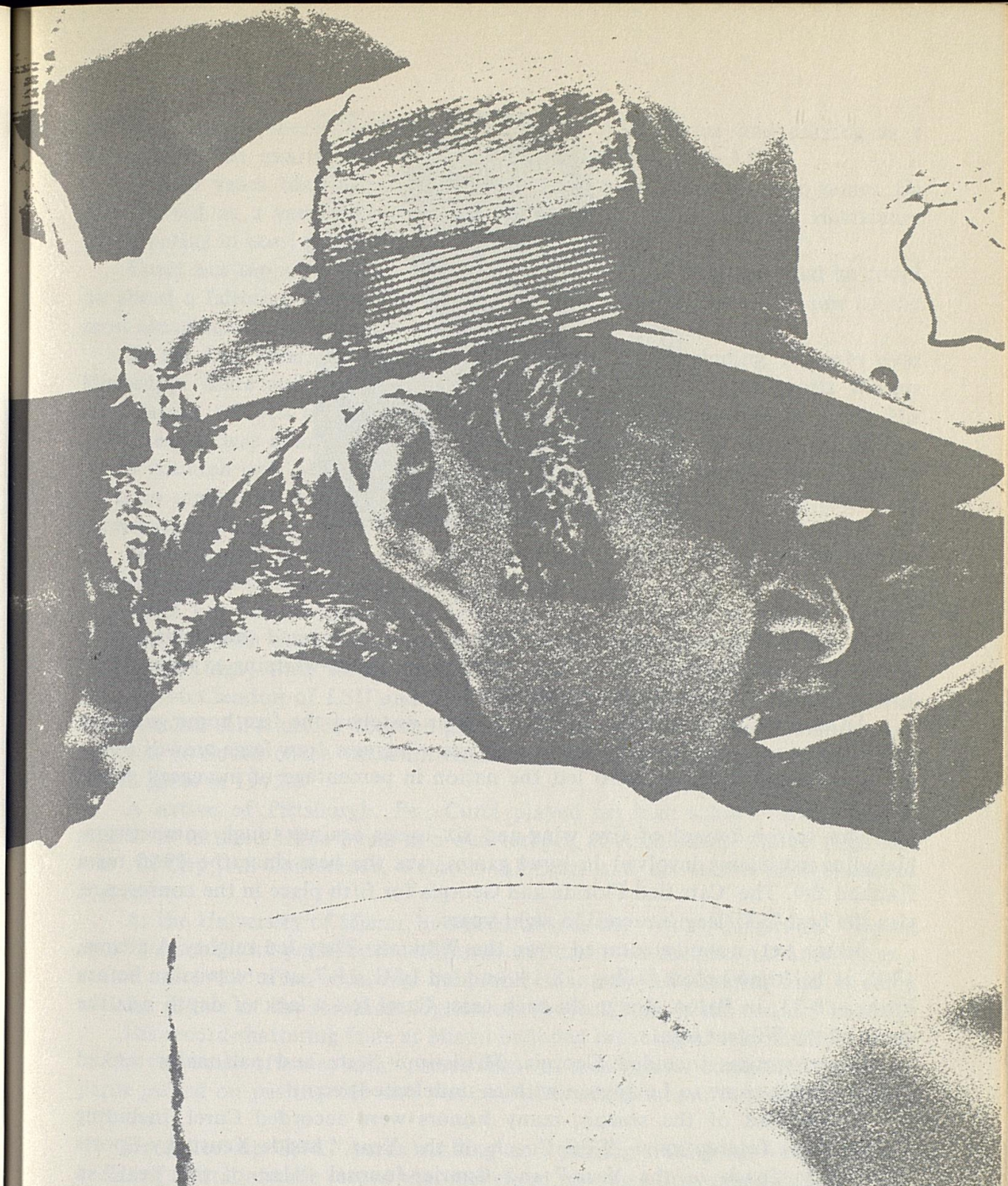
He served as assistant football and basketball coach at Georgetown College (1932-33) and Paris High School (1933-34), head basketball coach at Bagdad High School (1934-36) and principal and coach at Gleneyrie High School (1936-42).

Lancaster earned his master's degree in 1943 while serving as a part-time assistant in basketball and full-time instructor in Physical Education from Sept. 1942 until March 1944, when he entered the U.S. Navy as a Seaman 2/c. He advanced to lieutenant (SG) and returned to the University in March, 1946, in time to assist Rupp in winning UK's four NCAA basketball championships of 1948-49-51 and '58.

