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

Terry Hall's continuing record of achievement has been well documented at the University of Kentucky. It took her less than five years to become the winningest coach in Kentucky women's basketball history. And should she post 20 victories with this year's squad, she would simply be keeping pace with her outstanding six-year season average.

In each of her first three seasons, Hall led her Kentucky teams to at least 23 wins. Overall, Hall's UK squads have won an impressive 68 percent of their games. Four of those teams advanced to the national playoffs. One captured the Southeastern Conference championship. All but one have been in the Top 20.

Hall's success is not unique to Kentucky, however. In 12 years of collegiate coaching, her teams have known only winning seasons. Her career record is 214-115, with a 121-55 mark at Kentucky. She previously coached for one season at Eastern Kentucky and had a

five-year stint at Louisville.

Hall began to establish Kentucky as a national contender in her first season as Lady Kats coach. That year the team won the Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference and Hall was named KWIC Coach of the Year. The Lady Kats advanced to the final round of 16 in the AIAW National tournament and completed the 1980-81 season with a 25-6 record. In 1981-82, women's basketball joined the NCAA and Hall's Lady Kats won the Southeastern Conference title and advanced to the Mid west Regional final before falling to eventual national champion Louisiana Tech on the Lady Techsters' home floor.

The 1982-83 team rose to new heights as the Lady Kats were ranked fourth nationally and set a new women's basketball attendance record-10,622 vs. Old Dominion in UK's Memorial

Coliseum. The team was upset by Indiana in the first round of the playoffs, but

In 1983-84, Hall had a very young and inexperienced team that was challenged with the fourth-toughest schedule in the nation. The Lady Kats earned respect from their opponents despite their up-and-down season and

The 1984-85 squad again faced the fourth-toughest schedule in the nation, and with the graduation of two key starters, expectations were not extremely high for Hall's young squad. Still, they came roaring out at the start of the season and owned an 11-3 record and No. 12 national ranking by the end of December. Before the season ended at 16-12, they had stunned four Top 20 opponents and proven they could play with any team in the nation.


Last year's team also defeated four Top 20 teams, and qualified for the NCAA playoffs before losing a 73-70 heartbreaker at Drake to end an outstanding 18-

11 season.

Donna Murphy joined the Lady Kats program in June, 1985, giving Coach Hall's staff an experienced coach and recruiter, as well as an accomplished player who is highly-regarded throughout the state. A former assistant coach at Memphis State and Florida, Donna achieved legendary status in Kentucky as a player at Newport Public High and at Morehead State University.

A native of Newport, Donna had a brilliant high school career and was honored as the state's first "Miss Basketball" in 1976. She went on to star at Morehead, where she earned All-America honors while virtually rewriting the record books of both MSU and the Ohio Valley Conference. Following her graduation in 1980, she was the first forward drafted in the now-defunct Women's Basketball League, and played for one year with the St. Louis Streaks.

Donna continued her education at the University of Cincinnati, where she served as a graduate assistant coach in basketball and track. After one year at UC, she returned to Morehead, where she was an assistant in basketball while completing her degree in higher education. She then served as an assistant for two years at Memphis State, before accepting a position at the University of Florida for the 1984-85 season.

Sue joined the UK training staff in 1982 after serving for one year as Co-Ordinator of Sports Medicine for the Department of Intramural/Recreational Services at East Carolina University. Sue graduated from Ohio State University, where she earned a degree in Physical Education in 1979 after serving for four years as a student trainer. She was a graduate assistant at Purdue University, where she earned her Masters Degree in Physical Fitness and Exercise Physiology in 1981.

A native of Smithville, Ohio, Sue is a member of the National Athletic Trainers Association.

Since becoming the eighth president of the University of Kentucky in August of 1969, Dr. Singletary has maintained an active role both in academics and

Great strides toward academic excellence have been the trademark of Dr. Singletary's presidency at UK. The Schools of Dentistry and Pharmacy consistently rank among the best in the nation.

Departments such as political science, history, and mathematics also have gained nationwide attention, while the UK library system now rates among the best in the Southeast.

Dr. Singletary has served as president

of the Southern Association of Land-Grant Colleges and State Universities, vice president of the American Council on Education and vice chairman of the Southern Regional Education Board.

He is a member of the Business and Higher Education Forum of the American Council on Education and a seniorat-large of the United Chapters of Phi

Beta Kappa.

