


As one sportsman to another-The Secretary of the Treasury and Buck O'Neil, sports writer of the Times-Herald.

That distinguished looking man in the third row is the Secretary of the Treasury.




Mrs. Truman laughed when the President tried to collect the three dollars Bob LaFollette borrowed from him last week.

None of those cold fish finger tip handshakes from this man.




Matt Connelly adjusts his upper plate.