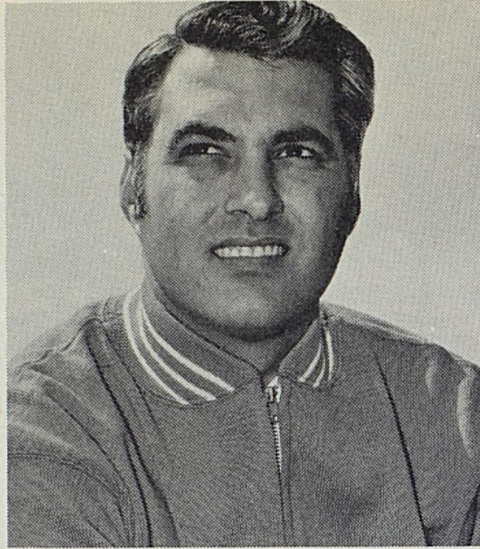
Traveled to Greece in 1951

In his own right, Lancaster has traveled extensively and received a signal honor when he was invited to prepare the Greek National Basketball Team for the 1968 Olympics. A return six-week tour in Athens was cancelled when Lancaster was asked to stay home and serve as acting athletics chief of staff.

Lancaster had traveled to Greece in the summer of 1951 on a special athletic assignment for the U.S. State Department. The mission called for him to act as an advisor to Greek Basketball Federation officials in Olympic procedures and other matters. He also conducted numerous clinics and coaching schools and gave public lectures on the cage sport. During the summer of 1962, he helped Coach Rupp conduct clinics for Army personnel in the Far East Theater and worked with Rupp on the team's Middle East Tour in 1966 and a clinic in Germany in the summer of 1967.



Wildcat Coaches



FRAN CURCI
Head Football Coach

In one excitement-packed year, Fran Curci transformed the University of Kentucky football program into an interesting and heart-warming experience for a record number of fans attending Wildcat games.

An average of more than 50,000 persons watched the five home games in new Commonwealth Stadium, while six "away" games drew large crowds to see the rejuvenated Wildcats, who led the nation in percentage of increased attendance.

The season record of five wins and six losses against tough competition, including six teams involved in bowl games, was the best since the 1965 team finished 8-4. The 'Cats tied Florida and Georgia for fifth place in the conference, also the best U.K. league record in eight years.

Better yet, nobody romped over the Wildcats. They led mighty Alabama, 14-0, at halftime before falling, 28-14, and led LSU, 21-7, at intermission before losing, 28-21, in Baton Rouge. In each case, Curci felt a lack of depth was the cause of the Wildcat loss.

Upset victims included Georgia, Mississippi State and nationally ranked Tulane, which came to Lexington with an undefeated record.

At the end of the season, many honors were accorded Curci, including United Press International "SEC Coach of the Year," Inside Kentucky Sports "Kentucky Coach of the Year," and Courier-Journal "Man of the Year" in Kentuckiana sports.

One of his big problems upon arriving in Lexington was to convince the players and fans that Kentucky could win; after an opening victory over Virginia Tech, he told the squad that a person would have thought they had lost, they had to learn to win. By the end of the season, the Wildcats became known as a team that never gave up, and twice came from far behind to lose by only two points to bowl-bound teams.

Curci came to U.K. in December 1972 from his alma mater, the University of Miami, Fla., where he was head coach two years. He started his career as

freshman coach there in 1962 after making All-America and playing as a 5-foot-9, 152 lb. quarterback for the old Dallas Texans of the AFL.

In four years, his Hurricane freshman teams won 12 and lost two games. He then served as a varsity assistant two years (1966-1967), and the Hurricanes participating in bowl games both those years.

Curci was tapped by the University of Tampa in 1968 to see what he could do about a faltering football program; in three campaigns, he wrote one of the most amazing success stories in college football.

In his first year, he put together a 7-3 season, including victories over Mississippi State and Tulane. That earned for him the Florida Sports Writers Association "Coach of the Year" award, a recognition repeated in 1970. His 1969 season was a brilliant 8-2 affair. His 10-1 record in 1970 also included a 31-14 triumph over Miami and brought the Tampans the nation's No. 1 College Division ranking as well as bringing Curci College Division "Coach of the Year" runner-up honors.

He took over as Miami grid boss Dec. 19, 1970, and left the program there in good shape for his successor.