Singletary's involvement in athletics is as impressive as his academic achievements. A former president of the Southeastern Conference, Dr. Singletary also served as a member of the NCAA Select Committee on Athletic Problems and Concerns in Higher Education and as chairman of the board of directors of the College Football Association. He currently is a member of the NCAA Presidents Commission.

In the 17 years Singletary has been president, the University of Kentucky has grown to more than 21,000 students



on the Lexington campus and close to 24,000 students in UK's 14 community colleges.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced when the UK Alumni Association presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award, an honor rarely bestowed upon a nonalumnus of Kentucky.

Singletary and his wife, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bon-

nie, Scot and Kendall.



Clifford O. Hagan

A former University of Kentucky basketball all-America, Cliff Hagan is no stranger to striving toward goals and achieving them. UK squads he played on won 86 of 91 games, including the 1951 NCAA Championship and the undefeated season of 1954. During his career with the Wildcats, he set dozens of Southeastern Conference records and

the NCAA season mark for rebounds with 528 during the 1951-52 campaign. Having achieved such lofty goals as a collegian, it is no surprise that Hagan

reaches beyond the rim as athletics director of his alma mater.

The new \$700,000-plus Hilary J. Boone Indoor Tennis Center is in operation. Groundbreaking is scheduled soon for the \$5.5 million Ervin J. Nutter Football Training Center. A new \$5 million-plus natatorium, to be named for former Wildcat Athletics Director Harry C. Lancaster, also is in the works.

Judging from his past accomplishments as an athlete and as an administrator, those

goals will be achieved.

Recent completed projects include: a recruiting/entertaining lounge and two storage rooms in the Football Offices complex at Commonwealth Stadium, replacement of 120 yards of turf and the addition of 40 yards of turf on one of the main practice fields, and new dressing facilities for women at Shively Sports Center.

A completely revamped training room in Memorial Coliseum, a computerized program for the Ticket Office and installation of computers in the Sports Information Office also were among UK's achievements during a banner 1985. Kentucky scored a first by offering up-to-the-minute computerized statistics at the 1985 Final Four.

In addition to serving as host for that 1985 Men's Final Four, the University welcomed the Southeastern Conference Basketball Tournament and the Women's NCAA Basketball Championship last spring.

Championships were nothing new to Hagan. In addition to the recent championships and that which his UK team won in 1951, Hagan captured a world championship as a player with the St. Louis Hawks of the National Basketball Association.

The Owensboro native is married to the former Martha Milton, also of Owensboro. The couple has four children: Mrs. Barry (Lisa) Thaxton, Louisville; Mrs. Jim (Laurie) Hill, Lexington; Mrs. Ron (Amy) Burdette, Decatur, Ala.; and Kip, a recent graduate of Transylvania University.

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The NCAA—Common Ground of College Athletics

What is the NCAA?

The question could be answered simply by saying "National Collegiate Athletic Association," but in reality the NCAA is much more than four words beginning with the letters N-C-A-A.

It is also much more than a staff working in Mission, Kansas, on administrative details of America's intercollegiate athletics programs.

To say that the NCAA is a staff or a group of people is to misunderstand not only what the NCAA is, but what its goals and objectives are. It is to misunderstand its very reason for being.

In reality, the NCAA is composed of nearly 1,000 colleges and universities across the United States. The NCAA, in its truest sense, is every member institution working together for the common good of all. It is democracy in action. All rules, all policies, all procedures, even the directions and goals of the NCAA are determined by the colleges and universities working and voting together in a common body.

Working together, these institutions of higher learning provide America's young athletes with an opportunity to "be as good as they can be" in the classroom and in the athletics arena

Today's college athlete is a student first and an athlete second, a student-athlete. Through their common association of NCAA membership, our nation's colleges and universities work to ensure the academic integrity of all their programs.

As with any organization made up of individuals or member institutions, the requirements in any given area, be it academic or enforcement, are continually changing in response to the desires of the membership, but the goal is always the same — a sound mind, a sound body, a spirit that is unafraid and a clean sports program that develops those qualities individually, institutionally and nationally.

Perhaps no area of the NCAA comes under more inspection than the enforcement program. Yet, even there, the NCAA is responsive to the needs and concerns of the individual institutions working together for what they perceive to be the common good. The colleges and universities make the rules. The NCAA staff, working under the direction of the colleges and universities, enforce the rules.

