

Minutes of the University Senate - November 11, 1935

The University Senate met in the Lecture Room of McVey Hall, Monday, November 11, with President McVey presiding.

The minutes of October 14 were read and approved.

The Committee on Duplication of Work presented the following new courses and changes in courses, which were approved:

College of Arts and Sciences

New Courses

Anat. and Physiol. 6. General Anatomy and Physiology for Nurses. The course is especially designed to meet the needs of those who are in training. Lectures and recitations, three hours a week; laboratory, two hours a week. Four credits. Prerequisite; General Chemistry is most desirable. If not had, General Chemistry must accompany this course.

Romance Lang. 3a-b. French Conversation and Composition. Two hours a week. Two credits. Prerequisites: Romance Lang. 1a-b.

Romance Lang. 10a-b. Spanish Conversation and Composition. Two hours a week. Two credits. Prerequisites: Romance Lang. 5a-b.

Change in Course

Sociology 109. The Family. To be changed from a two-credit course to a three-credit course.

The Senate approved the recommendation of the College of Education that Education 169a-b, Directed Teaching in Physical Education be raised from five to six credits to conform to the new certification requirements.

Dean Jones made an informal report on the administration of the Federal funds for students employment. He stated that provision had been made by the Government for the employment of 345 students, but that by subdividing the funds he had been able to give employment of 445 students, paying them from \$7.50 to \$15.00 a month.

Dean Jones also submitted a request for approval of the policy of the Social Committee regarding student dances. After some discussion, it was referred back to the Committee for further consideration, with a request that the proposed rule be reported along with the other rules and regulation at the next meeting of the Senate.

Dean Blanding made a brief report of the meeting of the Kentucky Deans of Women, during the Educational Conference, October 25-26. She mentioned three outstanding speakers who contributed to the program.

Dean Wiest gave a review of the group insurance plan and explained the reasons for making participation in the insurance compulsory. He reported that there were now more than 700 in the group.

President McVey gave a report of the meeting of the Association of American Colleges in Atlanta, Georgia, November 1-2.