Curci has been selected four times to coach in all-star games. He assisted Bear Bryant with the South team in Tampa's first annual American Bowl game three years ago, then served as South head coach the next year. He helped Charley McClendon of LSU and Alex Agase of Northwestern direct the East in the Coaches All-America football game at Lubbock, Texas, three summers ago and was co-South coach with Bill Battle of Tennessee in Miami's Shrine North-South game in 1972.

A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Curci played his high school ball in Miami, where he lettered three years as a quarterback at Archbishop Curley High and was All-City, All-Conference, Catholic All-State and his team's Most Valuable Player.

At the University of Miami, he was known as the "Mite-y Magician." Playing at 152 pounds, he parlayed intelligence and desire to become All-America as a senior in 1959 after receiving honorable mention All-America and winning acclaim as one of the foremost sophomore football stars in the country in 1957.

His record-shattering feats at Miami included breaking of seasonal and career marks for total offense, most passes thrown, most passes completed and most yards gained on passing. He also was co-holder of the record for most TD passes thrown.

He rolled up 2,767 yards rushing and passing during his varsity career, breaking a total offense record that had stood for more than two decades.

As a senior, he captained Miami and climaxed his career by engineering a stunning upset (18-23) over Big Ten champion Michigan State.

After graduation in 1960 with a degree in marketing, he played one year with the Dallas Texans and then served as a lieutenant in the Army, coaching and playing football for the Fort Eustis team, which won the National Service championship in the Missile Bowl.

He is married to the former Miss Patricia Ann Taylor of Louisville. They have four children, Angela 13, Frankie 11, Mary Teresa 10 and Jimmie 8.

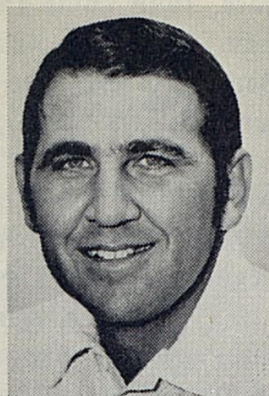

GALS' COACH FIRST UK MENTOR

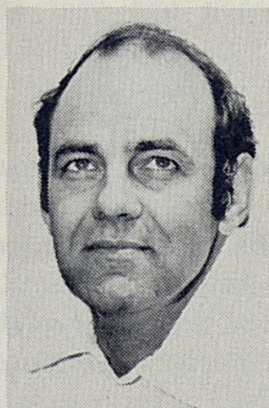
Prof. A. M. Miller, who became Kentucky's first football coach in 1892, was chosen because he had learned about the game from sideline observations while a student at Princeton. His only previous coaching experience was at a girls' school in Pennsylvania.

BILL NARDUZZI, DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR



The architect of an improved Kentucky defense last year was Bill Narduzzi, who has played for and been associated with some of the great names in the game of football. At East Canton, Ohio High School, he was co-captain in football, captain in basketball and baseball, earning three varsity letters in each and two in track. At Miami University in Oxford, he was a star lineman, first under Ara Parseghian and then under John Pont and was voted the Redskins' outstanding lineman as an end during his senior season (1958). Before entering the college coaching ranks, he was assistant coach of the city champion (11-1) Benedictine High, Cleveland, Ohio; assistant coach, Sandy High, Magnolia, Ohio (8-2) in 1961; assistant coach city champs (7-3) and track coach, Ursuline High, Youngstown, 1962. He was freshman coach at the University of Pittsburgh in 1962, and varsity assistant at Brown in 1963 and 1964. He coached seven years at Yale University, where the Eli ranked either first or second in total defense in the Ivy League all those years, was ranked No. 2 nationally in total defense and No. 3 against the rush in 1968, and in 1970 ranked No. 13 in total defense and No. 11 against rushing. Bill is immediate past president of the "Cradle of Coaches Association," a professional organization of Miami U. of Ohio affiliates in the coaching field.

BILLY MITCHELL, DEFENSIVE ENDS



Billy returned to his alma mater last year from Wake Forest, where he was a member of K-Letterman Tommy Harper's staff. A native of Georgetown, he earned four letters as quarterback at Garth High, plus three letters each in basketball, track, and tennis. He was All-State two years in basketball and regional high jump and tennis champion. As a U.K. halfback, he earned three letters and also lettered as a high jumper for the Wildcat cinder squad. He was head coach at Manual High in Louisville in 1965 and then served as an assistant at Murray State, Virginia Tech and Wake Forest.