When a school runs afoul of the "NCAA rules," it had best remember the now infamous words of the cartoon character Pogo, "We have met the enemy and he is

Just as integrity is the key to an academic program, it also is vital to healthy competi-



tion between NCAA member institutions. The colleges and universities seek to create an atmosphere in which all institutions have an equal chance to recruit America's outstanding student-athletes. It is then up to member schools to help the individual student-athletes be as good as they can be, both in the classroom and in their athletic endeavors.

For all of the attention it receives, the enforcement program is but one small part of the NCAA's total concern. The NCAA administers 74 championships in three divisions in 21 sports. More than 15,000 men and women student-athletes compete annually in these events, designed to determine the national champion.

The NCAA also sponsors one of America's foremost honors programs, which is designed to recognize yesterday's and today's top athletes and the contributions of intercollegiate athletics as a whole to the country and society.

It has been said, and rightfully so, that sport is but a microcosm of society. Never before has it been more true, for sport and for the NCAA.

However, the goal of the NCAA is still the same — America's colleges and universities working together for the common good of higher education, and the young men and women who study and compete for NCAA member institutions.

Academic All-America

The academic all-America program, administered by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA), has honored the nation's best student-athletes for more than 30 years. It is a program that has bestowed accolades for scholastic and athletics achievement on some of sports' greatest names—Sam Huff; Merlin Olson; Bill Bradley; Heisman Trophy winners Alan Ameche, Terry Baker and Pete Dawkins; and, more recently, Bernie Kosar and Tracy Caulkins. One of its alumni, Tom McMillen, who has played 11 seasons in the National Basketball Association, may stand out as much for his success as for his 7-0 height.

McMillen, a former Rhodes Scholar from the University of Maryland and 11-year veteran of the NBA who will run for Congress in 1986, captures the very ideal of the student-athlete. "It is a particularly fitting time to raise the profile of the student-athlete on our campuses," McMillen said. "We are in a time when questions are raised whether we should emphasize acraemics or institutionalize athletics. The academic all-America award shows that academics and athletics can be equal ideals. Through this award, we should send the message loud and clear that campuses are for education and sports are ancillary."

The program began in the 1950s with honorees in football, and later basketball and baseball all-academic teams were added. In the mid-1970s, women's basketball became a part of the program; and in 1982, at-large programs were added.

The standards for nomination and selection are rigorous. To be nominated, a varsity athlete must have a minimum 3.20 cumulative grade-point average (on a 4.00 scale). Sports information directors at individual schools send nominations to eight

district coordinators who compile a local (district level) ballot. Academic and athletic biographical data are prepared in ballot form and mailed to the entire CoSIDA membership of each of the eight districts. The votes are returned and tabulated, and a district team is announced. From the eight district teams comes a national ballot, which is distributed to the 1,200 members of CoSIDA. The votes from each of the eight districts are counted by a national coordinator and an academic all-America team is formed.

CoSIDA selects all-academic teams for men in football, basketball, baseball and an at-large category, which encompasses other major NCAA sports. For women, all-academic teams are selected in volleyball, basketball, softball and in the at-large category. Honorees are presented permanent mementos of the honor.



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
Cheerleaders

THINGS DON'T GET EASIER FOR KATS

After playing five games against top-ranked teams already this season, one would think the schedule would begin to lighten up for Terry Hall's Kentucky Lady Kats. But unfortunately, things only get tougher. Tonight Vanderbilt brings a 14-2 record and a No. 11 ranking into this critical Southeastern Conference matchup. (See SEC standings, page 20). Next Old Diminion comes to town for a 7:30 p.m. game on Friday. Then it's on the road to No. 8 Ole Miss on January 28, and a slight break from top 20 action at Mississippi State on January 30. On February 3, the Kats are back at home against No. 2 Auburn.

But back to tonight. Kentucky owns a 7-2 series lead over the Lady Commodores, but will likely be facing Coach Phil Lee's toughest squad ever tonight. Karen Booker, a 6-1 senior center, leads Vandy with averages of 19.9 points and 12.3 rebounds. She was named SEC player of the Week last week for outstanding games against Ole Miss and Alabama. In the narrow 77-73 loss to Ole Miss, she had 29 points and 21 rebounds. Against Alabama she contributed 22 points and 12 rebounds to the 90-84 road win.

