Jaruzelski lifts martial law in Poland

WARSAW, Poland — Martial law leader Gen. Wojciech Jaruzelski announced yesterday on national television that the military rule imposed here last Dec. 13 will be suspended by the end of the year.

Jaruzelski, who heads the Communist Party and the ruling military council, said the 21-man Council of National Redemption "is of the opinion that conditions have arisen for suspending martial law. I would like to state this just today — on the eve of the anniversary of its introduction.

"The suspension of martial law means that its basic rigors will cesse to function before the end of this year," he said.

Jaruzelski proclaimed martial law a year ago to begin the destruction of the independent labor union Solidarity. The union was outlawed Oct. 13, and last month the government concluded it was no longer a threat when underground leaders were unable to rally a nationwide protest strike.

Jaruzelski said the military council's recommendation that martial law be suspended would be presented to the Parliament, or Sejm, this morning. Since the Sejm is con-

trolled by the council and the party, its approval appeared

Jaruzelski spoke only in general terms of the restrictions that would be litted and those that would remain. Only regulations that directly protect the fundamental interests of the state, creating a protective shield for the economy and ensuring the greater personal safety of citizens, should remain in force wholly or in part as a temporary measure," he said.

Insult topped injury, however, with the January release of a report written by the New York Times' education editor calling UK one of the worst schools in the nation. "Absolutely ridiculous" and "fiction" were some of the names given the report by leaders here; whether the labels were true is subject to debate. Two weeks later, a former University vice president produced the surveys instrumental to the Times' essay — and they were blank. The surveys were never

distributed for completion, tarnishing the accuracy of the essay.

This semester began tragically with the death of a sophomore in a traffic accident. By the end of the year, five students lost their lives in various ways. Their passing is mourned by us all.

The UK football team, under new head coach Jerry Claiborne, provided us with entertainment, but entertainment does not a football game win. To be more precise, our squad went winless for the first time in history, and the season itself was not without the usual ups-and-downs UK has come to be expected to provide.

But through it all, we got to where we are

But through it all, we got to where we are now — final examinations. Today brings the first, and by Friday only those unlucky enough to register for certain classes will re-main here. Most of us will go home, some of us never to return here.

To those who will wake up this Saturday to find themselves in the real world, our congratulations and good wishes. You will need them in the cruel world we all live in.

To those of you who will be back (in only 27 days, mind you), have a safe holiday season. Enjoy your relatives and your friends and get some rest. Don't drive if you drink. And remember: Spring break begins in 88 days. There is some justice to life.