JOHN COOPER, DEFENSIVE SECONDARY



Now in his second year with the Wildcats, John came to Kentucky from the University of Kansas, where he was defensive coordinator, defensive secondary coach and recruiting coordinator. A standout safety as a college player, he was a member of Iowa State's famed "Dirty Thirty" Club of 1959 and captained the Cyclones in 1961. He remained at Ames a year as a member of Clay Stapleton's staff, then joined Tommy Prothro at Oregon State for the 1963-64 seasons. He went with Prothro to UCLA to coach the defensive backs. He left UCLA with Pepper Rodgers when the latter was hired for the KU head job following the 1966 season. A native of Clinton, Tenn., he was a quarterback and safety on the undefeated Powell High School team of 1952 and the 1953 team (7-3) and was named outstanding player in the Tennessee All-Star game. He also earned three letters each in basketball and baseball. At Iowa State, he was most valuable player in 1961. He was on the coaching staff of three bowl teams: Oregon State vs. Michigan in 1965, UCLA vs. Michigan State in 1966, and Kansas vs. Oregon State in 1963.

DAN COUGHLIN, DEFENSIVE LINE



A teammate of Fran Curci and a two-year starter as offensive guard and linebacker at the University of Miami, Dan cut his coaching teeth at Coral Gables High School, where he spent nine years with the perennially powerful teams there. During his tenure, the Cavaliers won 102 games, lost nine and tied one, registering nine shutouts in 13 games in 1967 and winning two national championships. A native of Cleveland, he played his prep football at Benedictine High. After graduating from Miami, he coached one year at LaSalle High there.

JON MIRILOVICH, OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR



A former star end at the University of Miami, Jon is in his fourteenth year of coaching and second year at Kentucky. He was a teammate of Fran Curci at Miami's Archbishop Curley High, earning All-City and All-American honors. Playing as two-way end at U. M., he lettered three years and was accorded honorable mention All-American, teaming again with Curci. He played with the Dallas Texans before a leg injury cut short his career. He served successfully as assistant coach at Columbus High (1961-62) and Southwest High (1962-62), head coach at Columbus (1965-66) and as assistant coach at Coral Gables High (1968-69) before joining Curci at Tampa in 1970. The Spartans swept to a 10-1 record that year and rolled up an astounding 342 points, including 31 against U. M. and 48 against Florida A&M. Jon went to Miami with Curci in 1971 and came to U.K. with him last year.

NICK NICOLAU, OFFENSIVE BACKFIELD



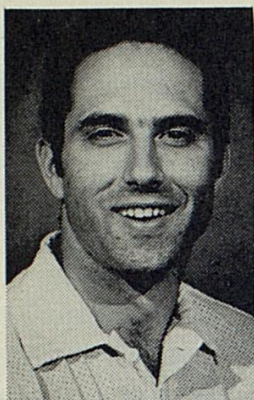
A graduate of New Bedford (Mass.) High, where he was a member of football and track teams, Nick launched his collegiate career as a freshman on the Southern Connecticut defensive unit which established a national small college defensive record in 1951. He was then shifted to offensive halfback during his sophomore campaign and was the club's leading ground gainer. He interrupted his college career for a two-year hitch in the Marine Corps but returned to Southern Connecticut in time for the 1956 season and was a key member of the Owls' 9-0 club, the finest in the school's history. He was the last player to earn four varsity football letters. His coaching background includes stints in high school, Southern Connecticut, Springfield College, University of Bridgeport, University of Massachusetts and University of Connecticut. While head coach at the University of Bridgeport for five years, he was twice chosen "Coach of the Year" in 1966 and 1969. He was selected as honorary head coach of the "Centennial" University of Bridgeport team. His '69 team won the Eastern Football Conference championship in 1969 and played in the First Annual Knute Rockne Bowl. He holds a Bachelor's degree from Southern Connecticut, a Master's degree from the University of Indiana and a doctoral degree from Springfield College.