When Booker isn't filling it up inside, sophomore guard Deborah Denton is bombing from the outside. Denton is hitting 51 percent of her field goals and 74 percent of her free throws for a 17.6 scoring average. Junior forward Patsy Smith adds 12.9 points and 6.2 rebounds a game.

Old Dominion has a 7-1 series lead over Kentucky, but the one win is perhaps the most memorable in Lady Kats' history. That was on February 5, 1983, when a record-setting crowd of 10,622 watched Hall's team battle back in the second half to defeat the fifth-ranked

Lady Monarchs 80-66. The attendance record has since been shattered (22,000 at Iowa last year) and none of the current players were in college then. But nonetheless, Kentucky vs. Old Dominion still stacks up as an exciting game between two always-respected powers.

ODU has two dynamic junior forwards in Donna Harrington (13.9 ppg, 8.5 rpg) and Adrienne Goodson (12.3, 7.6). The Lady Monarchs bring a record of 7-8 into Friday's game, but boast a schedule that is very similar to Kentucky's in terms of toughness.



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DEBBIE REACHES MILESTONES DESPITE PRESSURE

With the Lady Kats leading by 20 points, Debbie Miller stepped to the free throw line. The game against Tennessee State was already in the win column, but the pressure was still on. Debbie calmly swished both shots, allowing her to break the record for consecutive free throws of 22 held by Diane Stephens set during the 1982-83 season.

Debbie has excellent shooting touch, as her career marks of 56 percent from the field and 81 percent from the line proves. Debbie ranks second in the Southeastern Conference in free throw percentage at 86.9, seventh in field goal percentage at 56.9 and 12th in scoring at 14.8.

"Debbie has great touch and shooting form for a big girl," Coach Terry Hall said.

Debbie says she goes to the line with confidence. "I think it's (shooting free throws) just a matter of concentration," she said. "I just try to block everything out while I'm at the line." Debbie extended her consecutive free throw string to 26 before missing against LSU January 17.

In an interview prior to the Tennessee State game, Debbie admitted that she felt the pressure. "I'd be lying if I said I didn't," she said. "I want the record because it will give me something to cherish and remember."

Debbie, as one of the team captains, must provide leadership both on and off the court. Her advantages of 14.8 points and 7.5 rebounds per game attest to her leadership on the court. As a leader off the court, Debbie tries to lead by example. "I do feel more responsibility as a captain. I just try to have a good attitude and play hard. I try to be a role model for the younger players and show that good things will come to those who work hard," she said.

Hard work has paid off for the 6-1 senior from Liberty, Ky. Debbie currently has 850 points for her career, good for 13th place among all-time Lady Kat scoring leaders. If she continues at her current pace, she should be only the 10th member of the 1,000-Point Club. Also within her reach is the career record for free throw percentage held by Stephens at 82.4. In addition to her scoring accomplishments, Debbie has pulled down over 500 career rebounds.

Debbie, a social work major, has enjoyed her four years at UK. "I can say it's been a truely great experience," she said. "It's opened a lot of doors, I've gotten free education and built some life-time friendships. To sum it up, it's been a memorable experience."









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SOUTHERN CONFERENCE MAY BE STRONGER THAN EVER

For four consecutive seasons the Southeastern Conference has been considered the top league in the nation. And as the 1986-87 season passes the midway point, it can be argued that the SEC is presently stronger than it has ever been. In the Associated Press Top 20 poll released on Monday, six conference squads are ranked in the top 12. Aurburn is No. 2, Tennessee No. 3, Mississippi No. 8, LSU No. 9, Vanderbilt No. 11 and Georgia No. 12.

The Lady Kats have already suffered losses on the road to Tennessee and LSU, and, after meeting No. 11 Vanderbilt tonight and playing host to perennial power Old Dominion on Friday, travels to No. 8 Ole Miss. Not until they play at Mississippi State on January 30 do they meet a non-ranked conference opponent.

SEC teams have proven their dominance over the rest of the nation by running up a 101-19 record against non-conference foes this season. And although Tennessee is currently tied for fourth place in the conference, the Lady Vols can boast a victory over the No. 1-ranked team in the country (an 85-78 win at Texas).

Last season, seven SEC teams made the NCAA playoffs. It would appear that the currently ranked teams, along with Kentucky (9-6) and Alabama (12-4), all have good shots at making the playoffs this season, bringing the total to eight.

