

Dear Uncle Spencer,

Such a super parcel arrived on Saturday! It was a delightful surprise, & everything in it was really "just what we wanted." The fats are particularly welcome, as they're extra short. We really couldn't improve on it at all - except Mum says maybe you'd send her some dried apricots some time to make jam that tastes like jam! The last parcel scored its own success particularly with me - I was so thrilled that everything fitted. It would be so tragic if it didn't!

You know anyone who gets a parcel from the States or South Africa or Australia gets so excited, it's pathetic. It reminds me how before the war people used to send things to their relations in Poland because they hard times were hard. It's quite an experience to be at the other end of the deal. I know we have

To believe that one day things will be normal, but it's hard to imagine. A 12-year old on the radio the other day gave her ambition as seeing chocolate one out of the automatic machines on the railways. Makes it seem a long time!

At least we don't get shot at now, anyway. Everyone with relatives in Palestine is going around looking green from one letter to the next. This private war seems to be developing into a second Spain - it's quite obvious where the Arab arms are coming from. Yet I'd rather be there, & be able to see the enemy, I think, than to have the sort of thing that goes on here. Moseley & Co. are pretty busy, & these are times when the people are only too willing to have someone to blame for everything. The situation is too horribly like Germany after the war - before - the - last.

But don't think we're really so grim all the time. We splashed out & made the most of the holidays, & New Year's Eve we went to the Circus, & saw the Year in at a little restaurant locally where things

were very bright. One of our hobbies is skating - if you've got to be cold you might as well get some fun out of it.

So now we own the railways. So far I haven't noticed any improvement, but they say they're going to paint the stations & abolish the Railway Beer. Honestly, you won't know the old place if you come back.

Rene O'Neil from Dublin is now back in London. She's now qualified in medicine & is looking for a practice in a hurry - next July we own the doctors too. I can't think what they'll nationalize next. Of course the profession simply hate it - everyone in the country will pay insurance, & everyone will be on a doctor's panel - a great step from only the workers being able to see a private doctor for free.

I wonder how ~~of~~ our New York relations are enjoying the weather. Auntie Clara didn't want to risk being caught by our winter - & it's really quite warm for January. I haven't dug

out my boots yet, so it can't be too bad. I
suppose we've got it coming to us. That's
one thing I wish came in parcels -
California sunshine!

I really think I've covered
all the newspapers in brief, & it's only
left to me to say thanks a lot, & to
wish Richard better, & send our love
to all of you.

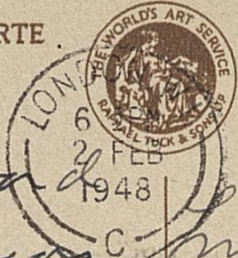

The weather here is very changeable just now. It's quite cold at present. Hope it gets warmer soon.

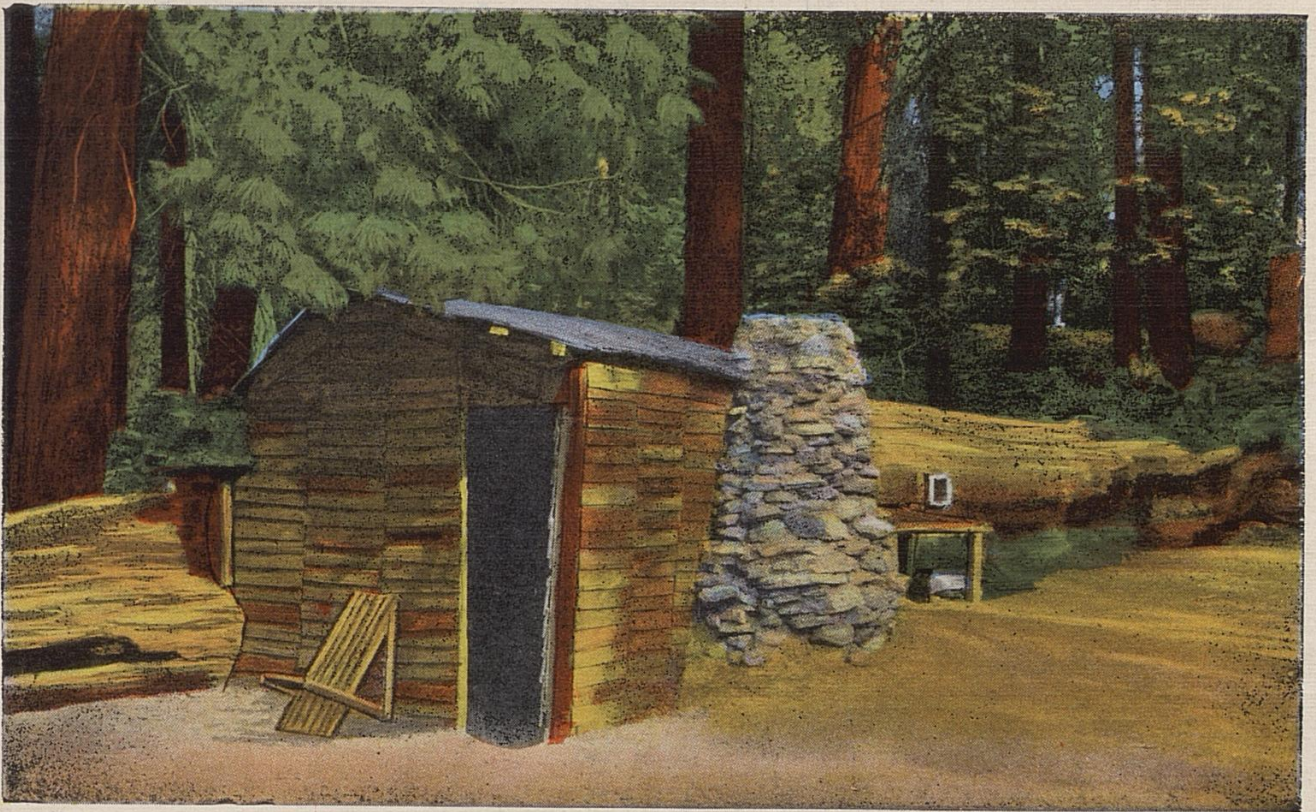
I have no very interesting news just at present. What do you hear from home? Write again soon. Should like to hear all about the wedding and maybe some pictures.

We are expecting Ghita and her husband back soon. Am quite looking forward to seeing them again. He is a very nice fellow. I met him in Toronto when I was there in the winter.

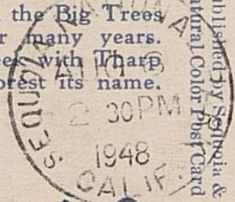