RON BLACKLEDGE, OFFENSIVE LINE COACH



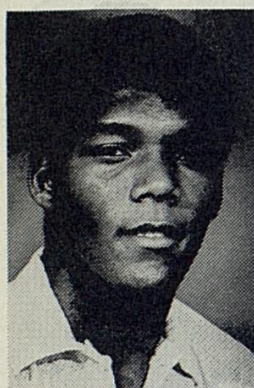
A member of the Bowling Green University Hall of Fame (Oct. 28, 1972), Ron came to U. K. in 1973 from the University of Cincinnati, where he served as an assistant (offensive line) in 1972. A native of Robertsville, Ohio, he was raised in Canton, where he was All-City and All-Stark County both in football and basketball, honorable mention, All-Ohio football, second team basketball, a three-letterman in baseball and winner of the Timken Athletic Achievement award in 1956. He was a regular on the 1959 undefeated Bowling Green football team, winning All-Mid-American Conference honors. He was also first team All-MAC in baseball, winner of 1960 NCAA slugging honors and a seven-year all-star in Canton amateur baseball circles. He was guidance counselor and assistant football coach, Canton South, 1960-63, head coach Timken High three years, a graduate assistant at Ohio University in 1966 and coach one year at Canton Glenwood. He was assistant coach at Ashland College three years before joining Wildcat letterman Ray Callahan at Cincinnati.

DAVID WELLS, RECEIVERS



A native of Madisonville, Ky., Dave came to the University three years ago as a graduate assistant after serving an internship as an assistant at his high school alma mater. He earned three football letters and was an All-State running back at Madisonville, setting a school record for the most points in a season. He also earned three basketball and four track letters, participating in the state track meet two years. An Academic All-SEC and honorable mention Academic All-American, he lettered three years as a wingback at Ole Miss, playing on one SEC championship team and participating in the Sugar, Bluebonnet and Liberty bowls. He was with the Washington Redskins during the 1966 exhibition season and was a graduate assistant that fall and the following season at Ole Miss. He spent two years with the Army in Germany before returning to Madisonville.

FLETCHER CARR, ASSISTANT



It is fitting that Fletcher work with centers, since that was the position at which he excelled at the University of Tampa. After earning four letters as a starter there, he joined his former coach Curci last year at U. K. A native of Erie, Pa., he made All-City in football at East High, playing tackle on both offense and defense, earned four letters in track and was city wrestling champ. At Tampa, he made All-South Independent and was an honorable mention All-American. He was All-American and NCAA College Division wrestling champ in 1971 and 1972, Florida State champ four years and participated in the 1968 and 1972 Olympic Trials. After finishing first in the College Division wrestling championships last year, he was fourth in the University Division. He is the 1973 Southeastern karate champion, holding a black belt in the sport. He also served last year as the University's first wrestling coach of modern times, finishing with a fine record and excellent prospects for the future.

DAN LEAL, CHIEF RECRUITER



A native of Oakmont, Pa., as is Fran Curci, Dan played linebacker and halfback in high school there, and graduated from Gannon College in Erie, Pa. He spent eight years with Spang & Co. in Butler, Pa., before coming to U. K. as Curci's chief recruiter. He had served as unofficial recruiter for Curci in the Pittsburgh area since Curci started coaching and recruiting in the college ranks.

ROY DON WILSON, TRAINER



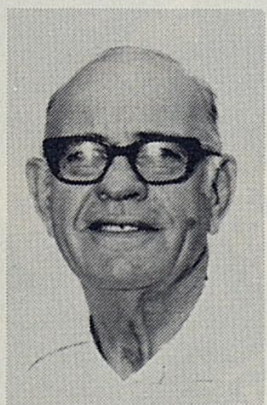
After serving two years as head trainer at The Citadel, "R. D." came to U.K. five years ago, and is recognized as one of the top men in his profession. A native of Texas, he is a graduate of Amon Carter Riverside High in Fort Worth. He received his B. S. degree from Texas A&M with a major in physical education and a minor in business. He also received a corrective therapist certificate from the VA hospital in Houston. After serving as a student trainer at Amon Carter and A&M, he was head trainer two years at Ector High in Odessa before serving two years as assistant trainer at Florida State University.