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SEC Foes Highlight 'Good, Tough' Schedule

"Our philosophy has always been that in order to be a good, tough team, you have to play a good, tough schedule," said Kentucky coach Terry Hall.

If Hall's reasoning holds true, her 1986-87 Lady Kat basketball squad should be ready for anybody who happens down the pike. A quick glance at Kentucky's list of opponents shows eight teams in the national Top 20 (in two separate polls). Five of those eight teams are also Southeastern Conference opponents. The ranked teams are Louisiana Tech, Auburn, Tennessee, Old Dominion, Louisiana State, Georgia, Mississippi and Ohio State.

The dominance of the SEC schools is of no real surprise. The SEC has become known as a hotbed of women's basketball. Tennessee's seventh appearence (in 10 years) in the Final Four was the latest display of showings by the SEC in post-season play. Seven of the 10 SEC teams participated in the NCAA tournament last season with five of the teams advancing to the quarterfinal round.

But the SEC teams will not be content to sit on their laurels, by any means. Any one of the ranked squads has the capabilities to win the conference title, and with a little luck, one of the others could be 1987's Cinderella team.

"This year is no different than any other," said Hall. "We (the SEC teams) will take turns beating up on each other, with some upsets along the way. It is always unpredictable. A break here and a break there, and anybody could win."

Auburn coach Joe Ciampi and Tennessee's Pat Summit agree.

"This is by far the toughest conference as a whole in the country," said Summitt. "Any one of four or five teams could win the SEC title as well as the national title."

"This has to be the toughest conference, top to bottom, in the country," Ciampi said. "There is so much depth and talent that it will be a real fight again this season."

Not only will Kentucky's challenges come from conference opponents, but perennial national powers Louisiana Tech and Old Dominion will test the young Kats in 1987. Both of these teams have won two national championships. ODU is the Sun Belt Conference favorite in '87, while Louisiana Tech will be gunning for yet another NCAA tournament appearance.

Old Dominion coach Marianne Stanley also has respect for the SEC.


"I definitely feel the SEC is one of the toughest conferences in the country and I see them challenging for national honors again this season," said Stanley. "In addition to the SEC, I also feel the Sun Belt Conference, of which we are a member, and the Atlantic Coast Conference are very competitive."

Stanley's assessment of the Sun Belt Conference as competitive may be an understatement. Not only is ODU back to strength after a season plagued by injuries, but Western Kentucky will be in the hunt for its third straight Final Four appearence.

The 1986-87 version of the Lady Kats will be a mixture of youth and experience. With the loss of Leslie Nichols and Karen Mosley, UK will be counting on the leadership of Sandy Harding, Debbie Miller and Bebe Croley to guide the five eager freshmen.

"We'll be smaller this season," said Hall. "I think our shooting will be one of the strongest points, but desire could be the thing that wins us alot of games."

As the Lady Kats dive headlong into the 1986-87 gauntlet . . . er, season, a few lumps are inevitable, but the lessons to be learned from the lofty competition will provide Hall's charges with the "good, tough" opponents they seek.



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Since the Wildcats moved downtown to 23,000-seat Rupp Arena in 1976, the Coliseum has been the exclusive home of the Lady Kats. Throughout their 11 seasons in Memorial Coliseum, the Lady Kats have added an SEC title of their own and compiled a 140-42 record there.

The highlight of the Lady Kats' era in Memorial Coliseum came on Feb. 5, 1983. On that cold Saturday night, 10,622 enthusiastic fans filed into the 11,500-seat gymnasium to watch Kentucky upset fifth-ranked Old Dominion. That crowd constituted the largest crowd to have ever watched a women's college basketball game in America. Iowa broke the record last season with an amazing attendance of 22,000, but Kentuckians will long remember the excitement of that evening. The Lady

Kats were ranked fourth nationally after the Old Dominion victory, and in their three remaining home games that season they averaged 7,600 fans.

Just as their male counterparts did before them, the Lady Kats have made Memorial Coliseum the home of a winning high-class program. Among their many wins is included a 31-game homecourt victory streak in 1981-82.

Plans for construction of the Coliseum began in 1941, when Dr. H. L. Donovan became president of the University and recommended a building "that will properly take care of our athletics, our health services, our physical education and our recreation."

The Coliseum was completed in 1950 at a cost of \$3,995,000. The huge building was dedicated to serve as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentuckians who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict. The Coliseum covers an entire city block and has as much space as a seven-story office building.