DR. FRANK M. DOWNING, ACADEMICS



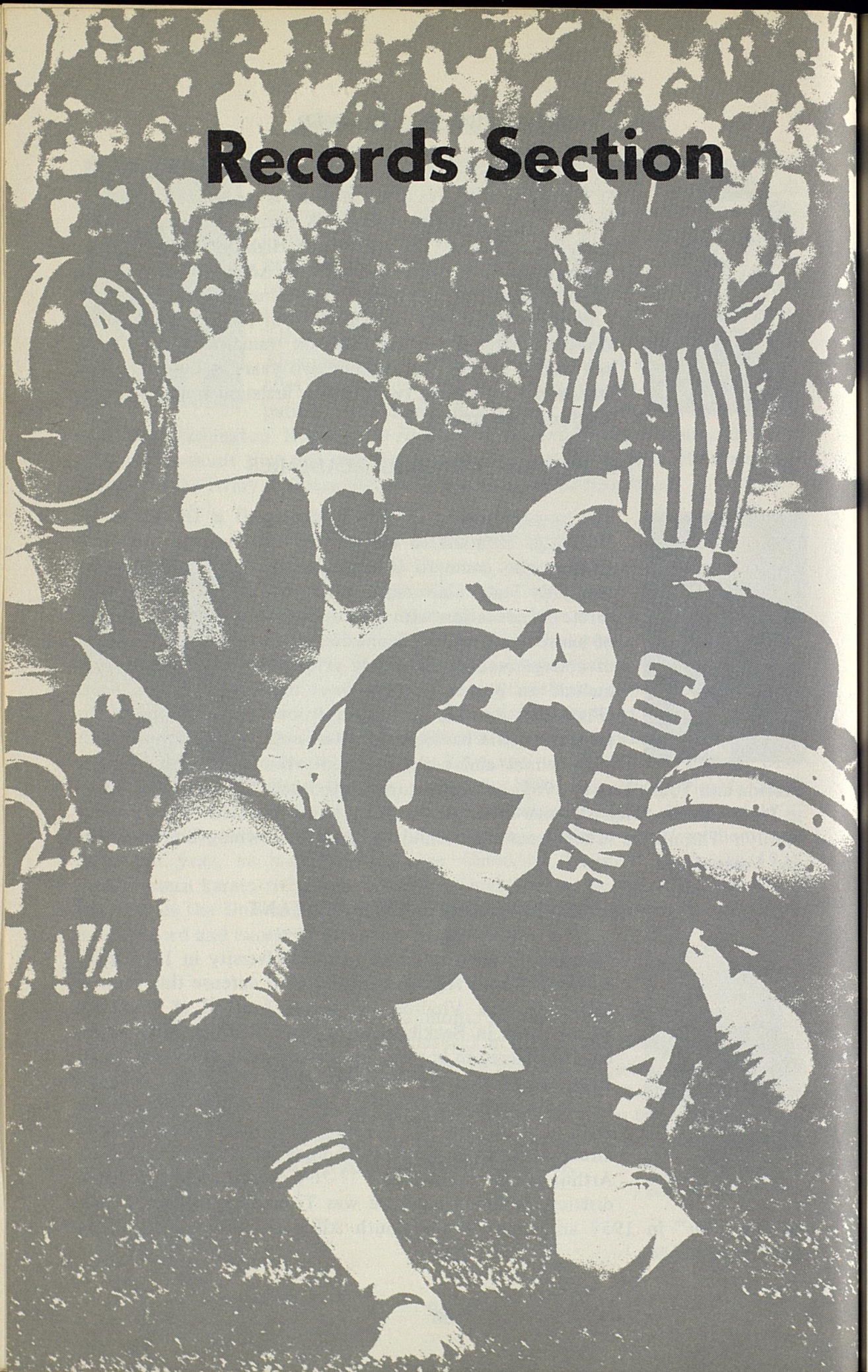

CLARENCE UNDERWOOD, ASSISTANT



"Buckshot," who returned to the University in 1965 as an assistant coach, will head up the prep defense this year. A native of West Virginia, he played football at Woodrow Wilson High in Beckley and at Marshall University, where he also lettered in boxing. He coached four years at Beckley High, served as a Naval lieutenant in WW II and coached two more seasons at Beckley before joining "Bear" Bryant's staff at U.K. He left U.K. in 1956 to become athletic director and head coach at Thomas Jefferson High in Port Arthur, Texas, compiling a 77-26-6 record and winning six district championships. He was Texas high school "Coach of the Year" in 1957 and coached the South All-Stars in the 1960 Texas schoolboy classic.

STOLL FIELD 'COW PASTURE' BIRTHPLACE OF DIXIE FOOTBALL

University of Kentucky's campus boasts the distinction of serving as the birthplace of Dixie football. Ironically, however, the forerunners of the present day Wildcats were not involved in the early grid contest.

The first intercollegiate football game ever played in the South, and probably the first to take place west of the Alleghenies, came about April 9, 1880, on old Stoll Field. That gridiron, located adjacent to the present Stoll Field, was the site of the early tilt which saw Kentucky University (now known as Transylvania College) take the measure of Centre College, 13¾ to 0. The match, which was said to resemble a combination of soccer and rugby, followed by only six years the introduction of the game of football to the United States.

University of Kentucky (then called A & M College of Kentucky) did not play its first game until a year later on the same field, which once served as the private pasture for University President James Patterson's bovine herd.

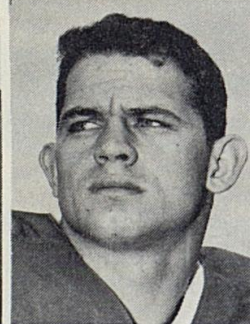

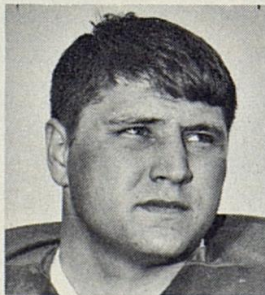

SPORTS INFORMATION STAFF



SPORTS INFORMATION DIRECTOR—Russell Rice was named sports information director at UK in May, 1969, after serving two years as assistant to Ken Kuhn, who retired after more than two decades of service with the University. Rice came to the Wildcats from The Lexington Leader, where he was a general reporter eight years and sports editor five years. A native of Paintsville, Ky., he won letters in football, basketball and baseball at Van Lear High. After serving with the U.S. Marines in World War II, he attended Kentucky Wesleyan College and received his bachelor's at the University of Kentucky in 1951. He has served as manager of the NCAA Mid-East Basketball Tournament (1968), president of the Southeastern Conference Sports Information Directors Association and chairman of the Basketball Hall of Fame Committee of the College Sports Information Directors Association and was recipient of the 1971 Churchmen's "Sportswriter of the Year" award. As a newspaperman, his duties ranged from agricultural hearings in Washington to spending three months as the traveling companion to a Kentucky gubernatorial candidate. He attended a national sports editors seminar at Columbia University and reported the activities of such Wildcat teams as football coach Charlie Bradshaw's "Thin Thirty" and "The Runts" of basketball coach Adolph Rupp. He is a former Kentucky area correspondent for Time-Life-Fortune magazines and was Kentucky editor of Tobacco Magazine and Religious News Service. For the past seven years, he has pursued a hobby of researching Kentucky basketball and football. He edits the K-Mens Newsletter and has been honored by that organization for outstanding service. He also was honored recently by WAVE-TV for "Outstanding Contribution to Televised Sports." He is married to the former Miss Doris Thacker of Knott County. They have four children—Mrs. Rodney Morris of Louisville, Russell James, 22, Judy, 20, and Kim, 8, all of Lexington.



ASST. SPORTS INFORMATION DIRECTOR—Jack S. Perry came to the University in March, 1970, after 15 years service in the library of The Lexington Herald-Leader. A native Lexingtonian, Jack attended the University in 1949-50 before entering the U.S. Air Force, where he served during the Korean War as an airborne radio operator aboard B-29s. He joined The Herald-Leader as assistant librarian in March 1955 and was named head librarian in the spring of 1960. Jack is married to the former Miss Barbara Sanders of Lexington. They have four children—Mrs. William Case of Lexington, Patti, 20, Jack David, 15, and Todd, 13.

COMMONWEALTH STADIUM

Commonwealth Stadium, the University of Kentucky's new football facility, is located on an 86-acre tract on the Kentucky Experimental Station Farm grounds south of the main campus and east of Nicholasville Road.

A concrete and steel structure with two cantilevered decks along each sideline, it replaced Stoll Field, where Wildcat football teams had played since 1924.

Constructed by Huber, Hunt & Nichols, Inc., the new facility has a capacity of 50,000 sideline seats, with end zone bleachers swelling the total to 58,000. The lower stands are so constructed that the seating can be increased to 68,000 later when needed.

Bids for the stadium were opened in mid-July 1972 and construction began a short while later.

The pressbox, located between the two levels on the south side of the playing field, is serviced by two elevators and contains a main working area, radio booths, food service areas, private booths and a camera deck extending along the entire front of the box.

Thirty-four concession areas and 30 restrooms are located conveniently throughout the facility. Four first aid stations with emergency health equipment also are provided. There are four major pedestrian ramps at each corner of the stadium and 40 ramp exits to seats.

The area immediately surrounding the stadium contains 6,000 parking spaces, with half of those paved and the other half in grass with gravel driveways. Another 8,500 parking spaces are located within a mile, all north, of the stadium.

Five exits, all leading to four-lane highways, serve the facility.

The playing surface was sodded in Kentucky bluegrass in July 1973 and this was replaced with bermuda last spring. A fairly new scoreboard was moved from Stoll Field and installed with a similar scoreboard at the new stadium.

The new stadium does away with the seeming duplication of titles—Stoll Field and McLean Stadium—that caused much confusion among the general public and sports-writing fraternity.

By action of the University Board of Trustees, the general area encompassing the old Wildcat playing field, located first on what is now an intramural field, was dedicated Oct. 14, 1916, as Stoll Field in honor of the late Judge Richard C. Stoll, prominent alumnus, trustee and benefactor of the University. Soon after the first sections of the concrete stadium on Euclid Avenue were completed Sept. 4, 1924, the new field site and stadium were likewise officially known as Stoll Field.

The first attraction to be held on the new Stoll Field was a football game with the University of Louisville Oct. 4, 1924. A gridiron clash between Kentucky and the then-powerful Centre College team was the first game played in the fully-completed stadium Nov. 1, 1924.

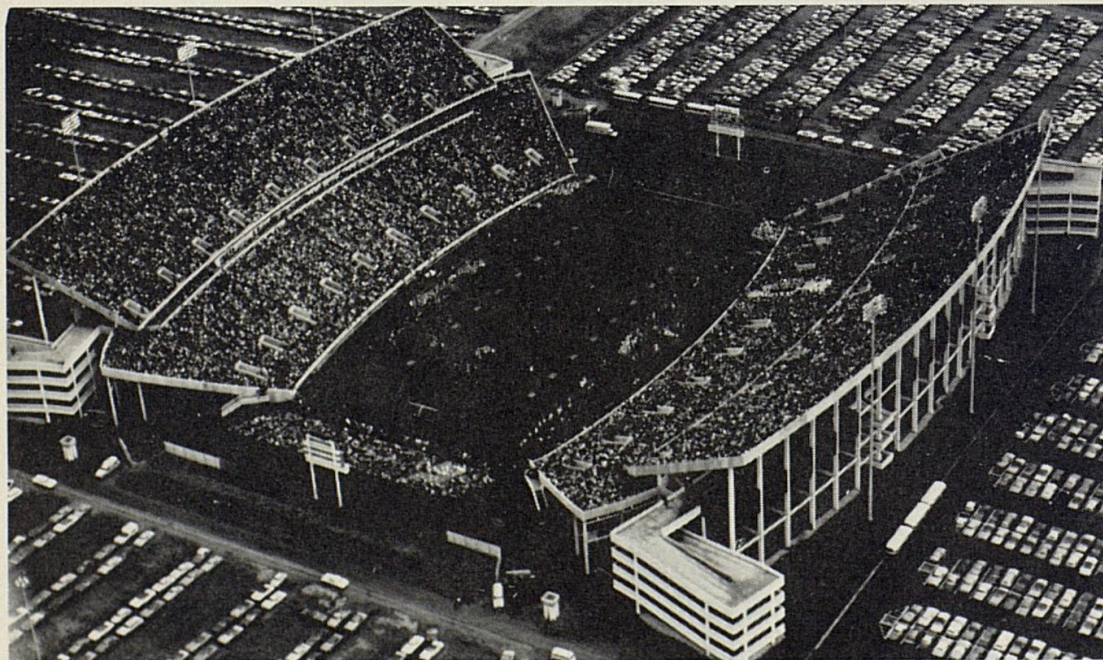

PRESS BOX—From 30 to 30-yard-line. Serviced by two elevators. Two VIP booths on each end; six booths for radio, scoreboard, timekeeper, coaches to field setup; two food-serving lounges; regular working space with approximately 105 seats; two Telecopier service areas; camera deck across entire front of box.

Footnote A — Although numerical scoring had not yet been introduced in Rugby football, either here or in Great Britain, when Kentucky and Transylvania (then known as Kentucky University) played their series in 1881, persons in charge of the games obviously had arrived at some sort of agreement assigning values to the various scoring plays. Records never existed and men who played in the games are now deceased. All we can do is accept the scores printed in the newspapers and surmise that a touchdown perhaps counted $\frac{1}{4}$ point and that a goal or an end-kick (a punt into the modern end zone) counted 1. That seems logical, since in the ratio scoring of that day, a touchdown was worth one-quarter of a goal. The end-kick, a British heritage, undoubtedly was introduced because all realized that green players would score few goals, if any.
